

On December 13 P. J. C. went to play Edwards Military Institute. P. J. C. found the cadets too strong for them and gave up the game 115-74. High scorer for the Scotties was Vest with 26 points.

P. J. C. played host to Louisburg on December 16. P. J. C. had one of its closest games thus far in the season. Louisburg walked away with a victory for their record. P. J. C. lost 84-76. Vest again was high scorer with 40 points,

After the Christmas holidays Presbyterian Junior College was ready for another game. The Scotties played host to Wilmington Junior College and won the hard-fought contest 77-68. Tommy Vest took the scoring honors for the night with 24 points. Judge Johnson was next for P. J. C. with 15 points.

Two nights later P. J. C. went to Buies Creek to meet Campbell College again. At half time Campbell had P. J. C. 43-40. After the half time Campbell pulled away to win the game 89-75. Tommy Vest was high scorer with 25 points and Tommy Hurt was second for the Scotties with 21.

A week later Presbyterian Junior College played Chowan in Maxton. If P. J. C. ever had a tight game, this was one of them. Chowan was leading P. J. C. 42-36 at the half. P. J. C. found the basket during the second half and won the game 76-75. Tommy Hurt, who

suffered a broken arm during most of the season, proved that he could still find the basket and took the scoring honors with 22 points.

Pheiffer came to Maxton to play Presbyterian Jnnior College on January 22. P. J. C. was out to win this game because Pheiffer showed no mercy toward the Scotties in the game on November 22. But again Pheiffer was too strong for the Scotties and took the game 95-85, High scorer for the Scotties was Don Averitte with 26 points. Vest was close behind with 25.

P. J. C. went to Louisburg with fire in their eyes and hope in their hearts for a victory over the strong Lonisburg team. At the half P. J. C. had a three point edge over Louisburg, but during the second period of play, Lonisburg caught on fire and won the game 79-68. High scorer for P. J. C. was Tommy Vest with 19, and Don Averitte and Tommy Hurt tied the second place scoring with 18 points each.

Presbyterian Junior College traveled to Charlotte to play Charlotte Junior College. Score at half time was 32-23 in favor of P. J. C. Charlotte's Jerry Gandit caught on fire and scored 30 points in the second half to put his team ahead 69-54 in the closing seconds. Tommy Hurt and Don Averitte shared the scoring honors with 17 points each.

with Wingate. Previously, Wingate beat them by 10 points. The Scotties were ont for blood. During the first half, P. J. C. held a five-point lead but lost their skill at the basket in the second half. Wingate won the game 67-65. High score for P. J. C. was held by Tommy Vest with 20 points.

After losing four games, P. J. C. played host to Oak Ridge and won a hard fought battle with the score of 81-78. High scorer was Tommy Vest with 24 points and Don Averitte was second with 23.

Next Presbyterian Junior College went to play Davidson Jayvees at Davidson. At half time Davidson was leading P. J. C. by a margin of 12 points, but during the second half P. J. 

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
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
