REPORT.

THE Council of the Zoological and Acclimatisation Society of Victoria has the honor to submit its Twenty-first Annual Report to the Subscribers.

During the past year the Society has become an incorporated body, having successfully carried a bill through Parliament during the last session for that purpose; this places the Society on a much more secure and satisfactory footing, as its by-laws can now be enforced, and the Act empowers the Society to borrow a sum of money on the security of its income not exceeding £10,000, for the improvement of the Gardens.

In June last the Assistant Director, Mr. Dudley Le Souef, was despatched to Singapore and the Malay States, principally for the purpose of procuring a Rhinoceros and a pair of Tapirs for the Zoological collection; he procured both, though at considerable expense, as the demand for these valuable animals for the Zoological Gardens of Europe is very great, and the prices asked and obtained by the native trappers are high in consequence.

The first Tapir, a very fine animal, reached Melbourne in September last by the S. S. *Iolani*, but it refused food and began to pine, and in

spite of every care died in about five weeks after arrival. The second Tapir died at sea near Port Darwin, and the Rhinoceros in Mr. Le Souef's charge reached Sydney in safety and apparent good health; unfortunately he had there to tranship all the stock, and was detained for several days, the weather being both cold and wet; the day before he left Sydney the animal was attacked by acute inflammation, brought on by the great change in the temperature, and died in a few hours. The death of these valuable and expensive animals has been a considerable loss to the Society. Mr. Le Souef brought back a number of other specimens which have enriched the collection in a desirable direction, and the Gardens are now very attractive, the collection being larger and more valuable than it has ever been previously.

It is, however, much to be regretted that the number of paying visitors to the Gardens during the past year has been slightly below those of 1883, the numbers in that year being 79,541, as against 76,590 in 1884.

The Council attributes this falling off to the free Sunday, the attendance on that day continuing to increase, and is a most serious hindrance to the onward progress of the Society. The Council has no hesitation in affirming that had the Gardens been open only to subscribers on Sundays as in London, or a charge made as in Continental and American Gardens, this Society would now have taken its place among the leading Societies of the world, and the Gardens would have become infinitely more attractive than it is possible to make them under present conditions. It seems to the Council that if the present arrangement is to continue, the Government and Parliament should at least double the present grant of £1,500, as that sum is a most inadequate compensation to the Society for the immense crowds of visitors, estimated at over 200,000 annually, who visit the Gardens free on Sundays.

On September 8th last, the Brunswick and Coburg Railway line was opened, and gates were erected close to the Royal Park Station and duly advertised in the press, but after a trial of three months the receipts were found not to pay the gatekeeper's wages, and the gates have therefore been closed. Until the connection with Flinders Street is effected, these gates will only be opened on public holidays.

During the past year the improvements in the grounds have been steadily carried on. A building for Mammals has been erected containing six divisions. One of the large circular Aviaries has been rebuilt. A new Parrot House has been added, and many other minor additions and alterations.

If the Council decide on borrowing money to improve the grounds, some good buildings will be erected, among them a new Refreshment Room of a superior class, and a Band Stand.

The last Report stated that the Council was still in correspondence with the Hon. Howard Spensley on the subject of the importation of Herring Ova. Mr. Spensley has gone to considerable expense and much trouble to compass this matter, and in conjunction with Mr. Lalor, the Manager of the Brighton Aquarium, has experimented and endeavored in every way to retard the vitality of the Ova by cold sufficiently long to enable the spawn to be sent out, but up to the present time it is to be regretted that the experiments have completely failed. Several suitable streams have been stocked with Trout Fry during the past year from Ova procured from the Salmon Commissioners of Tasmania. The Society is also indebted to Sir Samuel Wilson through his agent, Mr. A Fisken, for the gift of nearly 400 Salmon Trout Fry, which were successfully placed in two suitable streams, tributaries of the Upper Yarra.

The Society continues its efforts to acclimatise Pheasants and other game birds at Gembrook; they are now spread over a considerable area, but they do not increase as quickly as could be wished, the great drawback in acclimatising birds throughout Victoria is the want of berrybearing bushes. In New Zealand there are such in abundance, and game increases much more rapidly in consequence.

