

RHODODENDRONS like our climate and soil and can be grown successfully in this area. Most Rhododendrons do well in full and partial shade. They respond well to plant food, be it either well-rotted cow manure, which should be applied in the fall, or to commercial fertilizers which have an acid reaction on the soil. Rhododendrons can be pruned as any other flowering shrub which gets out of shape or too tall. Pruning should be done right after the plants bloom.




