PULLETS SHOULD BE LAYING.

Voing pullets hatched in March and April ought all to be laying this month. Later hatched ones, if not laying by November, will probably if left to themselves not lay before spring, when eggs are down to fifteen cents per dozen. A well-known poultry farmer showed us recently his account for last December, with 125 pullets. The net profit for that month from eggs alone was \$93.93; from the same pullets in April following the profit was \$14.97, and he got fifty dozen nore eggs in April than in December. 



ADMISSION

1. Each Exhibitor will be given a ticket, not transferable Applications for passes for employees must be made in writing by the Exhibitor, stating each employee's name, to the Superintendent of the Exhibitor's Class. Members of the Society, on application to the Secretary, will receive badges entitling them to admission at any time during the exhibition. The fee for membership is \$5, which can be sent to the Secretary, who will return a Certificate of Membership.

EXHIBITORS.

- 2. The books of entry will be closed September 4th. This regulation applies to articles entered for "exhibition only," as well as to those put in competition for premiums, and to all the classes, except classes IV. (Poultry), and VII. (Dairy, including Bread and Honey), in which entries close October 1st; VI. (Grain and Vegetables), and VIII. (Flowers and Fruits), in which entries may be made up to 12 o'clock M., on Monday, October 7th; and IX. (Domestic Manufactures), in which entries may be made up to 6 o'clock P. M., on Monday, October 7th.
- 3. The Entrance Fees must be remitted with the entries, a description of which will be found under the several Classes of Premiums.

All exhibits in Classes VI., VIII., VIII. and IX., must be in place by 6 P. M., Monday, October 7th.

- 4. Entries must be made by letter, addressed to Bay State Agricultural Society, Boston, Mass., on or before September 4th, except in Classes VI., VIII., VIII. and IX.
- 5. Copies of this premium list and blank forms for entries will be furnished on application by mail to the Society's office. Letters should be addressed to the Bay State Agricultural Society, Boston, Mass.
- 6. Exhibitors must make themselves acquainted with the premium list, regulations and requirements, and be sure in what classes and divisions their entries properly belong.
- 7. No animal or article may be removed from the show grounds until the close of the Fair. Transgression of this rule will incur forfeiture of any premiums awarded.
- 8. Exhibitors will not be allowed to sell goods to be delivered during the Fair (though they may receive and book orders), nor will they be permitted to call attention to their wares in any noisy or disorderly manner; and only such signs and placards may be put up as the officers shall approve and allow.

9. All exhibitors must (except in the case of live stock) state at the time of entry, the space needed by them, in order that proper quantity of space may be reserved.

The Society reserves the right to refuse any entries, or parts of entries, offered, particularly such as require an unreasonable amount of room.

- 10. Exhibitors having business cards, are requested to send them with their entries; also to give full particulars as to the objects entered.
- 11. Owing to the somewhat limited space for the Department of I mplements and Machines, the Committee of Arrangements reserve to themselves full powers to invite the display of such implements and machines as in their judgment seem desirable; and also full powers to disregard or reject, any or all offers of exhibits, and applications for space in this Department.

All exhibits in the Department of Implements and Machines, must be put in place, and taken out of the building within three days after the close of the show, by, and at the expense of, the exhibitors.

- 12. The Society will take every precaution for the safe keeping of articles and goods of exhibitors, but assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage; and upon this condition entries are received.
- 13. Goods and stock must be delivered in the Building or Pens, and put in place by the exhibitors, and promptly removed by them at the close of the Fair. All freight and expressage intended for exhibitors, should be addressed to the respective, exhibitors, at Mechanics' Building, Huntington Avenue, Boston.

All freight and express charges must be prepaid and receipts taken.

- 14. Exhibitors wishing to erect additional structures, or exhibitors requiring additional work, must secure permission to do so from the Superintendent of his class; and in all such cases the exhibitor must bear the expense.
- 15. Exhibitors can ascertain from the Superintendents of the several departments, when the Judges may be expected to examine their animals or articles. No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the Judges have overlooked animals or articles, will be considered by the Executive Committee.
- 16. All protests must be in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, be signed by the protestor, and will not be received unless delivered to the Secretary before 10 P. M. of the day of judging. All protests will be decided by the

Committee of Arrangements, and their decision shall not be subject to any appeal.

- 17. All entries in competition for prizes must be made in the name of the owners, or the names of the joint owners, if of animals. In Classes VI., VII., VIII. and IX., all articles must be the product of the exhibitor. The penalty for transgression of this rule will be exclusion from the present and all future exhibitions of the Society.
- 18. Premiums will not be awarded to animals or articles not worthy. If there be but one exhibitor in any division, or subdivision, of a class, only one premium will be awarded—the first or a lower premium, as the Judges may think deserved.
- 19. Implements and machines exhibited, must be labelled with the name of the exhibitor, name of the machine, its use and the retail price; and they are required to be the same in construction and finish as those sold to the farmer,—not specimens gotten up for exhibition.
- 20. The Society reserves the right to withold the premiums awarded in every case in which it shall appear to the Committee of Arrangements that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted.
- 21. No person having entered anything for competition may afterwards withdraw it; nor may any one refuse any premium awarded, and prize cards and ribands must be displayed during the Fair. Any infraction of these rules will incur the forfeiture of all premiums awarded to the exhibitor, and such further penalty as the Committee of Arrangements may order. All Premiums remaining unclaimed on November 15th, 1889, will be considered donated to the Society.

