Bulbs Easy to Grow

**Success Is Sure With P-W's Selected Stock
For Outside Planting**

The Time to Plant: First of all the fact should be emphasized that the **Autumn Months** and not **Spring** is the proper time to plant Hyacinths, Tulips, Narcissus, Daffodils, Crocus and other spring flowering bulbs and hardy perennial plants. Most of the varieties described in this list are ready for delivery the latter part of September or early October and should be planted as soon as convenient after that time, but surely before the ground freezes. "Lily of the Valley" and some of the Hardy Lilies are not ready until November or December; should there be danger of the ground freezing before that time, cover the space to be planted with leaves or straw and the bulbs can then be planted at your convenience after arrival.

Distance Apart varies with the variety from 2 to 3 inches for Crocus to 12 to 18 inches for Lilies. The proper space is indicated under the respective headings in this list.

In Bloom All Winter

A trifling outlay in money plus a little fascinating fun. Many do not realize how easy and inexpensive it really is to have a continuous succession of bloom in the living room during the entire winter. The culture is so simple that with the right kind of bulbs anyone can be successful.

Kind of Soil: Any good, moderately rich, well drained soil is suitable for most bulbs; avoid heavy and boggy soils as poor drainage is fatal. In a stiff clay formation, supply a small quantity of sand or coal ashes at the base of each bulb and enrich soil with bone meal, VIGORO, or very well rotted manure, but do not use fresh stable manure under any conditions.

Proper Depth: Depends upon the size of the bulbs. A good rule is to place each bulb from one and one-half times to twice its own thickness below the surface of the ground. In districts of extremely cold temperature it is advisable to mulch the beds with leaves or straw during the severe weather, but care should be taken to remove the covering upon the approach of spring. In Salt Lake and equally mild climates no such protection is necessary.

They are just as charming, too, and, perhaps, as valuable for permanent planting in shrubberies and borders. They will continue to bloom for years. They are much more adaptable to warmer climatic conditions than the early Tulips. We advise our customers in the Southern States and California to choose Darwins when selecting Tulips.

Plant 6 inches apart, 4 to 5 inches deep in heavy and 6 inches in light soils. The number immediately following the name is the average height in inches. For convenience in figuring allow 5 bulbs for each square foot to be planted.

