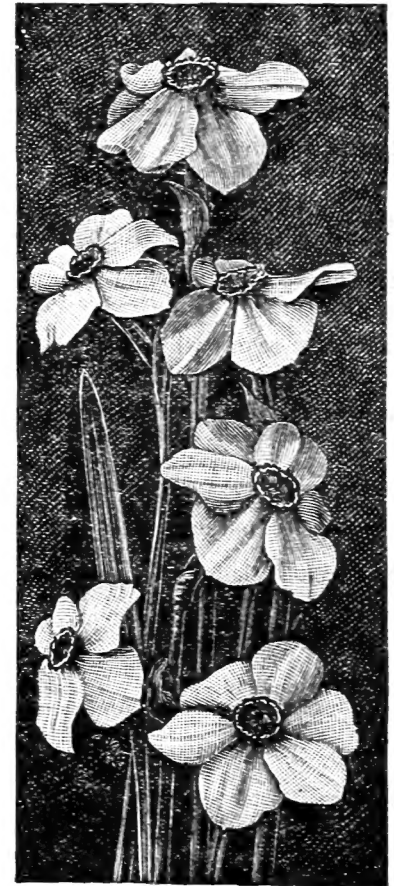
NARCISSUS OR DAFFODILS.

Therefore, when planting varieties marked (P) it will be necessary to have every third row a Perfect Flowering or (S) variety to properly fertilize the bed; much finer fruit will be obtained by so doing.

For example—If your order calls for 200 Great Ruby (P) you should also have 100 Great Northern (S) to properly fertilize the bed. Plant the first two rows with Great Ruby (P) and the third row with Great Northern (S) and so on; or you can use any other (P) and (S) varieties in the same manner.

CULTURE—Strawberries require very rich soil and good cultivation while growing. When plants are received, dip the roots in water, taking care not to wet the leaves or crown. Set the plants out in rows 2 or 3 feet apart and 15 inches in the row, using care that the crown of plant is set above the earth; press the soil firmly about the roots so as to exclude all air. In December cover the whole bed with straw about one inch deep, and in March uncover crowns of plants.

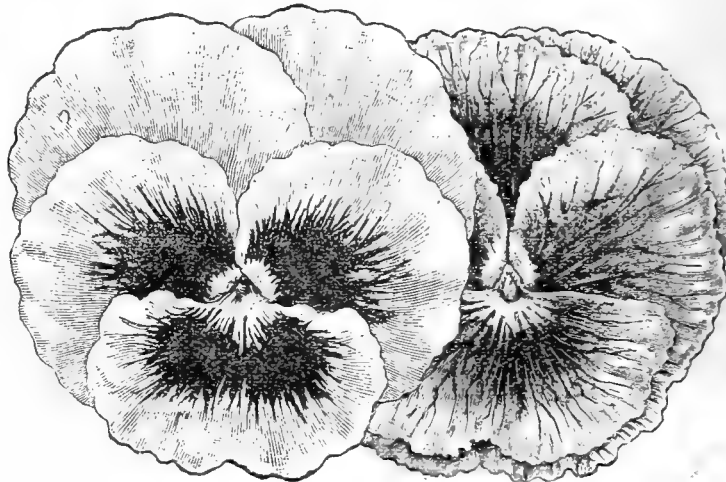

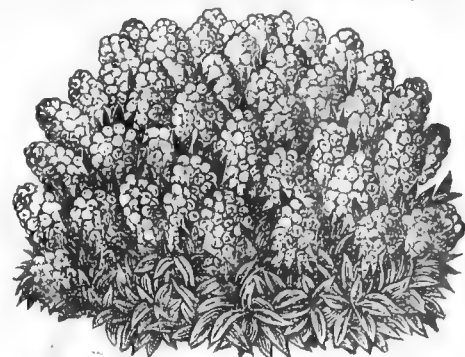

The more progressive lovers of flowers in the last few years have shown a tendency to go more into the planting of seeds that don't have to be sown every season, but which when once in the ground will come up year after year and give an abundance of beautiful flowers which will bloom from early Spring till late in the Fall. And it is with this end in view that I have compiled the following list of **HARDY PERENNIALS**, assuring those who have hitherto been content with the ordinary run of **ANNUALS** (which only last for one season) that they will be well repaid for the time, labor and the small outlay invested.

