This also has an engraved title-page, but not the same: the date MDCCLXXII is engraved on it, but, as before, one title is made to do double duty by the addition of I in type for the second volume. There are also two editions of vol. 2 bearing the imprint 'Wheble, 1771,' on a typographical title-page, although both must have been printed after Woodfall's of 1772, as the one concludes with the note about Horne, and the other has the Philo-Junius Letters, and a Letter to Lord Apsley signed Junius, and dated Feb. 1775.—Another edition in 2 vols. 12mo. Lond. Wheble, 1775. This also concludes with the Lefter to Lord Apsley. The probability is, that after Woodfall's authorised edition of 1772, Wheble found it necessary to help the sale of his superseded stock by adding the new matter to the copies on hand.


