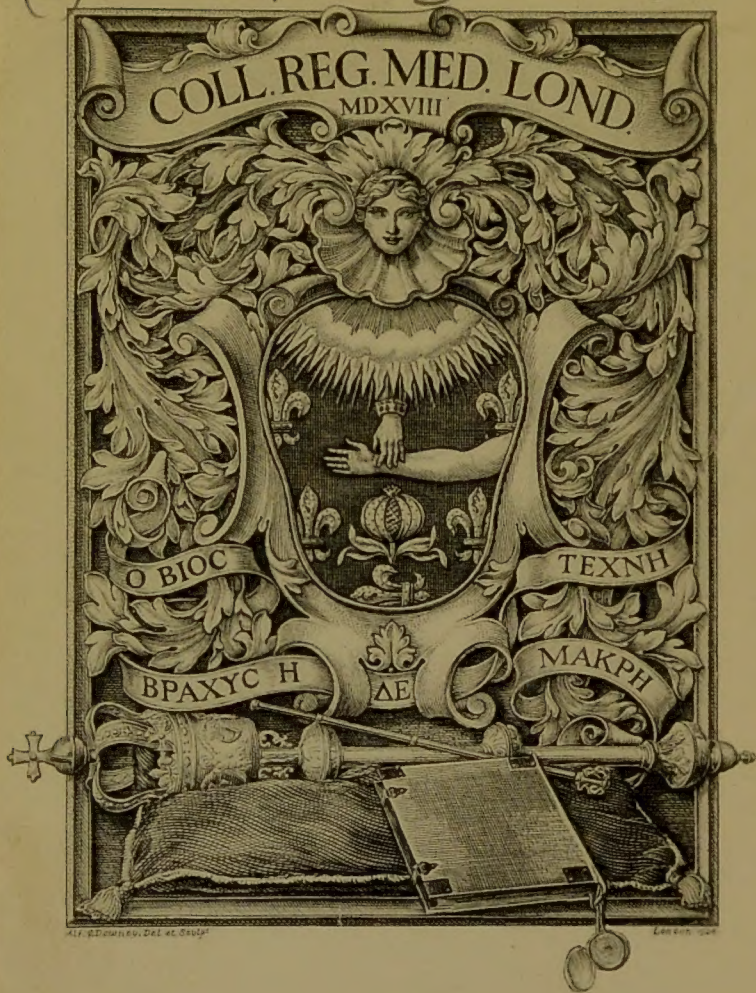

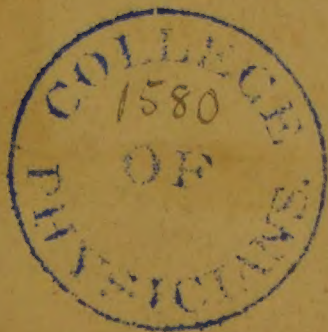

An Alphabetical Table of the Names of such Authors, both Ancient and Modern, as are often cited in the following History; their principal Botanick Writings; the Year wherein they were put forth, and the number of their Icons of Plants, and also the Country the said Authors were of.

**L** *Abridge de bon fruits*; or, The Abridgment of good fruits, &c. published by C. Cercy, at Paris, 1675. in *Octavo*. In this are great variety of Garden-Fruit, more fully described than in any work before it.

*Christoph. Acoftæ*, a Physician of Africa, who in the former (15th) Age, writ *Historiam Simplicium ex India Orientali*: Rendred into Latin by *Clusius*; of which here.

*Asta Hafniensis Medica & Philosophica*, a *Tho. Bartholino* edita.

*Stirpium Adversaria nova*: The Works of Peter Pena, and Matth. Lobel, Physicians living in London, where the said Work was printed, 1576. and 1605. with an Appendix. Icons 314.

*Aetius Amideus*, a Grecian, who writ of Medicines, 1535. *Folio*.

*Paul. Ægineta*, of the Isle Ægina, writ of Medicines before *Dioscorides*; which came forth 1528. *Folio*.

*Ulysses Aldrovandus*, a Bononian, writ much of Medicines, and natural things. His *Dendrologia Naturalis* was put forth 1648. *Folio*.

*Prosper Alpinus*, a Physician of Padua, writ *De Plantis Ægypti*; which came forth, 1592. Icons 46. *Quarto*.

*Character Plantarum Naturalis*, by *Paul. Annon*, 1684. and *Hortus Eoſianus*, 1687.

*Aloysius Angularia*, a Physician, President of the publick Garden of Padua, his Opinion of some Plants; printed 1561. *Octavo*.

*Apulcius*, an ancient Platonist, who writ of the Virtues of Herbs; printed at Paris, 1528. *Folio*.

*Avicenna*, an Arabian Ph. whose Works were reduced into an Index by *Casæus*, 1564. *Folio*.

*Hermolaus Barbarus*, an Italian, who writ *Collariaries* on *Dioscorides*, 1530. *Folio*.

*Casparus Baubinus*, a very famous Physician of Basil, who writ *Pinacem Theatri Botanici*, one of the most elaborate and useful Works of Herbarism, 40 years in compiling; wherein he gives the several *Synonyma's* to each Plant, and names about 6000 as distinct. 1627. 4to.

*Casp. Baubinus* his *Phytopinax*. 1596. *Quarto*.

*C. Baub. Prodrromus Theatri Botanici*, 1620. Icons 140. *Quarto*.

*Petrus Bellonius* writ *De Arboribus Coniferis*, &c. 1553. *Quarto*.

