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





FOOTBALL

With only a handful of returning lettermen Coach Doak's Scottish eleven was depending heavily on new recruits to shoulder the burden. Also, a new aid to the Presbyterians was the assistance of two new coaches; handling the line was Jim Mock of Maxton, and aiding Doak with the backfield was Kirk Dansereau, a graduate from the University of Maryland, The returning lettermen included 3 backs and 5 linemen: the backs composed of D. S. Wood, Bill "Wah Wah" Jones, and Bey McIntyre; the line represented by Hayne Stratford, Pete Sellers, Hal Sharpe, Ted Brillhart, and Larry Diggs. From the nearby state of South Carolina came Paul Boan, John Johnson, and Steve Pursley, all who were key men in the future Scottish attack. Bepresenting Laurinburg was Clyde Parrish, a passing and blocking quarterback. Transfers from Davidson added strength in the line who were Jim Donnell, and Tommy Stewart. Alabama was represented by center Sonny Quinnelly; Aberdeen selected Bill Matthews, an end for representation. Upon these few returning lettermen and the above mentioned fell the weight of the Scottish attack.

BREVARD 6–P. J. C.–6

On October 1, 1949, Coach "Peanut" Doak unveiled his Scotties at Brevard, a Western Junior College contender. Here the Presbyterians netted a 6-6 tie and an opinion, fortified by statistics, that the Scots outplayed the Westerners.

The home team took the marker first in the second quarter on a pass, the kick however, was wide and the winning point failed to materialize then, just as it did in the third quarter. Halfway time found Brevard out front by the margin of 6-0. As halftime play commenced the Scotties took over. Clyde Parrish tossed to wingback Ben McIntyre who scampered into pay dirt: score 6-6. The extra point attempted was wide and the game remained tied.

The last half was played almost exclusively in

the Brevard territory. Coach Doak expressed pleasure over his air work especially, and his offense in general. The entire Scottish eleven played sterling ball: Paul Boan was a constant threat as he charged the line again and again. Lanky end "Goon" Johnson pulled down 8 aerials for a coverage of 100 vards. "Wah Wah" Jones tossed five passes and all were completed. Guard Ted Brillhart was a savage on defense. The game however, left its mark on the Scotties; injured were Dave Wood and "Wah Wah" Jones, both backfield men.

The P. J. C. line-up included: Ends: Johnson, Sharpe, and Matthews; tackles, Donnell, Diggs, and Pursley; guards. Brillhart, Stratford and Stewart; Center, Sonny Quinnelly; Backs, Parrish, Boan, Wood, Jones, Morris and McIntyre.

CAMPBELL CRUSHES SCOTS

The second game of the season and the most awaited was with the Campbell "Camels" from Buie's Creek. This was the first home encounter for the Scots and the crowd came to Laurinburg Memorial Stadium for the game.

Again the yearly jinx befell P. J. C. during this grudge affray. With two first string backs on the bench an injury-riddled Scottish eleven took the field. The first half was indeed a football thriller; it was rough, tuff. and no scoring occurred. But second half was a different story, the Camels plunged thru the Scotties and at games end the score stood at 35-0 for the Camelites.

Scottish line standouts were Pursley, Donnell, Diggs, Stewart, and Stratford. The backfield included Parrish, Boan, McIntyre, Morris, and Jenkins.

GARDNER WEBB 16-P. J. C.-O

For their third game the Preachers journeyed to Shelby to engage the Bull Dogs from Gardner-Webb. The first quarter ended scoreless, but the Bull Dogs tasted pay dirt in the second quarter. The Scots then drove up to the 40 yard line and scored on a pass from Johnson to Matthews, which was called back due to holding. The first half ended with Webb ahead 7-0.

It was during the fourth quarter that Gardner-Webb added another T. D. and later a safety for the additional two points, making the score 16-0.

Dave Wood playing for the first time since the Brevard game, was re-injured but managed to gallop off a 45 yard jaunt before leaving the game. Larry Diggs, right tackle was injured and too, the Scots lacked the pressure of guard Ted Brillhart, who would be lost for the rest of the season.

BELMONT-ABBEY at P. J. C.

The Crusades from Abbey defeated the Scots by a score of 45-7 for their third loss in a row. Belmont took possession and on seven attempts plunged over the white marker for their first score. The Scots then took the kick-off but fumbled on their 16 yard line and again Belmont scored—conversion was good and Abbey led 13-0. Near the end of the first half the Presbyterian fans roared to their feet. By McIntyre taking the kickoff ran to the 20, here he handed off to "Wah Wah" Jones and the train roared. Jones twisted and squirmed passing all opposing players on the 40. From here on it was "All the way, Wah Wah." Matthews converted and the half ended 19-7 in favor of Abbey.

