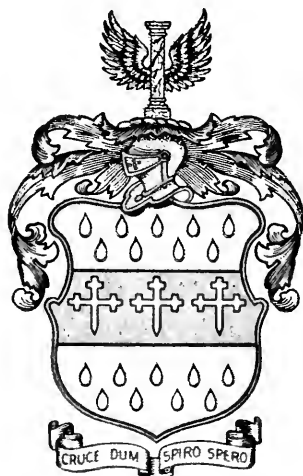
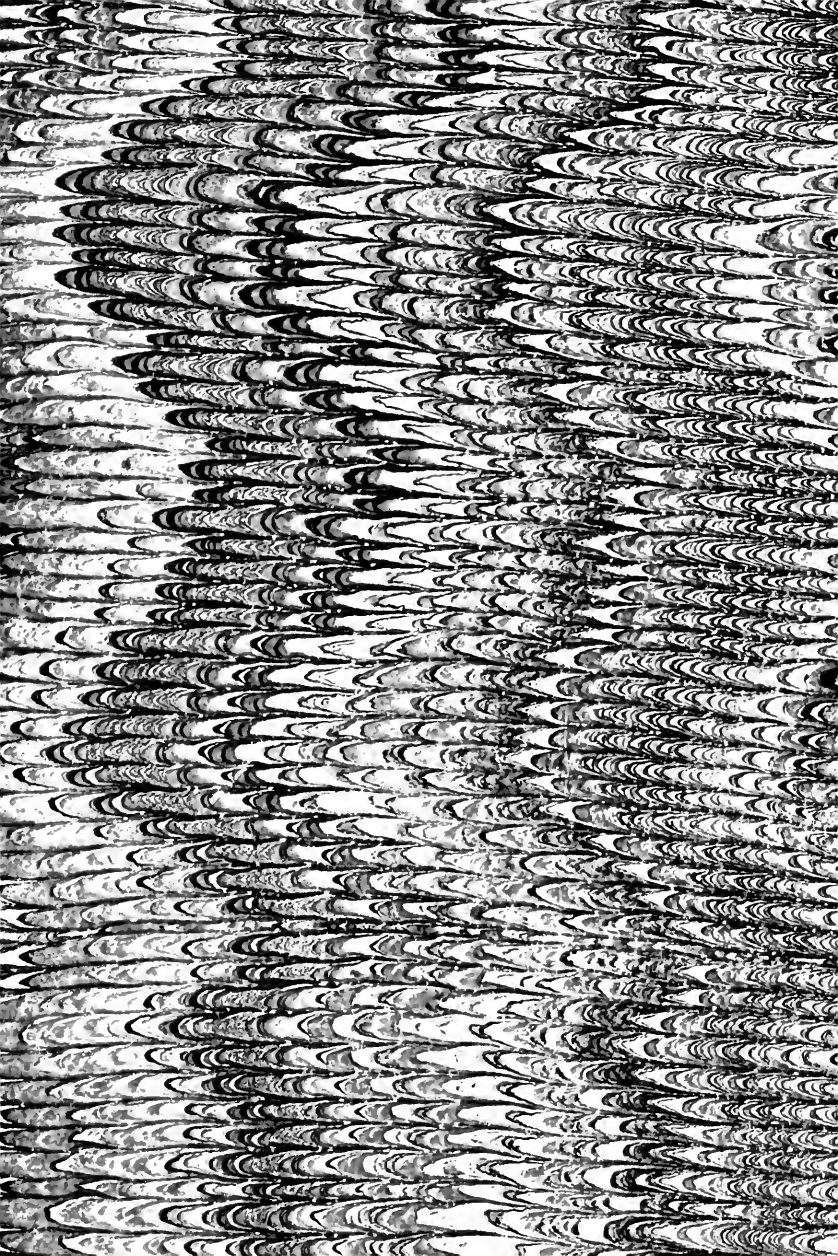

NOTICE TO THE SEVENTH PART.

I HAD hoped to publish the present Part several months ago, as promised, but found this impossible. It has unexpectedly required more personal labour than any of its predecessors, as may be surmised from the fact that it is enlarged to full double the matter contained in the parallel portion of the original work. The supplemental pages devoted to LORD MACAULAY are, as will be seen, an afterthought, arising from accidental circumstances. Although literary anecdotes are not immediately within the scope of the present undertaking, I could not resist the pleasure of preserving an interesting scrap of a writer so universally esteemed. The article on DE QUINCEY is thrust into this Part, out of what is strictly its proper place, rather than omit it altogether. This has arisen in consequence of my original plan having been to limit all additions to the pegs previously provided by Lowndes; and he happened to omit De Quincey, although the "Confessions of an Opium-Eater" had been printed and become popular within his time. I soon found it desirable to abandon this exclusive plan, and in the later letters have introduced most writers of mark who commenced their literary career before 1834.

