The motto is filled with practical philosophy, reflecting a spirit and sincerity that shows the true viewpoint of every member of the F. F. A.:

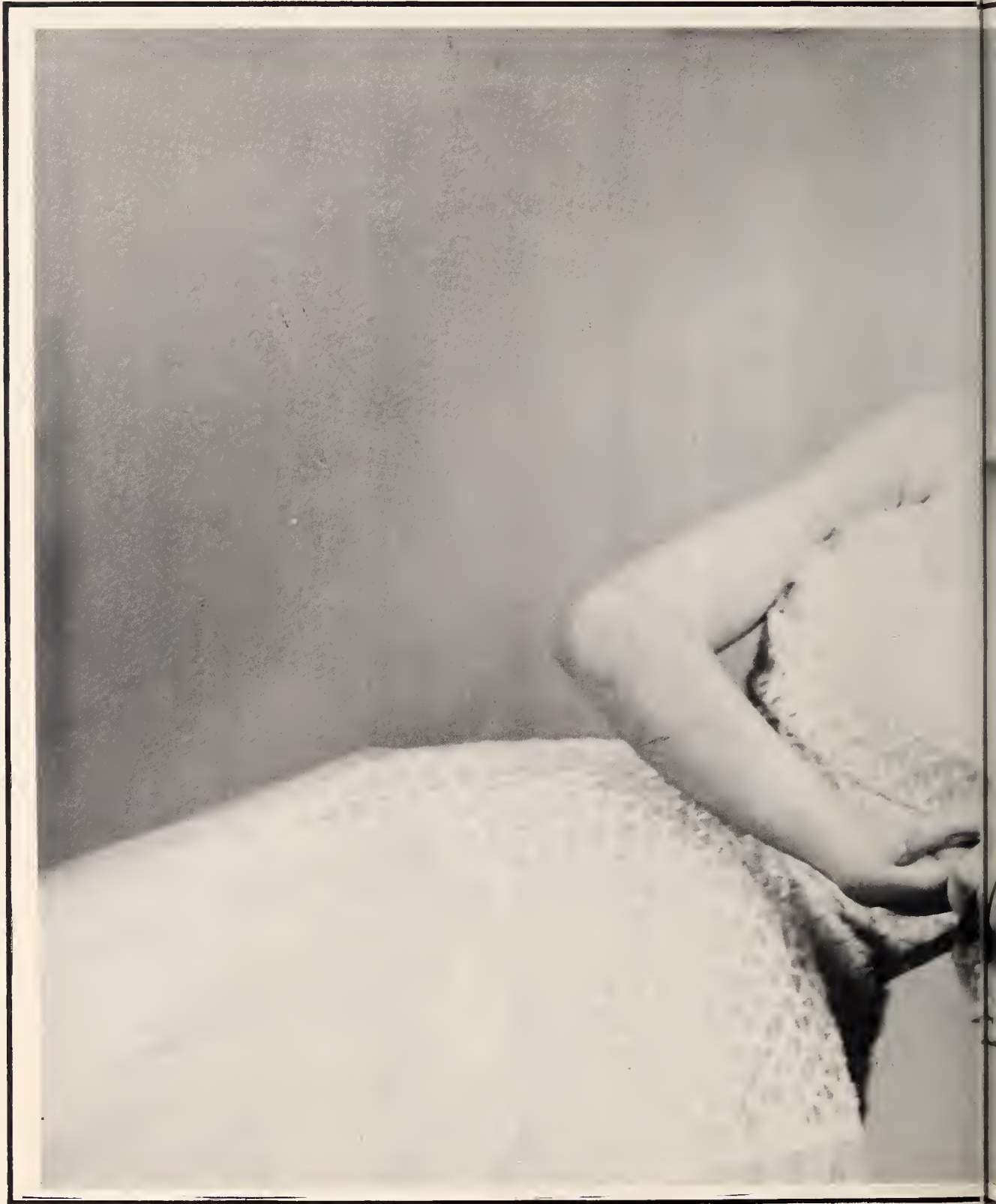