The second half was strictly Abbey, passing and running. The game ended with the score at 45-7.

The Scotties seemed to be completely stymied offensively and defensively. Jones ran beautifully for P. J. C. Paul Boan played his usual outstanding game. In the line, standouts were Pursley, Gene Williams, and Sonny Quinnelly.

CATAWBA FROSH AND P. J. C.

Displaying a strong passing attack the Frosh from Catawba defeated the Scots 31-0. This marked

the first non-conference game for the Scotties. Despite the fact that P. J. C. faced all opponents under-manned and injury-riddled, this game was the poorest one witnessed by the home fans. The Scots continually fumbled, and blocking was indeed poor. Paul Boan was the outstanding offensive player setting up all of P. J. C.'s first downs. Goon Johnson pulled in several nice aerials, while "Rev." Carraway hit the middle hard.

WHITEVILLE DEFEATED AT HOMECOMING

Displaying a strong air attack, not witnessed since the Brevard affray, the Scots trounced the Whiteville Leafs by 19-7. All the Preachers' touchdowns resulted from the passing arm of quarterback Clyde Parrish.

The Scots drove from their own forty on a series of passing and running plays, then scored on a pass to end John Johnson. Jones converted. Score 7-0. The Scots again scored on a pass from Parrish to Moss -a 25 yard toss. Moss scampered across, standing up. The try for the extra point was wide, 13-0. During the last quarter, starting at midfield, the P. J. C-ers advanced to the S. Here Parrish bulleted to scatback Wah-Wah Jones, who squirmed over the goal line, standing up. Conversion was wide and the score read 19-0.


Here the Whiteville Leafs bounded back and passed for their only T. D. Game's end found the Scots leading 19-7.

Parrish, Jones, and Moss were outstanding in the backfield. Donnell, Diggs, and Sharpe played "bang-up" line ball. Goon Johnson made several nice catches including a one-handed circus catch.

ERSKINE TOPS SCOTS

The Erskine Frosh took a hard fought game by the margin of 20-0. The game was much closer than the score indicates with Coach Doak employing a two-team system.





The Doakmen penetrated within the enemy's 10 yard marker on one occasion—a march which ended on the two yard line. Here on the third down, lacking 1 yard for first and goal, a pass was ealled to Johnson. Parrish completed across the scrimmage line to Goon, but the opposing plavers pushed the lanky end back a few yards. The referee, blowing the whistle, agreed for a measurement—still the Scots lacked one yard. This was the only disputed play of the game.

In the line, standouts included Stratford and Johnson. In the backfield it was Boan driving all the way.

P. C. FROSII DEFEATS SCOTTS

Thanksgiving day found the Scots facing a strong air minded P. C. Frosh team. Both teams were guests of the American Legion of Lumberton. Once again the P. J. C. fans were brought to their feet by the swivel hipping of Wah Wah Jones. Taking the ball on a hand off Jones swept around end, through the secondary, and passed the goal marker standing up. However, the T. D. was called back as the referee ruled Jones stepped out of bounds on the end jaunt. The offense of the Scotties was exceptionally good but the defense somewhat bogged down. On several occasions the Scotties marched into the P. C. territory, Runs by Wood, Boan, Jenkins, and Carraway pushed the ball goalward. However, the defense became tighter and the Seots were unable to penetrate to pay dirt. The P. C. Frosh defeated Scotties 46-0.

In the line for the Scotties it was Stratford, Donnell, and Caddell who were outstanding. Guard Hayne Stratford continually ripped through the defense to block their attempted punts. In the backfield the outstanding were Jones, Boan, Carraway, Jenkins, and Parrish.

No scholarships in athletics are permitted by Presbyterian Junior College and therefore competition against other teams that do prove to be unbalanced. The student body of P. J. C. are very proud of their "footballers" for the reason of the "never give up" spirit which was displayed by the Seotties.

The Preachers have returning football material for next year in the form of Clyde Parrish, Bill Matthews, Gene Williams, Robert Caddell, Elmo Jernigan, Sugar Chiles, and possibly Paul Boan and Sonny Quinnelly. Lost from the squad will be Wood, Jones, Stratford, Johnson, Sharpe, Melntyre, Diggs, Hasty, Sellers, Stewart, Donnell, Carraway, Fields, McCall, and Flanagan.

