We acknowledge with deep appreciation the unselfish and sincere efforts of those persons who contributed to the production of THE BEAR.





FAREWELL TO THE CLASS OF 1960



Senior Class History

In the year of 1956, one hundred and seventy-six green, eager, and excited freshman entered Shaw University. Many of us were destined to trod on these hallowed grounds for the set period of time while others of us were destined to drop by the wayside. Most of us being frightened and curious, did not realize just how queer we appeared.