The seeds of most Hardy Perennials may be sown at any time from January till October. Early sowing should be made indoors in boxes or they may be sown out of doors in April after the frost has gone and transplanted where intended to flower in early Fall or following Spring. Many varieties succeed best sown in Autumn when they should be sown in cold-frame, transferring them to their permanent places the following Spring. In the Southern states the seed is sown in the open ground and a slight protection is sometimes necessary in very severe weather.

Many of the failures in Flower Culture are due to improper treatment of seeds and young plants. The soil should be well prepared and the surface made as fine and smooth as possible. Do not plant any seeds when the ground is wet but water thoroughly the day before sowing. When sown in shallow boxes in the house see that the drainage is perfect by boring holes in bottom of box and filling same about an inch with broken crocks, coal cinders, or any rough material that will furnish drainage.

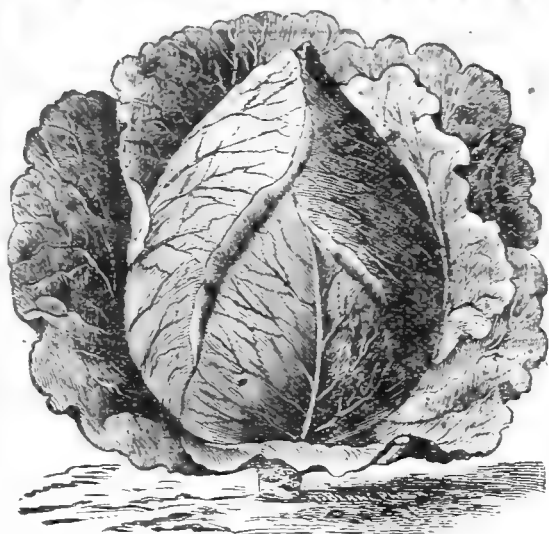

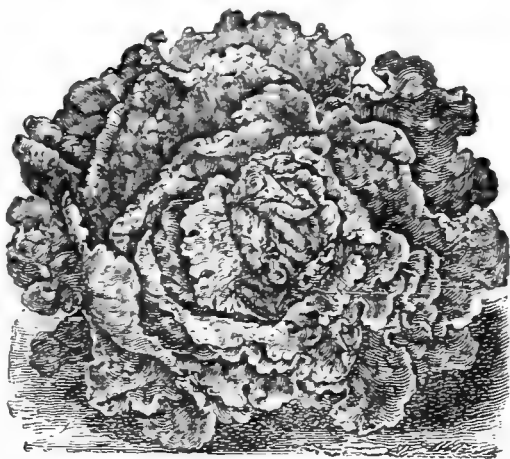

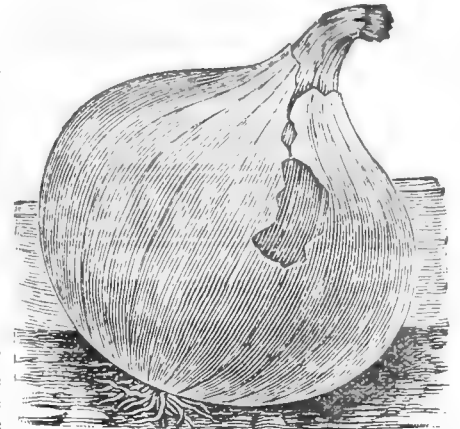
Sow in seed-beds in August and September and when the sets are the size of a goose-quill transplant to rows twelve inches apart and four to six inches between the sets. Of course, the seed can be sown in drills and thinned out, but you will have larger Onions and a far better yield if transplanted. There is no crop in which a liberal use of manure is more essential than in this and it should be of the best quality, and where a sufficient quantity of this is unavailable a thousand pounds of high grade commercial fertilizer can be used to the acre with profit. A dressing of Nitrate of Soda when the plants begin to bulb is of great benefit.