The Council has disposed of the Society's Ostriches to Mr C. M. Officer, M.P. The Council having no suitable land for Ostrich farming was unable to retain them with any prospect of success. It is however a matter of congratulation that the birds have fallen into such good hands. The Messrs. Officer have had charge of them for some years, and have already spent a large sum of money in developing the industry, and there is but little doubt that Ostrich farming will become an important matter

in the future of the colony. There is no reason why selectors in the North and North Western portions of the colony should not adopt this industry to their own profit.

During the last session of Parliament a bill brought in by the Hon. D. Sterry, M.L.C., for the abolition of the Swivel Gun, was passed into law. The use of this cruel and destructive weapon was universally condemned throughout the colony.

The close season for Hares has lately been abolished, but the Hare is now so firmly established that it can well hold its own without protection.

Advantage was taken of Major-General Scratchley's visit to Melbourne to interest that gentleman in obtaining specimens of the Fauna of New Guinea for the Society's collection. General Scratchley, as her Majesty's Commissioner in New Guinea, will no doubt have many opportunities of assisting the Society's efforts in that direction.

The Council would, in conclusion, tender its best thanks to the retiring President, Mr. Moule, for his services during his term of office, and also to the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Purchas.

The Hon. Veterinary Surgeon, Mr. Kendall, has been most attentive to the health of the stock in the Gardens, and the Council begs to record ts appreciation of his services.

REGULATIONS

MADE BY THE COUNCIL OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL & ACCLIMATISATION SOCIETY

PURSUANT TO THE ZOOLOGICAL AND ACCLIMATISATION SOCIETY INCORPORATION

ACT 1884, Section 8.

- 1. Membership.—A subscriber of One guinea or npwards annually, which shall be payable in the month of January, shall be a member of the society; and contributors, within one year, of Ten guineas or upwards shall be life members of the society; and any person who may render special services to the society shall be eligible for honorary membership, and may be elected as such by the Council, or by any annual general meeting.
- 2. Election of council.—At the annual meeting to be held in the month of February, 1885, nine members, comprising the whole of the elected members of the council, shall be elected by ballot, and thereafter the president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall annually retire from office, and also three other members of council (namely those who have attended the fewest meetings of the council since their appointment) shall retire annually, but shall be eligible for re-election, subject to Regulation No. 9.
- 3. Vacancy in council, how supplied.—In case of a vacancy occurring by the death, resignation, or non-attendance of any member of the council for a period of two months, without leave of the council, the remaining members shall, in due course, appoint another member of the society to be a member of the council in the place and stead of the member who shall so resign or absent himself; but such new member shall be nominated at an ordinary meeting of the council prior to the meeting at which he is elected.
- 4. Council to fill up vacancies.—In case of a vacancy occurring by the death or resignation of the president, vice-president, or honorary treasurer, the council may appoint from amongst themselves, or the other members of the society, a person to fill the vacancy so occurring, and the person elected shall hold office only until the next annual meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election for the subsequent year: Provided that such vacancy shall not be filled up unless seven days' notice in writing shall have been sent to each member of the council, stating the vacancies which it is proposed to fill up.

