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# AARS Means Americas Finest Rases 

AARS stands for All-America Rose Selections, a national non-profit organization set up to scientifically test al! new Roses and to select the best of each year's introductions for national awards. All entries are planted for official test and competition in seventeen carefully selected All-America trial gardens scattered from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Minnesota to the Gulf of Mexico, so that most Rose growing climates and locations are included. Seventeen of the ablest Rose judges in America score these new Roses for a two-year period on a uniform point basis. At the end of each two-year testing period the scores are averaged and the top scoring Rose or Roses are then named as All-America Roses. Any new Rose, no matter who originated it or what country it comes from, is eligible for the competition. Final awards are strictly impartial and based entirely on the merits of the Roses in the competition.

 PinkieOne glimpse of the perfect long red buds of this new Armstrong Rose will tel! you why it is an All-America Winner. We believe that Nocturne is undoubtedly one of the half dozen best red Roses in existence. Described and illustrated on opposite page.

One of those changeable Roses which displays delightful new color combinations with each change in the weather. Taffeta, with its perfect long-stemmed buds, is going to make friends wherever it goes. See description and illustration on opposite page.

This unique little Rose is a new type, almost in a class by itself. It is a Polyanthus, a Baby Rose, with its dainty pink blooms borne in clusters, but each perfect bud is on a stem long enough to cut for use. We look forward with anticipation to having our friends plant it. See page 4.

This should be one of the most spectacular and beautiful Climbing Roses ever introduced for mild climates. The two reasons are: (1) The extraordinarily brilliant yellow color of the beautiful buds and (2) its habit of blooming regularly, not only in the spring but throughout the entire summer. Not hardy in the East and Middle West. See page 4.

## Taffeta $\rightarrow$

Dozens of beautiful color combinations will be displayed throughout the season by the new 1948 AllAmerica Winner (illustrated at right). You may describe it as rose-pink, salmon, or apricot, but the predominant color is usually a rich carmine-rose in the bud, changing to Be -gonia-rose in the open flower. The reverse of the petals is tinted yellow. Taffeta is outstanding because of the richly colored, perfectly formed, long-stemmed buds, which are exceptionally fine for cutting. The medium to large buds, delightfully fragrant, open to semi-double flowers of about 21 beautifully textured petals. The upright bushy plant has plenty of huge, glossy, dark green leaves. Nation-wide tests indicate that it will be a success in all sections of the country-Pacific Coast, Middle West, East, and South. Originated in Armstrong Research Dept., by W. E. Lammerts. Plant Pat. ## Nacturne

It is a pleasure to launch this fine new red Rose on what we expect will be a long and successful career in the Rose gardens of America. It won, in strenuous competition, a 1948 All-America Award. The long, streamlined, perfectly formed red buds should give even the most experienced rosarian a big thrill. The color is bright cardinal-red with intriguing dark shadings of Chrysanthemum-crimson. (Illustrated below.) The large, richly textured petals have good substance, and there are plenty of them. The flowers are pleasantly fragrant, though not approaching the famous Mirandy in this regard. The stems are long, the foliage large and luxuriant, and Nocturne will quickly grow into a big sturdy bush in the garden. During hot summer weather the color is somewhat lighter. ## Pinkie $\rightarrow$

 This unique little Rose, Winner of an All-America Award for 1948, is a Polyanthus, a Baby Rose, but its blooms have a perfection of form not heretofore found in this class. The dainty little pink bud (technically the color is Neyron Rose) is long, slender, and perfect in every detail. The flower, fully open, is about 2 inches across. The bloom is nearly continuous from early spring until late fall, and the 2 -foot plant, covered with light green, glossy foliage, forms a beautiful background for the large, rounded flower clusters. Blooms have a spicy fragrance.Pinkie is a Rose of many uses. Each perfect little pink bud comes on an individual stem long enough to cut for small vase or corsage. The free-blooming habit, the clean looking foliage, and the tendency of the old flower petals to drop off cleanly, adapt Pinkie for use as a border or dwarf hedge. The Rose thrives magnificently all along the Pacific Coast, and in the Southern and Middle Atlantic States it should do wonderfully well. Not completely tested in colder climates. # $\leftarrow$ High Noan <br> Brilliant New Pillar Rose 

