Next P. J. C. went to Pheiffer and lost the battle 88-58. P. J. C. played a hard game, but they were no match for the cage men of Pheiffer. Johnny Williams was high scorer for the Scotties with 11 points.

Wingate came to Maxton to play P. J. C. on December 4. P. J. C. had found that the Wingate team was a little too strong for the Scotties and P. J. C. lost the battle 86-76. Scoring honors went to Averitte with his sinking 24 points.

On December 7, P. J. C. met Campbell Junior College in Maxton. Campbell, being the state champions of the Junior College Conference, walked away with a victory under their belt. P. J. C. bowed to the strong Campbell team 111-69. Vest was high scorer for P. J. C. with 31 points.

A week later Presbyterian Junior College played Chowan in Maxton. If P. J. C. ever had a tight game, this was one of them. Chowan was leading P. J. C. 42-36 at the half. P. J. C. found the basket during the second half and won the game 76-75. Tommy Hurt, who

suffered a broken arm during most of the season, proved that he could still find th basket and took the scoring honors with 22 points.

Pheiffer came to Maxton to play Presbyterian Junior College on January 22. P. J. C. was out to win this game because Pheiffer showed no mercy toward the Scotties in the game on November 22. But again Pheiffer was too strong for the Scotties and took the game 95-85. High scorer for the Scotties was Don Averitte with 26 points. Vest was close behind with 25.

P. J. C. went to Louisburg with fire in their eyes and hope in their hearts for a victory over the strong Louisburg team. At the half P. J. C. had a three point edge over Louisburg, but during the second period of play, Louisburg caught on fire and won the game 79-68. High scorer for P. J. C. was Tommy Vest with 19, and Don Averitte and Tommy Hurt tied the second place scoring with 18 points each.

Presbyterian Junior College traveled to Charlotte to play Charlotte Junior College. Score at half time was 32-23 in favor of P. J. C. Charlotte's Jerry Gandit caught on fire and scored 30 points in the second half to put his team ahead 69-54 in the closing seconds. Tommy Hurt and Don Averitte shared the scoring honors with 17 points each.

At the last game of the regular season P. J. C. played E. M. I. at Maxton. Before E. M. I. beat P. J. C. by 41 points, but this time it was P. J. C.'s night and they took the game 67-65. Tommy Vest was high scorer with 30 points.

After the regular season play was over, Presbyterian Junior College was preparing themselves for the North Carolina Junior College Tournament. P. J. C. met Charlotte College in the first night and won the contest 96-63. Don Averitte was high with 25 points while Vest sank 24 points.

The next night P. J. C. played Campbell, last year's champs, and lost the game 103-77. Tommy Vest held the scoring honors for both teams with 26 points.

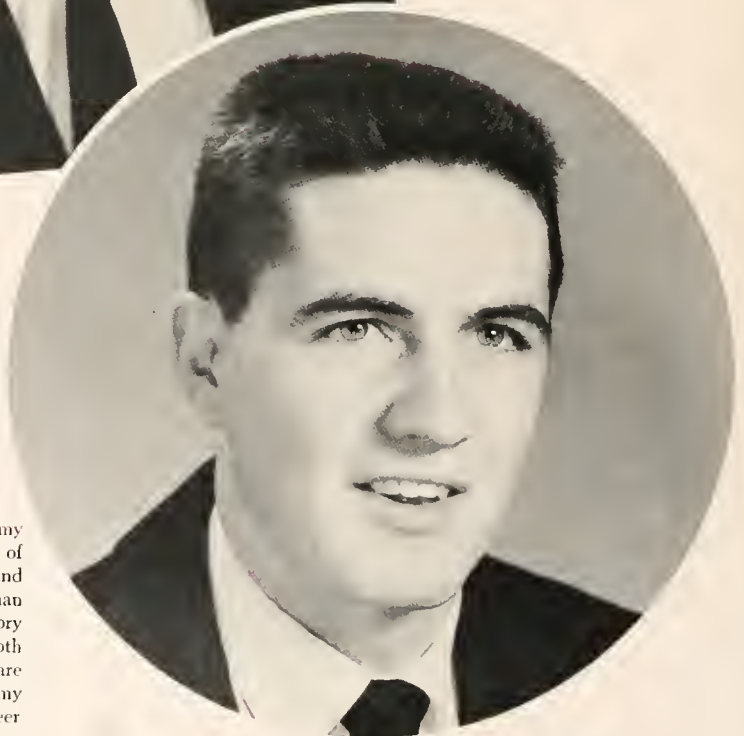

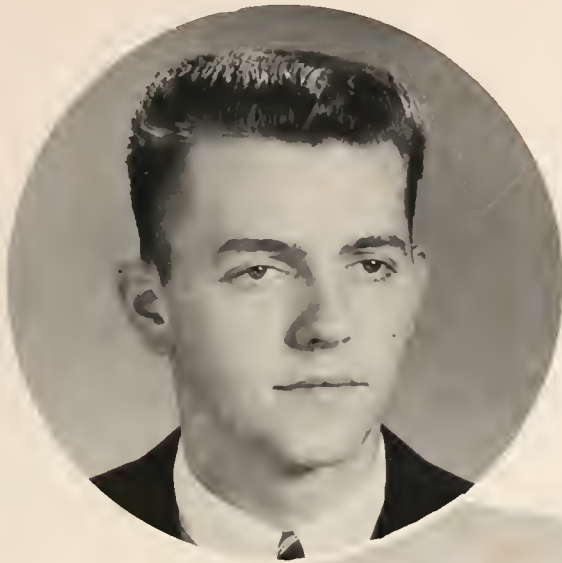
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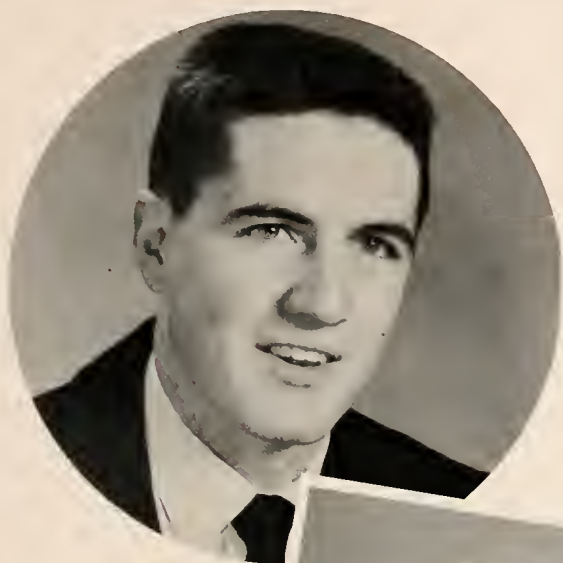


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
