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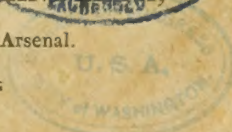

ADVERTISEMENT.

THE present edition of our catalogue will be found to contain many rare and curious plants, also many newly introduced varieties of fruits, all of which are in a promising train of propagation, the greater part we have already succeeded with, and now offer to the public a collection consisting of Green-house Plants, Fruit and Ornamental Trees, Flowering Shrubs, Bulbous Roots, &c. &c. not exceeded by any other establishment in America.

We still continue to appropriate a considerable portion of our grounds to the culture of garden seeds, and are fully persuaded they can be saved as successfully, and the kinds perpetuated as genuinely in this country as in Europe, with but a very few exceptions. And from the reputation they have at home and abroad, we are satisfied that the system of growing them ourselves is far preferable to depending on importations or inexperienced growers for supplies.

Prices have been affixed to the seeds, plants, &c. with a view to give persons at a distance some idea of the charges; they vary in a partial degree, particularly for the seeds, in proportion to the scarcity or abundance of the season.

Considerable expense has been incurred from time to time in the introduction of foreign fruits, plants, &c. from Europe, China and other parts of the world, and it is our intention to continue every exertion to procure from abroad whatever may be desirable for use or ornament, sparing neither pains nor expense to continue the standing which the establishment has so long maintained.

The proper season for transplanting bulbous flowering roots is from the middle of July to the middle of November, at which time Hyacinths, Tulips, Ranunculus, Anemones, Crocus, &c. should be planted.

Trees may be transplanted as the weather may permit at any time during the months of October, November, December, March, April, and until the middle of May. For Evergreens, the spring months are considered the best. Green-house Plants can be transplanted at almost any season, though the Autumn is preferable.

Trees, Shrubs and Herbaceous plants indigenous to America, always on hand in the greatest variety for foreign exportation; also extensive assortments of native seeds which will be carefully put up and correctly named.

We return our acknowledgments to the public for the very liberal support hitherto received from them in the various departments of our business, and solicit their future favours; also to those of our friends who have so politely presented us with rare plants, seeds, &c. many of which, in viewing the grounds, they will find in luxuriant growth.

It may be well to observe that but few of the fine imported grapes ripen their fruit well in the country, excepting under some peculiar circumstances, and so general is this complaint around Philadelphia, that the planting of them has considerably ceased. This may arise from the most of them having been introduced from the more temperate part of Europe. The weather in this latitude being too severe for them; to remedy that, if possible, many kinds have been imported by different individuals during the two past years from higher latitudes, and from their success thus far, there is strong ground to hope they will prove better adapted to the country. In our cities many of the finest imported vines are found to succeed admirably well, as much so, it is said, as in France itself. There being something peculiar in the atmosphere of the cities which tends to perfect the fruit and wood, and prevent the mildew they are so subject to in almost every situation in the country. Those under the head of "Native sorts," have been discovered wild, and some of them bid fair to be of considerable importance. The cultivation of the vine is daily becoming more a matter of attention in this country. In many sections, vineyards have been established, and their success has in many instances been very flattering. Much of course must depend on the situation, and in the kinds of grapes cultivated, being suitable for the purpose. Most of the vineyards of which we have any knowledge are composed nearly exclusively of such vines as have originated in this country, and such have in almost every instance been attended with success.

FLOWER SEEDS.

Put up in papers at $6\frac{1}{2}$ cents, or 4 dollars per hundred, assorted. Of annual flowers we have an extensive and handsome assortment, but they are not of sufficient moment to give a catalogue in detail.

In our selections of esculent vegetable seeds, we have chosen such as are most generally known and esteemed; of many of the kinds, for instance, cabbage, radish, &c. the names of thrice as many could be given, but we cannot conceive any advantage can arise from the cultivation of so many sorts. No garden wants more varieties of each kind than we now offer for sale, and indeed, very few ever raise half the number.

We have already observed in the advertisement attached to this catalogue, that the garden seeds sold by us, are, with an exception not worth notice, of our own raising. This fact we wish to impress on the minds of purchasers. The advantages, and very great ones too, attending a culture such as pursued by us, cannot but strike all who will give it the smallest consideration.

The seeds being reared on our own ground, from the moment they are planted, through all the various stages of their growth and ripening, are under our immediate care and superintendence, and every attention necessary to bestow on them they receive; thus few errors can arise, and we become intimately acquainted with their quality as well as age; and as the present is the only establishment of any extent in the United States, at which seeds so exclusively raised by the proprietors thereof are sold, we deem the fact worthy of notice, not with a view to decry those sold by others, but to state the which might otherwise remain unknown.

For the information of those who purchase to sell again, we have given the wholesale prices. At times, owing to a failure in the crop, some of them may exceed the prices quoted in the catalogue, but it will be but seldom, and then to a slight amount.

OBSERVATIONS ON TRANSPLANTING TREES.

As the success in transplanting trees so much depends on the treatment they receive, we have thought it advisable to

present a few remarks for the observance of those who have had but little experience on the subject.

On removing trees from the nursery, care should be taken to prevent the roots from drying previous to planting them, otherwise they frequently receive considerable injury; and in our orders for trees, particular care is taken to preserve them from drying winds before packing. Immediately on their receipt, the bundles in which they are packed should be opened, the roots well watered, and "laid in" until the ground in which they are to be planted is ready to receive them. By laying in is understood the making of a trench sufficiently large to admit the roots, in which they are placed; the earth having been previously made fine, is then filled in around them, and a gentle watering given, in which situation they may remain with safety until planted. The holes in which it is intended to plant them should, for an ordinary sized nursery tree, be from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to three feet in diameter, and about the same in depth. The earth from the bottom should be thrown aside, and its place filled up with good compost or black mould, (no fresh stable manure should be used in the compost.) The tree should be planted about the same depth, or perhaps an inch deeper than it has stood in the nursery; the roots and fibre should be spread out horizontally, and during the process of filling in the earth, the tree shook several times, so as to admit the earth between the roots, and fill up any cavities that might otherwise remain. The earth should be then trodden down, or during the time of filling, and when the excavation is completely closed, the tree gently watered. After the expiration of a short time the earth will have settled, and all hollows that may have formed should be filled up—finished by forming a basin around the trunk to receive the rain—watering it may be necessary to give it—which it will require should the ensuing season after planting prove dry. If convenient, a stake affixed to prevent the winds from loosening the earth around the roots would have a good effect, and during the season of vegetation the ground should be kept free from grass and weeds.
