

Bemis Heights, a post hamlet of Saratoga Co., N. Y., in Stillwater township, on the west bank of the Hudsou river, twenty-four miles N. of Albany. Here occurred an engagement between Generals Gates and Burgovne Sept. 19, 1777.

Bemis Point, a Post-Office and Summer Resort of Chautauqua Co., N. Y. on Chautauqua Lake, 10 miles W. N. W. of Jamestown. Here is a church.

INTRODUCTORY.

THE author was desirous of completing, for the benefit of his children, four Genealogies, two on his own side, and two on that of his wife, so undertook the compiling of the Draper and Bemis Family Histories, the first of which was published in 1892, and the second is presented herewith. On his wife's side, the Kelsey History is almost finished, and the Gould Genealogy, is in a fair state of progress.

The writer realized, that work of this kind, must necessarily be a labor, largely of love, and that he must put aside all hopes of a pecuniary reward, because the clientage of those interested in a family History, is necessarily circumscribed.

The great importance of collating Historical and Genealogical information is little understood by the people at large, and it is with the greatest difficulty that members of a family are induced to furnish information even, much less to subscribe for a work of this character. Although every possible effort and meaus has been used, to obtain data, there are many blanks and inaccuracies in this work, but they who peruse its pages, will kindly lay the fault at the doors of those, who have been negligent and indifferent, and not blame the author.

Pecuniarly, the author is out of pocket a large sum of money, and the time it has been necessary to give to the subject.

As this is the History and Genealogy of an American Family, it does not cross the ocean, and take up those of the name in England, these forebears are left to some English genealogist; the author feeling that the expense and time, necessary to an authentic research on the other side, would be more than he cares to attempt. Suffice it to say, that what has been learned of the Bemis's of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, is to their credit.

The Bemis's in America are not a large family, as families go; but it may be said that whatever station in life they have occupied, they have largely fulfilled their duty towards their country, their God and their fellow-men.

1619-1900.

1. Joseph Bemis, the founder, and original immigrant of the Family, although not all of the name in America can trace back to him, was born in England in 1619. He came to Watertown Mass. as early as 1640, or at about the date of his majority. He died in Watertown on August 7th, 1684. Whether he was previously married or not is impossible to say definitely, but the evidence is strongly in favor of his having been, and that his wife Sarah came with him, to America and Watertown; although as their first child Sarah was born in Watertown in 1642, Joseph and Sarah may have been married in Watertown in 1641, or as the Boston Records note their first child Sarah's birth, they may have been married in Boston and their dau. Sarah born there.

Joseph Bemis was accompanied to Watertown by his sister Mary, and in order not to confuse the record, I have deemed it wise to record her marriage and descendants first, before entering upon the main Genealogy of Joseph and Sarah's descendants.

Joseph Bemis was elected a Selectman in and for the years 1648; 1672 and 1675, and does not appear to have held other offices. He was a quiet, hardworking man, a farmer, and at times a blacksmith, and managed to accumulate some property during his life. The Inventory of his Estate was £200 40sh. 3d; a fair sum for those early days. The will itself, is dated the day of his death, Aug 7, 1684; it was proved three months later, on October 7, 1684. His widow, who died about 1712, administered on her husband's estate, which was divided after her decease on Nov. 18, 1712; except those parts which had already been given to "Eldest son Joseph and daughter Martha", to the following children, viz: Ephraim, Mary, Rebecca and John, the other children not being mentioned in the will.

MARY BEMIS, sister of Joseph m. at Watertown Mass. on Mar. 20, 1644-5 William Hagar (d. Jan 10, 1683-4.) She d. in Dec. 1695, "an aged woman." The inventory of William Hagar's Estate, administered by his widow Mary, was £353 14s.

7. JOSEPH BEMIS 2d (I. Joseph.) This son of the immigrant, the first to arrive at manhood, m. Anna——and removed to Westminster, Mass; then called Narragansett No. 2. In 1740, his son, probably Philip, "Disposed of all right and title to the property of my honored father and mother, Joseph and Anna Bemis, to my brother Joseph and sister Mary of Cambridge." (p. 542. Hist. of Westminster Mass. by William S. Haywood.) As we know that Joseph's wife was Anna, and that he went to Westminster to live, it proves that he was the son of Joseph Bemis the immigrant. The records of the towns of Westminster and Watertown do not furnish any data of an intervening generation, and the author therefor assumes there was none. Joseph Bemis, or Bemish so spelt, was a soldier in King Phillips War as evidenced from the following entries in Bodge "Soldiers in King Phillips War" p. 176. Joseph Bemish credited under Capt. James Oliver, for services Mar. 24, 1675-6. £2. 14s. p. 376. The same soldier received £2. \$10. p. 147. Under a list of the Grantees of Narragansett No. 2. now Westminster, Mass, appears Joseph Beames, deceased, claimed by his son Joseph Beames. Grant made about Oct. 17, 1733. In 1700, the son of the Narragansett settler, Joseph 3d was aided by a contribution "having had his substance consumed by fire."

The Hon Stephen C. Bemis was one of the best known men in Western Mass. When fourteen years old, he went to Chicopee Mass, and entered his uncle's store, where he showed such ability, that in four years he was made a partner; four years later he bought his uncle's share in the business. He later removed to Springfield, Mass., and became the Pioneer Hardware Manufacturer of the Connecticut Valley. He early and always, took a lively interest in politics and public affairs, holding many positions of Honor and Trust. He was postmaster of Chicopee in 1830; then Tax-Collector in Springfield, Selectman and a member of the Legislature. He was nominated for Congress, also candidate for the Lieutenant-Governorship. Several times delegate to Democratic National Conventions, and Mayor of Springfield in 1861-2. In this last position during the early years of the Rebellion, he bent all his energies and patriotism, which were great, to the furthering of the National Cause. A "War democrat", his whole soul, mind and heart were for the union. Soon after the expiration of his Mayoralty term, his health declined, in consequence of cares and overwork.

Ephraim Bemis was a private in Capt. Joseph Sylls Company, in King Phillips War, and, (see Vol. 43, p. 263. N. E. Hist. Gen. Reg.) received for his services in that campaign on Dec. 20, 1675. £3. 8sh. 4d. and on June 24, 1676. £3. sh. 5. on Aug. 24, 1676. £3. sh. 5. In Bodges "Soldiers in King Phillip's War" p. 360 he is named as of the garrison of Groton two of the above payments are mentioned as well as an additional one on Jan. 25, 1675-6 of sh. 12 on p. 376. He and Joseph Bemis are mentioned as soldiers from Watertown, giving the amounts paid them. In a list of Grantees of Narragansett Twship No. 4, confirmed by the Court Jan. 13, 1738, Ephraim Bemis received his assignment for services in King Phillip's War. He is mentioned as being then alive at Windham, Ct. This Twship No. 4, is now Greenwich, Mass.

The author has been entirely unsuccessful in obtaining absolute proof of the parentage of 384, 385 and 386, but is fully convinced that they were the sons of Ephraim (9) and Elizabeth who were born in Watertown. All accounts agree that the Windham County Conn. Bemis's were from Watertown, and both Records agree that the Windham and Hampton Bemis's were from there; and, as the date perfectly agree, of removal and settlement, it is a fair and honest assumption that the line of descent is correct.

Of James (385) there is a Windham Record, that on Jan. 29, 1731. Nathanial Bemis and his wife Abigail Hovey were summoned before the church to testify against James Bemis for "hard drinking."

There is not much to be said of Ephraim Bemis, because little is known. He resided in Ashford, and the church records of that town state; "at one time (1728) in Ashford Church, discipline was so strict, yet with all this, when it was put to a vote of the Association, whether Ephraim Bemis was guilty of a confessable fault in selling strong liquor, in small quantities, on a certain occasion, the church decided in the negative."