*Honorius Bellus*, a Physician of Crete, who by Letters had great correspondence with *Cl.* about Plants.

*Paul. Breconius*, Herbarist to the great Duke of Tuscany; he writ *Rariorum Plantarum Siciliæ, Melitæ, Galliæ & Italiæ*, 1674. Icons 110. 4to.

*Jobannes Bodæus*, a Physician of Amsterdam, who commented on *Theophrastus*, and writ of some rare Plants. 1644. *Folio*.

*Arſ. Boetius*, he published somewhat of Flowers and Herbs, with Icons, at *Bruges*. 4to.

*Jacob Bontius*, a Physician of Padua, writ *Historia Naturalis & Medicæ Indiæ Orientalis*. 1629. Icons 70. *Folio*.

*Mich. Boym, S. J. Flora Sinenſis Vienna*, 1656. *F*.

*Jacob Breynius*, a Dantiſcan Senator, who hath put forth *Plantarum Exoticarum Centuria prima*, with 110 most curious Icons, 1674. *Folio*. His *Prodrromus*, 1683. *Quarto*.

*Job. Theodorus du Bry* writ *Florilegia*, 1612. enlarged by *Matth. Merian*. 1641. *Folio*.

*Otto Brunsſelius*, a German, writ *Historiam Stirpium*, treating of about 288 Plants; the first that gave lively Icons thereof, 1556. *Folio*.

*Joachinus Camerarius*, a German Physician who writ *Hortus Medicus*, and *Sylvam Hercyniam*, 1586. *Quarto*.

*Camerar. Epitome Matthioli*, 1586. Icons 1003. 4to.

*Andreas Cæſalpinus*, an Italian Physician, a most curious Observer of Plants, whereof he writ, 1583. 4to. and an Appendix, 1603. 4to. The first we read of, that reduced Plants according to their Seeds, and Seed-Vessels.

Comelinus, a very worthy, ingenious Person, a Magistrate of Amsterdam; who, with very great civility and freeness, treated me with Specimens for my *Hortus Siccus*, of rare Plants growing in the Physick-Garden at Amsterdam: His Annotations on the 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6th Parts of *Hortus Malabaricus*.

Claudius Galenus, a Greek, the most renowned in Physick, whereof he writ much; and much commented on Hippocrates, in the 2d. Century.

John Gerard, Chirurgion of London, and Master of that worthy Profession; he put forth the Herbal, or General History of Plants, in English, 1597. Icons 2090. Folio.

Conradus Gesnerus, a German, writ much of Plants, 1541, &c.

Nehemiah Grew, M. D. Fellow of the Royal Society, and College of Physicians, London, writ *Museum Regalis Societatis*, 1681. Folio, wherein is something new of Plants. Also his Anatomy of Plants, 1682. Folio.

Melchior Guilandius, President of the Garden of Padua; who writ some Epistles of Plants, and Commentaries upon Pliny, de Papyro, 1558. Quarto, &c.

Paul. Hermanus, Physician, and Botanick Professor now at Leyden, a most ingenious person, and great Botanist; who hath published *Horti Academici Lugduno-Batawi Catalogus*, 1686. Icons 104. 8vo. He, with great freeness, gave me the liberty of the said Garden at Leyden.

These, especially their *Botanick parts*, are all brought into this one *Manual*; together with what is more new of our own, and communicated to us by ingenious and worthy persons, whose respective names shall be subjoined to their *Gifts*, that *Posterity* may know to whom they are obliged for the same.

P R E F A C E.

**T**HIS Herbal was begun by James Newton, M. D. about 1680, and the great Assistances he received from Abroad, and at Home, from the ablest Botanists of his Time, and his own great Abilities, Care, and many Years Study and Expence, to render it the most curious and universal of its Kind then published, may be so well known to need any Enlargement.

But considering this Herbal might be the Work of his younger Days, so on a Review of it in his more mature and knowing Years, it might not please him, as he might think, and very justly too, that then he could compose another of a more useful, curious, and universal Nature; and having such good Materials before him to work on as his first Herbal, he might therefore the more readily enter upon his other universal and compleat History of Plants, with their Icons, comprehending all hitherto extant, with Additions.

As his first Herbal begins with Grass, the other begins with Apples; and had he lived a few Months longer, he might have published it compleat and entire; for at his Death he had printed his First Book of Apples, and Part of the second Book, but dying suddenly, this valuable Work was lain by till now of late.

# The P R E F A C E.

Liber I. De Arboribus Pomiferis ; or, of Apples in general, treats of above eleven Hundred different Sorts comprehending the several Kinds and Species of Apples hitherto known ; and about three Hundred of their most principal Icons, neatly engraved on Copper-Plates.

Liber II. De Arboribus, & Fruticibus Bacciferis ; or of Trees, and Shrubs bearing Berries in general, may be rather more curious and comprehensive than the First Book.

Over the Icons stand their English, and in the descriptive Part their Latin Names. Since the Icons are reduced into their proper Classes, and the Index contains the Names of each Class, it may therefore equally answer the Intention of a more general one, which might have swelled to a great Size ; as you may take in at one View, by turning to its proper Class, the several Species belonging to it.

As for the antique Spelling, it is to be hoped the Reader will excuse that, since there's no Possibility of altering it.

The capital Letters standing by the Icons denote the Authors they were taken from, as P from Perkinson's Herbal, G from Gerard's, and B from Bauhinus's, and R from Ray's, &c.
