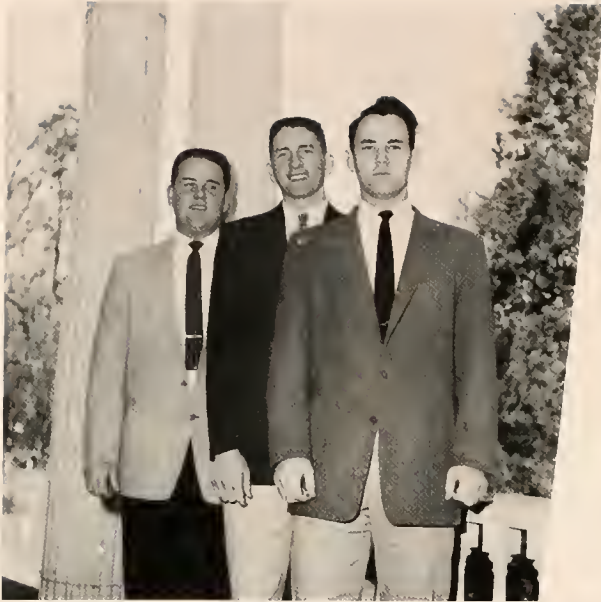
VETERANS CLUB

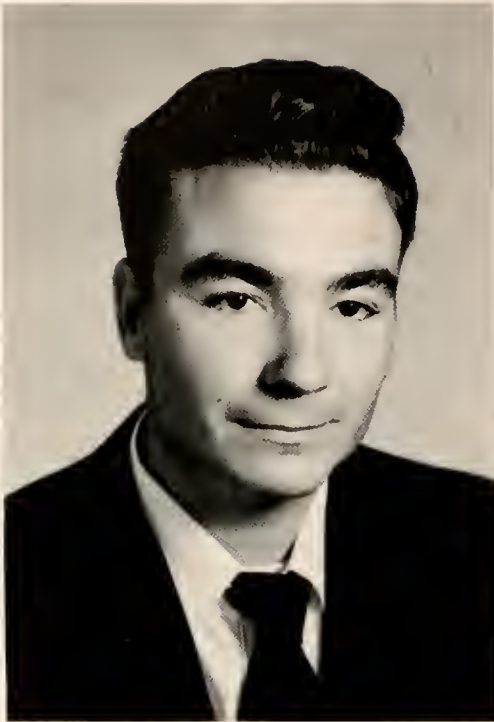