The rigid church party in Ashford were very bitter against the Baptists and Separatists, and the preaching of Solomon Paine was especially obnoxious, so that on Feb. 15, 1745, Justice Tiffany gave a warrant to Constable Ephraim Bemis to arrest Paine, who resisted; whereupon he was forcibly placed on a horse and conducted to the Justices, where he was properly rebuked, and apparently dismissed. Constable Bemis and his assistants had been very forbearing and gentle with the Exhorter Paine, but in spite of that, they were themselves indicted for riot, but on trial, declared not guilty, yet had the costs to pay, which later were also remitted.

Ephraim Bemis was baptized, as an adult, at the same time as his son James, namely Sept. 29, 1737.

405. JOTHAM BEMIS. (386. Ephraim. 9. Ephraim 1. Joseph.) (This Branch of the family write the name Bemus, substituting the *u* for the *i*; and I shall write the name as they do whilst treating of them, although believing it to be a corruption of the name, just as I believe that the name originally in England was Bemish. Author's Note.)

For the data on this Branch, I am almost wholly indebted to Captain Daniel Hazeltine Post of Jamestown, N. Y., who being a descendant himself took a great interest in the matter; In June 1894, he published a most interesting genealogical pamphlet entitled "Jotham Bemus of Bemus Heights;"

and which with Capt. Post's permission I make the basis of what follows, as to the descendants of Jotham Bennus.

Considerable interest naturally attaches to the family which owned and occupied the ground chosen by General Gates, on the advice of Connt Kosciusko, for the American defensive works against Burgoyne's onward march in 1777; in view of the fact that the family name became forever associated with the important battles fought in the vicinity, and that members of the family took part in them upon the American side, literally defending their home and fireside.

At the time above referred to, Jotham Bemns, his wife and six children were living on the west bank of the Hudson river, about four miles north of the village of Stillwater. He was a farmer energetic and enterprising, engaged in buying cattle and in other traffic, and evidently a man in easy circumstances. He kept the only Tavern of any note between Albany and Fort Edward, as Lossing relates in his "Field Book of the Revolution" Vol. I. p. 45. According to the English M.S.S. in the N. Y. State Library p. 827. he was in 1774 a Justice of the Peace.

He was born about 1738, and at the time of the Burgoyne campaign about 40 years old. He is described as of stont build and of a vigorons and determined character. From Charles Neilson's account of Burgoyne's campaign, published in 1844 p. 289. he states that Bemus's house was the only frame dwelling included within the military operations at the Heights, it being on the road from Albany to Whitehall.

At the time of the Battle of Saratoga, Sep. 19, 1777, the family had been residents of the vicinity for at least seventeen years, for the Calendar of Land Papers, N. Y. State Library 164. Sept. 9, 1763. p. 325. records, that in 1760, the families of Bemus, Griffith and Park, were occupying land in this region.

In the Battles occurring near the Heights, Jotham Bemus and three of his sons undoubtedly took part. This has always been a family tradition and much evidence exists to prove its truth. William Marvin of North East Pa., a descendant of Jotham Bemus, writes (in 1894) that he has heard William Bemus, son of Jotham senior, relate his army experiences. Jotham Bemus jr., the first child of Jotham sen., certainly was in the American Army as shown by the Archives of New York Vol. I. p. 250 viz:

"Bemus Jotham, Corpl. Rhode Island Regt., Jeremiah Olney, Lt. Col. Commanding, enlisted in Col. Van Schaick's for 1 year '76. Served 6 yrs. 1 month, 10 days. Discharged by General Washington Jan. 15,

1783. A. P. 17-62. Town of Saratoga, badge of merit."

William Bemus, the second child of Jotham Bemus, sen. was a member of Captain Ephraim Woodworths Company, the 4th in the 13th Regiment, Saratoga District, commanded by Colonel van Veghten, who was on Genrl. Gates staff.

Captain Woodworth was a neighbor of the Bemus's, his house about half a mile back of theirs being used by Genrl. Gates as headquarters, after he left the Bemus house. Col. John McCrea at one time commanded the Saratoga Regiment, the tragic fate of whose sister Jane McCrea, formed a leading incident of the Burgoyne campaign. See N. Y. Archives Vol. I. p. 271 and 322.

That the third son, John, also took part in the struggle is evident from the following extract from his obituary notice published in the Saratoga Sentinel Sept. 15, 1829. "Though young he was in the American service at the capture of Burgoyne, as a teamster."

The home of Jotham Bemus was used as Headquarters by Genrl. Gates for a time. With the extension of the American fortifications after the first battle, Genrl. Gates moved on to the Heights and into Captain Ephraim Woodworth's house. Genrl. Lincoln, after the battle of the 19th used the Bemus house as headquarters. The fate of the house is established by a letter from the Rev. S. Hawley Adams of Jamestown, N. Y. printed in Stones "Burgoyne Ballads," in which he says: "My grandmother, Salley Bemus Crawford, (daughter of Jotham Bemus Sen.) was born at Bemus Heights May 1768. * * * she has spent hours in telling me of Burgoyne and his army, which she saw;" of the burning of her father's house by the British, and of the sufferings of the family for a time, while they were wintering in a barn-Burgoyne having destroyed all their buildings and crops." Though no mention of the destruction of the house appears in any of the accounts of the battles, it is evident that it was burned in some foray of the enemy after it had been abandoned by Genrls. Gates and Lincoln as headquarters. It was on the extreme flank of the American lines, and probably more or less unprotected after the first days of fighting, the troops being massed at some distance from the river, near Fort Neilson.

The site of the Bemus house is now marked by a stone tablet bearing the following inscription:

SARATOGA, 1777

THE SITE OF

BEMUS'S TAVERN

THE GIFT OF

GILES B. SLOCUM

The Bemus Heights Farm is now the property of the Hon. James B. Jermain of Albany, N. Y.

Jotham Bemus, Sen. who was born about 1738, died, it is believed about 1786, at the age of 48 years. This date is thought too early by some of the family. His first wife was Tryphena Moore, who was of Scotch descent. She was a woman of much refinement and culture. His 2d wife's name is unknown.

In an old Family Bible in possession of some of the descendants, at Bemus Point, Chant Co., N. Y. is the following list of:

The letter is No. 187, Vol. 8, B. The lots mentioned are in the present town of Hamburg Erie Co. near Buffalo. He was a member of the First Grand Jury west of the Genesee river, chosen in 1803. Rev. S. Hawley Adams has the following record regarding him. "He was a farmer of Erie County, N. Y. He m. Asenath Andress: He was in the war of 1812 and died of sickness contracted thereby."

His wife's father was a leader in his section and for his patriotic resistance to the obnoxious rent laws, was in 1766 condemned to death for high treason, but was subsequently pardoned by the King. William Bemus in 1805 left Pittstown with his own and his father-in-law's family, a party of 30 persons, and journeyed to Kentucky and Tennessee, but came back to New York State and settled on the shores of Chautauqua Lake, at Bemus Point March 9, 1806. In 1804, according to Turner, he had taken articles to land in township 2, range 12, the site on which he settled in 1806. He evidently visited the region before his trip south. He was a man of mark in the community, of high character, benevolent instincts and public spirit, yielding a large influence. His military record has already been recorded.

He joined the party, and reached the Headquarters of the army just before the Battle of Bunker Hill, where he joined Capt. James Lewis's Company (his sister Martha's father-in-law.) Col. E. Hales Regiment, which marched June 29, 1777 to reinforce the Garrison at Ticonderoga. In Sept. 1777 Capt. James Lewis raised another Comp. in the neighborhood of Marlborough, in which James Bemis was also a private.

Abraham Bemis was one of the first fruits of Methodism in the East. With an unrestrained liberality, he opened the doors of his home at Waltham for its Evangelists, and for many years it was their home and temple. Hundreds gathered for years, in the shades of his orchards, to hear them preach, and many were there converted, including all of Mr. Bemis' family, and many of his relations. The old Weston Society was formed under his roof—his name being the first on the roll. His hospitality towards God's Messengers returned in a hundredfold; his acres increased and abundance surrounded him.

