



Let the Feasting Begin!


Now you ask who the dealers were. No one other than the professors, who really seemed to know their


cards well.



Central Europe Tour

A group of 27 Queens students left Charlotte on New Year's Day for the IEP Central European Study Tour. Tour leaders were Dr. Virginia Martin and Dr. David Petts, with Dr. Joyce Shealy along for the ride. Dr. Billy O. Wireman even accompanied the students through the tour's second stop, Prague, Czechoslovakia.

The first stop was Berlin, once again the capital of the united Germany, where students visited the Bradenburg Gate and met with an

official from the city of Berlin. The students then took a train to Prague, where they visited the centuries-old Prague Castle and met with Czech students in Kladno. From Prague, the tour continued on to Budapest, Hungary, where the participants visited Heroes' Square and traveled along the Danube River. The students followed the Danube all the way to Vienna, Austria, where they toured Schonbrunn Palace, St. Stephen's Cathedral, and the Kunsthistorisches

Musuem. Following Vienna, the tour moved on to beautiful Salzburg, where highlights included a tour of the Hohensalzburg Fort-ress, the Sound of Music tour of the Lake District, and a visit to a salt mine in Berchtesgaden, Germany. The group's final destination was the Bavarian metropolis of Munich, Germany, where several group members visited Dachau concentration camp, and many others sampled the pleasures of the worldfamous Hofbrauhaus.

The central European Study Tour exposed students to the Western glitter and sophistication of Vienna, the struggle for free market capitalism in Prague and Budapest, and the unique combination of the two in once-divided Berlin. By seeing such a large variety of cities, participants on the study tour were able to gain a greater knowledge about a fascinating and important region of Europe.

Italy








Congratulations














Kappa Delta
