Of all the varieties of Apples generally in cultivation, the parcels at 25 cents will each contain a dozen scions. When an order is sent for a small assortment of rare kinds only, no charge will be made under 50 cents per parcel. When a large number of scions are wanted of the more plentiful sorts of Fruits, they will be supplied by the 100 or 1000 at reduced rates. It is better that such orders be sent in the fall or winter, and the Scions can be forwarded by express if so ordered.