The Rev. George Pickering, was, at his death, the oldest effective Methodist minister in the world, having been a preacher for Fifty-seven years. Inheriting from his father a considerable fortune, principally in slaves, he refused to receive them, or any profit from their sale or labor, and they were freed. He also declined to be made a Bishop. He was one of the pioneers of Methodism in New England. At his death there were but two members of American Conferences who had preceded him in the ministry, and but fourteen in England. Born in Talbot Co. Md. brought up in Philadelphia, and converted in that city at St. George's Church, at the age of eighteen; he began preaching immediately and continued to do so almost till he died, a period of fifty-nine years. When he entered the ministry there were but eighteen Methodist preachers in the New England conference, when he died, he was at the head of six hundred and thirty-six, most of whom had been raised up by the instrumentality of his colleagues and himself. The church had risen from a membership of 500 to 66,000.

His wife Mary Bemis was converted in her seventeenth year. His marriage gave to the Rev. Mr. Pickering a home with his wife's father at Waltham, such as few Methodist ministers enjoyed, and free from the financial cares of life, he was at liberty to pursue his vocation as a minister of the Gospel. Of Emery Bemis the Cambridge Mass. Tribune of Dec. 1st 1882, said:-"A Boston merchant for more than fifty years, for twenty-five years an honored citizen of Cambridge, where his last days were spent. Such is the meager outline of a large life. Yet I deem it only fitting that one who has long known and loved him should add a word to this brief record of earthly years. There are many to whom this and the simple notice of death in another column will bring a shock of sad surprise. Not that death at an age so advanced was unlooked for or singular, but to those who knew him well, and were wont to meet him at his place of business, and in the streets of the neighboring city, he may well have seemed, up to the time of his enforced retirement from the scenes of active life, some six years since, the very embodiment of vitality and manly energy. It was impossible to look into the face of this man and not believe in him at once and completely, nor was such confidence ever misplaced. I have known and have had close business relations with many men, and can say with absolute truth, with neither exaggeration nor the fulsome eulogy that gushes so easily when death has closed a life record, that I never met his superior, scarcely his equal, for perfect integrity and unsullied and undoubted honor. As to a generosity, ever too free for his means, let the poor, to whom he was a providence; let the families of our soldiers absent in our defense, tell the story. For the last six or seven years Mr. Bemis has been confined at home, a victim of progressive paralysis, yet, despite the weakness and irritability consequent on such a complaint, his mind remained clear almost to the end.

'Why weep ye, then, for him, who having won
The bound of man's appointed years, at last,
Life's blessing all enjoyed, life's labors done,
Serenely to his final rest has passed;
While the soft memory of his virtues yet
Lingers like twilight hues when the bright sun is set?'"

Mr. Bemis when a boy of thirteen went with his parents from Boston to New York, and remained there till he rejoined his father, who had returned to the former city, in the business of leaf tobacco. In April 1861, he enlisted in the Second Battalion Light Inftry. Boston Tigers, expecting to be sent to the front, but the corps was ordered to garrison Fort Warren in Boston harbor, where they remained a month, and then did escort duty in Boston for six months. At this time George Francis Train, who was in London, introducing street railways, sent for him, and on his arrival in that city, he took charge of Train's business, and at the same time became the Genrl-manager of the "London American," at the solicitation of George Peabody, Charlotte Cushman and other Americans who had raised money for the support of the paper. During 1861-62-63 the paper had a large circulation abroad, advocating the Union cause, whereas, located only a couple of doors away, the Rebel paper "Index" was published. Mr. Bemis returned to New York in 1863 and entered the Brokerage business. In 1864 he joined Train again and helped him to organize the "Credit Mobilier," and in 1865 the "Credit Foncier" of which he was Secretary and Train, president. In 1868 Mr. Bemis went to Omaha, Neb. where he has since resided, although he has constantly been with George Francis Train on his lecturing tours, and in 1870, went with him on his second tour around the world, reaching Marseilles in October, where Train organized a following of 80,000 of the "Commune", the "International," and the "Ligue du Midi," whilst Paris was being besieged by the Germans, and for a short time, by a coupe de main, held possession of the city.

Returning to Omaha, Mr. Bemis devoted himself until 1887, to the Real Estate and Loan business in which he has very large interests. He was President of the Bemis Park Company that presented Bemis Park to the city of Omaha. On Oct. 17, 1891. Mr. Bemis was nominated by the Republican party for Mayor of Omaha and on Nov. 3rd following, he was elected over his democratic opponent, by the largest majority (4484 votes) ever given to a candidate for that office. A reform mayor was an urgent necessity at that time and he gave to Omaha for four years the best administration it has ever known, as is conclusively shown by the following from the Omaha Neb. "Bee" of Jan. 8th, 1896.

"The proudest title to which any man can aspire is that of an American citizen. George P. Bemis, who for four years past has served as mayor of Omaha, may now pride himself on the assumption of his title, 'Citizen.' His message as retiring mayor is a most creditable document. It is a clear cut and businesslike presentation of the situation of the municipal government. It affords a comprehensive review of the relations of the city to the various franchised corporations, and embodies recommendations for the promotion and protection of the city's interests in dealing with them in the future. It points out the imperative necessity of radical retrenchment in every branch of the municipal government and suggests appropriate remedies for existing abuses. While the message is dignified throughout and moderate in its tone. Mr. Bemis does not mince words in discussing questions that vitally concern the taxpayers. This is particularly true as regards public works contractors, tax shirkers and taxeaters.

"While the citizens of Omaha may not fully appreciate the difficulties under which Mayor Bemis has labored in their interests during the past four years, they must concede to him the merit of conscientious and faithful public service and fearless discharge of duty as he saw his duty. In the never-ceasing struggle with council combines dominated by boodling contractors and grasping corporations, Mr. Bemis never flinched from defending the public and never bartered away the rights of the taxpayers. Whatever the shortcomings of his administration may have been, they must be ascribed to conditions over which he had no control and the lack of honest co-operation on the part of subordinates and council.

"It will be many a year before Omaha secures another mayor who will be as devoted to its welfare and as courageous in the discharge of duty as George. P. Bemis."

Samuel Bemis was the second settler of Spencer, Mass., going there from Wat. in 1721. He purchased 400 acres of land, and began at once to fell the timber, with which the land was covered, before bringing his family from Wat. At that time the Indians were still numerous in that section, and they frequently came to his house and tarried the night, but their presence was most offensive to him. In 1722, when his wife was about to give birth to his third child, William, fearing the Indians, she made a journey to Sudbury for safety during that critical period, and when her little son was only two weeks old, she rode home on horseback, a distance of fifty miles in one day, carrying her infant in her arms, the road passing through an entire wilderness.

Samuel Bemis acquired a handsome estate, built the first frame house in Spencer, a building of two stories, which stood for over one hundred and twenty-five years, and was then taken down. The following is the inscription on his tombstone:

"In memory of Mr. Samuel Bemis, one of the First settlers of the Town, who died August 1776, in his 84th year."

"Where nothing dwelt but beasts of prey, Or men as fierce and wild as they, Our kind forefathers did repair, And built us towns and cities there."

Colonel Benjamin Bemis was a distinguished soldier in the Revoloutionary Struggle and in the War of 1812. He was a private in Capt. Joseph Walcott's Company of Rangers, from Spencer in the Lexington Alarm. Sergeant in Capt. Joel Green's Company, Col. Frye's Regiment, Mass. Militia 1775. Lieut. 8th Comp. Worcester County Militia, in Col. Washburne's Regiment, Worcester Co. Mass. Militia Jan. 12, 1781. Also Member of the Spencer Committee of Correspondence and Safety. He commanded a Regiment in the War of 1812, and was

ordered to the Canadian frontier, where however they did not have an engagement with the British. He was Assessor in 1785, Town Clerk 1781-82 and 86, Selectman 1784, 85, 86.