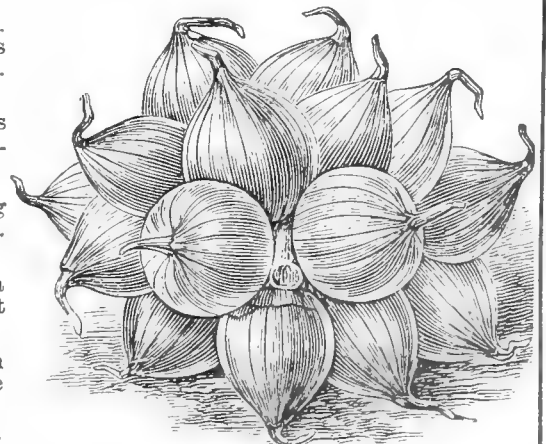

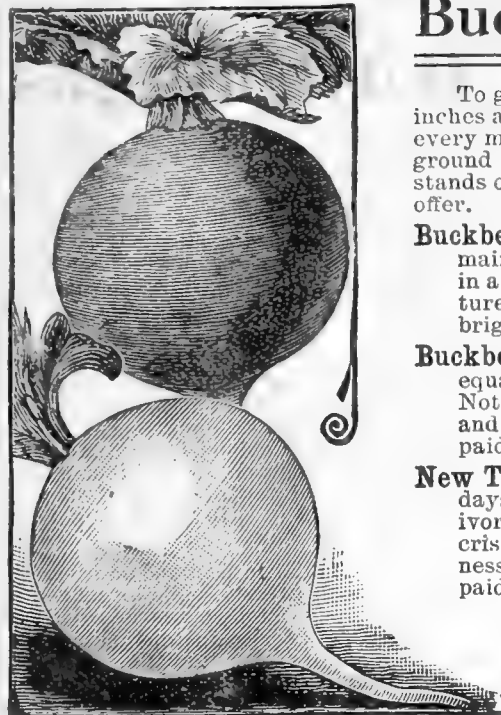

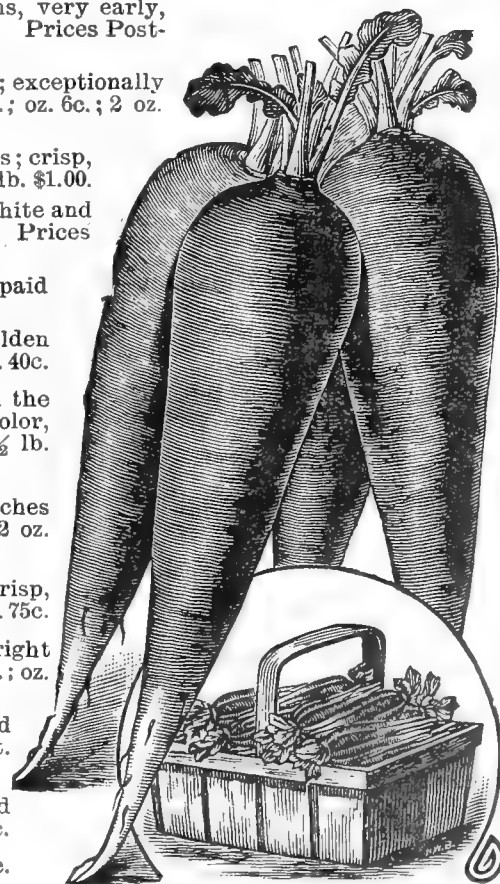

The ground should be kept as clear of weeds as possible with the hoe or cultivator and when the roots are matured and before hard freezing weather sets in, pull them, cut off the tops and store in a root cellar or pit. Ruta Bagas are sometimes sown broadcast and left to take their chances with the weeds and bugs, but this method is only successful on new clearing where there are no weed seeds.

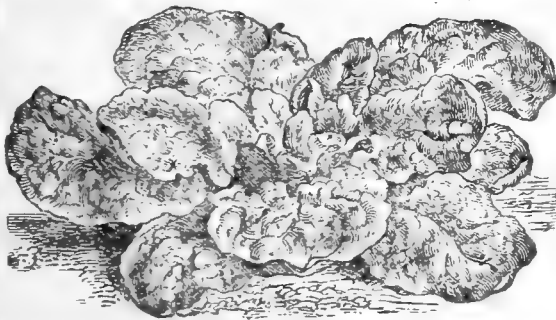

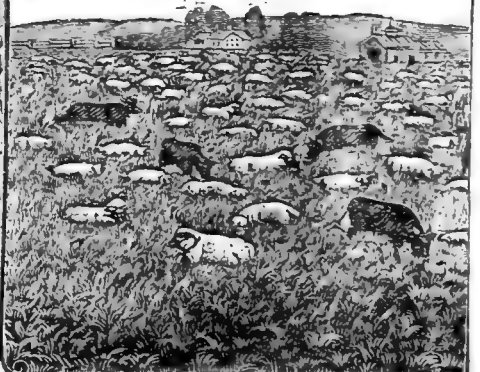

Velvet Beans. Nature's Great Soil Restorer. The Velvet Bean is a green manuring and foliage plant that is creating a great sensation in the Southern States where it is disputing for favor with the Cow Peas. The vines grow to a length of from ten to thirty feet and

