

EVERLASTING FLOWERS.

Those who have not the facilities to grow plants and flowers in their dwellings during the winter months, will find a few of these beautiful flowers very useful, to brighten up their homes during the winter. The flowers of the given varieties will keep fresh and bright for several seasons. They can be worked up into wreaths, crosses, monograms, baskets, &c., and if necessary can be used for funeral or festive purposes. The flowers should be cut in various stages of growth; some when half opened and others when full blown. After cutting, tie into small bunches and hang them up in a dry, airy place, with the flowers downwards, to keep their stems straight and in good shape.


