





#### Who's Who

Each year at commencement and awards exercise across the country, a select group of students are called forward to accept one of the most prestigious awards the academic community can bestow — that of being selected to Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges. This exclusive honor is conferred by more than 500 schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia and symbolized by the presentation of an award certificate. It exists as one of the most highly regarded and long-standing honors programs

in the nation, having earned the overwhelming respect of college faculties and administrations. In addition to the local and national publicity that each student chosen for the Who's Who program receives, his complete biography will be presented in this year's edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges.

Candidate selections are based on academic excellence and extracurricular activities. Each candidate must have a minimum overall G.P.A. of 3.0, be of a Sophomore status, and have the recommendation of two COA faculty or staff members. Each candidate is also judged on scholarship, service to COA, citizenship, and potential for future achievement. Each candidate's form is given to the Dean of Student Development, G. John Simmons, Jr.

For the students — the outstanding campus leaders of the year — national recognition by the Who's Who program marks a pinnacle of scholastic achievement.






#### Christmas at COA . . .












