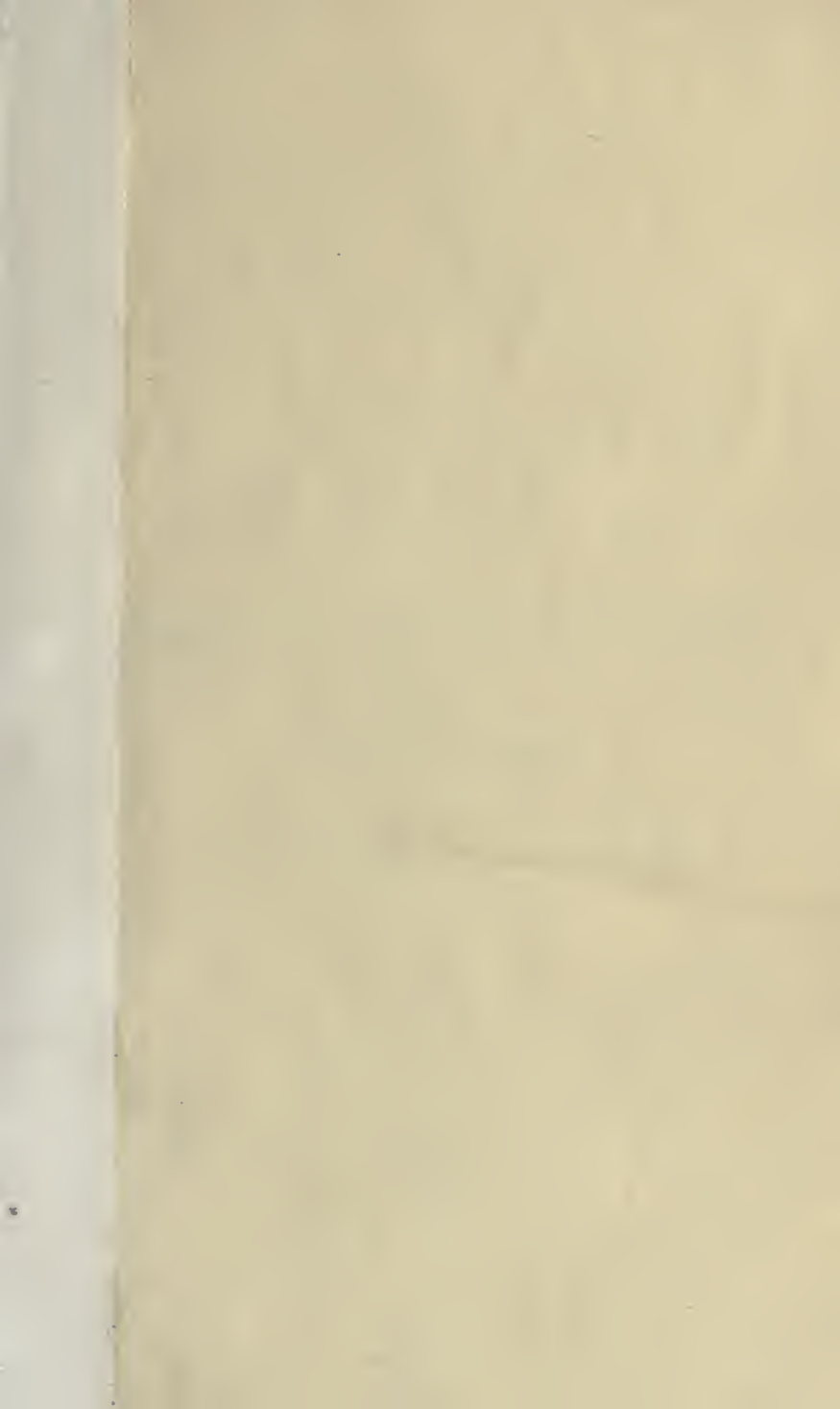

# Catalogue of Manuscripts.

1396

Gg. i. 1.

A small but very thick folio, on parchment, 633 leaves, chiefly double columns, of about 36 lines each, well written in a hand of the former half of the XIVth century; several diagrams and other illuminations; imperfect at the end.

A LARGE COLLECTION OF POETRY, chiefly in the Romance language, with some treatises in prose.

Two tables of contents are prefixed (fol. 1 to fol. 6*a*); but they give a most inadequate idea of what follows.

1. ' *Urbane curteis*, en Romance.'

Begins (fol. 6*b*):

Une sage home de graunt valour  
Ki iadis uesquist en honur.

2. *A few proverbs in the same metre* (fol. 7*b*).

3. ' *Art de Kalendere*, en Romance.'

Begins (fol. 8*a*):

De geste ne uoil pas chaunter  
Ne veilles estories cunter.

On fol. 16*a*, col. 2, the author calls himself RAUF, and states that he composed his work in 1256. The colophon adds (fol. 16*b*, col. 1) his surname: DE COMPOTU *secundum* RADULPHUM DE LYNHAM (see Oudinus, *de Scriptor.* III. 237). His portrait is most probably preserved in the initial letter.

4. Three short pieces in Latin, entitled *De Baptismo*, *De Utilitate visionis Corporis Christi*, *Utilitates Missæ* (fol. 16*b*).

5. ' *Lumiere as Laïs*, en Romance.'

Begins (after a long introductory Prayer, fol. 21*b*):

Ore comence le romaunz  
Qui n est pas as fous ne as enfaunz.

The first table of contents at the beginning of the volume is an analysis of this treatise. The author was PERES (Peter) DE PECCHAME (fol. 17 a). It is a kind of *Summa Theologiæ* arranged in the form of a dialogue, and divided into six books.

Ends (fol. 111 a):

Cest pater noster et aue marie  
A la dame qe pur nous prie  
Si issi seît sun fiz iesu Crist  
Amen amen issi finist.

6. '*De les xv signes deuaunt le iour de iugement.*'

Begins (fol. 111 a, col. 1):

Ciez tuz comunalment  
Dout nostre sire nous reprent.

7. A short extract from Aristotle, beginning 'Quo cibo nutriatur in corpore conceptus,' is added to fill up the column (fol. 113 b, col. 1).

8. '*Romaunce de Amour*' [i. e. Charity].

Begins (fol. 113 b, col. 2):

Amour, amour ou estes vous  
Certes en mult poi de luy  
Kar ieo ne os.

It contains many severe strictures on the morals of the times. The writer, if we may judge from the occurrence of such words as 'wapentak' (fol. 116 b, col. 1), was from the north of England.

9. '*Alcuns de les prophecies et des merueilles, qe MERLIN dit en soun temps, de Engleterre e des reis qe unt este puis le temps le rei Henri le derein qe nasquist a Wincestre, e de euz qe serrunt pur tuz iours mes en Engleterre de lur auentures quenz il serrunt bons ou mauueis, moles ou dures:*' in prose.

Begins (fol. 120 a, col. 2):

Un aiguel vendra hors qe auera blanche laung.

Cf. Geoffrey of Monmouth, Lib. vii. c. 3. The 'late' king alluded to in the title was Henry III., born at Winchester in 1207.

10. A small Latin extract, *De Perjurio*.

11. '*Liure de la passioun nostre Seigneur Jesu Crist, en Engleis:*' the title given in the table of contents.

Begins (fol. 122 a):

Herkinth alle the wolle you telle  
Of much pitie in mi spelle.

For other copies of this Passion, see above, Dd. i. 1, § 1.

12. '*Les Euangelies de tuz les Dominikes par ane od lur exposicions.*'

These metrical Homilies proceed in the usual course from Advent (cf. above, Dd. i. 1, § 4). After a long dedication, 'a sa trechiere dame Aline' (fol. 135 a to fol. 139 b), the exposition commences:

Ihesus uint pres d une cite  
 Qui Jerusalem est apele  
 E quant il vint a Bethfage  
 Qi est al munt Oliue.

Ends (fol. 261 a, col. 2):

Ici finent les domenees  
 Breuement espuns e endites.  
 Ore prie tuz ke les vient e dient  
 K il pur ROBERT DE GRETHAM prient  
 Ki Deu meintenge si sa vie  
 Ki par li sert en sa baillie  
 Amen Amen chescun en die.

Nothing more appears to be known of the author.

13. '*Septem Psalmi Penitencie:*' single column.

Begins (fol. 261 a, col. 2):

Deu en tes vengemens ne me pernez Sire  
 En ceste siecle present si me chastiez sanz ire.

14. '*Romaunce del Aue Maria:*' title in the table of contents.

Begins (fol. 264 a, col. 2):

Ave tresduce Marie, aue gloriouse.

15. '*De les cinc ioies nostre Dame.*'

Begins (fol. 265 a, col. 1):

Vous ke nostre dame amez.

16. '*Del assumpcioun nostre Dame seinte Marie:*' single column.

Begins (fol. 265 b):

Seignurs ore escutez ke Deu vous beneie  
 Pur sa mort doleruse ki nous dona la vie.

17. '*Le liure de les Lamentaciuns nostre Dame seinte Marie:*' single column.

Begins (fol. 272 a):

Pur ceus et pur cels ki n'entendunt quant oient lire Latin.

This poem is substantially the same as Dd. i. 1, § 2.

18. '*Le tretiz ki mun seigneur Gauter de Bitheswey fisit a madame Dyonise de Mountchensi pur aprise de langage.*' This is only part of a prolix title.



(Fol. 280 *a*—fol. 294 *a*). The treatise is in French verse, so written as to admit of interlineations: and in many cases the English words corresponding to the more difficult parts of the text are inserted in red ink.

19. '*La Manuel de Pecchez.*'

Begins (fol. 294 *b*, col. 1):

La uertu del seint espirit  
Nous seit aidaunt en ceste escrit.

See, respecting the authorship, Ee. 1. 20, § 1.

20. '*Le Brut, coment li bon rei Edward gaigna Escotz e Galis:*' single column.

Begins (fol. 323 *b*):

Ky volt oyr des reys coment chescune vesquist  
En le ille de Brutus Bretainne appeller feist

.....  
Ki volt sauer la geste des grauntz e de petit  
La pregnyc de dan PERES ke lad mis en escrit.  
De nostre reis Edward Schafeld li requist  
Recorder la geste: escuter cum il dist.

This is the Chronicle of Peter Langtoft, which was translated into English by Robert de Brunne. The translation only is in print, ed. Hearn, 1725.

Ends with the following stanza (fol. 345 *b*):

For þare wer þai bal brend  
He kauged ham pidre kend  
And dreued to dote  
For scottes at Dunbar  
Haued at þayre gan char  
Schame of þar note  
Wer neuer dogges þere  
Hurled out of herre  
Fro coylthe ne cotte.

21. A few lines, in Latin, on the *Joys of heaven*.

22. '*Le ymage du mounde,*' or '*La descripcioun de toute le mounde,* en Romaunce:' sixty chapters and twenty-eight diagrams. A table of contents is prefixed: double columns.

Begins (fol. 347 *a*, col. 1):

Ki veot entendre a ceste liure  
E sauoir coment il deit viure  
E aprendre tiel clergie  
Dunt meuz viuera tout sa vie.

Breaks off (fol. 389 *b*, col. 2):

Ac ici deuaunt vous escrit est  
Coment li firmament fet est.

The diagrams, which are coloured, are very curious.

The treatise relates chiefly to natural philosophy, learning, and the liberal arts. On the English version of it printed by Caxton in 1481, see Dibdin's *Typog. Antiq.* i. 101 sq.

23. '*Du bounte des Femmez.*'

Begins (fol. 390 *b*):

Cil fableurs trop me greuent  
De rimeur qe ne seuent  
Rimer counter for de fable  
Escutez vn dist creable.

24. '*Credo in Deum*, en Romance' (fol. 392 *b*).

25. '*Pater noster*, en Fraunceis' (*Ibid.*)

26. '*Ave Maria*, en Fraunceis' (*Ibid.*)

27. *Prognostications derived from the day of the week on which Christmas falls.* (cf. Ff. v. 48, §§ 18, 22).

Begins (fol. 393 *a*):

Ici comence la reison  
Del tens del ane e de la seisoun.

28. A short piece in Latin, with the title *Quando puer nascitur.* (fol. 393 *b*, id. 1).

29. '*De etate hominis*' (*Ibid.* col. 2): in Latin.

30. '*De sanguinis minucione*' (*Ibid.*): in Latin.

31. '*De recepcione medicinarum*' (fol. 394 *a*, col. 1): in Latin.

32. '*De tonitruo experimenta*' [i. e. prognostications]: fol. 394 *b*: in Latin.

33. '*Sentencie Danielis*,' or '*Soungarii de Daniel le prophete*' [rules for the interpretation of dreams]: fol. 394 *b* to fol. 397 *b*: in Latin.

34. '*De Sacramentis Ecclesie*:' in Latin.

Begins (fol. 397 *b*):

Quot sunt sacramenta Ecclesie? septem: que patent per hos versus...

35. '*La Romance del seinte croyz e de Adam nostre primere pierre*' [the common legend, connecting the wood of the Cross with the Tree of Life].

Begins (fol. 399 *b*):

Qui vodra sauer e oyer de la verrai croiz.

36. A short extract, entitled '*Inuenit Jeronimus in annalibus Judeorum de xv diebus ante diem iudicii*' (fol. 402 *b*, col. 2).

37. '*Compendium historiarum Bible.*'

Begins (fol. 403 *a*):

Vos qui concupiscitis statum vestrum scire  
Hec sigina tractabitis que dant inuenire.

Ends (fol. 404 *b*):

De relicta repetit erit maledictus.

38. '*Miraculum sancte Marie Virginis,*' or '*Une bele miracle de nostre Dame.*'

Begins (fol. 404 *b*, col. 2):

Entre les oueraines de charite.  
Ke ad fet la reyne par sa pite.

Ends (fol. 406 *b*, col. 2):

Benoit soit la mere nostre seigneur  
Par qe est acheue cele iceste labour. Amen.

39. '*Liure de la Pochalipse* [i. e. the Revelation], *en Fraunceis, od les exposicions,*' or '*La Pocalipse, en Romance;*' with fifty-five illuminations.

After the Preface (fol. 407) follows a translation of chap. 1, vv. 9 sq.:

E Johan nostre frere est parcener en tribulacioun e en regne, en pacience en Jhu Christ fu en vn ysle qe est apelee Pathmos pur la parole Dieu e testemonie Jhu Crist. E fu en esprit per vne dymaine...  
At least one leaf is wanting after fol. 421 and fol. 423.

Ends (fol. 439 *b*):

...e nous doint issi en li viure e morir qe nous puissiu oue li en sa glorie en cors e en alme saunz fin regner. Amen.

40. '*Le Liure qe est appeleé le Set Sages, en Romaunce.*'

Begins (fol. 440 *a*):

A Rome out vne empereour qi out a noun Dioelicien...

Respecting the nature and origin of this work, see above, Dd. i. 17, § 21.

41. '*De Phisenemie*' [Physiognomy], in prose.

Begins (fol. 464 *b*):

Ove ceste phisenemie voudra iuger ne mette ia sa entente en vn soul significacioun...

42. '*La nature de home par sa naissance*' [a series of prognostications]: fol. 466 *b* to fol. 469 *a*.

43. '*xvii Pointz qe deüent estre en confession*' (fol. 469 *a*).

44. '*Inquisiciones generales in confessionibus*' (fol. 470 *a*): in Latin.



45. '*Expositio Orationis Dominice*' (fol. 470 *b*): in Latin.

46. '*De Origine et Pena Pilati*:' in Latin.

Begins (fol. 472 *b*):

Rex fuit quidam qui puellam nomine Pilam filiam cuiusdam molen-  
dinarii nomine Atus...

47. '*Quel vaut meuz a amer gentil clerc ou chiualer*.'

Begins (fol. 474 *a*):

Ki auenturez veut oir e ver  
Il ne puet touz iours demorer.

Ends (fol. 476 *b*):

Mieuz est li clers a amer  
Que ili orgoillouse chiualer.