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All the concentrated essence of brilliant sunshine at midday is displayed in the lovely buds of this extraordinary new Climbing Rose. It is the winner of a 1948 Regional All-America Award for the Pacific Coast and Southern States. High Noon is not a rampant climber, and is better described as a bushy, 8-foot pillar Rose. The intense shade of clear shining yellow displayed in the medium size, well-shaped buds, cannot be found in any other Rose on the market today. The flowers are borne on long, almost thornless stems, well clothed with light green, glossy foliage. The plant is fast growing, bushy, many-stemmed, and should have a post, pillar, wall, or fence for support to best display its beauty

In the spring High Noon produces a big crop of magnificent long-stemmed buds, but it does not stop there. It continues to produce additional bursts of bloom throughout the entire growing season, just as does a bush Hybrid Tea. It should be one of the most popular climbers ever introduced for mild climates. High Noon is hardy only on the Pacific Coast and in the Southern States, and possibly as far north as New Jersey on the Atlantic Coast. A famous rosarian in Portland, Oregon, told us in the spring of 1947, "Certainly none can surpass High Noon in color ánd everblooming quality." Originated in the Armstrong Research Dept., by W. E. Other "48" Winners
In addition to the 1948 All-America Awards won by Nocturne, Taffeta, and Pinkie, and the Regional All-America Award won by High Noon, All-America Awards for 1948 were won by two other fine new Roses, San Fernando and Diamond Jubilee. Both are described below.

San Fernanda
ARS From sunny San Fernando Valley in Southern California, where many movie stars have their ranch homes, comes this new red Rose which reflects the glamorous setting of its birthplace. A perfectly shaped, long, stream-lined bud, an intense brilliant red color, and a rich heady perfume are its outstanding characteristics. The plant is upright, moderately vigorous. The petals have a very firm, heavy texture which makes them long-lasting. The color is several shades lighter than Nocturne, and, according to our observation, it does not produce as many blooms as that kind, but it is a fine red Rose of exceptional quality. Diamand Gubilee
This 1948 All-America Winner is robust and manybranched, sending out many long, sturdy flower stems, each carrying a big, ovoid bud in light pastel shades of buff, yellow, and pale orange. The large, many-petaled blooms have stiff, heavy-textured petals. Here in Southern California we could wish for the flowers to be of better quality, which evidently they are in cooler areas. It certainly produces an enormous number of blooms, and the big plant has an abundance of big, dark green leaves. Originated by Eugene Boerner. Patent Rights Reserved. $\$ 2.00$ each.

Charlatte


Since the day of its debut and its winning of the 1941 AllAmerica Award, Charlotte Armstrong has won every important prize or award for a new Rose. You will marvel, as we still do, at the beauty of the lovely, long, stream-lined, carmine-red buds and the magnificent open blooms of vivid cerise. The long-stemmed, mildly fragrant blooms are produced in great quantities throughout the season. Of course, this would not be possible without the strong, vigorous, free-branching growth which clothes the plant luxuriantly with handsome foliage.

Charlotte Armstrong is an all-climate Rose. Here on the Pacific Coast the latest annual poll of Pacific Rose Society members to name the twelve best Roses for this area puts Charlotte Armstrong in the No. 1 spot. It is hardier than most varieties, being one of the best Roses for Minnesota and lowa. The same enthusiastic stories come from Southern States, the Rocky Mountain region, the Middle West, and the East. Charlotte Armstrong is firmly established among the top Roses of all time. Mirandy has been a great success over most of the country. It is best in warm weather. Only in the cool foggy areas of the Pacific Coast do the flowers not always open perfectly. The long, tightly furled buds are clean golden yellow, deep and glowing, opening slowly into large, mildly fragrant flowers of lighter glowing yellow. The large, robust plant keeps throwing out new flower stems incessantly. Planters everywhere report that it does well in hot weather or cool. Lowell Thomas won an All-America Award in 1944. Its long-pointed buds of pure bright luminous red are beautiful to behold. They are borne on long stems and keep amazingly well after cutting.
