






BLOCK P CLUB


STUDENT ACTIVITY CLUB

From To An Athlete Dying Young








THE CHARIOT RACE from Electra

Behind, Orestes, hitherta the last, Hod yet kept back his coursers for the close; Now one sole rival left-an, he flew, And the sharp sound of the impelling scaurge Rang in the keen ears of the flying steeds. He neors, he reaches-they are side by side---Now one-the other-by a length the victor. The courses all are past-the wheels erect-All safe—when, as the hurrying coursers round The fatal pillar dashed, the wretched boy Slackened the left rein: on the columns' edge Crashed the frail axle; headlang from the car Caught and all meshed within the reins, he fell; And masterless the mad steeds raged along! Laud from that mighty multitude arose A shriek-a shout! But yesterday such deeds, Taday such doam! Now whirled upon the earth, Now his limbs dashed aloft, they dragged him---thase Wild horses-till all gory from the wheels Released;-and na man, not his nearest friends, Could in that mongled corpse have traced Orestes. They laid the body on the funeral pyre; And while we speak, the Phacian strangers beor, In a small, brozen, melancholy urn, That handful of cald ashes to which all The grandeur of the Beautiful hath Shrunk.





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
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