48. '*Le liure de Hending*,' or '*Les Prouerbis de Hending*:'  
in English verse.

The first proverb is (fol. 476 *b*):

Wel is him pat wel ende mai.

To which the following explanation is added:

Ne mai no man pat is in londe  
For noþing pat he mai fonde  
Wonnei at home and spede  
So fele þewis for to lerne  
So he þat had isowt yerne  
Auentures in fele dede.

Each proverb is in like manner illustrated by a single stanza.

49. '*Les Enfantescs nostre Seigneur quant il esteit en tere od  
la vie*.'

Begins (fol. 479 *b*):

Ore vous dirrai de vne enfaunt  
Quant en tere fut conuersaunt.

50. '*Le Brute dengleterre abrege*:' in prose.

Begins (fol. 484 *b*):

Escotez beau seignurs vous qe volez oir des reis e ieo vous cunterai  
coment Engleterre primez comenca.

This meagre abstract ends at the death of Edward I., whose merits it  
celebrates in verse (fol. 489). Two stanzas are added, one in French, the  
other in English, reflecting as it seems upon the maladministration of  
Edw. II.

51. *On the military 'feoda' of England and the 'cantreda'  
of Ireland* (fol. 489 *b*, col. 2).

52. '*Qualiter caput hominis situatur,*' or '*Descripçion del teste de home:*' with a model not unlike those of modern phrenologists: in Latin.

It refers to the *Summa* of Aquinas, who died in 1274.

53. '*Auctoritates,*' or '*Les auctoritez de Job e des autres Docturs:*' in Latin (fol. 491 *a* to fol. 494 *b*).

The majority are extracts from St Augustine, St Bernard, Gregory the Great; a few being added from the sacred writers.

54. '*Liure de Sydrac le philosophe qest apele le liure de la fontaigne de toutes sciences:*' or, more accurately, in fol. 496 *b*, '*Les Questions qe le roi Boctus demanda de Sydrac le philosophe;*' [a Romance of Eastern philosophy].

After a long table of contents the treatise begins (fol. 505 *a*):

Av tens le roi Boctus al leuant roi de vne graunt prouince que est entre Jude e Perse...

Respecting this long and elaborate romance, see Warton, *Engl. Poetry*, i. 145, ed. 1840, and on its translation into English verse, *Ibid.* ii. 305, 306.

55. '*Les propretes des Femmes, en Romaunz.*'

Begins (fol. 627 *a*):

Oiez seignurs e escutez  
E a ma parole entendez  
Ki en femme trop met sa cure  
Souent sera saunz honure.

56. '*Confessio,*' or '*Coment home se deit confesser:*' in French: (fol. 628 *a*).

57. '*Oratio de Sancta Maria:*' in Latin: (fol. 629 *a*, col. 1).

58. '*Les xxxii Folies:*' in French: (fol. 629 *a*, col. 2).

59. '*Miracula beatæ Virginis*' (fol. 629 *b* to fol. 633 *b*).

A series of religious anecdotes, imperfect at the end. See Ff. i. 14, § 19. Trace of ownership, in a hand of the xvii<sup>th</sup> century: 'Bought of Mr Washington.'

An octavo, on silky paper, containing 326 leaves, paged, each page containing from 20 to 30 lines, written in a cursive Greek character of the xv<sup>th</sup> century, some pages being left blank. The larger capitals are ornamented, and, as well as the other capitals and some of the musical notes, are written in red. The Greek titles are supplied by the MS.

Some French possessor (perhaps J. B. Hautin) has prefixed a Latin syllabus of the contents.

1. 'Ἀρχὴ συν Θεῷ ἀγίῳ τῶν σημαδίων τῆς πενταδικῆς \* τέχνης· τῶν τε ἀνιόντων καὶ κατιόντων σωματίων τε καὶ πνευμάτιων καὶ πάσης χειρονομίας καὶ ἀκολουθίας συντεθεμένων εἰς αὐτὴν παρὰ τῶν κατὰ καιροὺς ἀναδειχθέντων ποιητῶν παλαιῶν τε καὶ νέων.'

Ἀρχή, μέση, τέλος, καὶ σύστημα πάντων τῶν σημαδίων τὸ ἴσον ἐστὶ· χωρὶς γὰρ τούτου οὐ κατορθοῦται φωνή. (fol. 1.)

The work contains ὄρος μουσικῆς, ὄρος φωνῆς, ὄρος φθόγγου, several pieces set to music, tables, &c.

The last words of the treatise are set to music, and are as follows :

Πνεύματα τέσσαρα, ἑπτὰ φωναί, διπλασμός, καὶ τρία κρατήματα, ἐντέχως συντεθειμένα παρὰ Ἰωάννου τοῦ Κουκουζέλη καὶ Μαίστορος. (fol. 2.)

For Johannes Cucuzeles, see Smith's *Dict. Gr. & Rom. Biog.* Vol. II. p. 594. None of his works appear to be edited.

2. 'Περὶ ἀριθμητικῆς, ἐκ τῆς τοῦ Νικομάχου μερικῆ ἐκλογῆ.'

Begins :

Ἰστέον ὅτι ὁ δύο ἀριθμὸς λέγεται ἄρτιος, ὁ τρία περιττός. (f. 21.)

Ends with a scale at the head of which stand the words,

Τὸ ἄρτιον διαιρεῖται εἰς ἀρτιάκις ἄρτιον, περισσάρτιον, ἀρτιοπέριπτον.

3. 'Τοῦ αὐτοῦ ἀπὸ τοῦ β̄. βιβλίου [π]ερὶ'...

A blank space left after [π]ερὶ not filled up.

Begins :

Ἐὰν γὰρ λάβοις (sic) δύο μονάδας, ἐπειδὴ ἴσαι εἰσὶν ἀλλήλαις, (μονάδες γὰρ καὶ ἀδιαίρετοι) καὶ πολλαπλασιάσεις αὐτὰς ἐπ' ἀλλήλας, διάστημα οὐ ποιήσεις ἀλλὰ τὸ αὐτὸ γενήσεται. (fol. 22.)

Ends :

...καὶ ἀπλῶς ἐξ ἐναντίων τοῦ παντὸς ἢ σύνθεσις· τοιούτων εἰς τὸ τῶν ἀριθμῶν γένος· τὸ γὰρ ταυτὸ ἀδιαίρετον. (fol. 24.)

Illustrated with geometrical figures. For these arithmetical works see Smith's *Dict. Biogr.* s. v. Nicomachus.

4. 'Συλλογὴ λέξεν ἀπὸ τοῦ νόμου.'

\* Or possibly παντοδαπῆς. The MS. has παπαδικῆς.

Begins :

Βρεβείω κατὰ Λατίνους τὸ τέμνω· καὶ βρεβίτα ἡ συντομία. (fol. 24 verso.) (Cf. Boiss. *Anec. Gr.* T. I. p. 410.)

Ends :

...ἰμάντη, λῶρος: κόμπου χάριν πορευθῶ, δηλονότι ἐπιδείξασθαι καὶ ἐγκωμασθῆναι ὡς λόγιος (*ibidem*).

5. A scale of Pythagorean numbers (ααβ, αβγ, αγδ, &c.), but having no title: arranged in four columns, headed respectively, ἦφος, μέτριος, ἔναρξις, ἀπαξάδων. (fol. 25.) This table is followed by another (fol. 29) in nine columns, headed καὶ νῦν καὶ αἰεί, which is followed by a Pythagorean letter, entitled,

‘ Πυθαγόρου νίκη καὶ ἦττα (MS. ἦττας): Πυθαγόρας Τηλανυγῆ χαίρειν.’

Begins (fol. 57) :

Πολλὰ παθῶν καὶ πολλὰ πειράσας.

The Epistle treats of divination by numbers. It has been partially edited by Orelli in his *Collect. Epist. Græc.* p. 52, but his work only contains the first few lines. The remainder contains divers diagrams and mystical numbers, &c.; and ends with a magical receipt for catching a thief. See also Orelli's remarks, p. 301.

6. ‘ Λέξεις βραχεῖαι ἕκ τε τῶν τοῦ Χοιροβοσκοῦ, καὶ Μαξίμου, Μαγίστρου Θωμᾶ γραμματικοῦ, Λογγιβάρδου, καὶ ἐτέρων.’

Begins (fol. 32) :

Ἄκρασία: πᾶν τὸ περιττόν· ἀκρασία καὶ ἡ ἀνωμαλία· ἀκρασία ἀδυναμία καὶ ἄνοια.

Ends :

...ὦκα ταχέως. (fol. 43 verso.)

This treatise seems not to be published in this form.

7. ‘ Θεοδοσίου γραμματικοῦ Ἀλεξανδρέως περὶ προσωδιῶν.’

The Preface begins :

Περὶ γραμματικῆς γράφειν προθέμενος, κ. τ. λ. (fol. 44.) Ἰστίον τοίνυν ὡς ὁ Θραξ Διονύσιος ὁ περὶ τῶν ἡ λόγου μερῶν διδάξαις ἡμᾶς, κ. τ. λ. as in the MS. mentioned by Fabricius, Vol. vii. p. 34. Hamb. 1725.

The treatise itself commences thus :

Θεοδοσίου γραμματικοῦ Ἀλεξανδρέως περὶ προσωδιῶν. προσωδία εἰσι ἰ· ὀξεία, βραχεῖα, κ. τ. λ.

Ends :

...τὴν ἐπιφορὰν τῶν δύο συμφώνων. (fol. 50.)

By way of appendix is given an account of Dionysius Thrax, beginning, Διονύσιος γένος μὲν υἱὸς Διονυσίου Ἀλεξανδρέως, κ. τ. λ.



Ending:

...κατὰ μέρας δεικνύει. (fol. 50 verso.)

This appears to be an unedited treatise. A *Commentatio* upon it by Peyron is published with Sturzius' edition of *Orion Thebanus*, pp. 236—242. Lips. 1820. For some further remarks see Götting's preface to Theodosius *περὶ γραμματικῆς*, pp. xii—xiv. Lips. 1822.

8. 'Ὀνομασία μηνῶν.'

Fol. 51 consists of a catalogue of the names of Roman, Egyptian, Macedonian, and Cappadocian months, arranged in four columns: also of a catalogue of Greek, Hebrew, Bithynian, and Cyprian months, similarly arranged in four columns. Published by Cramer in *Anec. Gr.* Oxon. T. III. pp. 402, 403, but the Macedonian months are absent.

Begins:

Ends (fol. 64 b):

...τούτων δὲ καὶ ἕτερα ἅπαντα πλείστα εὔροις [ἄν] ἐν τοῖς ἐρωτήμασι καὶ ἐν τῷ πρώτῳ πλὴν οὐ κατὰ στοιχείου.

Published by Scapula at the end of his *Lexicon*; but this MS. has a variety of *ἐπιμερισμοὶ* at the end which are not contained there.

10. 'Παραγγέλματα ἰδικὰ συντελοῦντα εἰς ὀρθογραφίαν.'

Begins:

Βάλλω, στέλλω, τίλλω διὰ δύο ἄλλ' ἐπὶ ἐνεστώτος, ἐπὶ δὲ μέλλοντος δι' ἐνός (fol. 65).

Ends:

...ἀνδράριον καὶ εἴ τι ὅμοιον (fol. 70 b).

11. 'Ἀρχὴ σὺν θεῶ τῶν ἐρωτημάτων τῶν ἐπιδιορθωθέντων παρὰ κυρίου Μανουήλ τοῦ Μοσχοπούλου.'

Begins (fol. 73):

Τί ἐστι προσωδία;

Ends (fol. 232) with τὰ τρία μέρη τῆς ῥητορικῆς arranged in a table.

For this work see Smith's *Dict. Biogr.* under *Moschopulus*. It appears that it has been more than once printed.

12. 'Τοῦ περιτίμου ἐν φιλοσόφοις κυρίου Μιχαὴλ τοῦ Ψέλλου σύντομος ἐξήγησις περὶ συντάξεως ἢ περὶ τοῦ μὴ σολοικίζειν καὶ περὶ βαρβαρισμοῦ ἐν τῷ μεταξὺ τούτων καὶ περὶ συντάξεως προθέσεων καὶ ῥημάτων.'

Begins (fol. 233):

Ὅκτώ εἰσι (sic) πάντα τὰ μέρη τοῦ λόγου.

Ends (fol. 246 b):

...εἰς αὐ ἢ εἰς οὐ.

This work of Psellus appears to be unnoticed by Fabricius, and to be unedited. It consists of a variety of grammatical sections, e. g. *περὶ προσώπων*, *περὶ τοῦ μὲν συνδεσμοῦ*, *περὶ τῶν ᾗ γενῶν*, *περὶ ἐπιρρήματων*, &c. After this work follows a variety of short pieces (occupying about four pages), in prose and verse, accompanied by scholia. They are by Christian authors, and relate to Lazarus, Christ, and the Apostles.

13. 'Ἀφθονίου σοφιστοῦ προγυμνάσματα ὧν αἱ ἀρχαὶ μόνον ᾤδε.' (fol. 249.)

This is merely an enumeration of the definitions and chapters of the work of Aphthonius. Their Greek titles agree with those given in Walz's edition (*Rhet. Gr.* Vol. I. pp. 55—120). After this (fol. 250) follows a little notice of Hermogenes, and an abstract of his *στάσεις*.

14. 'Περὶ λογογραφίας.'

Begins (fol. 267):

15. 'Τοῦ ἁγίου Ἐπιφανίου (sic) περὶ μέτρων καὶ σταθμῶν.'

Begins (fol. 261):

Κόρος σίτου μόδιοι λ, ὃ λέγεται χάρ· χάρ λέγεται ἀπὸ τῆς τοῦ βουνοῦ ὑποθέσεως.

Ends (fol. 264 b):

...κουστωδία ἄνδρες

Bears but little resemblance to the work of St Epiphanius (Vol. II. pp. 158—184, ed. Pet.); but is partially taken from it. Compare the beginning with p. 177 D.

After this work follow a variety of grammatical excerpts, or little treatises, mostly without titles, which seem to belong to the late Byzantine school, and to agree in part with the *γραμματικὴ εἰσαγωγή* of Theodorus Gaza, edited by Aldus. (Venet. 1495.)

The first is a work on the prepositions. It begins, 'Ἰστίον δὲ ὅτι ἡ ἐξ καὶ ἡ ἐκ καὶ ἡ ἀπὸ καὶ ἡ πρὸ καὶ ἡ ἀντὶ μετὰ γενικῆς συντάσσεται (fol. 265, cf. Theodor. *Intr. Gr.* sig. I. A. II. ed. Ald.). After it follows one on the

persons, beginning, Ἰστέον δὲ ὅτι πάντα τὰ ὀνόματα καὶ πᾶσαι αἱ ἀντωνυμῖαι εἰσὶ τρίτου προσώπου (fol. 268): to this succeeds a work entitled ἐπίλυσις τῶν στερητικῶν μορίων καὶ ἐπιτατικῶν. It begins, δεῖ γινώσκειν ὅτι ὀκτώ εἰσι πάντα τὰ μέρη τοῦ λόγου (fol. 269 b, cf. Boiss. *Anecd. Gr.* T. I. p. 413): afterwards follow sections on conjunctions, and on the different significations of various Greek words (nouns, verbs, &c.), and on accents, breathings, &c. The series concludes with a section entitled Περὶ ῥημάτων ἀδυσποτάκτων (fol. 278 b); commencing Ἰστέον δὲ ὅτι ὦν μὲν τὸ ῥῆμα βαρύνεται ἢ μετοχῇ ὀξύνεται. (For the last compare Boiss. *Anecd. Gr.* T. II. p. 461.)

16. ‘Συνεσίου Κυρηναίου ἐπισκόπου Κυρήνης.’ (fol. 281.)

Contains twenty-four epistles. His letters have been several times printed.