Captain Simeon was one of those typical Yankees that have made the country what it is. He enlisted in the Revoloutionary Army, when but a lad of sixteen, and was promoted Corporal, Sergeant, Lieutenant and Captain. He kept the well known "Brookfield Tavern" at West Brookfield, Mass. for many years. This was the half-way house between the east and west. He owned and operated that part of the stage line, from Worcester to Springfield, which ran in pre-railroad days, so regularly between New York and Boston. He was elected to represent Brookfield in the General Court 1809-12-15-16-17-18-19-29-30; and was a member of the constitutional Convention of 1820. He held many offices in West and South Brookfield, such as Justice and Selectman. In 1800 he was given a commission in the regular Army by President John Adams, and served till the standing Army was abolished. General Lafayette was his guest over night at his house in Brookfield, on his second visit to America. He was an active Freemason, belonged to, and presided over Meriden Sun Lodge of Brookfield. Colonel Thedore Sedgwick Draper was a very prominent merchant and business man in New York and Paris. He was Lieut-Colonel and then Colonel of the 2d Regiment, Washington Greys, N. Y. S. M. which subsequently became the 8th Regiment N. G. S. N. Y. After the Rebellion he took his family abroad, (1866) to educate his children, and whilst there was offered by President Grant the Consulships at Dresden, Munich and Brussels, all of which he declined, although he acted ad interim, as consul in Munich for a few

months, by special request. He was offered numerous appointments, only one of which he accepted in the later years of his life, the Deputy Collectorship of New York, under Chester A. Arthur, who subsequently became President, on the death of President Garfield. He was a man without an enemy in life, and one who was a prominent and well known figure in Paris and New York.

THOMAS WALN-MORGAN DRAPER. (The Author.) (1386. Theodore Sedgwick Draper. 1363. Mary Bemis. 1339. Benjamin. 1331. Samuel. 569. Samuel. 10. John. 1. Joseph.) Mary Bemis (1363.) was the dau. of 1339. Col. Benjamin Bemis and Rebecca Draper.

Colonel Thomas Waln-Morgan Draper was born in New York City on March 12th 1855; the second child and eldest son of Colonel Theodore Sedgwick Draper and Elizabeth Morgan. On his father's side he descends from pure New England stock, his grandfather Captain Simeon Draper of the Revolutionary Army whose wife was Mary Bemis, the eldest child of Colonel Benjamin Bemis of Spencer, whose mother was Rebecca Draper.

On his mother's side, his ancestry is of the old Pennsylvania Quaker stock, Elizabeth Morgan was the daughter of Thomas Waln-Morgan and Hannah Griffitts, and back through these are the Carpenters, Morris', Walns, the Lewis's, Heaths, Fishbourne's, Powells, and many others.

It is but natural that with the Yankee-Quaker strains of blood combined, he should have become an ardent searcher into the past, especially into that appertaining to American Family History. Space does not permit of an enumeration of all he has written, but the works on Genealogy by him are: "The Drapers in America;" "The Tiffany History and Genealogy;" "The Beste-Cutting Charts;" "The Morgan Memorial"; "The Kelsey History and Genealogy"; and now the "History and Genealogy of the Bemis Family."

Work of this character requires a peculiar trend of mind, and great enthusiasm, without these two qualities it is a dry study.

Col. Draper went first to school in New York City, but in 1866, his parents decided to go abroad to educate their children, so that the next few years were spent in the schools of Germany and Switzerland. He then went to Munich Bavaria, where he graduated as a Civil Engineer; thence to the Royal School of Mines at Freiberg in Saxony, whence he graduated as a Mining Engineer in 1875.

During the Franco-German War, Col. Draper volunteered in the 2d. Saxon Lancers, and during the campaign was present at Weissemburg, Sedan, the Seige of Paris, Battle of Orleans and numerous smaller engagements.

In the spring of 1876, he returned to America, and had charge, under Prof. Baird of the Smithsonian Institute, of the U. S. Govts. Collection, to illustrate the Mineralogical & Geological Resources of the United States, at the Centennial Exposition.

In September 1876 he went to Colorado, where he remained in the active pursuit of his profession until 1881; during this period he visited New and Old Mexico, and most of the Western Mining Territory. His American Military career began when he enlisted as a private in Comp. C. 1st Regiment C. N. G. (Pitkin Gnards) in 1880.

On April 21st of the same year, his friend Governor Pitkin of Colorado, commissioned him Assistant Inspector Genrl. with the rank of Captain, which post he held during the Governor's term of office.

Col. Draper returned to New York to live in 1882, and resided there, with frequent absences, until 1896. Whilst in New York, he became Captain of Comp. "B" 71st N. Y. Inftry. the celebrated "American Guard."

In pursuit of his profession Col. Draper has been in many countries, Europe, Asia, Africa, Central and South America; in both of the latter he was obliged by circumstances to participate in the periodical Revolutions.

For five years, from 1884 to 1889, Col. Draper as Chief Engineer, built the Atlantic & Danville, and Danville & East Tenn. R. R.'s, in Virginia, North Carolina and Tenn. He has erected and had charge of large public and private works at home and abroad, which to enumerate and describe would take too much space. Explorations amongst the Cordellieras of Central America, and the Andes of South America, in search of the remnants of Ancient Civilizations have also engrossed his time.

In February 1896, Col. Draper returned to Colorada, intending to make it permanently his home, and resided in Denver. Scarce a year had passed, before he was manimously offered, and reluctantly accepted from the officers of the 1st

Inftry N. G. C. the Colonelcy of the Regiment, which he most thoroughly reorganized, and placed upon a first class basis, then resigned, as the work interfered too much with his other business. It was this regiment, under the command of Colonel Draper's successor, Lieutenant-Colonel Irving Hale, known as the "First" Regiment of Colorado Volunteer Infantry, that subsequently rendered such excellent service in the Philippines, during the War with Spain. On June 7th, 1898, Colonel Draper was authorized to recruit a Company, for the Second Regiment of U. S. Volunteer Engineers, part of a brigade of Engineer troops, especially authorized by Act of Congress for the War with Spain. The Company was mustered into the U.S. service at Denver, Colo. on June 28, 1898, and Captain Draper, with his officers, and men, left for San Francisco on June 30, reporting at the Presidio, San Francisco, on the morning of July 3rd, and became a part of the 3rd Battalion of the Regiment, under command of Major Wm. C. Langfitt, which acted independently of the other two battalions of the same Regiment, recruited in the East. These battalions served at Montank Point, in the Southern States, and were the first U. S. troops to enter Havana. Captain Draper's Company was "I", and they sailed from San Francisco for the Hawaiian Islands on August 5, 1898, as part of the 8th Army Corps. They were accompanied by the 1st Regiment of New York Volunteer Infantry, Colonel Thomas Barber commanding. These troops were ordered to the Hawaiian Islands as a temporary garrison and to take over the Islands, on annexation to the United States. It was intended that the Engineer Battalion should proceed to the Philippine Islands. but there was such a scarcity of troops that they remained there, building barracks, surveying the Islands, and accomplishing a great deal of engineering work during the whole war. The 1st New York Infantry was ordered home, leaving the engineers the sole garrison of the Islands. They were not relieved until April 20, 1899, and then by four batteries of the 6th U.S. Artillery, under the command of Major Mills. The battalion sailed the same day for San Francisco, where they were mustered out of the service of the United States on May 16th, 1899.

Captain Draper has had a varied career in his profession as an engineer and soldier. He received the thanks of the Legislature of Colorado, "Joint Senate Resolution No. 1," Session of 1899, for his service in the War with Spain. For the same services, he has subsequently been decorated by the Society of Sons of the American Revolution in the State of Colorado, and has also received a Medal of Honor issued by the National Society of Sons of the American Revolution. In addition to being a member of these Societies, he is a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, which was founded in his office in New York in 1892; and subsequently he founded the Colorado Society, of the same Order, in Denver.

For his services, he was decorated with the full insignia of the Order. He is also a member of the Society of the War of 1812, the Society of Sons of the Revolution, and the Naval and Military Order of the Spanish-American War, corresponding with the Loyal Legion. He is also a member of numerous other Societies and Clubs.

