Curing Salmon.

COCKBURN'S SPECIFICATION.

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, I, ALEXANDER COCKBURN, of the Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed, Fishmonger and Curer of Salmon for the London Market, send greeting.

WHEREAS His most Excellent Majesty King George the Third, by His Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, bearing date the Twenty-ninth day of July, in the third year of His reign, did give and grant unto me, the said Alexander Cockburne, His especial license that I, during the term of years therein expressed, should and lawfully might use, exercise, and vend my Invention of "A New Composition and Puculiar Method of

- land, His Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed; in which said Letters Patent there is contained a proviso obliging me, the said Alexander Cockburn, by an instrument in writing under my hand and seal, to cause a particular description of the nature of my said Invention, and in what manner
- 15 the same is to be performed, to be inrolled in His Majesty's High Court of Chancery within four calendar months after the date of the said recited Letters Patent, as in and by the same, relation being thereunto had, may more at large appear.

NOW NOW YE, that in compliance with the said recited proviso, I, the 20 said Alexander Cockburn, do hereby declare, that the that the nature of my said Invention of a New Composition and Peculiar Method for Curing Salmon with Spices doth consist of the several ingredients and is to be performed in the manner herein-after mentioned, that is to say:—

Cockburn's Method of Curing Salmon.

Take for pickle to boil a salmon of twenty pounds weight, a quarter of an ounce of cloves, a quarter of an ounce of mace, a quarter of an ounce of comion pepper, to put into three gallons of water mixed with one gallon of vinegar and four pints of salt. The salmon to be put into the pickle when boiling, and well skimm'd; the salmon to boil forty-five minuets. For 5 pickle to put upon salmon when cold, the composition is as follows, vizt: a gallon of vinegar, one quart of spring water, and a gill of salt, with half an ounce of cloves, half an ounce of mace, and half an ounce of common pepper, to boil thirty minuets, and be put into a vessell to stand until quite cold before it is put upon the salmon.

In witness whereof, I, the said Alexander Cockburne, have hereunto sett my hand and seal, this Seventeenth day of August, in the third year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, and in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three.