17. Epistles of Libanius and St Basil. (fol. 290.)

These are seven in number, and are all contained in Morell’s edition of Libanius’ *Epistles*.

18. Epistles of Michael Psellus, and others, some being apparently imaginary forms. (fol. 291.)

Some of these are simply inscribed ἐπίσκοπος πρὸς ἐπίσκοπον and the like. No epistles of Psellus appear to have been printed.

19. An Epistle of Apollonius (n. 33, p. 393, ed. Olear.), of Libanius to Julian (not in Morell’s or Wolf’s edition), and of Julian to Libanius (p. 20, ed. Heyl.) (fol. 294).

On the reverse are two scraps entitled πρόλογος διαθήκης and περὶ Ἰουδαίων.

The epistle of Libanius commences: τί ταῦτα γλώττης ἀργότερας;

23. A Declamation by Nicephorus Basilaca, without his name, entitled, 'Ἀνασκευὴ τὰ κατὰ τὴν Ἀταλάντην.'

It begins incompletely in the middle of the prologue 'hanc garrula anus hanc delirus senex.' Genesis begins f. 2*b*: S. Matthew, f. 284, and the Revelation ends f. 349, followed by the explanatory index of names: of this all after the letter S has been torn away: at the end of f. 349*b*, a later hand has written, '1591 explicit iste liber sit scriptor crimine liber,' on a small piece of parchment, which is pasted on the leaf. The books occur in their usual order except that the Acts comes after the Epistle to the Hebrews.

He adds, that he has chiefly followed 'tueyne doctorys of the whyche þ<sup>t</sup> one ys comunely called the maystyr of storyis,' and 'that othyr maystyr Nycholas of lyre þ<sup>e</sup> whyche was a worthy doctur of dyuynytee and glosyde all the hyble as to the lettural undyrstandynge.'

The last is an anonymous case against an executor to recover a debt.

A leaf is also lost between ff. 41 and 42, and 67 and 68: the Psalms end f. 86, and the Canticles follow with the Litany, which ends f. 93,—after a blank leaf the Vigiliæ Mortuorum begin f. 100, and in f. 110*b* the fifteen Oos, and the MS. ends f. 115*a* with S. Bernard's Oratio devota de nomine Ihesu.

In the beginning is written 'This boke pertainyng unto Thomas More sonne of Roger More Esquyer gyvyn by his Grauntfader John Husee in November 1547.' And on other blank leaves occur the names of John Ffish, George Hussey 1643, Mary Ffarmor 1574, and Nathaniel Ffauster.

Several of the leaves have been mutilated for the sake of the initial letter.

Most of the information here collected together was extracted from the works of well-known authors, named by the collector, and the whole seems to be an historical common-place book relating chiefly to England. The latest entry seems to have been made in the year 1694.

The Robert Nicholas above mentioned may have been the person recorded by Whitelock (p. 405) as a Commissioner of the Great Seal, Anno 1649.

At the end of the treatise appears

‘A Probleme

whence it comes to passe that the Court of Chancerie of late is soe frequented above other the common law courts at Westminster.’

At the top of p. 1 is written, 'De libris Sancti Sulpicii Bituricensis.'

The tract at the end of this volume is properly the completion of this treatise, as the catchwords imply. See § 26.

4. ff. 83—102. ‘Θεῶνος Ἀλεξανδρέως σχόλια πάνυ χρήσιμα εἰς τὴν Μαθηματικὴν μεγάλην σύνταξιν Πτολεμαίου.’

These are not Theon’s own commentaries.

Begins :

σύνταξιν ἐπέγραψε τὴν πραγματείαν οὐκ ὡς ἂν τις οἰηθείη...

Ends (imperfect) :

...ἢν τινὰς φαμεν ἀνατέλλειν...

ff. 107—109 are a displaced part of Euclid’s Optics. See § 24.

f. 110 is also a displaced fragment.

5. ff. 112—116. ‘Ἀρχιμήδους κυκλομέτρησης.’ ‘Εὐτοκίου Ἀσκαλωνίτου ὑπομνήματα.’

These correspond with Torelli’s edition of Archimedes. Fol. Oxon. MDCCCXII. pp. 203—216.

6. f. 121. *Greek Elegiac verses.*

Begins :

Εἰ κύβον ἐξ ὀλίγου διπλήσιον ᾧγαθὲ τεύχειν...

Ends :

...τοῦ Κυρηναίου τοῦ τ’ Ἐρατοσθενέους.

18 lines.

7. ff. 122—130 a. ‘Ἀγαθημέρου τοῦ Ὀρθῶνος γεωγραφίας ὑποτύπωσις.’

This is printed in the *Geographi Minores*, Vol. II. Oxon. MDCCCIII. Both the books there printed are in this MS., but the second is entitled here

ὑποτύπωσις γεωγραφίας ἐν ἐπιτόμῳ.

8. ff. 130 b. ‘Διονυσίου Βυζαντίου ἀνάπλους Βοσπόρου.’

This is only the opening of the tract, exactly as printed in the note to the Latin copy in *Geogr. Minor.* Vol. III. p. 1.

9. ff. 132—133 *a*. *A Grammatical Fragment*, probably of Isaac Argyrus.

Begins:

Probably by the same Isaac Argyrus. Incomplete.

The former preface is dedicated to archbishop Sigeric or Siricius, who was primate of all England (989—993).

Over the Greek words that occur in the Epistles, the corresponding Roman letters are written.

A fly-leaf in the beginning gives an index in a later and crabbed hand. On the leaf pasted on the cover is the note, 'Memorandum quod iste liber est datus magistro P. Carpet, monacho Sancti Antoni, ad usum seolarium predicti magistri Oxonie, ex dono magistri Nicholai Upton canonici Sarum.' Nicholas Upton was Precentor of Salisbury in 1446.

The deeds and records are arranged under the names of the places to which they relate, and those names are in alphabetical order throughout a considerable part of the book. The writing is arranged in two columns on each page.

The Book is the CELLARER'S REGISTER OF ST EDMUND'S ABBEY, AT BURY, as we learn from several notes accounting for the introduction or omission of documents.

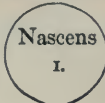

Rastell in 1559 edited "A collection of all the Statutes from the begynning of Magna Carta unto the yere of our Lorde 1557, whiche were before that yere imprinted." He was mistaken at the time he made the above note in supposing that these Statutes commenced with Magna Charta. Rastell died in 1565; Sir Rob. Catlyn in 1573; Lord Burleigh in 1598; and Francis Tate (of whom see in *Athenæ Oxon.*) in 1616.

This copy of the Statutes does not appear to have been collated by the sub-commissioners for publishing the 'Statutes of the Realm' in 1810. Indeed, as they have omitted all mention of it, when enumerating the collections of Statutes in this Library, they seem to have been ignorant of its existence. The various readings between these Statutes and those of the Record Commissioners' edition are many.

These Statutes differ somewhat from those printed by the Record Commissioners, and from those in Gg. v. 7, in their number and order, and in

the division of the chapters; there are also many variations in the text. The first page of the Statutes of EDW. III. and the first page of those of RICH. II. are beautifully illuminated in gold and colours; the initial letters of the Statutes throughout the volume are illuminated; and the chapters are marked with coloured paragraphs. This collection, like that of Gg. v. 7, appears to have escaped the notice of the Record Sub-Commissioners.

At the beginning of the volume, on the inside of the cover, is a genealogical table from ROLLO, the first Duke of Normandy, to HENRY II. of England. And at the end, upon the last three folios, in a different hand, is a copy of the Letters Patent of HEN. VI. (not in Rymer) directed to the Abp. of Canterbury, the Bishops of Winchester and Exeter, the Duke of Clarence, the Earl of Warwick, and others, appointing them a commission for the conservation of the peace; ending 'Teste meipso apud Westm. xv. Decembri, Anno ab inchoatione regni nostri quadragesimo nono, et readepionis nostre regie potestatis Anno primo;' signed 'Bagott.'

This is most probably by the same author as the Histories of the lives of Mary and James VI., and of the Life of Charles I. In the dedication, which is headed 'a second present to the kinges most excellent memorie,' he speaks of having written a former treatise on Exchange.

And the names of all the present M<sup>rs</sup>, and ffellowes, of everie particular Colledge. Together with the number of Magistrats, Governours, and officers, thereunto belonging, and the totall number of Students now therein residing. Collected Anno Domini 1621.'

This is followed by a dedication to Thomas Paske, D.D. Master of Clare Hall, by John Scott. The legendary account of the foundation of the University by Prince Canteber is given next, followed by the accounts of the several colleges, ending with Sidney Sussex College, each headed by the emblazoned coats of the founder and the college; the Schools, Library, Magistrates and officers of continuance, Councillors at Lawe for the Universitie and the King's Publike Professors and Lecturers, each headed by the personal arms of the founder, of the then incumbent, of the office, or of the office impaling those of the incumbent.

Afterwards there is a list of 'Officers daylie employd by the Universitie, Degrees of all orders and sciences of Scholars in the Universitie,' and a list of the Masters of Clare Hall.

Then follow copies of two letters; one addressed by the senate to king James I. and dated, '4<sup>o</sup> Nonas Febru. 1616;' the other, the king's answer, dated 'quatuor Kallendas Martias,' A.D. 1616. They are attested by John Scott as a Notary Public and 'Registrar Coll. sive Aulæ de Clare.' They are printed in Cooper's *Annals of Cambridge*, III. 113 and 114.

On the back of the title is a coat bearing Clare Hall impaling Paske. Quarterly, argent and sable; in the second and third quarters three fleurs-de-lis in pale of the first; a martlet sable for a difference in the first quarter. The coat of the supposed founder of the University is blazoned, azure, three crowns or.



The founder of Magdalen College is stated to have been 'Edward Stafford last Duke of Buckingham,' and his arms are given.

From the heading of the page on which the letter to the king commences we learn that the author of the book 'published to divers perticular Colledges' copies of it.

Dr Woodham has made much use of the copy of this book preserved at Jesus College in his *Application of Heraldry to the illustration of various University and Collegiate Antiquities*. Cambridge, 1841.

The following is written upon a piece of paper pasted in at the beginning of the book :

24 May 1656. a. w. w....

John Scot who set out this MSS. book, A° 1621 caused the same to be set out imprinted in single sheets in y<sup>e</sup> yeare following A° 1622 wherein is wanting the Description of the foundation of Cambridge, wherewith this book beginnes, as likewise the names of the M<sup>rs</sup> and fellows of diverse Colledgs w<sup>ch</sup> are herein set downe, likewise the Lers between K. James and the Universitie at y<sup>e</sup> end of this book are in the printed edition wanting.

This same John Scot in the same year 1622 set forth likewise the description of the Colledges of Oxford universitie in like manner as he did of Cambridge w<sup>ch</sup> are printed in loose sheetes w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup> armes of every Colledg as in this, but not in colours.

Dr Woodham learned that this John Scott was the deputy of Camden, Clarendieux King at Arms (*Appl. of Heraldry*, p. 76). The printed copy has not been found.

The Canon is inserted f. 130 in its usual place; the Proprium Sanctorum begins f. 191 with St Andrew as usual, and the Commune Sanctorum in f. 251 *b*. After the Common follows in f. 285 the Officium pro defunctis, and in f. 292 the Ordo triginalis Sancti Gregorii, [as in Ff. II. 31], the whole of this last being scratched through with a pen. The MS. ends f. 300 *a* with the Missa pro Sponsalibus.

With the exception of a very few references to the Statutes and to reported cases, it consists of notes of actions in which the writer was engaged, in which are given the names of the plaintiff and defendant, the nature of the action, statement of the case, amount of damages, plea of the defendant, names of the witnesses on his own side (which is noted) with the points which they were to prove. In hardly any case is the verdict given. It contains also lists of the actions at the Essex Assizes (held at Chelmsford, Witham, and Brentwood,) from August, 1633, to March, 1669—70, at which it frequently gives the names of the Judges. The number of cases at an assize sometimes exceeds 80. The Judges are, Justice Mallet, K.B., Francis Bacon, K.B., Serjeant Cressheld, (afterwards J.C.P.), Serjeant Keble, for Peter Phesant, C. P., sick, Serjeant Greene for the same, Baron Gates, Edward Atkins, C.P., Baron Rigbey, John Puliston, C.P., Peter Warborton, C.P., Richard Aske, K.B., Oliver St John, Ch. C.P., Serjeant Newdigate, Baron Pepys, Serjeant Steele (Recorder of London), Sergeant Croke, Serjeant Hill, Matthew Hale, C.P., Chief Baron Widrington, Orlando Bridgeman, Ch. C. P., Samuel Browne, C.P., John Keeling, Ch. K. B., Serjeant Browne, and William Morton, K.B.

## 2. A GUIDE TO COURTS LEETE AND COURTS BARON.

Written in a very small neat hand, in the reign of Elizabeth, on 24 leaves, with about 60 lines in a page. On the first page was written, in a contemporary hand, 'John Ellease,' to which an *r* has been added in a differently coloured ink, making the name 'Elleaser.' It is divided into the following chapters:

'The causes why court leete and courte baron were ordeyned.'

'The manner of keeping y<sup>e</sup> veiw of frank pledg.'

'Le precepte.'

'The entry of the court role.'

'An exortation to y<sup>e</sup> inqueste in courte leete.'

'An exhortation to y<sup>e</sup> inqueste in courte baron.'

'An exhortation to the inquest in court leete and court baron.'

These exhortations are quaint and interesting. They are of some length, and treat of the duties of piety and virtue in the various relations of life, abounding in illustrations from the Sacred Scriptures, as well as from Plato, Quintilian, and other moral writers. In the last, the assembly is exhorted to do good in imitation of Abraham, Daniel, and the Apostles; and that 'the ready way to doe this good is to eschew three things,

SIX ADDRESSES of a similar nature, and evidently intended for a like occasion, as the 'Exhortations' above noticed. They are written in a similar



though not identical hand, of the same date, and extend to 16 leaves. The last 'intreates of Judgment and Justice,' and begins:

'Masters, I have shewd you your duty toward God, your duty toward prince and country, the duties of superiors and inferiors'...

Ends:

After many blanks is a page containing the commencement of a charge, with erasures and interlineations, followed by two pages of unconnected notes.

## A COLLECTION OF ASTRONOMICAL TRACTS, AND ALMANACKS.

Many of these are imperfect. Few have been printed. The leaves are much displaced by the binder.

The first 80 leaves contain chiefly the Treatises and Tables of John Manduth (see Tanner, p. 506), with Tracts on the Catha conjuncta, and Catha disjuncta, and rules, &c. assigned to Campanus, Gebir, Ptolemy, and others. After 10 blank leaves, ff. 90—138 contain 9 Canons for the calculation of Eclipses, Figures of Constellations, Almanacks, and Tables. At f. 139 begins, Liber Mgri Rogeri de Hereford de Judiciis siderum et Astrologie (Quoniam regulas artis Astronomicæ...), see Tanner, p. 641. f. 154*b* begins, Liber Zael in Astronomia et Judiciis. f. 201, Tractatus de Sphæra editus a Magistro Roberto de Grosteste (see Ff. vi. 13, § 2). ff. 206—229, Astronomical Tracts and Tables. f. 230, A Tract on Squaring the Circle, by Campanus, printed in *Margarita Philosophica*, Basil, 1535, p. 1239, concluding with the verses 'Rem novam mirabilem.' See Ee. iii. 61, § 21. Following this are tracts with figures, giving the elements of the epicyclic orbits of the superior planets, by John de Lineriis. f. 273, Tractatus novi Quadrantis, and of the instrument Albyon. See Ee. iii. 61, § 2. f. 309, Tracts on Mensuration and Trigonometry. f. 323, On the Instrument called Semissis. f. 378, An incomplete work, wanting its commencement, on Arithmetic. There are also several Trigonometrical Tables.

The writing and compilation are very careless, and parts of the volume are nearly illegible through fading of the ink.