And here I will take leave to advert to an individual piece of advice given in a contrary direction. An influential paper some time since admitted a paragraph into its pages, in which it is

suggested that my edition of Lowndes would be more acceptable to the "students of our early literature," if it were restricted to books published before the time of Queen Anne—the avowed object for such a curtailment being to make it "a handy manual." On this principle it would be necessary to omit Defoe, Addison, Swift, Pope, and a hundred other of our best English writers, as well as almost all the principal Voyages and Travels, English History, Topography, books of Science and the Fine Arts. Besides which, to follow out the scheme literally, I should have to exclude all modern editions of an early writer, so that there would be no mention of any edition of Shakspeare or Milton subsequent to 1702, when English criticism was in its infancy. Such a book would not entail a twentieth part of the trouble and expense which I now undergo, but I should be ashamed of the present condition of bibliography if I thought my subscribers would be satisfied with such a retrogression.

My endeavour has been to make a manual practically useful to book-buyers of every class, especially the literary student; and fifty years of active experience ought to enable me to form a correct judgment as to the right course. The price too of the complete work is so extremely moderate, counting on a large sale, that a selection of merely one fourth of the matter, which could only command a very small one, would probably cost quite as much. Take as an instance: a well-known literary antiquarian has recently printed a small number of copies of a dry list of the twenty quarto plays of Shakespeare, which is sold for about half a guinea. Now the whole of the matter contained in this half-guinea's worth (which by the by is substantially contained in the old Lowndes) will be incorporated, with considerable additions, in my next volume, and, reckoning the number of pages it is there likely to occupy, will cost less than *two-pence*.

The next Part will be published as speedily as due care permits, and will include very elaborate articles on Shakspeare and Swift. But this will not complete the work; for, unless a mere reprint of the old matter were adopted, it would be impossible to squeeze the remainder into so small a compass. My subscribers must therefore be prepared for a Ninth Part,—to nobody's regret more than my own.

NOTICE TO THE EIGHTH PART.

THE present Part has been lingering at press for upwards of twelve months, notwithstanding that it has received more anxious and persistent attention than any of its predecessors, which were completed in half the time. The cause has been, that the portion of Lowndes on which this is based, is unusually deficient, and has required a disproportionately large number of additions, besides a full average of corrections. Indeed, the original matter has been more than doubled, as the slightest examination will show. The labour of this extensive revision has been very exacting, and no sale of the book is likely to repay even the cost of my amanuenses, much less the value of my own time; whereas, a simple reprint of the old book, however unsatisfactory in a literary point of view, would have been a remunerative speculation.

They who have taken the trouble to read my prefatory notices to the earlier Parts, will see how much more I am performing than I originally undertook; yet ever and anon I am called upon to do still more. Some requisitionists, overlooking that I limited myself at the outset to the period comprehended by Lowndes, with the intention of including later writers in a Supplement, ask me why I have omitted Dickens, Grote, Bulwer-Lytton, and many other distinguished writers of the present day? Others seem to expect that I should register every book, pamphlet, and broadside, in English literature, as well as foreign translations of them, and also indicate what they have sold for by auction, and where they are to be found in public libraries! A pretty task truly, which, if it could be accomplished, would occupy about fifty folio volumes, and as many amanuenses! Such suggestions do not come from practical bibliographers, but from shallow pretenders, who seek to acquire the reputation of critics by finding fault with what they would be quite incompetent to perform.

Every article of importance in the present Part has received considerable additions, of which the following may be taken as examples:—RITSON, ROCHESTER, ROYAL SOCIETY, SCHILLER, SCOTLAND, SCOTT (Sir Walter), SHAW (Henry), SHELLEY, SHERIDAN, SHIRLEY, SHORT-HAND, SIBBALD, SIDNEY (Sir Philip).

SHAKESPEARE, as a warrantable exception to all ordinary rules, has been elaborated up to an extreme point, and is a main feature in my bibliographical labours, past, present, or to come. I have not only endeavoured to record every printed edition of his works, whether published collectively or separately, but also all the volumes written respecting him, (commonly called 'Shakespeariana,') and all foreign translations. Besides this, I have given new and careful Collations of the first four folios, and of the early editions of the Separate Plays and Poems, with particulars of their whereabouts as far as the most diligent research has enabled me to trace them. This labour alone has occupied all my literary leisure for many months, and nothing but the pleasure of working on so congenial a subject could have stimulated me through the task.

I close this address with the hope that I shall complete the Lowndes Alphabet before the expiration of the present year.