Colonel Draper has always been interested in everything American, past and present, and has given his time and means to the forwarding of the aims of the Hereditary Patriotic Societies. He is an author, having written a number of histories and family genealogies, as well as numerous pamphlets on mining and civil engineering subjects. He had charge, amongst other details, of an independent command in the Hawaiian Islands, which embraced the survey of the lands adjacent to Pearl Harbor, and numerous reconnaissances, and it was through his efforts and reports that the large military reservation, of over 14,000 acres on Oahu Island, was set aside for military purposes. His reports were heartily endorsed by his commanding officer, as well as Col. George Ruhlan, Chief Quartermaster, Inspector-General Field, Brigadier General G. C. Compton, and Major-General Shafter, Commanding the Department.

Almost immediately after the War, Colonel Draper went to Alaska as General Superintendent of Mines, and Chief Engineer of the North American Transportation & Trading Company, spending the summer of 1899 in that territory. He is now residing in San Francisco, Cala., as consulting mining and civil engineer.

"An antograph letter of Mr. James D. Bemis, bearing date November 17, 1846, in which he tells briefly the story of his early life in Canandaigua, and refers to the struggles and labors through which he reached the distinguished position he held in the community. I let the letter tell its own story:

"I was born in Spencer, Mass, July 1, 1783. My father, Col. Benjamin Bemis, was a merchant and farmer, but failed in 1790. He removed to Worcester. where he kept tavern, &c. At ten years of age I went to Boston to learn printing. After ten months, left to go to school again, but being fond of my trade I went to it again and finished seven years of apprenticeship in Albany. At 18 I became a journeyman, worked hard by day and studied nights. I never had but two years of school advantages, but taught myself in the printing office. I was a good printer and qualified myself as well as I could for editing, by close application, after coming to Canandaigua (I lived in Troy one year). In the fall of 1803 my employers in Albany, Backus & Whitney, proposed to furnish a bookstore, with a partner's interest, to be established at Little York (Toronto), Canada. I left Albany early in November for that place, but my goods were frozen in the Mohawk the first night of their shipment. I left Schenectady in the stage, and was six days reaching Utica, going half of the way on foot with ten other young men, all going West for the first time. My stock arrived six days after my arrival. I remained in Utica six weeks. With some merchants, situated like myself, two 8-horse wagous were chartered, and I got on one of them with my goods. The turnpike from Utica to Canandaigua was then new, and the mud so deep that we could make but 8 to 12 miles per day, and at East Onondaga the teamsters gave up. Here I remained two weeks, when, snow falling, I hired a 3-horse large sleigh to take me on to Canandaigna.

'I arrived at Canandaigua, January 14, 1804, and was persuaded to open my store there, which I did, in the chambers over Wyvill's tailor shop, with a stock worth \$4,000 or \$5,000. So you see it was an accident that settled me in Canandaigua. After about ten months, finding it rather dull, I sold out to Myron Holley, intending to go into business in Albany, but was persuaded to remain and buy half of the printing office and old press and types, worth in all 1300 dollars, and I took the half at 700 dollars. It was then the only paper west of Utica. My partner, John. K. Gould, died in 1808, a worthy man, but of habits that killed him.

'In 1810 Mr. Holley wanted me to buy back the stock I sold him, and I did so for 1,200 dollars. I had put up a two-story building in the corner of Capt. Israel Chapin's garden—where E. Hale's stores now are (now Kinde's—N. T. C.), put my family below, and my office and store with a small bindery in the chambers; the next year I put on a wing and took the front lower rooms for the book store. My boys of the printing office slept in the garret. As business grew, I built where we now are (immediately below Anderson's store—N. T. C.), taking my old stand. Capt. Chapin offered me his whole lot, 60 acres, for 11,000 dollars, but I did not feel able to take it, but paid him 2,000 dollars for the acre on which

I built my house and other buildings, which cost considerable more than the lot. Here I have lived since 1815, and from time to time spread my business over the country—to set up young men in business from Onondaga to Detroit. In this way fifteen book stores were sent abroad. I established the first presses and book stores in Erie, Wayne, Livingston, and Onondaga counties at a pecuniary loss to myself of from 20,000 to \$25,000 but with the satisfaction of knowing that I had put a goodly number of young men into active and successful business.

'I was successful man for about thirty years, when my health began to give way under the great responsibilities I had assumed. In the fall of 1843 I went to Europe, accompanied by my daughter, and was absent 14 months. I returned with my health much improved, but it proved only a temporary relief, for on resuming my work again I found I was nufitted for any further severe work.'

* * * * * * * * *

'My only object in life was to do good and to help those who were in need. My weakness was I did not value money. I did value the reputation of an honest and independent editor. It was the ailment of my life, and have allowed its loss to disturb me. During my business career I had ten partners, and I am satisfied that I never was a good judge of character, and my devotion to the pleasures of editing ruined my business experience.

'In recurring to my youth and my manhood, up to 1833, when I was about 50 years old, and when I was beguiled to swing off from business, I hardly think there was much in my life worth relating. I can only say that I was a faithful apprentice, an efficient and painstaking journeyman, an indulgent master, yet a sovereign one, with a disposition somewhat spoiled by bringing up about 80 boys, with many journeymen, clerks, girls, and directing outdoor persons. For many years there were from 40 to 60 souls dependent in various ways on the "old establishment."

'To allude to the numerous social or local positions in institutions would look like boasting. I have been engaged in almost every enterprise of my time—too many perhaps for my interest. I have always sought to help the poor and weak, and for many years was regarded as a medium person in society, who could communicate with the rich and poor. I was vain enough to think that I had the confidence of both classes, and this thought made a considerable portion of my contentment. The nature of my business made my store a sort of rendezvous, and I was in the way of being in all that was going on.

'When in 1828 I sold out the Repository to my brother-in-law, Chauncey Morse, and my nephew, Samuel Ward, I was in excellent health and very happy in my growing prosperity. Up to that time nothing uncommon marked my career, except that the fame of an old and long-established concern was worth

having. It was this, the papers, the business, the headquarters—not myself—that made up all the reputation and all my comfort. I had rather continue as I was to my end than to have been Governor of the State. My anxiety for its continuance was so great that under its pressure my health gave way and left me but a wreck upon the society I had so faithfully served, and by which I had been so often honored.

'I close the letter to you by an incident illustrating the pride of my old position. Five or six years ago a well-dressed, educated young man introduced himself to me in the old store. He said he had long desired to see Mr. James D. Bemis, and would hardly believe that it was me whom he saw. He expected to see a gray-haired old man, and wished to hear him talk, to get his maxims, so famous had he been for giving tone to public feeling, &c.'

"Mr. Bemis adds: 'I confess it was the honest pride of such a reputation that formed all my comfort. It was as I said, my paper, my old position—not me—that was respected. I was so identified with all of it, that to lose it was fatal.'

"After Mr. Bemis sold the paper to Morse & Ward he kept on with his book store; yet the vigor of his life was perceptibly weakening. This led him in 1843 to make a long visit to Europe, accompanied by his daughter Ann. On his return, after fourteen months abroad, he was welcomed by the citizens of Canadaigua probably with more magnificence and heartiness than has ever before or since been shown to any of our distinguished people. He was a grand man in every way, of large, stately form, a genial presence, and everybody's friend and helper. And his paper was the greatest of all the weekly papers of the country. The old Outario Repository was a model—full of news as it was possible to be in those days, full of wisdom in the carefully written editorials, and full of those suggestions that comfort the old and stirred the enthusiasm of the young. It is safe to say that none of its successors, either single or compounded, have ever reached the dignity or power of the old household paper, and no personality like that of old Mr. Bemis has ever since gone out of it to the homes in Western New York. Verily, he was "The Father of the Western New York Press" as he was the father of the boys and girls who once a week were cheered and encouraged by his gracious words."