LIVE STOCK.

22. All exhibitors of live stock must pay such entrance fee as is stated hereafter under the several Classes, to be sent with the applications, or the applications will not be accepted; and in such latter case no notice will be sent to the owner making the application.

Stalls or pens, except for pigeons, will be provided upon the grounds, and hay, bedding and water will be furnished for cattle, horses and sheep, without charge, and also grain, for swine and poultry, from the Saturday preceding the opening until the close of the Fair, so that the stock may be taken to the grounds immediately on arrival. Grain for cattle, horses and sheep, will be for sale upon the grounds at reasonable prices.

23. The ages of all animals must be given, and satisfactory

evidence furnished if required. All ages will be computed to the first of October to determine in what division the animals shall be entered.

- 24. The Herd Book, or Register, number of all pure-blood animals, and statements of the breeding of all animals entered as grades, must be given, or filed with the application. Blank forms will be furnished by applying to the Secretary.
- 25. No animal may compete in more than one class or division, except that cattle may compete as individuals and for the Herd, Bulls and Progeny, Dairy, and any special prizes, and horses, sheep and swine in their proper classes and for any special prizes to which they may be eligible. All animals will be judged and shown in the ring, and exhibitors must be ready to bring them out when called for.

JUDGES.

26. The Judges are requested to report, and have their names entered, at the Secretary's office, in the Mechanics' Building, Huntington Avenue, immediately upon their arrival, where they will be furnished with their badges and informed when they will be called and where. Judges will apply to the Superintendent of their Class in all cases of doubt or difficulty. The Committee of Arrangements will fill vacarcies in the list of Judges, and receive their awards signed by all the Judges acting in their respective classes, and said Committee, in case of protest, shall have full power to decide. The Judges are requested to hand in their more extended reports before the close of the Fair.

They are requested to report fully upon all objects of interest and value, and to make such recommendations as circumstances or their experience may suggest; but they must not award any extra premiums.

- 27. It is desired that the Judges in each Class go together to hand in their report, instead of sending it by one of their number, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right.
- 28. Judges will in no case award a premium where there is no merit; and in case there is but one exhibitor in a division of a class, they will award only one premium in that division—the highest, or a second or third premium, as may be proper.
- 29. In addition to the Prizes in money, the Judges are authorized to award two Commendations in both Class I and Class II, if the entries are numerous, and the animals of sufficient merit. These Commendations to consist of "Highly Commended" and "Commended."

All exhibitors, will be charged an entrance fee of two dollars (\$2.), [which must be sent with the entry] for each animal entered, without regard to age, one-half of which will be refunded upon such animals as have been exhibited in accordance with the Society's rules.

Herd Prizes.

For the best herd, of one bull and five cows or heifers, all over one year old, of which such as were not bred by the exhibitor have been his property during the six months previous to the exhibition, Ayrshires, Jerseys, Guernseys, Holsteins, Swiss, Shorthorns, Devons, Hereford, and Polled.

The Society's Gold Medal.

The animals to compete for these prizes must be named at the time of entry, but the exhibitor may at the same time name, as reserves, two other animals, one of either sex, qualified as above, to be shown only in case any of the herd entered by him die, or become unfit for exhibition, between the time of entry and time of showing.

Prizes for Bulls and Progeny.

For the bull with which shall be shown four cows or heifers of his own get (all to have had a calf—grades being eligible for competition) in each of the following classes of pure-blood cattle. Ayshires, Jerseys, Guernseys, Holstein, Swiss, Shorthorns, Devons.

1st prize, \$50; 2nd prize, \$40.

\$75 \$50

The bulls to compete for these prizes must be specially entered, and they and their properly to be shown with them must also be entered individually in the proper divisions of the classes to which they belong. It is not required that the properly be the property of the exhibitor of the sire.

All special prizes, offered in any class, and not herein stateds will be made known through the press.

CATTLE.

- 1. In the classes of pure-blood cattle, only animals registered, or eligible to registry in recognized Herd Books, will be admitted. See Rule 24. Not more than four entries of cattle for any one premium may be made by any exhibitor, or firm of exhibitors.
- 2. Cows and heifers in milk must be milked clean on each morning of the Fair, between the hours of six and nine o'clock.
- 3. No bull over one year old will be allowed upon the grounds without a ring in his nose, nor be led out of his stall except by a staff.
- 4. No individual will be allowed to exhibit more than 18 head of cattle of any single breed.
- 5. The Judges will see Rule 29 for conditions under which Commendations can be awarded.

Horses.