There are no leaves printed on vellum; the arms of the bishoprics, &c., and some only of the capital letters are illuminated; pages 41 and 42 are erroneously substituted for 47 and 48; the wood-cut of the public schools, the two leaves containing the list of books given by the archbishop, and the leaf containing the errata, are wanting. Dr. Dibdin, in his improved edition of Ames' *Typographical Antiquities*, gives the collation of two other copies, one formerly Mr. Bindley's, the other in the collection of the Earl Spencer, which vary from those in the British Museum. The rare portrait of the archbishop by Hogenberg, measuring $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $3\frac{1}{2}$, and printed in the centre of the leaf, wanting in the British Museum copies, in Mr. Bindley's copy preceded nineteen pages, numbered at the bottom, devoted to the life of Matthew Parker himself. And at the next impression, the Imprynter, leauving out The Fourme of making and consecratyng of Archebishoppes, Bishops, Priestes, and Deacons, shal sel the saied Booke in queres for Two shyllnges, and not above, and bound in Forell for two shyllngs and eight pence, and not above, and bounde in lether, in Paste bordes or claspes, for thre shyllnges and four pence, and not above.

These Bookes of 1549 and 1552 have been collated with that of Oswen of 1549, and the differences pointed out in the volume edited by Mr. Ketley, for the Parker Society. See APPENDIX.

Variations exist in the different copies of the first impressions of Grafton and Whitchurch, of the date 1552. After the editions were printed, 'a Declaration' concerning Kneeling at the Lord's Supper was ordered to be added. In some copies this Declaration stands as the fourth, and in others as the fifth rubric, at the end of the Communion service; whilst in some it is found inserted on a separate leaf; some copies having already been dispersed without it.

This unique and recently discovered book differs in style from any other production from Caxton's press, inasmuch as each page is printed within narrow borders of animals fruits, &c.; no date is given with the Colophon, but as the Lady Elizabeth (of York) was not united to Henry (of Lancaster), afterwards Henry VII., until 1486, and the date of Caxton's demise being 1491, this interesting volume must have issued from the press between those years. The book has been recently added to the treasures of the British Museum. In the small catalogue issued in 1850, it is there called 'The fifteen Oo's in English,' but why, is doubtful—the Book being noticed by Dr. Thomas Fuller, as being THE FIRST BOOK OF PRAYERS tending to forward the Reformation.—Also by Ames, though placed among Books printed by Winkyn de Worde; for his conjectural account of it, read Ames, by Herbert, vol. i. p. 117; to his account Herbert or Dibdin have added nothing.

ROXBURGHE BALLADS.—Ancient Songs and Ballads, written on various subjects, and printed on separate leaves, chiefly in London, between the years 1567 and 1700, 3 vols. folio.

The celebrated collection, known by the name of the 'Roxburghe Ballads,' now in the British Museum, consisting of about 1340 broadsides, mostly in black letter. It was originally formed by Robert Harley, first Earl of Oxford. On the sale of the Harleian library, it became the property of Mr. James West, the President of the Royal Society. In 1773 Major Pearson acquired it for the sum of £20. The collection, then bound in two volumes, was, in 1788, bought for 36l. 4s. 6d. by the Duke of Roxburghe, who added a third volume, more bulky than either of the two former. At the sale of the duke's library, in 1813, they passed into the hands of Mr. Harding for 477l. 15s., who subsequently transferred them to Mr. Bright for about 700l. At the sale of that gentleman's library, in 1845, they were secured for the British Museum for 535l. A quarto edition, of which only 252 pages were printed, was afterwards undertaken by the distinguished Dr. Mead, who designed printing only one copy, but proceeded no further than to the end of the four books *De Trinitate*. THE PORTRAIT BY DROESHOUT served for the first four editions. The genuine state, as it occurs in the first three editions, is distinguishable from subsequent impressions by the shading on the left of the forehead (as it stands before you), which is expressed by single lines curving inwards from left to right without any crossing whatever, while in the repaired state, as it occurs in the fourth edition, the lines are strongly crossed, and bend outwards. Besides this, the hair is crossed in the repaired state, while in the original it is in single lines.

A copy of this first edition of Shake-

speare, formerly in the possession of Messrs. Arch, of Cornhill, bore the date of 1622, and another of the same date (formerly Mr. Baker's, and now in the possession of Mr. Lenox of New York) has in addition, two cancelled leaves in the play of 'As you like it,' sheet R; but, as regards the date, Mr. Lenox, in his own privately printed catalogue, throws some doubt on its integrity. He says, "The title-page with the date 1622 is inlaid at the bottom *below* the imprint: if by this means the last figure has been tampered with, the alteration is very successfully concealed."

Like the original, it is divided into 3 parts, viz. 1. Comedies; 2. Histories; 3. Tragedies, which are intended to form one volume. The first part, containing the Comedies, with a photographic facsimile of the original portrait by Droeshout, has already been issued, price 10*s.* 6*d.* Those Plays which appeared singly before the first collective edition, are also printed separately, and interleaved for the purpose of annotation, at 5*s.* each play.