The following obituary notice of him appeared in the Mass. "Spy" of Dec. 26, 1810: "Died in Spencer, Captain Edmund Bennus aged 90. There are some things worthy of record in the life of this aged and war worn veteran. His father was one of the first settlers of Spencer, having removed from Sudbury about the time of the birth of this son, or about 1720. His son Edmund had been very remarkable for his habits of industry, honesty and temperance which produced a long life of health and happiness. He early entered into the service of his country, and was a lieutenant at the reduction of Louisburg in the year 1745. At this age he was a zealous and active officer. After the French had surrendered to the victorious arms of New England, it was found that they had spiked their cannon, intending thereby to render them entirely useless to their captors. It had been heretofore deemed an impractical thing, after a gun was thus spiked, to drill it out, or by any other method whatever to render it again fit for service. The Commander of the American forces, offered a premium to anyone who would undertake the task. Lieutenant Bemis undertook it, and by a process heretofore unthought of, effected the desired object. Instead of drilling, as was supposed to be the only practicable method, he collected a large quantity of wood around the cannon, and setting it on fire, heated it to such a degree that, with a cold punch, the spike was easily driven into the barrel. Thus was he the author of a successful discovery to his country, which has ever since been followed with complete success. After the reduction of Louisburg, he was a Captain in the War with France, which succeeded, at the close of this war he returned home, to seek that repose among his friends, which he has since enjoyed without interruption."

George Washington Bemis was born October 13, 1826, at Spencer, Mass., where he remained until 1837, when his father removed to Alabama, Genesee county, New York. This change of residence was an event of no small moment, and involved a journey of many days fraught with more adventures and possible dangers than are now incident to an ocean passage or trans-continental tonr. The section of New York into which he was thus brought was then a part of the everadvancing frontier, and he gave a sturdy lad's assistance in the arduous labor of subduing the rugged face of nature to the needs of civilization. This task performed, his summers were spent in working on the farm which he had helped to wrest from the surrounding wilderness, and his winters were devoted to making the best use of such advantages as were offered by the primitive country school.

A course at the Cary Collegiate Seminary at Oakfield supplemented this instruction, and that he profited by every educational opportunity is shown by his early election to the office of superintendent of the township schools. His interest in political matters date from the presidential campaign of 1840, and in 1848 he disgusted his father—an ardent Whig—by casting one of the eleven antislavery ballots "which leavened the lump" of four hundred polled in that district for the opposing candidate. He remained an enthusiastic and uncompromising Abolitionist throughout the struggle which terminated in emancipation. He has

always, too, been a zealous advocate of woman suffrage. He taught school for two years in Wisconsin and in April, 1854, came west to visit an acquaintance. So enamoured did he become of the broad and fertile prairies of Iowa during his stay that he determined to adopt Independence as a place of residence, and went into the land business.

Mr. Bemis was elected a member of the Eighth General Assembly in 1859, and served in the lower house during the regular session, in 1860. It may be of some interest to mention, as an illustration of the changes wrought in a few decades, that four days and three nights were consumed in going from Independence to Des Moines, and that the capital had neither a railroad nor a telegraph line at that time. The session lasted nearly three months, and the legislators had to deal with business of great importance, including a revision of the Code, and an attempt to mitigate the "hard times", then existing, by remodeling the revenue laws. Mr. Bemis introduced an important bill in relation to the duties of county surveyor and was largely instrumental in substituting the present supervisor system for the then existing county judge rule. The extra or "war session" which followed in June 1861, was one that demanded action in affairs of much moment, and in all the deliberations he took a prominent part, his sagacious influence being very apparent. As one of a special committee of five, he was sent to investigate the construction of the insane asylum at Mt. Pleasant, out of which some ugly scandals had arisen, and he performed other and important duties.

In the fall of 1869 he was appointed by Governor Merrill, one of the Commissioners of the Hospital for the Insane at Independence, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Albert Clarke, and he acted as Secretary and Treasurer of the Board until his resignation in December, 1871. He was reappointed by Governor Carpenter in April, 1872, and served in the same capacity until July, 1892, during which time he received and disbursed more than a million dollars. He was elected from Buchanan county to the State Senate in 1871, and was justly regarded as one of the most efficient members of that body. He served as chairman of the committee on the State University and was one of the committee on appropriations. He also secured for the hospital at Independence, without a dissenting voice in the Senate, an appropriation of \$200,000, the largest ever granted. He was chosen Treasurer of State in 1876 and re-elected in 1878, conducting the affairs of that extremely responsible office in such a manner as to win expressions of general approval.

He was a member of the first board of supervisors of Buchanau county and, apropos of his candidacy for that office, he told an amusing and characteristic anecdote. On the day of the election he returned from an eastern trip to learn, with surprise, of his nomination. The struggle was an intensely hot one, party

feeling ran high and the result of the battle was in great doubt. He started for the polls with the modest intention, as in previous instances, of voting for his opponent, but it occurred to him on the way that he was no more justified in "scratching" than any other voter, and he deposited a straight ticket in the box. "I received a majority of exactly one", he concluded, "and so became the choice of the people."

"He almost beggared himself before he discovered where the eye of the needle of the sewing machine should be located. It is probable that there are very few persons who know how it came about. His original idea was to follow the model of the ordinary needle, and have the eve at the heel. It never occurred to him that it should be placed near the point, and he might have failed altogether if he had not dreamed he was building a sewing machine for a savage king in a strange country. Just as in his actual waking experience, he was perplexed about the needle's eye. He thought the king gave him twenty-four hours in which to complete the machine and make it sew. If not finished in that time death was to be the punishment. Howe worked and worked, and puzzled, and finally gave it up. Then he thought he was taken out to be executed. He noticed that the warriors carried spears that were pierced near the head. Instantly came the solution of the difficulty, and while the inventor was begging for time he awoke. It was 4 o'clock in the morning. He jumped out of bed, ran to his workshop, and by 9, a needle with an eye at the point had been rudely modeled. After that it was easy. That is the true story of an important incident in the invention of the sewing machine."

James Bemis. (Probably No. 404.) (386. Ephraim. 9. Ephraim. 1. Joseph.) b. Ashford, Ct. Aug. 6, 1737. He was an early settler of Worthington, Mass. was in the Revoloutionary War, and being severely wounded at the Battle of Bennington, returned home, broken in health and fortune.

"The subject of this sketch, who was the third of four sons, was born on the 16th day of February, 1773. In consequence of his father's continued ill health and limited means, he was, at a very early age, thrown upon his own resources.

Even in boyhood, he was imbued with a singular love of letters, and conceived a fixed determination to master them. Having no means for acquiring the first rudiments, he eagerly sought, and embraced the first opportunity, for employment in manual labor, with a single view to that object. With that indomitable energy, which was his distinguishing characteristic through life, he rose superior to every obstacle which stood in the way to his coveted acquirements. Every nerve of a vigorous and well-endowed constitution was strained to the uttermost to achieve his ends. Every leisure hour of this period was scrupulously employed in the study of such books as were within his reach.

The ruling passion of his life, which is rarely ever known to gain the ascendency, until a much later period, seemed even now to possess the mastery, for he denied himself all participation in the usual sports and amusements of boyhood, lest they might consume time he had determined to appropriate to more valuable purposes. It was, probably, in this manner he acquired that contempt for all conventional pastimes and amusements, or games of chance, which never forsook him in after life.

It appears from some old manuscripts, that the intervening four years, from 1789 to 1793, were alternately occupied in some department of business, and attendance upon school. During this period he was under the tuition of Eliphalet Nott, who had charge of the Plainfield Academy, probably the best common school at that time in New England.

At this date, 1793, he seems to have been pretty well advanced in letters, for we find him in charge of a school at Pomfret, Connecticut. In what proportion his time is now divided, between teaching and studying, is not clear. His diploma, or certificate of graduation in Plainfield Academy, bears the date, 30th March, 1795.

He now spent two years studying Latin and the higher branches of English literature, under the tuition of an educated gentleman, who had become interested in him by his steady, persevering efforts at self-advancement. In 1797 he entered the office of Dr. Zachariah Standish, as a student of medicine, under whose supervisory instruction he made astonishingly rapid progress in acquiring the elementary principles of the science.