This work is that published with the above title under the name of Hugo de S. Victore [*Opp.* iii. p. 9, &c. Migne]. The arrangement in the present MS. is very different from that of the printed edition. It contains the first three books, and a large appendix on trees. There are many references in the work to S. Isidorus, *Etym.* lib. xii. which do not appear in the printed copies. The illustrations are curious.

The book has formerly belonged to *George Williams*, in whose writing there is a Welsh inscription on the first fly-leaf, 'Gwithred yellfir lium a berthyn ye thangos natyriathe,' &c.

It commences with a table of writs, and is preceded by 2 leaves containing notes on Dover and other legal subjects, verses for remembering the common-days in Banco, and a list of Return-days in the Common Bench.

1. ff. 1—40. ARTICULI XII IN JOANNEM BARTHOREUM propter quos Cardinalis episcopi et Abbates Scotici in eum mortis tulerant sententiam, cum sui ipsius vindicatione.

Begins (after the dedication to Edw. VI., Non existimes, rex charissime... which occupies 6 leaves):

Amici cujuspiam opera, aliquot articuli propter quos Scoticus cardinalis...

Ends :

...a tam sancta pia atque Christiana pertinacia deflectere sinant.

This is the same person as Sir John, or Captain Borthwike, concerning whom see Foxe, *Acts and Monuments*, Vol. v. pp. 607—621, ed. 1846, where both the articles against him and his answers, as in the present MS., are given at length in English. The MS. is mentioned by Tanner, *Biblioth.* p. 78.

2. ff. 42—51. 'The manner of ADAM WALLACE'S ACCUSATION in the black fires [friers] of Edinboure the 17 of July, 1550.'

Begins :

Ther was a scaffolde made harde to the chancerie wall of the blacke frires church of Edinbourge...

Ends :

...the fire was kindeled and so departed to God constantelie in good countenance in ower syght.

This is in a different hand from the former treatise: it will be found in Foxe's *Acts and Monuments*, Vol. v. pp. 636—641, ed. 1846.

A small quarto, on vellum, containing ff. 506, in double columns, with 47 lines in each column. The initial letter to each book contains a miniature picture of some event in that book. Date, the xvth century.

BIBLIA VULGATA SANCTI HIERONYMI.

After a blank leaf and the usual prologues, Genesis begins f. 5, the initial I representing the 7 acts of creation. St Matthew begins f. 384 b, and the books occur in the usual order, except that the Acts follows the Epistle to the Hebrews. The Revelation ends f. 473 b, and is followed by the explanatory index of Hebrew names, with which the MS. ends f. 505 b.

The binding is stamped with the letters E O, and has clasps.

An octavo, on paper, containing ff. 59, with 32 lines in a page. Date, the xvth century.

SERMONS FOR SUNDAYS AND FESTIVALS IN ENGLISH: imperfect.

Begins (f. 8):

Diliges dominum deum tuum m'. xxii. cap. [37] the helpe ande the grace of godde þat is almyghtye...

Ends (f. 59):

...gapynge with his mowthe havynge thee in scharpe tethe...

The first 7 leaves contain a sentence from each Apostle and Prophet, three short addresses, one on the Gospel for the first Sunday in Lent, a story of incest and murder ff. 5, 6, an account of the Last Supper, &c.

Among the sermons are inserted two on the occasion of marriage, the first entitled 'in nuptiis sollacio,' the second 'in solemnizatione matrimonii.'

The title-page is illuminated at the margins, and has emblazoned there the shields of arms of the chief states of old Spain, the following words inserted under each coat being severally its supporter; viz. Bastardia, Homocidia, Tirania, Vsvrpacion, Hipocresia, Perfidia.

It contains an elaborate attempt to prove that the Austriau Kings of Spain had no claim to that dignity, and seems especially directed against Philip II. The genealogical tables are very full, amply illustrated by Heraldry, and neatly executed. On page 292, there is the device of a peacock standing upon a pomegranate with its tail expanded. On each feather one of the shields claimed by Philip is blazoned. The device is ingenious and well executed.

The Manuscript commences:

‘Aun que los Emperadores, Reyes, y Monarchas, cuyos setros se estienden sobre todo el universo, an de ser sagrados, por quanto nos representan, &c.’

And ends as follows:

‘Contra este perfido Felipe, gran Hipocrita, yncestuoso Rey, nefando Homecida, Ynjusto Usurpador, detestable Tirano, y Monstruo Castellano. Laus Deo.’

An octavo, mostly on paper, though with some parchment leaves, containing ff. 143, with 32 lines in a page. Written in the xvth century.

1. ff. 1—115. ‘THOMAS WALEYS DE MODO COMPONENTI SERMONES.’

Begins (after the preface, ‘Reverendo, &c. Theobaldo de Ursinis, &c. Desiderium vestrum...’):

Cum predicacionis officium sit pocius angelicum quam humanum ...

Ends (f. 111 b):

...pro me insuper fratre Galfrido Schale misso peccatore exoro quod preces pie porrigat uti ad summum gaudium ipsum et me deus omnipotens precibus sue matris ac sancti doctoris augustini patris nostri finaliter perducat. Amen. Finis.

Galfridus Schale was probably the scribe of the MS.

This is followed by a sermon on the text ‘Redde quod debes. Matt. xviii. [28].’

Thomas Walcys or Gualensis died in 1340. See Tanner, *Biblioth.* p. 750, who refers to this MS.

2. ff. 116—127. *A Theological Treatise on various Vices and Virtues*: imperfect.

Begins:

*De Superbia. Vesica inflata dum ungitur...*

Ends :

...amicos invenit alium quem...

3. ff. 128—143. *An explanatory index of things alphabetically arranged.*

Begins :

Angelus. Purus in natura...

Ends :

Vultur...in cadaveribus sociatur, pedibus libenter graditur.

This consists chiefly of several properties of each word that is explained. In f. 115 occurs the name W. Worde.

A quarto, on paper\* (with two leaves of parchment at the end), in good preservation, containing 181 leaves, with from 32 to 35 lines in a page, written in hands of the former half of the xvth century; the initial letters, through nearly all the book, are blue, ornamented with red, and the paragraphs are marked in red and blue. There are 'signatures' nearly throughout, upon the left-hand corner of the leaves, in sets of alternate sixes, as in a duodecimo.

Wilkins collated the Constitutions in this volume, and refers to it as the *MS. Elien. n. 235*, it being at that time in Bishop Moore's Library, and bearing that number in Moore's Catalogue\*. He has for the most part noticed the variations as far as No. 21 in the following description.

I. CONSTITUTIONES PROVINCIALES ANGLICANÆ.

1. 'Constituciones provinciales in concilio Oxon celebrato edite per dnm Stephanum [Langton] Cantuar. Archiepiscopum Anno Dni MCCXXXII., et Anno Regni Regis Henrici, filii Johannis, octavo.'

2. 'Constituciones dni Bonifacii Archiep. Cant. in concilio Westmon.'

3. 'Constituciones seu declaraciones de Redyng edite ibidem per fratrem Johannem Peccham Cantuar. Archiep. A.D. MCLXXIX. super certis articulis prius editis in conciliis Oxon.'

4. 'Constituciones provinciales dni Roberti Wynchelsey Cantuar. Archiep. apud Merton edite A.D. MCCCLX.'

Only 4 Articles are given here. Wilkins assigns 1305 as the date of this council, but does not note the variation.

\* In Cat. Vol. I. p. 390, it was erroneously said that Dd. ix. 38, was the MS. which Wilkins collated and referred to as above.

5. 'Constitutiones de Lameth per dnm Stephanum Cantuar. Archiep. edite, et in quibus libris habentur iste constitutiones ante constitutiones de Merton de modo dandi mortuarium.'

Spelman and Wilkins ascribe these Constitutions to Stephen Langton, but Johnson (*English Laws and Canons*) gives reasons for assigning them to Simon Langham.

6. 'Constitutiones Fratris Johannis Peccham Cant. Archiep. apud Lameth edite, A. D. MCCLXXVI.'

In the last article of these Constitutions they are dated vi. Id. Oct. MCCLXXXI., which date is given in the printed copies.

7. 'Constitutio Johannis Peccham, secundum aliquos libros, de mutando crismate singulis annis.'

This is the second of certain statutes of Peccham, dated 1280, given in Wilkins (ii. 43) 'ex MS. Colleg. Baliol. Oxon.'

8. 'Constitutiones dni Simonis Mepham Cant. Archiep. in concilio provinciali apud S. Paulum London celebrato, A. D. MCCCXXVII.'

9. 'Constitutiones provinciales, secundum libros aliquos, Johannis Stratford Cant. Archiep. edite London in concilio provinciali xx° die Octobr. A. D. MCCCXLII.'

Wilkins gives Oct. 10 as the date of these, but makes no note of the variation.

10. 'Celebratum concilium apud Westmon. tempore Ricardi Archiep. Cant. A. D. MLXV.'

Wilkins gives as the date of this council, 1175, and notes the variation from this MS. It is a manifest error on the part of the writer of the MS., as *Stigand* was Abp. of Canterbury in 1065.

11. 'Constitutiones provinciales Sti Edmundi Cant. Archiep.'

12. 'Constitutiones provinciales dni Stephani Mepham Archiep. Cant. edite apud Lameth.'

The scribe has committed another palpable error here. Mepham's name was *Simon*, and he is so called in an earlier part of this MS. Wilkins ascribes none of these Constitutions to Mepham. The first six he attributes to Abp. Raynold, mentioning in a note that Spelman and the Lambeth MS. give them to Mepham; and in reference to this MS. he says, 'Codex Eliensis, n. 235, autem Stephano (Langton) Archiep. Cantuar. attribuit.' Wilkins was evidently led into this mistake by the scribe having written Stephen for Simon, and he has supplied Langton in brackets, as if the Christian name only had been given in the MS, whereas *Mepham* is plainly written both in the text and in the margin.

13. 'Constitutiones Roberti de Wynchelsey, et secundum quosdam, Simonis Yslep, Archiepiscoporum Cant.'

Only one article is given, 'Quid parochiani invenire debeant, et quid rectores.'

14. 'Constitutiones dni Simonis Yslep quondam Cant. Archiep.'



15. 'De juramento sacerdotum et obedientia rectoribus et vicariis prestandis, etc., ex constitutione dni Roberti Wynchelsey Cant. Archiep. facta in visitacione, A. D. MCCCv.'

16. 'Constitutiones Johannis Stratford Cant. Archiep. edite A. D. MCCCLXXX. die Marc. [Mercurii] proxima post festum Sti Edwardi, in ecclesia Sti Pauli London.'

Wilkins gives 1342 as the date of this council, but makes no note of the variation.

17. 'De collacione officii aquebaculatus' [holy-water beadle].

This is the 29th article of the Synod held at Exeter, April 16, 1287, by Bishop Quivil. See Wilkins, II. 147.

18. 'De decimis lactis solvendis a primo tempore innovacionis, et aliis tam de proventibus boscorum warentorum quam artificiorum.'

This is not in Wilkins. Johnson, following Lyndwood, ascribes it to Abp. Winchelsey, and gives it as the sixth article at Merton, A. D. 1305. Spelman assigns it to Abp. Mepham, A. D. 1332.

19. 'Constitutio dni Roberti Wynchelsey Cant. Archiep. de stipendiariis presbyteris, innovata per dnm Courtenay Cant. Archiep.' Et 'Litera directa ad exequendum dictam constitutionem.'

20. 'Constitutiones provinciales per reverendum in Christo patrem dnm Thomam [Arundel] Cant. Archiep. in concilio Oxon edite, A. D. MCCCvii.'

Wilkins gives 1403 as the date of these Constitutions, and notes the variation.

21. 'Constitutio dni Simonis Islep Cant. Archiep. de stipendiariis presbyterorum perochialium.'

This is the re-enactment of the Constitution at Gloucester by Abp. Sudbury, 16 Nov. 1378.

22. 'Constitutio dni Rogeri Walden Cant. Archiep. super indicione festorum David, et Cedde, et Wenefede, et commemoracione Sti Pauli.'

23. 'Constitutio dni pape Urbani [VI.] pro festo Ste Anne matris Mario celebrando.'

24. 'Constitutio facta pro festis celebrandis.'

This is dated at Lambeth 13 Decr. 1362, that is, in the archiepiscopate of Simon Islip, to whom Spelman refers it; but Wilkins ascribes it to Simon Mepham in 1332.

25. 'Constitutio dni Roberti Wynchelsey Cant. Archiep. de abjuracione concubinarum.'

26. 'Constitutiones domini Henrici Chichele Cantuar. Archiep. facte in concilio provinciali celebrato London in ecclesia Sti Pauli [1<sup>o</sup> die] mensis Octobr. A. D. MCCCxiv.'

Wilkins records this Synod (ex Reg. Chicheley, f. 126), but does not speak of any Constitutions passed in it. Some of these articles he gives as emanating from Chicheley in other years.

## II. EXTRAVAGANTES.

1. 'Extravegans Bonifacii VIII. Quod nullus locus auctoritate ordinaria vel delegata supponatur ecclesiastico interdicto pro debito pecuniario, nisi de Apostolice sedis licencia speciali. Dat. Auvinon die Ascensionis Domini Pont. nostri, anno viii.'

2. 'Extravegans Urbani IV.' Ad evitandas lites et contenciones inter rectores ecclesiarum super decimis animalium.

3. 'Extravegans Johannis Pape XXII. De secundis nupciis.' 'De numero sacramentorum.'

Upon the back of the f. on which the last named article ends is a list of six cases in which absolution can only be obtained by dispensation from the Apostolic See. Also 'Modus celebrandi Synodus,' in 6 lines.

Upon one side of a fly-leaf which follows is,

'De Absolucionem Solemni et ejus forma.'

The last two are in a different handwriting, but of about the same date as the body of the book.

Then follows an Alphabetical Table of the principal matters in the Constitutions, upon 18 leaves, in a different handwriting, and paler ink, at the end of which is written in the same hand and ink, 'Ex' [explicit] in vigil. Ste Anne A° Dni mccccxxxii.

G[loria] D[eo] S[oli].'

III. 'CANONES PROVINCIALES DE PENITENTIIS ET REMISSIONIBUS.'

IV. 'TABULA JOHANNIS ATON SUPER CONSTITUCIONES DOMINORUM OTHONIS ET OTTOBONIS LEGATORUM DNI PAPE.'

Aton (de Aton, or de Athon) was a canon of Lincoln about the close of the xiiith century, and wrote a Gloss upon the Legatine Constitutions (to which this is the Table), which has been often printed.

V. 'ARTICULI IN QUIBUS ARCHIDIACONI HABENT INQUIRERE IN VISITACIONE SUA.'

VI. DE ABSOLUCIONE.

VII. DE ABBATE, ABATHIA, ET ABATISSA.

An octavo, on parchment, containing ff. 125, with 28 lines in each page. It had illuminated initials, but they are mostly cut away. Date, the xvth century.

PSALTERIUM CUM CANTICIS, VIGILLE MORTUORUM, &c.

The Psalter begins f. 1 with Ps. i. 2, 'et in lege ejus med[itabitur],' half the leaf being cut away with the initial letter, and ends f. 88; then follow

the Canticles and Litany. In f. 102 begin the *Vigiliæ Mortuorum*, in f. 114 'Commendatio animarum,' and in f. 115 'Incipiunt matutine de sancto spiritu;' after which, f. 123, the MS. ends with a prayer in English in a later hand, 'O the moder of God, the virgyn of virgynse, scheu to me thy moste sweetest sone,' &c.

A leaf is lost between ff. 111 and 112.

A small quarto, on parchment, containing ff. 177, in double columns of 27 lines. There are catchwords after every 8th leaf. Date, the xvth century.

THE EPISTLES, ACTS, CATHOLICK EPISTLES AND APOCALYPSE IN WYCLIFFE'S LATER VERSION, with the usual prologues.

