Never again will we take those dreaded trips to the office, never again share our secrets and experiments in school. The tears well in our eyes as we think over past years. Are they tears of happiness or tears of sadness? Are we happy because the long road has come to an end? Are we sad because our friends will go one way—we another, to face the world? Some will be in the Armed Forces fighting to keep this country free so our children will have the privileges we had. Others will have the privileges we had. Others will remain at home to make their places in the social and business world.

Wherever we go, whatever we do we will try our best, using the tools given us in our student days of childhood and youth—leadership, character, ability, and knowledge.