His certificate of the term of his professional studies, and permission to practice medicine and surgery, bears date June 3rd 1801.

After three months as an assistant to his preceptor, in the autumn of 1801 he emigrated to Kentucky, and located in Bloomfield, Nelson county, then called Middleburg.

In 1797 he had married Miss Elizabeth Bloomer (b. in New York), said to have been a lady of highly cultivated intellect, polished manners, and amiable disposition. On his first visit to Kentucky, he had left her with her friends in New York, where she remained for twelve months, at which time he went back, and brought her with him on his return.

The severe habits of early study to which the Dr. had subjected himself, together with the keen powers of observation, had so enlarged his capacity for the acquisition and retention of knowledge, that he had completely mastered all the standard works of his day.

He had amassed such a vast fund of information, and had such perfect command of the resources of the profession, that he at once took a very prominent stand, and acquired, in an incredibly short period of time, a reputation rarely attained by a country practitioner.

Boldness, self-reliance, implicit confidence in the curative power of his remedies, remarkable therapeutical acumen, and a profound sympathy with his patients, mark the outlines of his professional character. He was emphatically a man for the occasion. The fertility of his resources was almost boundless. And while exhibiting the most unwavering confidence in the saving powers of his remedies, and plying them with unwearied assiduity and skill, he had the happy faculty of imbuing his patients with the same unshaken confidence.

It is useless to say that Dr. Bemis was a very safe and successful practitioner. He had witnessed so many recoveries, against the reasonable expectation of friends, attributable, as he believed, to his vigilance, perseverance, and constancy, that hope never deserted him; nor did he relax his efforts until the taper of life had expired.

When in the height of his practice, his advice was sought in difficult cases in all the surrounding counties; and even after he had retired from the active duties of the profession, he was retained, throughout a very wide scope of country as consulting physician, to which calls he always yielded a hearty response. His thorough knowledge of the history and literature of the profession, his familiar acquaintance with the standard authors of the day, his ready comprehension, clear insight, accurate diagnosis, and lucid exposition of a case, attached great weight to his opinions with his professional brethren.

He was courteous and fair in his professional intercourse, cardid and uncompromising in his views of practice, kind and generous towards the junior members of the profession, scrupulously observant of the rules of ethics, jealous of the honor of the profession, and uncompromising in his opposition to all professional outlawry. The hordes of empirics and nostrum-mongers who flooded the country in his day, found no mercy or foothold near him. His boldness and bitter raillery were weapons they much dreaded.

Dr. Bemis was an ardent and excitable politician, and took an active part in the New Court and Old Court controversy. He was an uncompromising advocate of the Old Court policy, and wrote a number of able articles on the subject, which were published in the "Spirit of '76," at Frankfort. He had no sycophancy about him; never dissembled; was very decided and open in his attachments and antipathies; not unfrequently made enemies by his openness and candor.

His style of writing is vigorous, clear, concise—not much embellished with flowers. His natural turn was too pointed, and matter of fact, to allow space for either redundancy or decoration. Even in the midst of an overwhelming practice, he wrote a great deal. A number of his addresses on the subject of Masonry, of which order he was a prominent member, are still extant. They glow with that fervor, that spirit of expansive benevolence, which animated his whole life, and breathe of nothing but what is wise, good and philanthropic.

He was always a close student; retained his love for literature to the last; studied Greek when over sixty years of age, besides keeping himself well posted in all the current literature of the day, except novels, for which he had a supreme contempt.

Dr. Bemis's religious turn of mind developed in early youth, grew with his growth, strengthened with his strength, and matured in his manhood, culminating in a desire to assume the office of minister of the Gospel, in which position he thought his faculties for doing good would be enhanced, a consummation which had been his ruling passion through life.

Although he had in the year 1817 retired from active duties of the profession, and resigned his practice to the charge of his son-in-law, Dr. S. B. Merrifield, his ardent, ever-active temperament did not allow him to take that repose, which he had probably promised himself previous to his retirement, and he turned his attention to the study of Theology. He was accordingly ordained as a minister of the Presbyterian Church about the year 1830. The duties of this office he continued to fulfill with zeal, fidelity, and great acceptance until his death, which occurred, of apoplexy, on the 29th day of March, 1851, in the seventy-eighth year of his age."

Mary Frances' grandfather was Aaron Lockert, Commissary to Genrl. Sumpter, and fed his command in the summer of 1780 from his own Mills at Lockert's Shoals, on Broad River. Amy Jones Lacy was descended from the Lords of Pontefract.
 - "Dr. Bemiss' early education was carefully conducted by his father and private tntors until the age of eighteen, when he determined to study medicine, entering for that purpose the office of his brother-in-law, Dr. Samuel Merrifield, of Bloomfield. Here he remained until 1841, when he went to New York and became the first matriculate of the Uni-

versity of New York. Having returned to Bloomfield in the following year to continue his studies under his father and brother-in-law, we find him at the bedside of his first case in August, 1842. Thus his remarkably active life as a practiciouer of medicine extended over more than forty years.

In the fall of 1844 he went back to New York, where in the following spring he received his diploma, and degree "Medicinæ Doctor" from the University. To this careful and protracted course of study, and his own remarkable memory, was probably due that exact and minute knowledge of the details of many branches forgotten by most students in three years after they have risen from the benches.

Returning to Bloomfield, Dr. Bemiss at once became associated in an active practice with Dr. Merrifield, his former preceptor. This connection lasted until 1850, when another was formed with Dr. Joshua Gore. This was a period of his life of which Dr. Bemiss often spoke with great pleasure. He was full of anecdotes illustrative of the old-time in Kentucky, and, as he spoke, eulivening the story with many touches of hearty humor, men and manners rose clearly before the listener.

In 1853, the Doctor moved to Louisville, and joined practice with Benjamin Wible, a companionship only broken by the departure of the other for the Confederate army in 1862. Meanwhile, Dr. Bemiss had been appointed by the State, Registrar of Kentucky, in 1849; in 1858, Professor of Clinical Medicine; then, in 1859, Professor of Hygiene and Medical Jurisprudence, and finally, in 1861, Professor of Therapeutics and Materia Medica in the University of Louisville. In the latter year Kentucky had declared an armed neutrality, and many of her citizens were joining the ranks of either army. After some months of mature deliberation, Dr. Bemiss became convinced that his opinions and sympathies were with the Southern cause, and at once offered his services to the Confederacy. He became Acting Surgeon of the Provisional Army, at Tunnel Hill, Georgia, where he saw his first hospital work. His value was soon recognized by the authorities, and, in 1862, he received his commission as full surgeon, and was assigned to duty on the Medical

Examining Board, in session at Hamilton's Crossing, Virginia. It was during this period that Dr. Bemiss met and rendered some medical service to Gen. R. E. Lee, a circumstance to which he was wont to allude with pleasure. There is now in the possession of the family a letter in which the General thanks the doctor in warm terms for his attention and kindness.

In April, 1863, he was ordered to take charge of the hospital at Cherokee Springs, Georgia, where he remained until after the battle of Chicamauga, when he was transferred to Newman. December 1st, 1863, he was appointed Assistant Medical Director of Hospitals, to S. H. Stout, Medical Director of the Army of Tennessee, and, in 1864, Medical Director of Hospitals in the rear of the Army of Tennessee. At the latter post he remained until General Lee's surrender at Appomattox Court House, April, 1865.

Dr. Bemiss now returned to Louisville; was at once elected Professor of Physiology and Pathology in the University, and entered upon a large and remunerative practice. In the spring of 1866, however, he accepted a call to the chair of Theory and Practice of Medicine, and Clinical Medicine in the University of Louisiana. Dr. Bemiss now sailed for Europe, where he spent the summer in traveling and in visiting the hospitals of Great Britain and France.

In the Fall he returned to New Orleans and entered upon his new position, the duties of which he continued to discharge without interruption, and with great satisfaction to his colleagues and students up to the day of his death.