It is defective at the commencement, beginning Rom. viii. 35, 'or perel or swerd as it is writen.' A hand of the xvth century has supplied from 2 Thess. ii. 10 to Acts vii. 17, a considerable portion of which is on paper.

At the end, in a hand of the xviiith century, is written: 'Memorandum that I tooke M<sup>r</sup> Jones vi<sup>t</sup> in pawne for this book, to be paid agayne when I bring him to his shoppe agayne, & I to pay him j<sup>d</sup> a daye so long as I have him, the xxj<sup>th</sup> of June. Richard Jones.'

See Forshall and Madden's edition of Wycliffe's Bible, Oxon. 1850, T. i. p. liv.

A small quarto, on vellum, containing ff. 293, in double columns of 30 lines. Date, the xvth century.

The remaining four leaves are occupied by an index.

First printed Reutlingæ, 1473. It is in Migne's *Patrologia*, Par. 1855. A former possessor was William Walker, S. T. B. 1626. See f. 289.

An octavo, on parchment, containing ff. 141, with 16 lines in each page. It has a few illuminated initials and borders. Date, about 1400.

HORÆ BEATÆ MARIÆ VIRGINIS.

The Kalendar occupies ff. 3—9, and the Hours begin as usual f. 10, the Penitential Psalms follow f. 62, the 15 Psalms f. 74, Litany f. 78, *Vigiliæ*

Mortuorum f. 88, and the Commendatio animarum f. 104, with which the MS. ends f. 140 a.

In the Kalendar are notices of the marriage of Thomas Derham with Isabell Pagnell, whose father was John Pagnell, Esq. and mother the daughter of Phyllyppe Tylney, the births of their children, their deaths and of others of the Pagnell family, in the reigns of Henry VII. and VIII.

On f. 2 is written, 'Est liber iste mei Frederici de Tilney,' and on the fly-leaves at both ends are accounts relating to lands in a hardly legible hand.

This is followed on f. 118 b by a list of the titles of our Lord, and a letter of Alexander VI. 1493. id. April. pontif. anno primo.

In f. 16 is a form of a letter of commendation from one rector to another of a member of his flock, stating that he and his wife had confessed once in Lent, and paid his tithes in full. On f. 22 is an exhortation to confession in a very minute hand in English. On f. 28 b is a testimonial to a pilgrim, with the date 1494 in a later hand; f. 104 gives the 'Wylys of kyng farrowe' in English.

## 2. ff. 119—153. GESTA ROMANORUM.

Begins :

Anselmus in civitate romana regnavit...

Ends :

...propter que relinquimus et pervenire ad eternum bravium poterimus ad quod, &c.

This is the 'English' Gesta, which though frequently printed in English, is still unprinted in Latin. See Dunlop's *History of Fiction*, II. p. 170.

Ends (imperfect):

A leaf is lost between ff. 91 and 92, where probably a third book begins. There are other extracts in verse in the body of the treatise, and at the end are 12 lines beginning :

## 1. A BOOK OF TENURES.

This was printed in London in 1532, by Rob. Redman, with the title of 'The old Tenures,' and is like that in Gg. vi. 7.

## 2. A short FRENCH ACCIDENCE AND VOCABULARY.

## 3. 'CURIA BARONIS, ET ECIAM REGALIS.'

The former contains some account of the proceedings in Courts Baron; the latter contains instructions for pleadings in the superior courts.

## 4. 'BREVIÀ ORIGINALIA ET OFFICIALIA JUDICIALIA, PER JOHANNEM STAFFORD DE TOLSTON IN COMITATU EBOR.'

This title is supplied from the Colophon. The Tract was several times printed anonymously by the early printers under the title of 'Natura Brevium.' See Gg. vi. 7, where it occurs also anonymously.

A 12mo, on vellum, containing ff. 538, in double columns, with 52 lines in each column. There are a few illuminated initials. Date, the xivth century.

## BIBLIA VULGATA SANCTI HIERONYMI.

After 4 blank leaves and the usual prologues, Genesis begins f. 8, the initial I representing the creation in 7 miniature compartments. St Matthew begins f. 391, and the books occur in the usual order except that the Acts comes after the Epistle to the Hebrews. The Revelation ends f. 490 b, and is followed by the explanatory index of Hebrew names. The leaves are numbered throughout, and a list of the books with reference to these numbers is inserted at the end of the MS.

An octavo, on parchment, with a few leaves on paper, containing ff. 77, with 25 lines in each page. It has red and blue initial letters, and musical notes. Date, the xivth century.

A mutilated MISSALE, formerly belonging to the church of RYKEL.

The original MS. begins, f. 9, in the middle of the Canon :

Quam oblationem tu olens in omnibus...

a later hand having inserted on paper, ff. 5-8, the earlier portion of the Canon. In f. 21 the same hand begins on paper the 'Officium pro defunctis in presentia funeris,' the parchment MS. beginning again f. 29. The rest of the MS. is occupied by the offices for various saints' days and other feasts, the last being 'in die omnium sanctorum,' which ends f. 68.

On the fly-leaves, at the beginning and end, are various documents respecting the church of Rykel, the 'Condicio fratrum presbiterorum,' 'Registrum benefactorum,' a list of the persons belonging to the guild (bruderscap) of St Anne, mostly in Dutch of the xvth century.

At the foot of f. 74 it is stated, that on Feb. 18, 1521, while the exequies of Henry Stultetus were being celebrated, a loud voice was heard crying 'ad modum morbi sancti Egidii,' though no one could be seen in or out of the church.

## 1. BIBLIA VULGATA SANCTI HIERONYMI.

On three fly-leaves, at the commencement, are written part of a sermon on Christian duties in English, of the xivth century, and on the same page reversed a mention of an edict of Gregory X. 'in the pride 3er of his popehed, at þe conceyl of Lugdune,' 1272, respecting tithes: various extracts from the works of St Augustine, the Creed with each sentence assigned to one of the

Apostles, and the corresponding prophetic allusion, a note 'de ymaginibus ecclesie,' and the 'venalitas in quibusdam ecclesiis.'

The Bible begins, f. 4, in the middle of the prologue:

...hoc legem deputant [sic]: nec scire dignantur quid prophete...

Genesis begins f. 6; and the books occur in the usual order of the Vulgate. Maccabees ends f. 268 *b*, and the whole of St Matthew and St Mark as far as c. ix. 22, 'possibilia sunt credenti,' is torn out; there is also a gap from 1 Cor. x. 14, 'Propter quod karissimi mihi...' to 1 Tim. iv. 1, ['dæmo]niorum in ypocrisi loquentium mendacium.' The Acts occurs after the Epistle to the Hebrews; and the Revelation ends f. 316 *b*. The index of Hebrew names occupies ff. 319—336. There are many scholia in a minute hand, and in the Psalms, many of the ecclesiastical hymns are written in the margin with the dates prefixed when they are to be used.

## 2. MISSALE.

The canon Missæ is inserted immediately after the Revelation, the 'Te igitur...' being preceded by the Invocations to be used on particular days, beginning with that in Nativitate domini, and ending with the prefatio de Trinitate. The directions in the canon are very full, and differ from all given by Maskell. The offices begin as usual with Advent Sunday, 'Ad te levavi...', f. 336 *a*; they are written in 3 columns, after which each page contains 2 columns only.

The Kalendar occurs, ff. 350, 351, occupying 3 pages after the offices for the Sundays after Trinity; that for the vigil of St Andrew begins the Sanctoriale, f. 352, which ends with St Katharine, f. 360, when the Commune Sanctorum follows, ending, f. 367 *b*, with the 'Officium de beata virgine maria in tempore paschali.'

In f. 350 *a* is written in English a recipe to make 'god ynke.'

A moderate sized octavo, partly on vellum, partly on paper, consisting of 192 leaves, mostly in double columns (except from fol. 149—156, which seem to be written by another hand), each column containing between 40 and 50 lines neatly written in a hand of the XIVth century, which however is often difficult to decypher from the great number of contractions. The capitals are rubricated, and occasionally ornamented, but in a bad style of art. Various marginal notes occur up and down the MS., which is on the whole in good condition. The first three leaves are reversed, and contain scraps about the alphabet, &c., and also a précis (in a contemporary hand) of the contents of the volume. The titles of the works are mostly taken from their colophons, and from the précis.

This work is mentioned by Pits. *de ill. Angl. Ser.* p. 612. For a notice of this once famous grammarian (who died 1428) see Fabr. *Bibl. Med. et Inf. Lat.* s. v. None of his works seem to have been printed.

At the beginning is a table of contents, from which some of the titles in the following

description have been taken. In the margin of the first page of the first Tract is a shield bearing these Italian arms, Party per pale, az. and ar., a pile reversed counterchanged.

ff. 57—69. Seven Readings of Ambrose Gilbert, upon the Statute 34 and 35 HEN. VIII. c. 5, on Wills.

Gilbert is not mentioned in Dugdale.

ff. 71—80. Eleven Readings of Mr Blanchard upon the Statutes 32 and 34 HEN. VIII., on Wills.

Blanchard was Reader in the Middle Temple, 23 ELIZ. (*Dugd.*)

ff. 107—119. Eight Readings of Mr Bell, upon the Statute 21 HEN. VIII. c. 19, on Avowries.

The names and arguments of some of the Moot-men (Fleetwood, Farmer, and Nicholls,) are given.

Robert Bell (afterwards Chief Baron of the Exchequer) was Reader in the Middle Temple, 7 ELIZ. (*Dugd.*)

ff. 121—126. Five Readings of Mr Dyer, upon the Statute 34 HEN. VIII., on Wills.

James Dyer (afterwards successively Chief Justice of the King's Bench and Common Pleas,) was Reader in the Middle Temple, 6 EDW. VI. (*Dugd.*)

2. REPORTS OF CASES ADJUDGED BETWEEN 24 ELIZ. AND 4 CHARLES I., chiefly in the King's Bench, a few in the Common Pleas, Exchequer, and Star-Chamber.

Between the Readings of Blanchard and Bell (ff. 83—106) are some cases adjudged between 27 and 33 ELIZ., amongst which is Chudley's case, and that of *Harris v. Winge*. READINGS OF SIR FRANCIS MOORE IN THE MIDDLE TEMPLE, 5 JAMES I., upon the Statute 43 ELIZ. c. 7, an Act to redress the misemployment of lands, &c., given to charitable uses,—in 8 divisions. To them is prefixed, ‘My speach at the beginninge.’

These Readings appear to be throughout in the handwriting of the author, and were edited (abridged by himself) in 1676 by George Duke, of the Middle Temple, Esq., who has erroneously dated their delivery 4 JAMES I. Moore was in Parliament in the 43rd year of ELIZABETH, and is said to have drawn up the Act which is the subject of his Readings. He died in 1621. See Wood's *Athenæ Oxon.*

At the beginning of the volume are two leaves of curious notes by Moore, in which he says he ‘began his Readings on Mondaye, 3<sup>o</sup> August, 1607, Anno 5<sup>o</sup> Jac., and ended them the 14 August, in respect the plague much increased, the certificate beinge 77.’ He gives the names of the Benchers who were his assistants, amongst whom was Sir Henry Montague; the names of the ‘Cubbardmen’ assigned to him; of the utter barristers called by him; of the stewards of his feast; of those admitted to the house in his Readings, amongst whom were his eldest, second, and third sons; of the Readers in the other Inns of Court; of the preachers upon 8 August, ‘the daye of the Kinge’s delivery from the treason of Earl Gowrey in Scotland.’ He enumerates the Gifts at his Readings, with the names of the donors. These consisted of 6 hoggesheads of wyne, at the cost of £6. 5s. per hhd.; £44 in money, in sums varying from £10 to 20s.; 26 loaves of sugar; 24lbs of pepper; 3 firkins and 2 kegs of sturgeon; 7 swannes; 4 cakes of salmon; 13 trowtes; 5 marchpanes; 22 chickens; 68 capons; 14 pullets; 16 tirkeis; 22 partridges; 1 fesant; 1 pehenn; 5 geese; 26 quails; 5 dosen pigeons; a fatt shepe; a fatt lambe; a banbury cake; and 18 cheses.

Upon a slip of paper found loose in the book, and now pasted in at the end, is a memorandum that the writer, ‘Thomas Pacy the elder, had dely-



vered to Wylyyam a Powell the deeds of two houses in Bristow, held of the Abbot and Convent of Tewkysbery, he (Pacy) being so byssy that he was unable to apere by for the ummage at the Corte: dated 4 Dec. [blank year] HEN. VIII.'

They are printed in the Camden Society's Publication for 1841 (page 77), among the Latin Poems commonly attributed to Walter Mapes, with the title ‘Goliath de conjugio non ducenda.’ They consist of 192 lines, but in the printed copy they extend to 212, and there are a great many various readings. Mr Wright, the editor, mentions several MS. copies, but does not notice this. A French imitation of it, of the beginning of the 14th century, and an English one, of the 15th century, are printed by the Camden Society in the same volume.

These are followed by 40 lines of verses of similar construction, which begin :

He was grandfather of the first Lord Boston; see Pishey Thompson's *History of Boston*.

#### THE *Brute* CHRONICLE OF ENGLAND, TO THE 12TH YEAR OF HENRY VI.

It has neither title nor colophon. There are three prefatory chapters: the first begins :

'The first inhabytynge of the lande how women first inhabit it. And after that BRUTE inhabit it, and conquered the giauntes...'

In this chapter the authorship of the Chronicle is thus alluded to: 'This booke compiled grete clerks, as Abbotes and Piores, and men of religion.' And it speaks of 132 kings to Edward III., so that the Chronicle originally ended with that reign.

The second chapter begins :

'The prologe of this booke declareth how this lande was callid Albion after the eldest daughter of the Royall Kyng Dioclecian, the which was called Albyne...'

The third chapter begins :

'Some tyme in the lande of Surrey there was a myghty and a roial kyng callid Dioclisian ..'

And ends on page 4, with this rubric :

'Her endith the prolog of this boke, And how Brute was begoten, And how the lande was callid Albion, now ye shal here of the susters, how thei demenyd theme.'

The first chapter of the Chronicle begins on page 4 :

‘ In the noble cite of grete Troy there was a noble knyght...’

It ends with chapter 287, ‘ How the Duke of Bedford and his Wife went into Normandy.’

At the end of this chapter is written ‘ Chapter 228,’ as if the Chronicle had been continued later, but this is erased with a pen, apparently in the same ink as the body of the MS. ; and at the bottom of the page the word *fnis*, cut from a printed book, has been pasted.

The story relative to the death of king John by poison is related in chapter 160; and after chapter 247, which gives an account of the siege of Rouen in 1418 (with which most of the copies of this Chronicle end), is part of the old English poem on that siege, the whole of which was communicated to the Society of Antiquaries by Sir Fred. Madden, and printed in the twenty-second volume of the *Archæologia*. In this MS the poem begins at verse 1161 of the printed copy, and is continued to the end.

See a Dissertation upon this Chronicle by Sir Fred. Madden (who considers it a translation from the French), in his Introduction to *Havelok the Dane*, edited for the Roxburghe Club ; and more recently, with additions, in *Notes and Queries*, Vol. I. second series, pp. 1—4.

On the upper margin of the first page is written, ‘ This olde Cronicle was given to me Jasper Bridgeman of Exceter by M<sup>r</sup> John Pylle of the same Citty in December, A.D. 1594.’ And : ‘ Tho. Bridgeman me possidet, A.D. 1617.

#### THE FOUR GOSPELS IN GREEK.

Written very clearly throughout, almost without contractions. The writing varies considerably in different parts of the volume, but the gradation is complete. The iota subscript is not used. The text does not appear to differ from the Constantinopolitan family of MSS. generally, but the great carelessness of the scribe has introduced a number of obviously accidental variations; especially unintelligible omissions. Some of these have been supplied by a modern hand, which has likewise numbered the chapters and verses, and written on the first and last blank leaves. On 1 b an older hand has written 'Poyntz. dominus regit me et nihil mihi deerit.'

