WELCOME TO THE COLLEGE OF THE ALBEMARLE! COA is a fully accredited, state funded, two year community college, COA was the first accredited community college in North Carolina. The beautiful 40 acre main campus is easily accessible on U.S. 17 just north of historic Elizabeth City, the first capital of the state. The Pasquotank River flows behind the campus, which consists of three large buildings designated A, B, and C.

Building A consists of administration offices, classrooms, laboratories, a bookstore, cafeteria, and student center. B building houses the business labs, classrooms, a lecture auditorium and the learning resources center (LRC). The LRC includes audio-visual materials and equipment along with a well stocked library and learning lab. Most of the college's occupational programs including machine shops, electronic laboratories, automotive shops, music rooms, and physics and art labs are located in C building.

Additional college programs and facilities include extension centers in surrounding counties, classroom facilities for the Practical Nursing program, the Dare County Campus, and the Continuing Education program which includes the Adult Basic Education Program and the Bridges Program.

COA is in the process of erecting yet another structure, Building D. Noel L. Coltrane designed this structure and it is being built by Silas S. Kea and Sons, under the supervision of Dee Rollings. The building will include a 1,013 seat auditorium, classrooms, small business center, and student lounge.



A ttending the College of the Albemarle has listinct advantages. First, as a state supported community college, tuition at COA is rather nexpensive, and persons over 65 are not required to pay tuition. In 1987 an In-state resident could attend college full time for \$84 plus the cost of books. Other universities cost at least three times more for the same basic education. A person could attend COA for two years and effectively have their third year at a four year institution free.

Secondly, as a two year community college, COA professors are not required to "publish or perish". They are more interested in teaching classes and have time to spend with their students one-on-one. At a major University, professors have less time for teaching. They are hired, not for their desire to teach, but for their ability to do research, because that's the way the University makes money. Also, professors at major universities are so far advanced in their fields, that making lower level courses understandable can be difficult for them. Courses required in the first two years of college are the same wherever you go. So, you are better off

attending a small college like COA. The College Transfer Degree program was specifically designed with this in mind.

The College Transfer program is flexible and individualized. Many undecided freshmen can explore career fields by taking a number of general courses. Those students that know which field they intend to major in can enter one of the three programs of study in the College Transfer Division.

The programs of study in this division lead to associate degrees in Science, Fine Arts, and Liberal Arts. Major curriculum choices include Agriculture, Computer Science and Computer Technology, Dental, Engineering, Forestry, Medical, Pharmacy, Veterinary Science, General Science, Art, Drama, Music, Business Administration, Business Education, Elementary Education, Law, Liberal Arts, Mathematics, Secondary Education, and Social Work.

Some students are satisfied with their associates degree while others work toward other associates. Most students taking transfer courses go on to four year institutions and graduate with baccalaureate degrees, which is the purpose of the associate degree program in the College Transfer division of COA.



As a community college, COA has to meet the needs of many diverse people, including, but not limited to, those who can only attend in the evening, senior citizens, and students with little or no education. The General Degree program allows students to attend school without declaring a major field of interest. Students can aquire skills and knowledge without working toward a degree. However, if a student decides to acquire a degree, transfer from the General Program to one of the three degree programs is not difficult. Most courses already taken can then he used for credit.

COA's Bridges program gives students with little education a chance to gain a high school equivalency (GED). Tuition, books, and supplies are paid for by the Joh Training Partnership Act. Statistics show that more than 14,000 people in the seven county area serviced by COA have trouble reading above an eighth grade level. If you know someone who has trouble reading, mention the Bridges Program to them.

COA also provides education in basic literacy skills. The ABLE program teaches math, reading, and grammer to students who want to improve themselves. The program presently has 75 volunteers helping with one-on-one tutoring for the 106 students currently enrolled. The ABLE program is funded by the state and is tuition free. The ABLE and Bridges Programs work in tandom. Many area residents who could not read have entered the ABLE program, learned to read, registered in the Bridges' program, earned their GED (all tuition-free), and gone on to acquire an associates college degree. COA was literally the key to their future.



Vocational programs are generally one year in length and in many cases lead to an Associates Degree. All of the programs are preapprenticeship in nature. The programs of study are Automotive Mechanics, Industrial Maintenance, Light Construction, Air Conditioning, Heating & Refrigeration, Cosmetology, Electrical Installation & Maintenance, Machinist, Advanced Machinist, Nursing Assistant, and Practical Nursing.

The cosmetology department has a salon where the students can perfect their skills on real customers, after spending many hours in practice on mannequins and on **each other!** Students enrolled in the Practical Nursing Program have the option of living in a dormitory. The building was constructed with state funds as an extension to the hospital with the criterion that it be used only for COA's practical nurses. The housing is free, as an added incentive to those wishing to come from far away to become licensed practical nurses.

The major objectives of each of the vocational programs is to guide both the young and old in acquiring vocational competency in the knowledge and skills that will help them to become well adjusted and self supporting citizens. The programs are designed for beginning students as well as for workers who need new job skills.

Students are able to enter the work force in their chosen profession immediately after graduation. Graduates have the technical knowledge necessary to operate the equipment they will find in the work place. More importantly, our shops are supplied with most of the standard machines as well as up-to-date equipment, so students will have experience on both. COA graduates are assets to any business, able to produce results the first day on the job.

PRACTICAL NURSING CLUB (PNE)


