Thrust into the upheaval and change of post Civil-War Period was a group of dynamic blacks with vision who were members of Saint Matthews Methodist Church. This group realized that if blacks were going to improve their status and build meaningful institutions and lives, they would have to be prepared. To this end, a school was organized in 1873. The first classes were held in the basement of Saint Matthews Methodist Church. As the school grew, the founders appealed to and received aid from the Freedman's Aid Society and the Southern Education Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The school was named for Lyman Bennett, who gave the first ten thousand dollars for the construction of a classroom and dormitory building. Thus began a great historical adventure.

From 1873-1926, Bennett College produced men and women who became active leaders in all aspects of American life. Indeed, two of the first black bishops in the Methodist Episcopal Church were graduates of Bennett College.

In 1926, the Woman's Home Society and the Board of Education of the Methodist Church envisioned a College for the education of black women. It was felt that black women needed a place where they could obtain an education geared especially for women — a place where women could search for their own identities, obtain a good general education, realize specific career goals and strive for wholeness in personal development. After the reorganization of the institution as a women's College, Bennett readily achieved accreditation by the appropriate state, regional, and national accreditation associations.

In 1930, it graduated its first four young women with the Bachelor of Arts Degree. Since 1930 Bennett College has graduated over 5,000 young women.

The purpose of Bennett College is to maintain distinction as an institution of higher learning by offering women an education conducive to excellence in scholarly pursuits, preparation for leadership roles and life-long learning in a contemporary society. The College offers selected education, training and research experiences appropriate for preparation in the arts and sciences, the professions, and for public service. Consistent with its church-related heritage, Bennett College nurtures the development of spiritual and moral values to undergird educational, scientific and technological endeavors. The College advances cognizance of African-American heritage, international awareness and the preparation of world citizens.

She was speaking to the presence of our ancestors-African women, their obstacles, challenges, problems and their survival to produce us. The concept reflects the fact that Bennett Women "Came to Stay." The concept that one picture is worth 1,000 words invites us to review the academic year of Bennett College through the yearbook.

Alma Mater Bennett College for Women, has had a full, diverse, productive year. There have been great accomplishments by students, faculty, and alumnae and significant contributions to the life of the College. The essence of the year is captured in the BENNETT BELLE. The new Bennett Belles of Class of '97 entered, and the Phenomenal Graduates of the Class of '93 graduated to enter further graduate study or the world of work. Faculty transmitted knowledge and used new techniques, administrators completed computerization of the various systems, reorganization of service delivery, physical renovations and improvements, acquisition of the networked Computer Laboratory, acquisition of the Microwave Unit for Uplink Transmission via Satellite, Fiber Optic or Copper; the expansion of community service into the Southeastern Greensboro; the implementation of the new General Education Curriculum, the continuation of new students' participation in "ROPES", a wonderful year with our Queens exercising student leadership on behalf of the student body, and the Bennett Image Dancers enhanced the superb "Coronation of Miss Bennett", one semester after the first successful "Spring Fest - Nubian Nuissance."

Speakers included Dr. Betty Williams of Black Nurses Association; Dr. Dorothy Height, Civil Rights Leader; Dr. Geraldine P. Woods, Embryologist; Dr. Robert Albright, President of Johnson C. Smith; Dr. Margaret Burroughs, and the Exhibit of Outstanding African American Women of Greensboro. All of these and many more are captured here in the Bennett Belle.

The opportunity to use creative approaches to the "review of the year at Bennett" makes this document one to remember from now and every five years until the year 2044, when the Class of 1994 will return to celebrate its Golden Anniversary and will use the Bennett Belle to compare and contrast "Life at Bennett Then and Now."

This book is dedicated to a phenomenal man, Dr. Will B. Scott, first spouse, musician, sociologist, and academician.



The Student Government Association recognition award, "The Voice of Wisdom Award" (which is a golden Apple that is a Bell) was presented to Dr. Will B. Scott, as the faculty member most involved in the education, development and direction of students at Bennett College. The award summed up the 27 year career of Dr. Will Scott, who started his own formal higher education at mid life (35). The one sentence biographical statement would say that his professional activities have all been directed toward teachings students (undergraduate and graduate); the development of faculty to teach and staff to support the teaching-learning delivery; the development of the content and methodology of the profession; the development and accreditation of undergraduate programs in social work; the influence of various private and public agencies to support the development and improvement of social work education and the discovery of new knowledge or the rearrangement of old knowledge to extend scholarship in the discipline of sociology and the applied discipline of social work.

Dr. Scott was born in Kingsville, Texas, to Mr. Will and Mrs. Leah Willie Scott, raised in South Texas, graduated Solomon Melvin Coles High School in Corpus Christi, Texas in 1945. From 1945-1948, he traveled working at many different jobs, throughout the Southwest and West. In 1948 he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and was a performing musician in Air Force Bands for four years. Following an honorable discharge in 1952, he traveled and performed with various jazz, blues and gospel groups, including Roy Hamilton and Jimmie Witherspoon, touring the country. In 1955, he formed a jazz trio — The Three Souls — in Indianapolis, Indiana and was concurrently a manager of recording artists and worked in wholesale record distribution.



Dr. Scott attended Indiana University 1960-1963, majored in social work with a minor in sociology, was Deans Honor List each semester, and earned an A.B. degree in Social Service, December, 1963. During this time, he served as Teaching Assistant and Research Assistant. He earned the M.A. degree in Social Service in 1964 with a clinical social work concentration. He earned the Ed.D. with major in Higher Education and minors in Sociology and Social Work. In 1965, Dr. Scott was inducted into Phi Delta Kappa National Honor Society, served as Teaching Assistant and Research Assistant. The Doctoral Dissertation was *Race Consciousness and the Negro Student at Indiana University*.

As you move into the world of work, graduate and professional studies, or marriage and parenting, be ever mindful of "things that matter...":