At the end are lists of the chapters of the first three Gospels, with prefaces to S. Mark and S. Luke, chiefly from Theophylact.

This MS. does not appear to have been examined by any editor, unless it be No. 443 of Scholz, which he describes thus, 'Cantabrig. ol. Askew.'

The material of the MS. is paper, not parchment: but Scholz likewise has 'membr.' in the notice of his 441 ( $\psi$  2622), which is merely Hervagius's edition of 1545 with MS. notes. It is however at least equally probable that the word 'Cantab.' was inserted at random, from a vague impression that 'Askew.' denoted a College in Cambridge. Scholz in like manner (p. cxi.) includes a 'Lambeth' MS., the *Codex Ephesius*, under 'Cantabrigienses.'

Gregorii, pro infirmis, pregnantibus,' etc., the last being 'In commemoracione omnium Sanctorum Officium.'

Poet.* (ed. 1840) II. 368, the translator is said to have been 'William of Nassyngtone,' and the true author, 'freere Johan of Waldby,' an opponent of the Wycliffites. Possibly one of Hampole's Latin prose treatises may have supplied the original basis of the work.

The following entry on the first page and in the same handwriting contains the formal approbation of the University of Cambridge, and throws some light on the history of the poem :

'Anno Domini mccc<sup>mo</sup> octogesimo quarto, compilacio ista hoc modo Cantebr. erat examinata, dum a quodam sacerdote ad ligandum ibidem fuit posita, a quibusdam scolaribus erat intuita atque perfecta et cancellario Universitatis eiusdem consilio presentata propter defectus et hereses<sup>1</sup> examinanda, ne minus literati populum per eam negligenter fallant et varios errores negligenter inducant. Tunc jussu Cancellarii coram eo et toto consilio Universitatis per quatuor dies cum omni studio et diligentia fuit examinata atque in omni colegio vndique comprobata. Die quinto omnibus doctoribus utriusque iuris et magistris theologie, cum Cancellario, dicentibus et affirmantibus eam de sacris legibus et libris divinis bene ac subtiliter tractatam et ex autoritate omnium doctorum sacre pagine sapienter allegatam, id est affirmatam necnon et fundatam. Ideo quicumque fueris, O lector, hanc noli contempnere, quia sine dubio si aliqui defectus in ea inventi fuissent, coram Universitate Cantebr. combusta fuisset.'

On fol. 226 *b* occurs the following trace of ownership : '3e þat redo þis boke or here it redde, I pray 3ow praith for Sir Roberte soule, and alle cristen soulis, þ<sup>t</sup> gaf þis boke to þis place : for wo so praith for anoþer laburse for hym selfe and schal haue grete mede.'

And on a blank page at the end of the volume the precise date of the MS. appears to be given : 'In die sanctorum Crispini et Crispiniani [Oct. 25] incepti, et 3<sup>o</sup> die post sanetam Annunciationem beate Marie [March 28] finem habui, 1<sup>o</sup> dom. 1423<sup>o</sup>.'

On a fly-leaf at the end is a note dated May 25, 1628, comparing the two houses of Parliament to the summit and foot of Mount Sinai where the law was given, Exod. xxxi. 18.

The present copy appears to be identical with one sent by Ælfred to Wulfsgie, bishop of Sherborne, (cf. Wright's *Biograph. Britan.* i. 393, 394).

It was presented to Archbishop Parker in 1568, and by him to the University of Cambridge. The originals of two letters addressed to Parker by Bishop Jewel in January 1568 [1569] are preserved at the end of the volume, and printed among Jewel's *Works*, ed. Jelf, VIII. 193, 194. From the earlier of them we learn that the present MS. was discovered by Jewel in his 'poore librarie of Sarisburie.'

A folio, in parchment, of the XIV<sup>th</sup> century, containing at present 101 leaves. The several treatises bound together in this volume are all medical. Most of them are imperfect. The number of lines in a page is various.

Various MSS. of the apparently unedited commentary of Remigius on Priscian are extant, which was anciently used in Cambridge (see Craik, *Lit. and Learn. in Engl.* Vol. i. p. 53): whether this commentary be his must be determined by comparison. See Fabric. *Bibl. med. et inf. Lat.* s. v. *Remigius*, Vol. vi. p. 187.

This cannot possibly be a treatise of Aristotle's, notwithstanding the opening sentence: for the word *Constantinopoli* occurs at fol. 194 *a*, col. 2, where mention is also made of *Terra Romanorum* (i. e. the Lower Empire) thus: *Exitus Tygris est ab oriente terræ Romanorum et aggregatur cum Euphrate sub Bagdeb et cadit in mare Persicum.* The occurrence of the name of Bagdad here (in a crude form) makes it not altogether unlikely that this is a Latin version of some Arabic commentator on Aristotle's Physical works: but the number of those who wrote on them is very large. (See Weise's Ed. pp. 1015, 1016.) Probably this work may be the same as the '*De proprietatibus elementorum,*' for which see Fabric. *Bibl. Gr. Vol. III. p. 280. Harl.*

Ascribed by some to Alexander Neckham. See Coxe, *Cdt. Cod. Oxon.* pp. 39, 40. (C. C. C.) At the end, in a later hand (of the xvth century?), is a disquisition about 'corpora cœlestia,' occupying about two columns.

The table of contents is in a hand of the XVth century. The author's name appears in the Explicit. ‘Explicit tractatus de proprietatibus secundum Fratrem Batholomeum Anglicum de ordine fratrum minorum.’

This very beautiful volume formerly belonged to Archbishop Parker, 1547. The Greek quotations in the work are written in characters phonetically imitated from the uncial.

‘CHRONICA QUE DICUNTUR CHESTER,’ RANULPHI HIGDEN.

The parts of this work relating to English History, up to the Conquest, are printed in Gale’s *Hist. Angl. Script.* Vol. i. p. 179. For the rest he says, ‘Inferiora jam pridem in manus eruditorum pervenerant,’ alluding probably to Trevisa’s translation for Caxton. At the end of the first paragraph of the 43rd Chap. Lib. vii. p. 297, in the text, appears, *Explicit Historia*, but the work goes on afterwards in the same handwriting. A marginal note (xv<sup>th</sup> century) observes here, ‘Nota quæ sequuntur in codice isto et altero diversos habuerunt scriptores, ut in hac proxima sententia plane cernitur de *Morte Edw. II.*’ There is also a note *ex vetere quodam libro* concerning the author in the margin of p. 299, stating that he continued the history *usque ad tempora Ed. Reg. III. post conquestum*, making the work to consist of seven books *ad exemplum primi Opificis*. In the present copy there are eight books (the last brief), and the history is continued to 1381, ending:

Mense Martii ejusdem Anni Dominus Thomas Hatfield Episcopus Dunelmensis moritur senex multorum dierum.

On the second fly-leaf is the following: *Presentem C[h]ronicam conpilavit frater Ranulphus Cestrensis Monachus*, with numerals in order over every letter, and the following note: 'Hic titulus textitur ex literis initialibus capitum Primi Libri; et vulgo vocatur Pelichronicon sive Policraticon.' Through the annotator's blunder in inserting and numbering the *h* in *Chronicam*, the numeration is false. Of the first eighteen pages three are blank, and the others contain the Table of Contents.

This is one of the volumes given to the library by Archbishop Parker.

From an old table of contents on a fly-leaf at the beginning, it appears that this volume formerly contained several other treatises.

The two final fly-leaves consist of pages of Philosophical Dicta, written in the xvth century, with a very wide margin. The names of former owners of the volume are Wylhelmus Chausey, Wylhelmus Martyn and Johannes Rant, 'olim collegii Gon. & Cai. socius dignissimus,' who presented it to the Library in 1655. Thence it passed to archbishop Parker, who received it from 'Franciscus comes Bedfordiæ 29<sup>o</sup> Decemb. anno 1567 in camera stellata' (p. 602). The archbishop presented it to the University of Cambridge in 1574.

An 'index rerum' is appended to the volume, probably the work of Wheloc.

The author states that he was sent by the Emperor Frederick to Manuel Emperor of Constantinople, and that he collected his Greek authorities there: when he returned into Germany, he shewed these 'Petro, venerabili Tusculano episcopo,' who expressed his surprise that these works were unknown to one so well skilled in Greek as Gisilbert, Bp. of Poitiers. Anselm, Bp. of Havelberg, was sent on the above embassy in 1153. See *Otto de Gestis Frederic. I. Imp.* in the *Germanici Scriptores Urstisii*, Francofurt. 1585, p. 451. For an account of him and his writings, see Oudin, ii. col. 1428. He died Bishop of Ravenna.

Ends:

...by the dyscourse followinge shal bee mad manefeste.

The Discourse begins:

Ends:

...admytte and receive him to the Succession of the kingdome.

3. ff. 41—48 a. ‘*A Booke conteyninge a declaration of the Succession of the Crowne Imperiall of England.*’

Begins:

III. ff. 49—63. ‘*Of the Election of the Kinge of Poland, December, 1632, by waie of letter, dated ut supra.*’

Begins :

My laste unto you was the thirteenth day of December : Nowe these are to lett you understand of some passages concerning the Election of the Kinge of Poland...

Ends :

...God in his good time will send a man, that shall roote uppe this generation of Locusts from the face of the earth.

This is a familiar description of the journey of the writer and Mr Gourden from Dantzic to Warsaw, with an account of the proceedings at the election of Vladislas VII.

In a fresh handwriting,

IV. ff. 64—119. ‘*A Record or memoriall of divers excellent Orations and pollitique Consultacions in manie exigents and waightie points of state, delivered at sundry times, and upon severall occasions, by that famous Councillor to Queene Elizabeth, SIR NICHOLAS BACON, Knight, Lord Keeper of the Greate Seale of England.*’

1. ff. 65—68. ‘An Oration made by the Lord Keeper to the Queene’s Majestie in her Gallerie at Westminster, exhorting her to marriage.’

Begins :

May it please your Majestie to understand, that all my Lords here present, and all the rest, both Spiritual and Temporal...

Ends :

...and on th’other side, If I have performed my Commaundement, that see they would affirme it.

This, though not mentioned in the journals, was probably delivered upon the occasion of presenting the petition of the Lords, Nov. 10, 1566. See *Parl. Hist. of England*, I. 710.

2. f. 68 b. ‘The Answer given in the Queene’s presence to the Lord Maior, when hee was presented.’

Begins :

The Queene’s Majestie hath heard, and doeth very well understand, your humble suite and petition...

Ends :

...nor you, my Lord Maior, in receiveinge the charge, nor your brethren the Aldermen, in their election.

3. f. 69. 'His Speech used to a Serjeant at Lawe called to be a Judge.'

Begins :

Mr Serjeant.—Your wisdome and my weaknes requireth fewe words, and in very deed, fewe words bee best remembred...

Ends (after the oath taken, 'upon the deliverie of the pattent'):

...reward for the execucion of the same, as ever happened to anie that ever occupied this place.

4. ff. 70—75. 'An Oration made to the Queene's Majestie by the Lord Keeper concerninge her marriage and the succession of the Crowne.'

Begins:

...Soe, for duties' sake, I shall with good contencion enter into such callinge as your Majestie shall commaunde mee.

Begins :

My Lords and Masters.—For that in see greate and waightie a cause as this is...

Ends :

...as upon the first breakers of the treaty betweene both the Realmes.

9. ff. 96—101. 'A Speech used by the Lord Keeper in Councell in the end of Midsomer Terme, 1582 [1562, see Burghley's *State Papers*, pp. 388—393], when it was brought in question whether the Enterviewe betweene the Queene's Majestie and the Scottish Queene were convenient to bee allowed of or not; the effect whereof he spake in July to the Queene att Greenwich.'

Begins :

My Lords.—To my understandinge the best way to judge whether the Enterviewe shall bee good and profitable...

Ends :

And therefore for my part I cannot allowe of it.

10. ff. 102—110. 'A Speech used by the Lord Keeper to the Lords and others assembled in the Parliament house.'

Begins :

My Lords and Masters all.—The Queene's most excellent Majestic, our naturall and most gracious Sovereign Lady...

Ends :

...and for your day of presentation, the Queeno's Majestic giveth you, &c.

Delivered upon the opening of Parliament, Jan. 25, 1558-9, and printed in *Parl. Hist. of England*, I. 637—642.

11. ff. 110—118. 'An Oration made by the Lord Keeper the eight of March, the Parliament then endinge, to the Nobles and Commons, in the presence of the Queene's Majestic.'

Begins :

Mr Speaker.—The Queene's Majestie hath heard you how discreetly and wisly you have declared...

Ends :

...accordinge to the auneyent order shal bee made and declared, as I have saide.

It does not appear that any one of the Parliaments of ELIZABETH ended on the 8th of March. This is given, with very considerable variations, in D'Ewes's *Journals* (p. 151), as the Lord Keeper's Speech at the close of the Session, May 29, 1571. See also *Parl. Hist. of England*, I. 766—772.

12. ff. 118—120. 'The effect of his Speech to Mr Bell, when hee was called to bee Judge, descrybinge the qualitties requisite to bee in a Judge.' [24 Jan. 19 ELIZ.—*Dugdale*.]

Begins :

That the Queene's Majestie, through the good opinion which shee had conceived of Mr Bell...

Ends :

...and satisfyinge her people whom he hath to judg by her authoritie.

This gives the purport only of the speech, in the third person.

Then follow the lines,

Sic puto, sic scripsi: sic vivam, sic volo cuncta :  
Sic mediocere placet. Numquid magis omnia possunt ?  
Des igitur, Deus, hoc medium : mea vota tenebo.

Beneath these is written the name of BACON, apparently an imitation of his autograph.

This is a work on Natural History in general, in eight books, with pictorial illustrations. The title-page describing the author, &c. is as follows:

'Gia Sylva Hor Giardino Cosmografico Cultivato da Bartholo Sylva Citadino di Turino Medico Phisico et Chyrugico; Per quelli, che non hanno tempo di far longo studio; opera non meno utile, che molto necessaria per conoscere il Mondo, e le eo se continenti in quello; Perche Chi non conosce il Mondo non merita star nel Mondo.'

Here follows a figure, well drawn and coloured, of a man, probably Nebuchadnezzar in the days of his punishment, standing on thorns, and holding a serpent, which is biting his body, looking up at the Sun. The picture is surrounded with a border, containing the words of Ps. cxx. 2, in Hebrew. There is also a portrait, coloured, on a copper engraving, of the Author, in

his 30th year. Among other illustrations is one representing Chaos, a remarkable specimen of colouring, and views or maps of Temistitan, Metropolitana Chiesa della Spagna Nova; and Cusco Metropole del Peru.

The work is preceded by a number of sets of complimentary verses addressed to the Author, in Greek, Latin, Italian, and French, by various personages of rank, and is dedicated to the Earl of Leicester.

ff. 3—8 contain the Kalendar, ff. 20—28 contain commemorations and hymns to the Holy Trinity, the Facies Redemptoris, S. Michael, S. Christopher, SS. John B. and E., S. George, S. Katharine, S. Margaret, and S. Ann, each with an illuminated picture occupying an entire leaf. The Hours



begin f. 30, with before each hour a picture of the Annunciation, Visitation, Nativity, a hermit playing on the bagpipes, f. 43, the Adoration of the Magi, Massacre of the Innocents, Flight into Egypt, and Presentation in the Temple: then f. 56, preceded by an illumination of the B. V. and Child in glory, the hymn, *Salve virgo virginum stella matutina, O Intemerata, the Septem Gaudia*; in f. 65, after a picture of the Crucifixion, the prayers to the Wounds, and Bede's on the Seven Words; f. 71, the Seven penitential Psalms after the usual representation of our Lord with the instruments of the Passion followed by the Litany, and in f. 80, the *Vigiliæ Defunctorum*, and f. 90, the *Commendatio Animarum*; after which the MS. ends, f. 97 *b*, with a prayer about S. Etheldreda.

