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Public Law 369, 79th Congress, approved by the President on April 30, 1946, and which became effective on June 30, 1946, transferred "all the functions of the Secretary of the Interior and the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior and the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior which affect the breeding, raising, producing, marketing, or any other phase of the production or distribution, of domestically raised fur-bearing animals, or products thereof, to the Secretary of Agriculture." The law specifically states that "fox, rabbit, mink, chinchilla, marten, fisher, muskrat, karakul and all other fur-bearing animals, raised in captivity for breeding or other useful purposes shall be deemed domestic animals."

Therefore, persons who are engaged in, or who contemplate engaging in fur farming or raising domestic rabbits, should now address their inquiries for published literature or specific information on any phase of these subjects to the Bureau of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D.C.

Information on the production, conservation, and utilization of fur animals in the wild, however, can still be obtained from the Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior, Chicago 54, Illinois.

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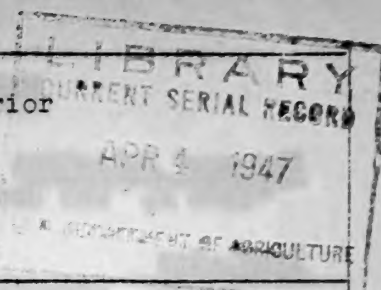