BASKETBALL

The 1949-50 edition of the Presbyterian Junior College basketball Scotties was a much improved squad with plenty of spirit and fight. Coach Doak had a nuclens of six veterans from last year's squad to build around.

This year, the Scots poured a total of 963 points through the hoop in seventeen regular senson games. Captain Jerry Parrish gamered almost a third of these with 123 field goals and 57 free throws for a total of 303 points and an average of 18.93 per game. Tom Fields was second in line with 230 points resulting from 87 buckets and 56 charity tosses. The high game total for the Scotties was 83 against Wilmington.

Conversely, the opposition dumped in a total of 931 points. The highest total among the Scots adversaries was produced by the N. C. State freshman team when it racked up 80 tallies at the Coliseum in Raleigh.

SCOTTIES DROP OPENER, 74-38.

The Scotties opened the season on the red side of the ledger and took a 74-38 licking at the hands of the Camp LeJeune Marines. The big leatheroecks, holdiog a 28-17 halftime advantage, broke loose and connected from everywhere in the second half to win in a walk. John Johnson used his height to a good advantage and took the local seoring laurels with 11 points. However Friesen of the Marines was the high man of the night with 21 counters.

SCOTS 111T LOUISBURG, 59-39.

December 15 found Louisburg and P. J. C. prying the lid off of the 1949-50 Conference campaign on the Maxton floor. The midway mark found the Scotties clinging to a

one point lead, 23-22, but Tom Fields, Jerry Parrish, and John Johnson led the locals the rest of the way. Big Tom connected eight times from the floor and tanked in five from the white line to lead with 21 tallies, while Parrish and Johnson had 16 each. For Louisburg, Boddy Ussery dropped in 16 to lead their attack.

MARINES AGAIN DIP SCOTS, 63-46.

Returning to action on the hardwood after the Christmas vacation, the Scotties and Camp Lefeune again tangled on the local floor January 6, with the Marines again taking the measure. Jerry Parrish accounted for 23 of the Scots' 46 points, but Hurst of the Marines took high game honors with 27.

SCOTTIES HIT PEAK-BLAST WILMINGTON, 83-54.

January 10 found the Scotties pouring it on with both barrels, with Wilmington Junior College feeling the wrath of the preachers. Jerry Parrish out-distanced the field, dump.ng in 28 markers. Big Tom Fields pushed him all the way and ended with 25. Sid Carraway played outstanding defensive ball as did Bill Matthews and John Johnson. Taylor led the Wilmington offense with 20 markers.

LOUISBURG RAPS SCOTS, 70-57.

Too much Buddy Ussery was the outcome of the Scots' trip to Lonisburg, January 13. The little forward drove in from all angles to keep Louisburg out in front. He was good for 24 markers. Tom Fields led the locals into battle with 17 points while Jerry Parrish canned 13.





SCOTTIES BOWL OVER E. M. L, 70-33.

Roaring back after defeat at the hands of Louisburg, the Scotties proceeded to dump Edwards Military Institution on their home floor, 70-33. The Cadets could not cope with the accuracy of the visiting Scots, especially Jerry Parrish who led the onslaught with 30 points. Tom Fields tacked on 11 and Bill Matthews and John Johnson had 8 each. Bowersox provided the best effort for the Cadets, contributing 9 counters.

SCOTS LAY CHOWAN LOW, 68-47.

Following their rout of E. M. I., Coach Doak's Scotties entertained Chowan College and didn't prove to be very hospitable. Chick Seals started in place of Captain Jerry Parrish who was ill. Big John Johnson took scoring honors for the evening with 14 and Tom Fields followed with 13. Clemmer led the all-freshman Chowan squad with 10 tallies.

THE STRAW THAT BROKE THE CAMEL'S BACK? SCOTTIES, 77-55.

Campbell's Camels rode into Maxton with a winning streak of several years over P. J. C. athletic teams. However, Jerry Parrish and company were not content with this idea and shot the works to come up with a stunning 77-55 victory over their arch rivals. The lanky Parrish led all the way with 24 points, followed by Tom Fields with 21 and John Johnson with 15. Sid Carraway and Bill Matthews acquired 7 apiece to round out the scoring, Biggers was the only consistent visitor, racking up 16. The biggest factor in winning this tilt was the hustle and team work exhibited by the Scots, Tom Fields did a bang-up job of intercepting passes and controlling the backboards. Carraway and Matthews were unexcelled as playmakers, and Johnson's rebound work was notlding short of terrific.