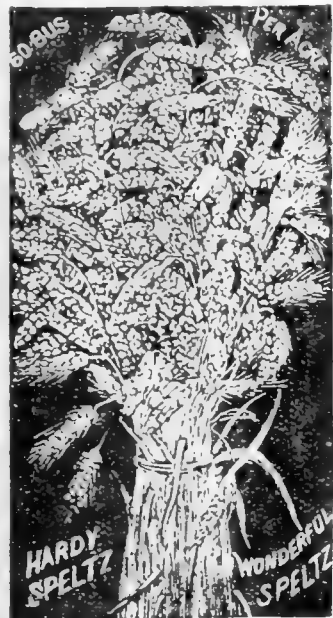

Speltz, or Emmer. The Valuable New Grain from Russia. Speltz has now been grown in the United States in a large way for several years and each succeeding season not only emphasizes its value but sees its production increasing to an enormous extent. The berry is of the color, texture and hardness of "No. 1 Hard" Spring Wheat, but about twice as long and with pointed ends. Those who have not grown Speltz should not let another season go by without giving it an important place on the farm. The Summers are very hot and long, and in many places the evaporation exceeds the quantity of moisture that has fallen during the year, and here it is that Alfalfa grows and flourishes. Not only does it endure extreme cold and drought but excellent crops of it have been raised on strongly alkaline soils. Sown alongside common Alfalfa the Turkestan made a top growth averaging eighteen inches in height with corresponding long root growth, while the common grew only a few inches high. August, September and October are the three best months for seeding Alfalfa, although, of course, it can be sown with good results in the Spring. The land should be prepared by either plowing or discing, making a good seed-bed and having it seem firm rather than too loose. Alfalfa should always be cut when just commencing to bloom, whether the plants are large or small. If the Seed is allowed to form the growth of the plant ceases. Alfalfa is usually sown broad-cast at the rate of fifteen to twenty pounds per acre. It should not be grazed during the first year, as it is too valuable a hay-producer to risk injury from stock. 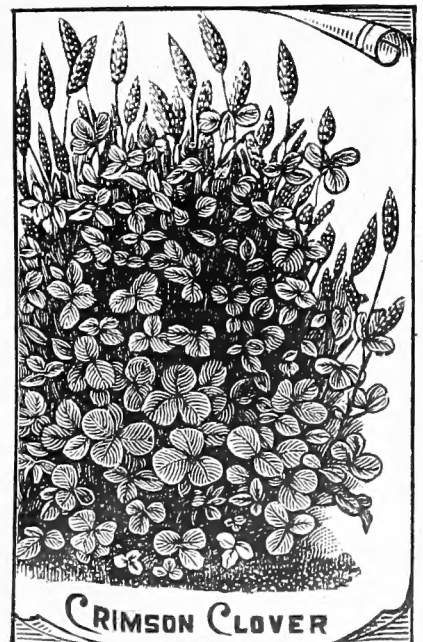
CRIMSON CLOVER (*Trifolium Incarnatum* or *Giant Incarnate*)

THIS FINE CLOVER is one of the most valuable Fall crops the farmer can put in as it will make the earliest green feed of any of the Clovers. 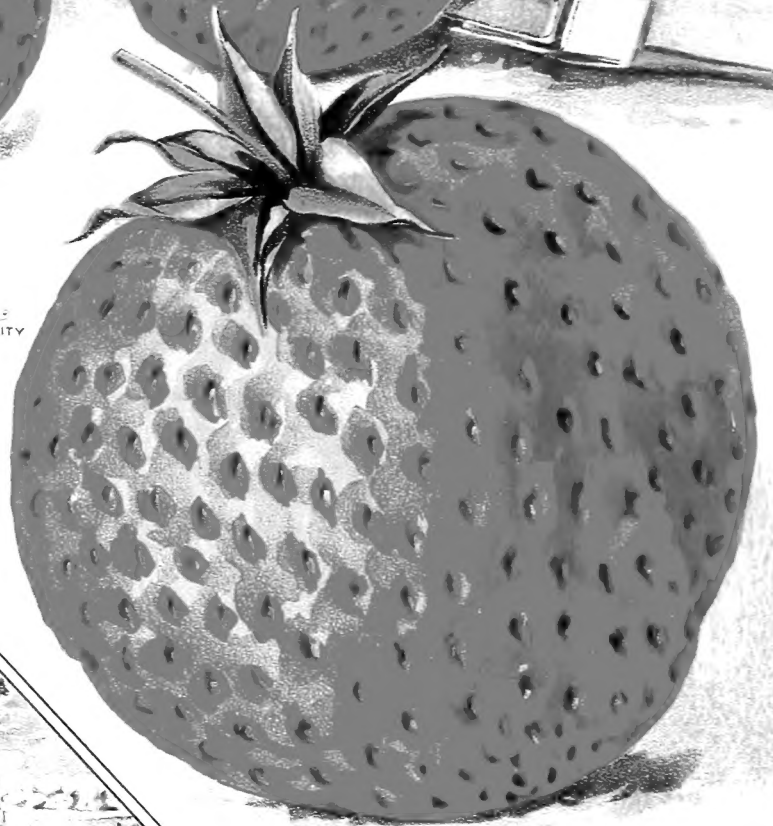