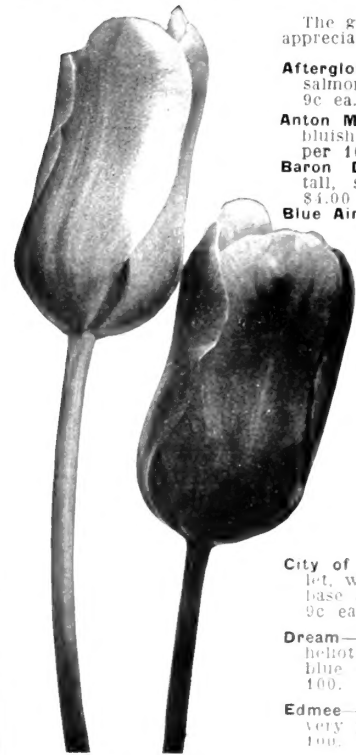

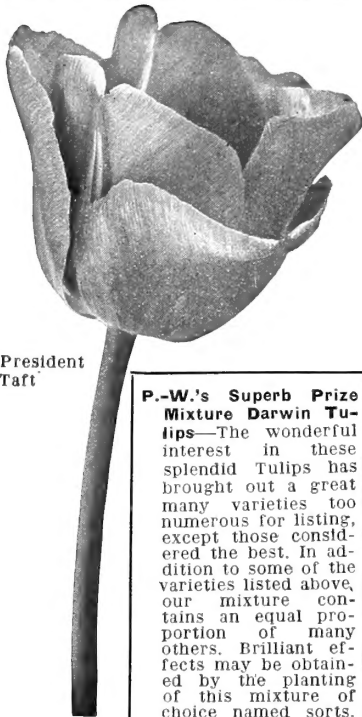

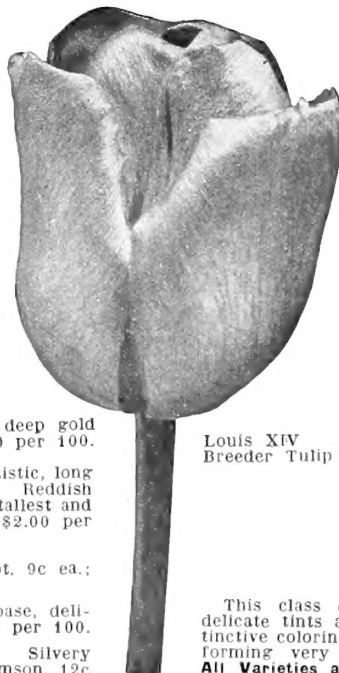

Dutch Art or Breeder Tulips (May-Flowering)

Breeder Tulips are very similar in habit to the Darwins, and flower at the same time. Their chief characteristic is their immense blooms, borne on strong, stiff stems, many of them longer than the most gigantic Darwins. The revival of the taste for art colors has made these Tulips, at one time very popular in England, strong favorites with American enthusiasts. Truly they possess Nature's happiest combinations of yellow and gold, brown and orange and other distinctive colorings. Flowers are very large, of perfect form, and borne on tall, strong stems. Plant same as Darwins, allowing four bulbs for each square foot to be planted.

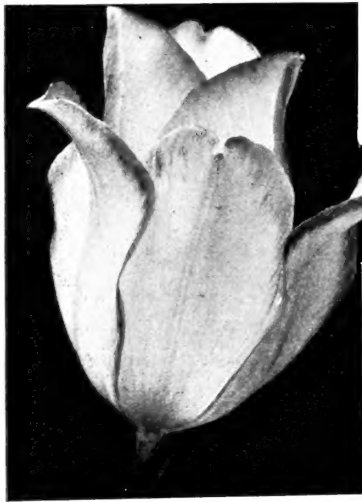

DIRECTIONS FOR USING BULB FIBER. Wet the Fiber thoroughly until it has absorbed all the water it can hold. This is best done in a pail or pan. Then squeeze out nearly all the water and it will be just right for planting. Fill the bowl three-fourths full, or to within a few inches of the top, according to the size of the bulb. Press down gently (never pack it down), set bulbs at the proper distances, and fill up with Fiber. Press it gently around the bulbs but **don't** pack it down. Keep the Fiber damp by spraying it lightly every day but never allow it to become too wet. All bulbs, except Freesias and Callas, should be kept in a dark place to develop roots before sprouting. Hyacinths, Daffodils, and Tulips require from four to six weeks; Paper-White and Soleil d'Or Narcissis and Chinese Lilies from two to three weeks. 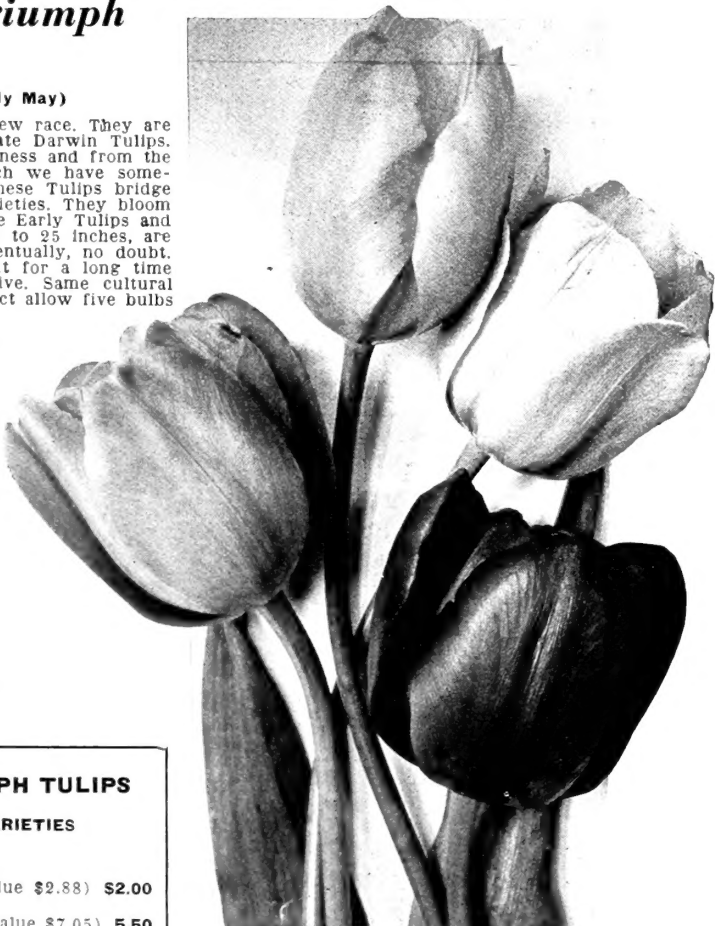

