 The 23 does, 14 fawns, 5 bucks
 and 4 indeterminate were listed.
 One buck had good sized horns, two had
 small horns with about 3 or four points and
 two small spikes, not yet of breeding age.
 This leaves one good and two poor bucks for 23 does.