The MS. formerly belonged to Edmond Roberts (the son of the owner of *Ii. vi. 7, q. v.*), who besides his name in various parts of the book, and hymns and prayers in English and Latin on the blank side of the illuminated pictures, has given a list of Thomas Roberts' 24 children, and the dates of their births, ff. 28, 29.

In f. 27 is a curious 'Oratio bona pro febribus,' beginning:

V., the prayers to the Ymago and Wounds of our Lord, each with a miniature, Bede’s on the Seven Words; f. 97, the penitential Psalms, with the usual illuminations, followed by the fifteen Psalms and Litany; f. 115, the ‘Vigiliæ Mortuorum;’ f. 141, ‘Commendationes Animarum;’ f. 156, the Psalms of the Passion, with the usual illumination; and f. 165, the abbreviated Psalter of S. Jerome, preceded by the usual rubrick and a picture of him, as a young man, with which the MS. ends, f. 177.

This begins on f. 5 *a*, with an illuminated initial and border, facing a picture of St Matthew on 4 *b* (4 *a* was left blank); and ends on 15 *a*; 15 *b* is blank. At the top of f. 5 *a*, outside the border, are the words 'innomine see trinitatis' in the original scribe's handwriting.

3. ff. 16—27. *St Mark* i. 1—v. 35, 'Initium—archisynagoga.' The text begins on f. 17 *a*, with border, &c. as in Nos. 1 and 2, and ends on 27 *b*.

4. ff. 29—40. *St Luke* i. 1—iv. 2, 'Quoniam—diabulo.' The text begins on f. 30 *a*, as the former gospels, and ends half way down 40 *a*; the rest of the page, and 40 *b*, were left blank.

5. ff. 41—86. *St John complete, and the Apostles' Creed.* *St John* begins on f. 42 *a*, as the former gospels, and ends half way down 84 *b*, with the colophon, 'Explicit euangelium secundum iohannem;' the rest of the page is filled up by a rude illumination. On f. 85 *a* is the Creed, and immediately below it the colophon in Gaelic, 'Ferchubus caichduin imbia arrath inle-brán collí aratardda bendacht foranmain intruagain rodscribai.' ff. 85 *b* and 86 *a* are filled with illuminations; 86 *b* is blank.

## II. The concluding portion of a MASS, ACCORDING TO THE ANCIENT SCOTTISH RITE; handwriting, Irish, of the XIth century.

This occupies the *verso* of the inserted leaf 28 (28 *a* is blank), and f. 29 *a*. It contains '*Item oratio ante dominicam orationem.* Creator naturarum...;' the *Post dominicam orationem*, 'Libera nós Domine a malo Amen christe ihesu custodi nos...;' the *Communio*, in the words 'Corpus cum sanguine Domini nostri ihesu christi sanitas sit tibi in vitam perpetuam et salutem,' preceded by a rubric in Gaelic; then the anthem 'Refecti christi...,' and the *Consummatio Missæ*, 'Deus tibi gratias...Finit.' Compare the *Missæ Dominicales* in the *Missale Gothicum* pr. by Thomasi (*Codices Sacramentorum*, Romæ, 1680, 4°); the *Missæ de infirmis* in the Book of Dimma (Betham's *Ir. Ant. Researches*, Dubl. 1826-7, 8°), and Dr Todd's paper on the E. of Ashburnham's Sacramentary, in Vol. XXIII. of the *R. I. A. Transactions*.

## III. A small CARTULARY OF THE CLERICS OF DEER, written by several hands, in GAELIC and LATIN, about the middle of the XIIth century.

1. *Legend of the mission of St Drostan*, beginning, 'Columcille acas drostán mac cósgreg adálta tangator áhí...;' and *list of early grants of lands and immunities*, beginning, 'Cómgeall mac éda dórat úaorti nice fúrené docolumcille acas dodrostán...'. These are both in Gaelic, in one handwriting, and occupy the lower half of f. 3 *a*, 3 *b*, and the upper half of 4 *a*.

3. *Grant of 'Donchad mac mec bead mec hídid,' with names of witnesses*, followed by an account of some more donations; without date, but a few years later than No. 2. These are in Gaelic, in one handwriting, and fill the outer and lower margins of f. 4 *b*.

4. *Grant of 'Colbain mormaer buchan acas eua ingen garnait aben phústa acas donnachac mac sithig toesech elenni morgainn,' with names of witnesses; without date, but shortly after the death of David I. It is in Gaelic, in a handwriting in which additions have been made to Nos. 1 and 3; and fills the outer and lower margins of f. 5 a.*

5. *Grant of David I. to the clerics of Deer, with names of witnesses; dated at Aberdeen, without year, but clearly of the very end of his reign. This is in Latin, in the ordinary character of that date, and was probably written in at the time. It refers to previous grants, 'sicut in libro eorum scribitum est,' probably alluding to the Gaelic entries in this very volume.*

It is believed that no printed copy of Williams's pamphlet exists. A MS. copy is in this Library (Dd. III. 84, § 2), which, however, does not contain the above; but when arrested, a copy was found upon the Author *with new annotations*. (There is also a copy in the Lansdowne MSS. ccxiii. 59.) Williams, a Roman Catholic, had been a member of the Middle Temple, but was expelled for his religion. For writing this pamphlet, and another entitled *Speculum Regale*, he was convicted of high treason, and executed at Charing Cross on Wednesday, May 5, 1619. See Lorkin's and Chamberlain's Letters in *The Court and Times of James I.*, pp. 147, 157, 158, 160. For a report of his trial, in which the law of libel was strained to the utmost, see Rolle's *Rep.* II. 83.

The author was Sir John Davis, whose *Epigrams* were printed about 1596: cf. Warton, III. 92, note †, ed. 1840.

Printed in *Cabala*, pp. 31—34. This and the following are in a different hand from the other articles in this Collection, with 56 lines in a page.

vi. 3 pages. *An account of the death of Essex.*

This seems to be a copy of Camden's authority for his account of the event.

2. 21 leaves. Thirty-five lines in a page.

'SUMMARIE COLLECTIONS OF TRUE NATURAL MAGICK grounded upon PRINCIPLES DIVINE and from the writings of HERMES TRIMEGISTUS AND OTHERS, THE LEARNED AUNCIENTS: contening the true Philosophie and Physick drawn into commune places:' by Samuel Rynevile and Norton.

There is an epistle dedicatory to Lord Burleigh, dated from 'my house at Ligh.'

The dedication begins:

I think it no offense or unmeete...

The treatise begins:

Magick we define to be an Art and faculte...

Ends:

...the benefit of his church and profit of his people. Amen.

3. 40 leaves, with 50 lines in a page, written about the beginning of the xviiith century.

‘TWO BOOKES OF THE HISTORIES OF IRELAND, compiled by EDMUND CAMPION, feloe of Seint John Baptistes Colledge in Oxforde.’

Printed, fol. Dublin, 1633. The MS. contains 40 numbered leaves.

This is the copy to which Baker refers, MS. note to Wood's *Athenæ*, col. 164: ‘It (Campion's *History*) is extant in MS. [probably the original] in the public library at Cambridge, dedicated to Robert, Earl of Leicester, in an epistle dated from Dublin [MS. Dyvelin] Maii 27, 1571, being then upon the point of his departure to leave the Land, as he there says.’

In this the words [probably the original] are cancelled, and over them is written *only in part*. The clerical blunders and the spelling of the proper names, both incorrect and inconsistent, shew that the copy cannot be autograph. It is all in one hand, and is complete. There is a geographical table of Munster on the last page.

4. 11 leaves. ‘*A Brief Collection of all such severall and Ordinarie Fees or Charges as (by Suites in the Common-Lawe) are defraied or paid out into diverse Courtes or offices thereunto appendant everie Terme tyme. Opto placere probis.* 1609.’

5. 16 leaves, written in the xviii<sup>th</sup> century.

‘ORATIO PENITENTIS humilis et devota pro peccatorum remissione et gratia.’

This consists of verses of the Psalms put together, with headings to each in the margin.

6. 50 leaves, written in the xviii<sup>th</sup> century.

‘AN EXPOSITION UPON THE NYNTHYE PSALME OFF DAVID.’

Begins (after an Argument, ‘The prophett in this psalme...’):

Qui habitat, &c. In this psalme god is prayed for the benefites...

Ends:

...and cannot lye or deceve, to whom, &c.

7. 22 leaves, in the same hand as the last.

‘AN EXPOSITION UPON THE 129 PSALME.’

Begins:

The title of the psalme, &c., For explication of this title we may understand...

Ends:

...the reward hoped for shall succede through, &c.

A prayer follows.

8. 30 leaves, in a hand of the same date.



‘DEVOUT AND GODLY PRAYERS made off the preface and seaven petitions of the Pater noster.’

These are followed by ‘*One prayer made at large of the holl Pater noster.*’

9. 10 leaves, in the same hand as the last.

‘A SERMON OF SAINT CYPRIAN the Martyr concerning the SUPPER OF OUR LORD, truly translated by Doctor WATSON Bisshope of Lincolne.’

Begins:

When the rumor of Lazarius which was raysed...

Ends:

...which meate and drinke is our Lord Jhesus Christ to whom, &c.

Thomas Watson, Master of St John’s Colledge, was Bishop of Lincoln in 1557. This translation has not been printed.

10. 13 leaves, of which 5 are blank, in the same handwriting.

i. ‘A PARABLE OF FAITHE, HOPE, AND CHARITIE.’

Begins:

A certaine noble and mightie kinge had three daughters...

Ends:

...in vayne that keepeth it.

ii. ‘A PARABLE concerning the retournyng of a Synner from the captivitie of the Devill to God agayne, written by SAINT BARNARD.’

Ends:

11. Ninety-three leaves, on different paper and in a hand of the xvth century.

A LONG ENGLISH POEM, much damaged, beginning and end as well as the upper part of all the leaves rendered almost entirely illegible by damp. The last rubric indicates the general nature of the work: ‘Here endith *The Boke of the Natiuite of our Lady, and of the birth of our Lord Jhu Criste.*’

The second book relating to ‘the Counsell of the Trynyte,’ begins:

Who that is bound and fetherid in prysoun

Thynkith long aftir delyveraunce...

The poem ends :

To kepe and save from all adversite. Amen.

This appears to correspond in many respects with the work known as Lydgatis *Lyf of our Lady*, printed by Caxton : see Dibdin, i. 336 sq. Another copy is marked Mm. vi. 5.

12. Eighty leaves, of the same date and in a similar handwriting. '*A tretys wiche is callid* [the rubric here breaks off: but an addition follows in a later hand] *a vieu of the instabilitie of the worlde with a reproof of the excesse therein vsed,*' by Occleve.

This poem appears also in Hh. iv. 11, and Gg. vi. 17. In both of these copies the colophon styles the poem 'De regimine principum.' See also Harl. MSS. 116. But Gg. vi. 17 is referred to by Tanner, *Occleve* (= More, 427), as 'Consolatio sibi a Sene oblata.' None of the three MSS. in the Cambridge University Library contains the stanzas given in Warton.

Begins :

Ends :

A kind of epilogue or 'envoye' is appended, beginning :

20. '*The Priouresses Prologue*,' and a small portion of the tale by Chaucer, on a single leaf of parchment, of the xvth century.

#### A FRAGMENT OF A CHRONICLE OF ENGLAND.

It consists only of three sheets, of which the second and third are transposed. On the first sheets are chapp. lxxviii—lxxxiii. entire, out of the History of King Arthur; on the second, chapp. clxii—clxxxiv.; on the last, chapp. cxli—clv. The chapters on the last two sheets are identical with those in Hh. vi. 7, except for a few verbal differences, as if they were both translated from the same work.

An Exposition of the 10 *Commandments*, in English, imperfect at the beginning.

This is written in a hand of the xvth century on 108 leaves, with rubrics and a good margin, and about 38 lines in a page. This is an English translation of an original which will be found in the Brit. Mus. Harl. MS. 4410, but is not among the works of the authoress enumerated in *Biogr. Universelle*. Translations of two other works of this lady were printed by Caxton.

In the initial H of the Incipit the following arms are emblazoned:—

Quarterly 1 and 3 or. a cross engr. gu. 2 and 4 per pale az. and gu. a lion rampant, doublequeued, erm.

The following is the Incipit:—

Here begynneth the Boke whiche is called the body of Polocye, and it speketh of vertues and of good maneres. And the said boke is devyded in thre parties. The firste parte is addressed to Princys, the second to Knyghtes and Nobles, and the thyrde to the universall people.

The Preface begins:

If it be possible that of vyce myght growe vertue...

The first book begins:

Than now we have for to trete of vertu...

The third book ends :

...ben many solempne persones in clenness of lyf. Here Xpine concludeth her boke.

L'envoy follows, beginning :

Now I am comen...

Ends :

...all perfection of soule and body.

2. THE COUNTESS OF PEMBROKE'S ARCADIA, by SIR PHILIP SIDNEY.

On 208 leaves, numbered, with about 48 lines in a page, dated 1584. The first edition was printed in 1590. This is an unfinished copy, blanks are left for most of the proper names in the latter part of the volume, those in the former part being inserted in a careful Italic hand. Most of the verses, and all the Eclogues, are omitted, spaces being left for the verses left out, and some of those inserted being written in a peculiarly ornate style of calligraphy. The arrangement is that of the first edition, excepting the division into chapters, which is omitted. The MS. breaks off at fol. 350 *a*, line 30, 1st edition.

3. 'Ye grete lawis of SCOTLAND of ye gude king DAVID, the quhilk lawis are conteint in ye buke the quhilk he callit REGIAM MAJESTATEM.'

It is written in Lowland Scotch, upon 39 leaves (some of which are much decayed), in a hand of the early part of the xvth century. It is not the same version that was edited by Sir John Skene ; and contains only the first three parts, divided into 135 chapters (in the index 139), the titles of some of which are misplaced.

The first part, after the Introduction, begins with the Chapter 'Of the muts yat pertynys to ye King's croun:' the second part begins with C. 43, 'that spekis of Arbotry:' the third begins with C. 119, 'Of detts to be mot in ye court,' and ends with C. 135, 'Of Recognicion of Richt that upon lauchful sesing is givin.'

It appears to correspond generally with the R. M. in the *Marchmont Manuscript*, as described in the Record Ed. of the *Acts of Parl. of Scot.* I. xxxvi., where also this MS. is noticed, I. xxv.

For an account of the Regiam Majestatem see Bp. Nicholson's *Scott. Hist. Libr.*, pp. 75—78, and Dalrymple's *Ann. of Scot.* III. 275—326.

4. 'Ye Copiis of ye Roll of Ulerioun [?] and ye Jugement of ye lawis of ye see' [sea].

Upon 3 leaves, in the same handwriting and language as the preceding section.

It contains 21 chapters,—the first, 'Of ye makyn of a man maister of a schip,' the last, 'Of a yong man mayde lodys man of a schippe.'

This is also in the *Marchmont MS.*, where it is entitled, 'The copyis of the Rollis of *Admirall*,' &c.

5. 'The law of Burch [*Burgh*] mayde throw king Davide, Malcolme Sone, and Saynt Margeret.'

Upon 19 leaves, in the same handwriting and language as the two preceding Articles.

It has a preface, neither in Skene nor in the Record Ed., and 107 chapters only, whilst in the former there are 143, and in the latter 119.

6. *A short Latin Poem*, without title.

Begins (fol. 61 *b*):

Taurus cornutus ex patris germine brutus

It is extracted from the poem described below, Kk. vi. 16, § 2.

10. '*Bernardus de cura rei familiaris*;' handwriting changes.

This is a metrical paraphrase of St Bernard's epistle 'to Reymunde knyght of chewalry y<sup>e</sup> rose.' The Latin text is also given, sentence by sentence, in red ink.

11. '*The Craft of deyng*;' in prose, title supplied from the first paragraph.

Begins (fol. 84 *a*):

Sen the passage of this vrechit warlde the quhilk is callit *Dede*  
semys harde perelus...