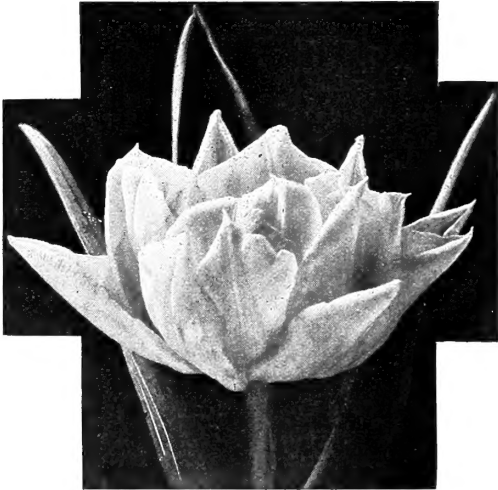

Brilliant Single Early Tulips

The Early-flowering Tulips are desirable from a standpoint of earliness and brilliant coloring. They do not grow as tall as the May-flowering varieties but bloom almost a month earlier, namely, during April when most other plants show hardly a leaf and the landscape still bears the unmistakable signs of the winter just past. Their culture is exactly the same as that of the May-flowering Tulips, but they may be planted as close as five inches apart instead of six inches, which we recommend for the May-flowering sorts. Their coloring is varied, mostly of the very brilliant and gay shades of yellow, orange, and scarlet, brilliant pink and rose, glistening white. They are most effective when planted in solid beds of one to several different colors. Varieties marked (*) are good for forcing inside as well as outside planting.

These Early Tulips bloom about 40 days ahead of the late varieties, so they flower and go, in abundant time for you to replace them with other plants. For best effects allow five bulbs for each square foot to be planted.

The Hyacinth is possibly the most useful and popular hardy bulb flower. It delights millions of flower lovers throughout the world with its matchless beauty and fragrance. GARDEN CULTURE: Bulbs may be planted from the end of September until very severe weather sets in. If the soil is dry at planting time it should be watered and kept moist while the weather permits.

HYACINTHS IN POTS. Get rich, light soil or Bulb Fiber. If soil, provide drainage. Break off any offsets which appear at the base of the bulbs, and, in potting, place each bulb so that its top shall be half an inch below the surface of the soil, and about an inch below the rim of the pot.

Beautiful Peonies

Probably no perennial is more universally acclaimed and loved, and we know of none that justifies such popularity more than the Peony. It is hardy, is not bothered by a multitude of ailments and pests, is not particular about soils or fertilizers, does not require frequent transplanting in the garden or continual coddling and anxiety from the gardener. For the little that it needs, it pays back with increasing generosity. Years, as a rule, merely add to its beauty and enhance its lavish display.

HOW TO GROW

The greatest mistake most amateurs make is in manuring their Peonies. The two most serious Peony diseases both seem to be caused by improper fertilization, usually with stable manures.