P. J. C. DOWNS WILMINGTON, 75-47,

January 26 saw Jerry Parrish and Tom Fields fatten their respective scoring averages as they led the Scotties to a 75-47 win over Wilmington with 22 points apiece, Sid Carraway tacked on 11 points as did John Johnson, and both played outstanding defensive ball. Taylor and Coleman led the invaders' attack with 18 and 13 markers respectively.

SCOTS CLIP CHARLOTTE, 63-49.

Tom Fields was the big gun in the Scotties attack on Charlotte. The big Carthage center bucketed 8 field goals and added 7 charity tosses for good measure, Jerry Parrish accounted for 14 and Sid Carraway banged in 10. Procter and Ilarkey led the visitors with 14 and 13 counters respectively.

CAMPBELL STOPS SCOTTIES, 55-35.

The Scotties travelled to Buie's Creek February 1 to take on Campbell's Camels, but came out on the short end of a 55-35 count. Held to only 11 points in the first half, the Scots played Campbell on even terms in the final canto, but the gap was too wide. Jerry Parrish was the only consistent scorer with 14. Reserve guard Pete Hasty tacked on 7 in addition to playing a fine floor game. Poe with 17 and Lasater with 15 led Campbell.

SCOTTIES RAP E, M. I., 47-37,

Seeming to have lost their scoring eye, P. J. C. nipped the E. M. J. Cadets in a rather slow encounter at Maxton, 47-37. Jerry Parrish, who seems to like the idea, was again high score with 17 points. Tom Fields followed with 8. Wadtord offered the most resistance for E. M. I. with 10.

HEIGHT TOO MUCH FOR SCOTS-STATE FRESH-MEN 80, P. J. C. 39.

N. C. State College's freshman team had too much height for the Scottics to overcome and breezed to an 80-39 victory. Even though it was a very one-sided affair, the contest was quite rough, as 45 personal fouls were called. Jerry Parrish, a veritable midget among the State giants, took game honors with 17 tallies. John Johnson, for once having someone taller than himself, rang the bell for 11 counters. For State, Kukoy, Coss, and Speight dropped in 16, 15, and 12 respectively for top honors.



WINGATE LOWERS THE BOOM, 70-43.

The Scots again tasted bitter defeat at the hands of Wingate Junior Gollege at Wingate in a very rough and hotly contested ball game. Last year Ankie Rowe was escorted to the bench to cool off, and this year it was IIal Sharpe-whose temper got a little out of control. Hal later returned to action. The Scots seemed to do everything wrong after the first ten minutes of play. They were limited to four field goals during the entire second half as Wingate seemed to score almost at will. Jerry Parrish topped both teams with 20 points, and Bill Matthews canned 11 for the Scotties. For Wingate, Musten, Gordon, and Vestal tallied 15, 12, and 11 respectively.

PFEIFFER EDGES OUT SCOTTIES, 58-54.

After several disputed plays, Pfeiffer Junior College edged past the Scotties, 58-54 on the local hardwood. Jerry Parrish, stellar forward of the Scots, and Kalanick of the visitors waged an individual scoring battle that ended with each racking up 25. However, the game was won on the free throw line. Each team having 24 field goals, Pfeiffer made good 10 of 17 tries, while the Scots only popped in 6 of 19 chances.

SCOTS GET REVENCE-64-61 OVER WINGATE.

Winding up the home season, the Scotties got sweet revenge as they downed Wingate Junior College, 64-61. Four local players hit the double figures as Captain Jerry Parrish led with 16. Tom Fields connected for 13 and Sid Carraway and Bill Matthews rang the bell for 11 each. After John Johnson fouled out in the first period, Cnach Doak shifted Matthews to forward and Clyde Parrish took over at guard. Big Neill Gordon, who took the scoring laurels for the evening with 21 points, Hawkins with 13 and Jurney with 12, led Wingate.

SCOTTIES TRIP CHARLOTTE, 58-40.

The Scotties closed the regular season with a 58-40 win over Charlotte. Jerry Parrish moved his season total over the 300 point mark with 16 counters, but Tom Fields was the high man for the evening, bringing home IS. Proctor and Harkey lcd Charlotte with 13 and 10 tallies respectively. CAMPBELL KNOCKS SCOTS FROM TOURNEY, 63-59.

In the first round of the Eastern Division of the Carolinas Junior College Tournament, Campbell ousted the Scotties in a race to the wire, 63-59. Long John Johnson led both teams with 19 points and Jerry Parrish was right behind with 16. Lasater, Grayhill, and Poe dropped in 14, 13, and 12 respectively to lead Campbell.
