EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING AWARD

Althea Riddick received the Excellence in Teaching Award, the highest honor for full-time teachers in the North Carolina Community College System, during ceremonics in Raleigh on November 19, 1999.

She is the first COA instructor to receive the honor and it comes just eight short years after she graduated from COA.

Ms. Riddick is an assistant professor in COA's in the Business Information Technology Department.

When she began classes at COA she wanted to be an administrative assistant so she began taking business classes. There she met Marvenia White, a business education instructor, who was to have a profound impact on her career. One day Ms. White asked her what she really wanted to do with her life. Althea said that she thought about how she enjoyed working as a professional tutor through COA's Student Services center, and realized that she wanted to teach. Marvenia told her to "go for it."

Not long after Athea's graduation from coa, Marvenia was diagnosed with breast cancer. She died five years ago, shortly before Althea received her master's degree from East Carolina University.

Today Riddick heeps a photograph of herself with Marvenia, on her desk. "I look up at it and I hope she's pleased with what I've become, because she lit the fire," Althea says. "She saw something in me, so I believe why shouldn't I pay attention to my students?"

Althea says she models her teaching style after White's. She admits being tough on her freshman students, but says it's necessary because the work world is difficult and many are woefully unprepared for it.

Well done Ms. Riddick. You are an inspiration to all of us!!
