"Barney" Pilgrim, a resident of South Mills and the Visiting Artist at College of The Albemarle, was recently honored for his achievements on the General Education Development (GED) Testing Service exam. Pilgrim had the highest score in the stare of North Carolina in 1991 on the GED exam and also had a perfect score on the Social Studies section of the test. Pilgrim earned his GED through the literacy program at College of The Albemarle. Pilgrim scored 370 points out of a possible 400 and was the top scorer in North Carolina of the 13,331 who passed the GED test in 1991. Over 800,000 took the test in 1991 in the United States, Canada, and U.S. territories.