Professor Bemiss' style in lecturing was marked in simplicity and force. His delivery, slow and emphatic. Few of his students will ever forget the impressive forefinger, lifted to work some especially nice point of diagnosis, or treatment. In opinion he was conservative and judicial. He was careful in directing attention to the relations between symptoms and pathology. As a clinical teacher Professor Bemiss was most painstaking. Ever punctual in his wards he would pass from bed to bed, patiently demonstrating each case, and pointing out the appropriate remedies and their rationale.

It was his custom to make each student practice day after day the arts of ausculation and percussion; each day a number of the class would be called upon to examine, diagnosticate, and prescribe for some new case, a bit of goodhumored raillery being the penalty of a too glaring mistake. In these exercises the Doctor was at especial pains to encourage a feeling of self-reliance in his students. Turning to a number of his class he would invite him to listen to a beautiful example of such and such a sound (in a perfectly normal lung), and was always delighted when the pupil frankly declared his inability to hear it.

In 1878, Dr. Bemiss was named as chairman of the commission appointed to investigate the origin and spread of the great yellow-fever epidemic of that year. He threw himself into the work with all his heart, and in conjunction with Dr. Jerome Cochran did most of the practical work. A large number of infected towns were visited, and a report presented at the meeting of the Public Health Association at Richmond, in November of this year. In the following December, the commission was merged into a Board of Experts, with Dr. John M. Woodworth, Supervising Surgeon General; of the Marine Hospital Service, as President. Many more localities were now visited, and the final report of the Board made January 29th, 1879. In March of the same year, the National Board of Health was instituted, and Dr. Bemiss was made a member, and also Chairman of the Committee on Epidemics.

Having been long a contributor to various medical periodicals, and having been ever interested in medical journalism, Dr. Bemiss, in 1868, became Senior Editor of this Journal, a position which he continued to hold until 1883.

Besides his many valuable contributions to the pages of this Journal, and his writings embodied in the Reports of the National Board of Health, the best known of his papers are "Essay on Croup," Louisville Review, 1856, and "Report on the Influence of Marriages of Consanguinity upon Offspring," Transactions of American Medical Associations 1858, a paper which won for its author great praise.

Dr. Bemiss was a member of the American Medical Association; of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Louville; of the Kentucky State Medical Society; of the Boston Gynaecological Society; of the State Medical Association of Louisiana."

His first trip into the world was made to visit his father's honored preceptor, the distinguished Dr. Draper, of New York. So he went on a pilgrimage, which was filled with many experiences. He remembered with much pleasure the one bright hour he spent with the aged man, who gave him a very warm reception.

In the course of time he went to the University of Virginia, where he was said to be the youngest boy that up to that time had ever entered the institution, being just fifteen. Here he prosecuted his studies with earnestness and with much success for several years, graduating in 1876. returned to New Orleans, where he matriculated in the Medical Department of the University of Louisiana, now Tulane. During these days he was closely associated with his father, Professor Bemiss, assisting him greatly in the preparation of his lecture notes. For a short time preceding his graduation he was a resident student in the Charity Hospital, but did not remain long, owing to an opportunity which presented itself through the kindness of Prof. T. G. Richardson. This was the offer of a medical position under the Hawaiian Government. Professor Bemiss, believing the change of climate would materially benefit his health, advised him to stand a premature examination and accept it. This he did, and having received his diploma, he went in the spring of 1878 to the Sandwich Islands, where he remained about five years. He was government physician in the Wailuckee and Lahaina districts, his residence and office being in the town of Wailuckee on the Island of Maui. He published after his return an interesting illustrated article on Hawaii.

He had much of interest to relate of his life out there, and told his experiences in a peculiarly delightful style. He had learned the Hawaiian language and was fond of calling attention to the musical character of its many beautiful vowel combinations. While in the islands he carried on a practical study of leprosy and made some valuable contributions to its literature. When he returned to New Orleans, about 1882, he entered into partnership with his father, Dr. S. M. Bemiss, who still occupied the chair of the Theory and Practice of Medicine in the University. He continued with his father until the sudden death from apoplexy of Professor Bemiss in 1885, just at the beginning of the course of lectures.

During this partnership with his father, which lasted until the death of the latter, Dr. Bemiss very materially assisted in the hospital work of the professor. He served as chief of clinic and rendered much efficient service, taking numerous case notes and carefully following the admirable course of instruction in physical diagnosis, carried on by Prof. Bemiss. All who were so fortunate as to be students at this time, remember the remarkable diagnostic ability of Prof. Bemiss and the very entertaining way in which he imparted his teaching. To this association with his father may be largely attributed that unusual ability of the younger Bemiss as a physical diagnostician. Had his health permitted he would undoubtedly have remained the peer of any man in the Southern profession. He was so earnest and painstaking in his instruction of students that all his pupils in the classes of Tulane, and afterward in the New Orleans Polyclinic, remember him with the liveliest gratitude. Soon after his return from the Sandwich Islands Dr. Bemiss, with Dr. G. B. Underhill, just then returned from Germany, organized the Quiz class in the Medical Department.

Dr. Bemiss took the first year the subject of Practice of Medicine and Materia Medica; Dr. Underhill, Surgery and Anatomy; and another Physiology and Obstretrics. The following year others were associated with them. Dr. Bemiss retained the Practice of Medicine. Thus was established with the approval of the professors, the Quiz classes, which, modeled after the original one of Prof. Chaille, have in

various hands continued up to the present day, making now, we believe, a feature much sought after by students. carried on this Ouiz with as much zeal and earnestness as he afterwards did his teaching in the New Orleans Polyclinic, which organized in 1887 on an entirely clinical basis. He was its first president and so continued until failing health forced him to relinquish his interest in its work. But while strength permitted, both as president and professor of Physical Diagnosis, he threw his whole soul into his work and both students and professors cordially testified to his unflagging zeal as its executive officer and to his remarkable success as a teacher. Indeed, it was no secret among the students that the chair was the most ably filled and the most sought after in the Polyclinic. He had prepared a scheme of physical signs which was simple, but thorough, and much facilitated his instruction, which was almost entirely clinical. He had a happy knack with the students, encouraging them on from one step to another, guiding them, making them fully appreciate each explanation so thoroughly that it was a pleasure to go on. Here was displayed conspicuously a trait recognized by his family from his early boyhood-that of exactness. His attention to detail, in his teaching at least, was unusual, and to this his success as a teacher is largely due. This was the underlying factor in his professional career.

In his private practice he was equally conscientious, to the poor and the rich alike. He was too charitably disposed, seemingly, preferring to devote himself to the poor. He gave his colored porter just as close and careful attention as he did the wealthiest of his patients. Money was a secondary consideration with him. He frequently forgot to send bills, and his accounts were so carelessly kept that many who would willingly have paid him well for his services, did not know what they owed him, and a practice which should have made him independent, left him scarcely anything for his long period of enforced idleness.

He wrote many valuable articles for the *New Orleans Medical and Surgical Journal*, and other journals. Some of these are: "A Few Cases of Leprosy," "Hysteria in Chil-

dren Due to Malaria," "Thoracic Aneurism with Spontaneous Recovery," "Abscess of the Liver," "Hydronaphthol in Cystitis," "Hamophilia" and many shorter contributions, for he was for many years a regular correspondent of the Medical News and was for some years on the editorial staff of this journal. He wrote well and carefully and had his health been vigorous he would have enriched our clinical medical literature."

NOTES.

The Notes on Military Service which follow, were obtained just as the Book was finished, and are from the Mass. archives, therefore thoroughly accurate. The Author did not have the time to enter them in the main body of the History, but this can be readily done in each case.

There are numerous repetitions of service by the same individual, under the headings of different ways of spelling the name. Therefore in looking up service of a soldier, it is well to search under Bemas, Beamis, Beamiss, Beamos, Beamous, Beamos, Bemass, Bemass, Bemes, Bemies, Bemiss, Bemiss, Bemos and Bemns; all of which are only different ways of spelling the same name.