- 5. Eligibility of members of council.—No person shall be eligible as a member of council unless he be a subscriber to the funds of the society of at least One guinea per annum, and any member of Council whose subscription shall be in arrear for three months after his subscription is payable shall cease to be a member of Council: Provided that this rule shall not apply to persons who may have become life-members of the society, by a payment of Ten guineas, or who may be honorary members of the society, and provided also that a month's notice in writing shall be sent to the member so in arrear before his place can be filled up.
- 6. Meetings of council.—The council shall meet at least once a month, three members to form a quorum, and transact the business of the society. And the director shall have power to call a special meeting of the council whenever occasion may require.
- 7. Minutes of proceedings.—Minutes shall be made in books kept for the purpose of all proceedings at general meetings of the members, and minutes shall also be made of the proceedings of the council at their general and special meetings, and of the names of the members attending the same, and such minutes shall be open to inspection by any member of the society at all reasonable times.
- 8. Moneys to be paid to treasurer.—All subscriptions and other moneys received on account of the society shall be paid to the treasurer, or some person authorized by him, who shall place the same in a bank, to be named by the council, to the credit of the Society; and no sum shall be paid on account of the society until the same shall have been ordered by the council, and such order be duly entered in the book of the proceedings of the council and all cheques shall be signed by the treasurer as such, and be countersigned by the president or one of the vice-presidents, and by the director.
- 9. Annual meeting.—An annual meeting of members shall be held in the month of February in each year, and the council shall report their proceedings during the past year, and shall produce their accounts duly audited for publication; and the meeting shall elect by ballot the office-bearers for the ensuing year, and fill up any vacancy which may exist in the council: Provided that no person shall hold the office of president or vice-president for two years successively.
- 10. Medals.—No medal of the society shall be awarded to any person except by the vote of at least seven members of council, present at a council meeting, and after notice of motion for awarding such medal shall have been given at the next preceding meeting of the council.
- 11. Time of gardens opening and closing.—The gardens are open from half-past nine a.m. till half-past four p.m. in winter, and six p.m. in summer, except on Sundays when the gates are not opened until half-past one p.m.
- 12. Dogs not allowed in gardens.—Visitors are not allowed to bring dogs into the gardens. A penalty of Two pounds is imposed for an offence against this regulation, in addition to which the owner of any dog found in the gardens will be held responsible for any damage done by such dog.

- 13. Prohibitions.—Visitors are especially prohibited from teasing or disturbing the animals or birds; also from interrupting the workmen by conversation or otherwise; also from leaving bottles, broken glass, or crockery, paper, or litter of any kind in the gardens; from lighting any fire therein; from posting any bills on the fences, houses, or trees; and from playing cricket, football, or other games within the gardens. A penalty of Ten shillings is imposed for an offence against this regulation.
- 14. Children, unprotected, not allowed in gardens.—Children under twelve years of age will not be allowed within the gardens unless with a parent or other adult, and if found therein may be expelled therefrom.
- 15. Prohibitions.—Walking across the shrubberies or flower borders, pulling flowers or branches from the plants, shrubs or trees; standing upon or climbing over any of the fences, climbing trees or bird-nesting, cutting names or letters or marks of any kind, or writing on any of the seats, or trees or fences, or any building erected for the accommodation of the public are strictly prohibited. A penalty of Ten shillings is imposed for an offence against this regulation.
- 16. Entrance into enclosures prohibited.—Entrance into those parts of the grounds which are specially enclosed for plantation, or other purposes, is strictly prohibited, under a penalty of Five shillings.
- 17. Smoking prohibited.—Smoking in the summer time, at such times as may seem necessary to the directors for the safety of the gardens and the property therein, is prohibited, and at such times notices to that effect will be posted at the gates. A penalty of Five shillings is imposed for an offence against this regulation.
- · 18. Expulsion on misbehavior.—Any person found in a state of intoxication, or behaving in a disorderly manner, or creating or taking part in any disturbance, or committing any act of indecency, or swearing or using bad language, or committing a breach of any of the above regulations may be forthwith removed from the gardeus, and any member of the society so misbehaving shall cease to be a member.
- 19. Charges for admission.—Admission to the gardens is free on Sundays. On Mondays non-subscribers will be admitted on payment of One shilling for each adult and Sixpence for each child under twelve years of age. On all other days of the week non-subscribers will be admitted on payment of Sixpence for each adult and Threepence for each child under twelve years of age. State and other schools will be admitted to the gardens on application to the director at half the usual entrance fees. Members of the society admitted free.
- 20. Repeal of pre-existing rules.—All rules and regulations of the society in force prior to its incorporation and up to the date of these regulations coming into effect are hereby repealed.

The above regulations were made by a majority of the whole council of the society at a meeting assembled on Monday, the 5th day of January, 1885.