- 1. No horse will be allowed a premium unless sound, except in case of stallions and brood mares injured by accidents, which do not lessen their usefulness for breeding purposes.
- 2. Horses must be shown uncovered, and in such manner as the Judges may require or allow, and if exhibitors refuse to submit to the proper requirements of the Judges, their animals will be ruled out. Exhibitors will have the privilege of showing their horses as the Superintendent shall direct.
- 3. As horses possessing no merit whatever, and not worthy of exhibition, have in some cases been entered merely to secure stabling at the expense of the Society, the Superintendent in charge of this department is empowered and directed, when any cases of this kind are known by him, or reported to him by his assistant, at once to order the animals so entered out of the Building, and the entrance money paid for such animals shall be forfeited.
- 4. The Judges will see Rule 29 for conditions under which commendations can be awarded.

- 2. All fowls are to be shown in pairs or in breeding pens; a breeding pen to be one cock or cockerel, and four hens or pullets.
- 3. Pairs must score for first premium 175, for second premium 165, and for third premium 160 points, or be in the estimation of the judges such as will score so many points when in full feather. Breeding pens must score proportionately.

No. 33. Plants and Flowers.

All articles for competition and exhibition must be ready for examination by the Judges at 6 P. M., on Monday, Oct. 7th,

All exhibitors will be charged an entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.), which must accompany the entry.

Each Exhibitor to place his Exhibits upon the tables in the places assigned by the Superintendent, or his authorized assistant.

General Rules and Regulations.

- 1. All Flowers and Fruits offered for Prizes, must have their names annexed, and must have been grown by the competitors. Specimens offered for exhibition by others than the growers, must in all cases have the names of the growers affixed, if known.
- 2. Where a certain number or quantity of Plants, Flowers and Fruits is designated in the Schedule, there must be neither more nor less than that number or quantity of specimens shown; and in no case can any other varieties than those named in the schedule be in the stand.
- 3. When only one prize is offered for any article, only a single specimen or collection can be shown by one person; but when a second, third, or fourth prize is offered, two, three or four specimens or collections may be exhibited, but no variety can be duplicated.
- 4. All persons exhibiting Plants, Flowers and Fruits, who desire reports of the same, must hand lists to the Superintendent of this Class.
- 5. After the articles are arranged, they will be under the exclusive charge of the Superintendent, and not even the owners will have liberty to remove or touch them, until the exhibition is closed, when they will be delivered as the contributors may direct.
- 6. No Flowers or Fruits will be entitled to a prize unless they possess points of superiority.
- 7. Competitors will be required to furnish information as to their modes of cultivation, and to present specimens for trial and examination if necessary.
- 8. No eards of a business nature will be allowed in any exhibition.
- 9. In awarding Premiums for Fruits, adaptation to general Cultivation will be deemed indispensable.
- 10. Attention is called to the Special Rules for Flowers and Fruits, and all articles not offered in conformity to the Rules will be disqualified, and Prizes will be awarded only to exhibitors who have complied with the Rules and Regulations.
- 11. It is understood that all persons placing any article in any exhibition thereby signify their assent to all the Rules and Regulations, General and Special.

Special Rules for Flowers and Plants.

- 1. All named varieties of Plants and Flowers exhibited for premiums, must have the name *legibly* and correctly written on stiff card, wood, or some other permanent substance; and each separate plant or flower must have its name attached, also have the number of the prizes for which they are offered.
- 2. Plants in Pots, to be entitled to Prizes, must evince skilful culture in the profusion of bloom, and the beauty, symmetry and vigor of the specimens.
- 3. No person can compete for any Prize for a single specimen, with a variety shown in a collection.
- 4. When Prizes are offered for the same flower in different classes, any person may exhibit in more than one class, but no variety can be duplicated.
- 5. All exhibitors, not strictly complying with the above rules, will be excluded from competition for Premium.

Special Rules for Fruits.

- 1. All Fruits offered for Premiums must be correctly named. Indefinite appellations, such as "Pippin," "Sweeting," "Greening," will not be considered as names.
- 2. All Fruits offered for Premiums must be composed of exactly the number of specimens or quantity named in the Schedule. A "dish" of Apples, Pears, Peaches, Plums, Nectarines, Quinces, Figs, Apricots, etc., is understood to contain twelve specimens, and this number will be required of all Fruits when not otherwise specified.
- 3. The whole quantity required of any one variety of Fruit must be shown in a single dish or basket.
- 4. Contributors of Fruits for Exhibition or Prizes, must present the same in the Society's dishes. Market baskets will not be allowed on the tables.
- 5. No person can compete for more than one Prize with the same variety or varieties of Fruit; except that a single dish may be of the same variety,—but not the same specimens,—as one of a collection.
- 6. Grapes grown on girdled vines cannot compete for a Premium.
- 7. All Fruits offered for Prizes, except when otherwise stated, and those for foreign Grapes, must be of out-door culture.
- 8. The Fruit Judges, in making their awards, will consider the flavor, beauty and size of the specimens, comparing

each of these properties with a fair standard of the variety. The adaptation of the variety to general cultivation will also be taken into account. Other things being equal, specimens most nearly in perfection, as regards ripeness, will have the preference.