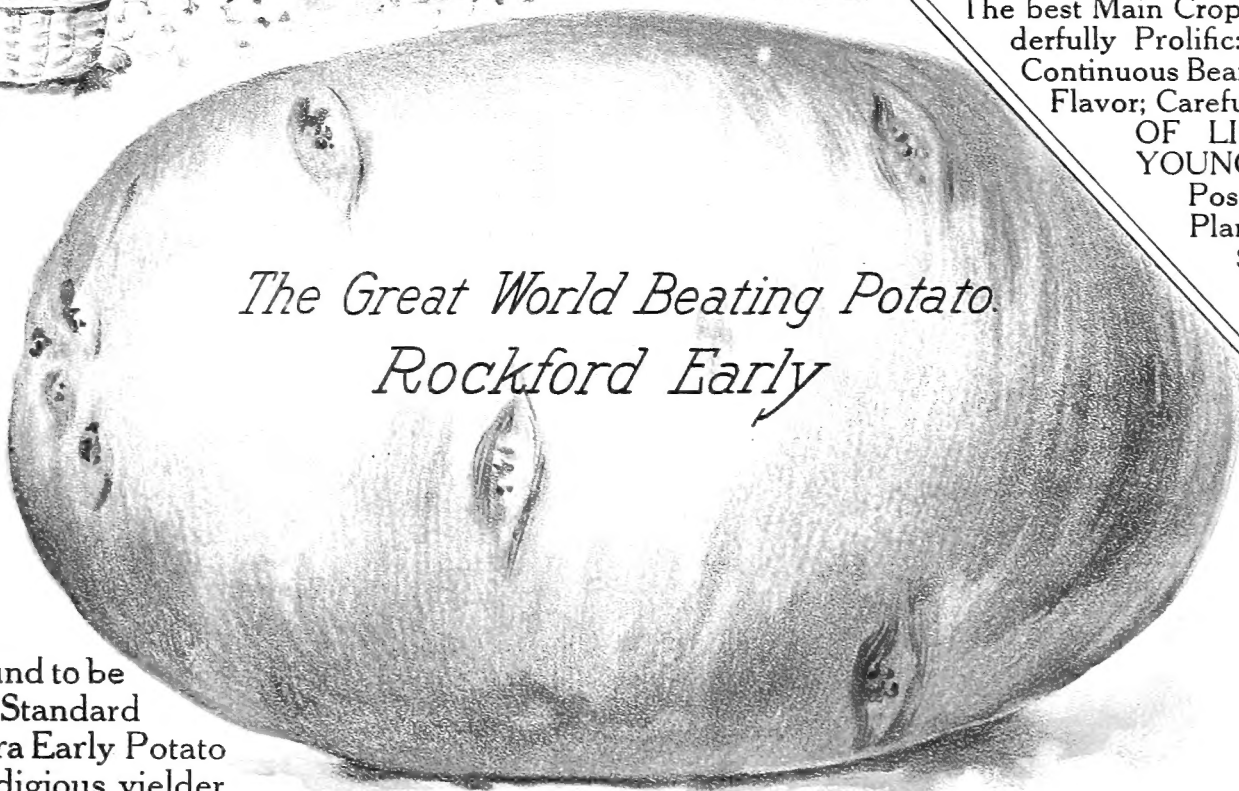