FACSIMILE OF THE FIRST EDITION.—An exact facsimile of the first folio, produced by the Photo-zincographic process at Her Majesty's Ordnance Survey Office, under the direction of Sir Henry James, at the instigation of Howard Staunton, Esq., is now in progress. It will be published by subscription at 10*l.* or less. Mr. E. W. Ashbee is also engaged in producing a facsimile by tracing and the lithographic process.

This interesting volume, although in the catalogue of King George the Fourth's magnificent donation to the British Museum, is not in that repository; but remains with some other works in the Royal Collection at Windsor.

"This edition is two years earlier than any hitherto noticed. It is anonymous, and has been supposed to be the play used by Shakespeare as the foundation of his 'Taming of the Shrew.' There is no good reason why it should not be considered as the first idea of his play, as the difference between the two is little more than that between the recently discovered 'Hamlet,' and the more perfect editions afterwards printed; and also between the first edition of the 'Merry Wives of Windsor,' 1602, and that in the folio, 1623. The variations in the names of the characters between the present edition and that in the folio of 1623, will not militate against this supposition, as it was not an unfrquent practice among the Dramatick authors of the time. Ben Jonson changed the names of the Dramatis Personæ of his 'Every Man in his Humour,' as will be seen by comparing the 4th edition of 1601 and the folio 1616. In the Hamlet of 1603, Polonius is called Corambis throughout; and it is well known also, that Sir John Falstaff originally bore the name of Sir John Oldcastle. Mr. Malone assigns the year 1594 as the date of the composition of the 'Taming of the Shrew,' and when the present play was republished in 1607, it had the name of Shakespeare as the author on the title-page. In whatever light it may be considered, whether as the Play remodelled by Shakespeare, or as the first draught of his Comedy, it is unquestionably of the highest literary interest and curiosity in a Shakesperian Library."—Note in Mr. Heber's Catalogue, pt. iv. p. 251.

In another account we are told that "the copper plates, letter-press, &c., in short, every vestige of the above folio work fell into the possession of Miss Jane Ireland, youngest sister of the fabricator, who was so anxious to witness the complete annihilation of the same, that although strenuously applied to by Mr. Mavor, then partner with Mr. Lackington, in order to possess a few copies of the folio, she would not consent. At the period in question, therefore, every copper-plate was defaced, and sold for waste metal, and every sheet of the publication torn up in Miss

Ireland's presence, and disposed of in a similar manner. From this statement it naturally results, that only 122 copies are extant, being those furnished to the subscribers, whose names are affixed to the folio volume, added to which, the usual numbers were remitted to the Universities, &c.; and about half-a-dozen presented by Mr. Samuel Ireland to particular friends, making a total of 138 copies, which are all that remain to commemorate that most celebrated imposition. This volume, which was usually knocked down in the sale rooms for 1l. 10s. or 1l. 15s., is now rising in value, and there can be little doubt but in a few years it will become an object of great rarity, from the causes above mentioned." *The learned Dr. Parr was among the first to inspect the Ireland fabrications, and is said to have been so completely taken in, as to depart himself with the utmost enthusiasm respecting them. But the following note, written inside his copy of the book, denies the assertion. "I am almost ashamed to insert this worthless and infamously trickish book. It is said to include the tragedy of King Lear, and a fragment of Hamlet. Ireland told a lie when he imputed to me the words which Joseph Warton used the very morning I called on Ireland, and was inclined to admit the possibility of genuineness in his papers. In my subsequent conversation, I told him my change of opinion. But I thought it not worth while to dispute in print, with a detected impostor.—S. P." See BIBLIOTHECA PARRIANA, p. 522.*

It was intended to be posted on the walls throughout England, if the Armada had been successful, and sets forth the reasons why Elizabeth is not worthy of wearing the Crown of England, or even to live; and threatens with Excommunication and corporal punishment all persons who after this Notice shall yield obedience to, or in any way assist her; and it promises to all those who will lend assistance to the cause, Plenary Indulgence, and pardon for all their sins. It describes her as 'an heretike,' 'a bastard, conceived and borne by incestuous adultery,' 'an unjust usurper,' 'a perjurer,' 'a murderer,' and with other similar epithets. On the failure of the Expedition this broadside was so studiously suppressed and destroyed, that its very existence has been denied. It is supposed to have been printed at Antwerp, and, although attributed to Cardinal Allen, is considered to have been really penned by Father Robert Parsons. The only copy known was marked in Mr. Henry G. Bohn's Guinea Catalogue at 5l. 5s., and lingered there for more than a year. The same resold at Sotheby's, Dec. 1st, 1862, produced 31l.