The best way to do this is to dig a deep and generous hole. Place well-rotted barnyard manure in the bottom, well-mixed with soil. If well-rotted manure is not available, fresh manure will do no harm, provided 8 to 10 inches of good garden soil intervenes between the roots and the manure at planting time. By the time the roots reach the manure, it will no longer be manure and there will be no danger. Never mix manure in never much it in the soil above the roots; never mulch

the surface of the soil with it. With a bed prepared in this fashion, all the fertilizer needed will be a handful of bone-meal or Vigoro around the plant in spring when the stalks begin to push through the soil. Work in the fertilizer but do not allow it to touch the shoots.

An important point to observe in the planting of Peonies is not to plant too deep. The roots should be placed so that the crowns are covered with two or three inches of soil. Too deep planting is a frequent cause of shy flowering. Proper distance apart is from 3½ to 4 feet.

Peonies are best planted from the latter part of September until the ground freezes in the Mountain States.

NOTE:—Figures following varieties indicate the rating given them by the American Peony Society. The highest rating a peony can receive is 10. There is no variety yet with such a rating; 9 is excellent, 8 is very good, 7 is good.

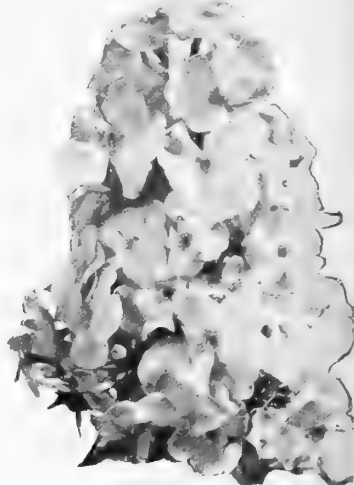

Some Things To Observe for Success With Roses When Planted in the Fall

HOW TO PLANT—The rose delights in an open, airy situation; all types are partial to clay loam, but will succeed in any ordinary soil if enriched with well rotted barnyard manure. Dig up the soil thoroughly to a depth of twelve to fifteen inches. Dig a hole sufficiently large to accommodate the root, and pour a half pail of water into the hole; in filling, shake the plant slightly so that the soil may fall evenly all around the roots; this avoids cavities. Firm the soil well around the plant in order that it may be solid. Be sure that the buds or grafts, that is where the lower branches begin, are at least 2 inches below the surface of the soil. Bush Roses can be set 1½ feet apart, climbing varieties from 4 to 6 feet apart, the standard Roses 3 or more feet apart.

To prevent the top branches from shiveling up before the root system has been developed, the earth should be hilled up as shown in Fig. 2.

WINTER PROTECTION—We have found that the most satisfactory protection is to draw a mound of soil from eight to ten inches high around the base of the plants, then covering the entire beds after the ground begin to freeze with any loose material, such as strawy manure, leaves, etc. (See cut, Fig. 3).

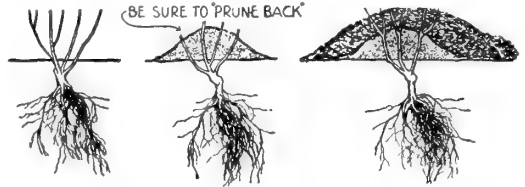


Fig. 1—Proper Depth to Plant Fig. 2—Properly hilled up "after planting" Fig. 3—Winter protection in cold regions.

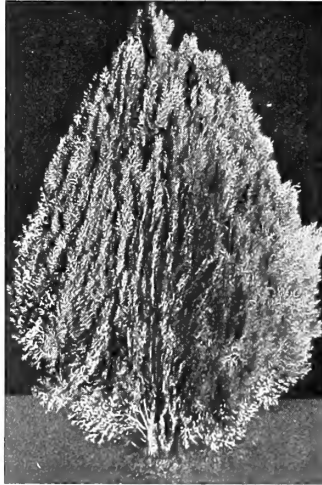