Ends:

...as God grant us al to do for his mikill mercy. Amen.

12. *Verses*, intended, it would seem, as an introduction to the following discourse.

13. '*Dicta Salomonis*;' such is the colophon, a prose treatise on the book of Ecclesiastes.

14. *Advice of a Father to his Son*; in verse, neither title nor colophon.

The 'Prologue' begins (fol. 95 a):

Epilogue ends (fol. 118 a):

And gyf hyme grace sa here to do

In a Prologue, extending from fol. 138 *a* to fol. 142 *a*, the author says that he will confine himself chiefly to the adventures of Lancelot in the war of King Arthur against Galiot.

Without date, but in answer to a large despatch, dated 9th of July, containing Informations received from the Commissioners in Connaught.

75. ff. 212, 213. 'A Copie of the Lords' Letter to Sir John Norreis and Sir Jefferey Fenton.—21st of Julie, 1596.'

In answer to a joint letter from them, containing a summary report of all the proceedings of the rebels from the beginning.

Complaining that, through bad management and delay, it was no wonder that the pacification of the country had not been concluded.

## EVANGELIA SECUNDUM VERSIONEM B. HIERONYMI.

The text of St Luke, the 'prologus' and 'capitula,' and the text of St John, are all that now remain; but it is clear from the remaining signatures that originally the other two Gospels must have preceded St Luke; and one quire is wanting at the end to complete St John.

1. ff. 1—68. *St Luke* i. 15 to the end; and the 'prologus' and 'capitula' of *St John*.

The 'prologus' and 'capitula' of St Luke must have been contained on the vacant leaves at the end of St Mark. ff. 1 and 2, which have been cut out, contained (1) the illuminated frontispiece, and (2) first page of the Gospel. The text ends on f. 66 *a*, with the words (in alternate red and black) 'Expliciu[n]t euangeliu[m] secundu[m] lucam incipit prologus secundu[m] iohannem.'

On f. 66 *b* the 'prologus' of St John begins: 'Johannis euangelista unus exdiscipulis...', and ends on the next page with the words, 'Expli: prae-fatio incipiunt capitula.' It is remarkable that these fourteen 'capitula,' beginning 'Pharisaeorum leuitae...', are the same as those in the *Evangelia Augustini Gregoriana* in the Bodleian, and C. C. C. Library, MS. 286: they end on f. 67 *b*; and f. 68, which is cut out, was most probably blank.

2. ff. 69—118. *St John* i. 18—xx. 7. 'Deum nemo uidit . . . noli me tangere.'

ff. 69 and 70 form one sheet. The first is blank; the second, which is cut out, contains slight remains of the illuminated frontispiece. f. 71, which is cut out, contained the illuminated first page of the Gospel; of this the outlines are visible on the next leaf, from the pressure of the style.

The text accords mainly with the *Codex Amiatinus*, and frequently gives the readings of the old version as printed by Sabatier: a careful collation would probably bring to light a strong resemblance to the Gregorian Gospels mentioned above. The copyist was an ignorant one, as sometimes marginal notes are introduced into the text, and the readings of the old and new versions mixed up together so as to make no sense. The initial letters point sometimes to the divisions of the 'capitula' prefixed, and occasionally numbers occur in the text, corresponding to the 'capitula lectionum' in the *Codex Amiatinus*. There are no regular marginal notes, but here and there

rubrics pointing out the lections for different days, and giving the number of the *Ammonian section* in which the lection begins. In the accounts of the passion, the narrative portions are distinguished from our Lord's words by the letters C and L respectively. The Irish character is precisely that of the *Book of Kells*, and very like (only written with more care) the fragments at C.C.C., MS. 197; both MSS. ascribed with good reason to the viith century. See Westwood's *Palæographia*, and Goodwin's paper in the *C. A. S. Publications*, No. XIII. Cambridge, 1847, 4to.

There is then a gap till Apocal. xvi. 13, f. 219. The Apocalypse ends f. 221 *b*, and is followed by a note on the mystick number 7, reckoning up the seven sacraments, orders, deadly sins, &c.

On f. 1 *b* is the note, Nov. 14, 1656: 'Ex dono reverendi doctissimique viri Roberti Morgan. S. Theol. Bac.' [probably R. Morgan, of S. John's College, S.T.P. 1667.]

## MISSALE SECUNDUM USUM SARUM.

The Kalendar mentions June 7 as the 'Dedicacio Ecclesie Wygorn,' the MS. having belonged to a chapel in Worcester diocese.

After the 6 leaves of the Kalendar, the Missal begins f. 7, as usual: a leaf is lost between ff. 104 and 105, most probably containing the illumination before the Canon Missæ, which begins f. 105, in the usual place. The Canon is followed, f. 108, with proper prayers, &c. to be used on certain feast-days, S. Oswald, S. Chad, S. Wulstan, &c., and in f. 114 begins the SEQUENTIALE, 'Salus eterna indeficiens mundi vita,' the sequence for Advent Sunday, ending f. 134 with 'Verbum bonum et suave.' Then the office 'in die pasche' begins f. 135, the office for the Last Sunday after Trinity ending f. 175 *b*. The Sanctorale follows, beginning, f. 176, with S. Silvester, and ending f. 244 *b* with a 'Missa generalis pro vivis et defunctis;' the 'Ordo Sponsalium' follows, in the middle of which the MS. ends (incomplete) f. 245 *b*, with the words 'qui intueris abyssos equi sedes super cherubim. v. Benedicite.' The Canon Missæ and Sequentiale are in a later hand. The Gradalia and Antiphons have musical notes.

In f. 104 *b* is the name 'Thomas Corser,' and in f. 133 *b* 'Thys is the prystys bocke of Hanley Castell in the county of Woster.' See *Beauties of England and Wales*, Worcestershire, p. 347. It belonged to the Nevilles, Dukes of Warwick.

The Prologue, of which only a small part remains, is addressed, 'Madame' (perhaps Margaret, eldest sister of Henry VIII.).

The work, the author informs us, was commenced on the 18th April, 1531, and ended 29th September, 1535.

This MS., though it has been collated as affording a fresh text, in the edition published at Cambridge in 1685, is a mere transcript of the editio princeps, even the colophon, with its date, being copied exactly. Fabricius perceived that the various readings of this MS. given in the 1685 edition were identical with those of the Subiaco edition. See *Biblioth. Med. et Inferm. Latin.* T. iv. p. 231, '1685. Cantabrigiæ, cum variis lectionibus Sublacensis editionis, quam pro MSto editor venditat.' On the other hand Dufresnoy, in the preface to his edition, denies that the readings are the same as those of the editio princeps. It is plain that he has not compared them, as the MS. actually coincides with the ed. pr. in its minutest details, excepting that the *Errores Lactantii* follow the list of chapters instead of being placed at the end of the book. The following note is written in rubrick on f. 1: 'Loquitur lector ad Vindelinum Spirensem, artificem qui epistolas Beati Cypriani reddit in lucem. 1471.'

The beginning is a specimen of a somewhat curious error. The scribe had left out the first line, 'Magno et excellenti ingenio viri quam se doctrine pe-' and had begun with the second '-nitus dedidissent, &c.' as above. The illuminator, not knowing this, filled up the initial blank with the letter U, and thus the first word in the MS. is *Unitus*!

Begins :

There are large coloured drawings of all the animals, some with groups of figures, interesting as illustrating costume, &c.

It is now being edited by Mr Churchill Babington, Fellow of St John's College, Cambridge, in the series of English historical works published by the authority of the Lords of her Majesty's Treasury, under the direction of the Master of the Rolls.

Alexander Nequam or Neckam was Abbat of Exeter, and died 1227. This work is mentioned by Cave (Vol. II. p. 286), under the title of 'Elucidarium bibliothecæ,' who quotes an extract from it on S. John vi. 52.

The MS. formerly belonged to a monastery, but the name has been carefully effaced from f. 1. In f. 8b is the note, 'Iste liber assignatur almaricelo noviciorum per magistrum Thomam Wastwell sacre theologie professorem. an. d.' the date effaced. On f. 1 is written the name of Walter Stonehouse. In f. 82 is a note relating to an argument between one Robert Mawes and John Colman.

A moderate-sized folio, on paper, of 289 leaves, each page containing 32 lines, neatly written in a hand of the xvith century, abounding in contractions. The heads of the treatises are handsomely ornamented in vine-leaf and other patterns.

After the above-named title *περὶ τῆς ὀρθοδόξου πίστεως*, which begins *Χριστιανός ἐστιν*, and forms the opening of the First Book of the *Basilica*, follows:—*ἀρχὴ τοῦ ᾱ στοιχείου. περὶ ἀγγαρειῶν καὶ παραγγαρειῶν καὶ τίνες καὶ πότε ἀγγαρεύονται ἢ οὐκ ἀγγαρεύονται.* The last title (fol. 245 b) is, *περὶ ὠραρίων* (sic) *τῶν καὶ ὑποδεκτῶν καλουμένων καὶ περὶ ὠρείων καὶ τῶν ἐν αὐτοῖς ἀποκειμένων εἰδῶν.* Prefixed is a table of the titles (fol. 1—11).

At the end (fol. 246) occurs the following note:—*τὸ ἴσον τοῦ ἐξηκονταβιββλου τοῦ τοῦ λαμπροτάτου Διέγου Μενδοκίου, τῷ τοῦ Δουάρδου Καλδέρου τοῦ νομικοῦ προστάγματι καταγραφομένου.* For Diego de Mendoza's zeal in collecting Greek MSS. see Roso's *Biogr. Dict.* s. v.

This *Synopsis* was published by Leunclavius, Basil. 1575.

The selection contains 55 novels, mostly very short ones.

The collection opens with the words, *θεσπίζομεν ἀπὸ τοῦ νῦν καὶ εἰς τὸν ἅπαντα χρόνον* (fol. 268 b): and ends with the words *ὅς ἄγει τοὺς ὑπηκόους* (fol. 278 b.)

Zachariæ (*Anecd.* p. xv. Lips. 1843) mentions that the *Ecloga Novellarum Leonis* has been edited, but without saying where. Those published by Bonifidius and Agylæus (*Antv.* 1575) and others differ from these in form, though sometimes having the same titles.

A moderate-sized quarto, on paper, of 120 leaves, each page containing two columns of Greek words, with their Latin equivalents in two other columns, (which last, however, are wanting in the latter part of the volume, after a part of the letter ε,) the number of lines in a column varying from 24—30, neatly written in a hand which may be referred to the beginning of the xvth century. The Latin part is not all by one hand, and the later of the two seems to belong to the xviiith century.

'GLOSSARIUM GRÆCO-LATINUM PHILOXENI.'

Steph. *Thes. Ling. Gr.* Vol. VIII. p. 346, ed. Valp.). The volume ends with a Latin scrap of 12 lines, beginning, Qui flagitia metuunt, virtutem consequuntur. The names of Hortensius and Varro occur towards the end of it.

The title of the work is written in the hand of J. B. Hautin, whose name occurs inside the cover. On the top of the first page of the book is written, Ex bibliotheca Claudii Sarranii (?), 1647.

On this Glossary of Philoxenus see Du Cange (*H. Steph. Thes. Ling. Gr.* Vol. VIII. p. III. ed. Valp.)

They are a continuation of the collection of Novels, described above, Vol. II. p. 163, beginning ἡ ἀναεάσεως χρεία γένηται, and they end in tit. λβ with the words χρυσίου λιτρῶν: the red paging of the last leaf of Ee. iv. 29 being 369, and the first of these being marked 372; the corresponding Greek pagings being τξ and τξγ.

A large quarto, on parchment, 128 leaves, about 33 lines in each page, written by two or more different hands before the middle of the eighth century (cf. Wanley, p. 228); slightly damaged at the commencement.

BEDÆ HISTORIA ECCLESIASTICA GENTIS ANGLORUM; five books, in Latin.

This is the celebrated MS. which furnished the text of Smith's edition, Cantab. 1722. It is minutely described, with a specimen-plate, (No. XXV.) in the *Monument. Britan.* p. 72; and also in Stevenson's 'Preface to Bedæ, ('Church Historians of England'), pp. xxix. xxx. Lond. 1853. It was probably written at Wearmouth a few years after the death of the venerable historian. Before coming into the possession of Bp. Moore, it belonged to some French monastery dedicated in honour of St Julian (fol. 128 *b*).

The last page of the MS. contains the Saxon (or rather *Northumbrian*) text of Cædmon's hymn, which had been already paraphrased in Bede, lib. iv. c. 24 (cf. Thorpe's *Cædmon*, Pref. pp. xxi. xxii.):

(1) In the same line follow three Latin words, with their Anglo-Saxon equivalents: after which, in the same hand, are certain chronological notes, supplying the length of the reigns of Northumbrian kings from Ida to Ceolwulf, and also dates of other incidents. 'Five of these concur with the year 737, and would thus seem to lead to the inference that this MS. was transcribed in that year; but there are others which cannot be brought into harmony with this calculation, but which point at the years 734, 738, 741, and 748 respectively.'—*Stevenson*.

(2) Then follow (in a Gallic hand, according to Wanley,) the *Sententia* of St Isidore (of Seville), *De consanguinitate*, and certain brief and fragmentary extracts *ex Decretis papæ Gregorii junioris, qui nunc Romanam Catholicam regit matrem Ecclesiam*.

Although the language seems to favour such a view, allusion cannot here be made to Gregory II., for he died in 731, the very year in which the 'Historia Ecclesiastica' was completed. The pontificate of Gregory III., his successor, extended from 731 to 741 (not as Wanley states, from 769 to 780); so that if these 'excerpta' were really added in Gaul, the MS. must have been carried over *immediately* after its execution in the North of England.

ALLEGATIONES ET CONSILIA JURIS-CONSULTORUM QUORUNDAM

They relate chiefly to cases testamentary and the succession to property in the KINGDOM OF SARDINIA and parts adjacent, and contain much genealogical information; but some few relate to criminal cases. Each Article is the original Case and Opinion, and (with a few exceptions) bears the signature of the Advocate.

The following is a list of the names of the Advocates, who were, for the most part, 'Utriusque Legis Doctores': Jacobus Angelius, Gabriel Sanna, Salvator Carcassona, Franciscus Fara, Jacobus Menochius, Angelus Carri, Petrus Selles, Augustinus Alen, Fran. The text of the Hebrews ends with ch. xii. 21, a blank space being left for the rest; the gloss is continued to the end. The Epistles occur in their usual order.

In the cover is written the name B. Twynyhoe: and on f. 1 is an order from Hen. VIII., king of England and France, lord of Ireland, and supreme head on earth of the English church, to Johannes Holder to appear before Thomas Suevyll.

After this follows an epigram of four lines on Thucydides, beginning

On the top of the first leaf is written, 'Benedicti Theocreni,' He was chancellor of the republic of Genoa in 1514, and his MSS. were seized by the Imperialist soldiers in 1522. See *Biogr. Univ.* s. v. This MS. has been collated by the Rev. R. Shilleto for his intended edition of Thucydides. It was, for the first time, partially made use of by Arnold for the latter part of his edition of Thucydides (see Arnold's *Thucyd.* Vol. ii. p. xii.), and is by him distinguished as T in the critical notes; it was also consulted by Dr Bloomfield, who sent extracts from the whole of it for Poppo's smaller edition. (See Poppo's *Thucyd.* ed. min. Vol. i. § ii. p. xlii. 1843.)

See Fabricius, *Bibl. Græc.* Vol. xi. p. 129. Also Gg. ii. 33, which, however, has considerable verbal variations. In this part there are about 31 lines in a page.

Begins :

Ends :

This is incomplete. The work is published in a fol. volume, with Ptolemy's Μεγάλη σύνταξις, Basil. 1538. See Fabric. *Bibl. Græc.* Vol. ix. 182.

'THE ANCIENT HISTORIE AND ONELY TREW AND SENCERE CRONICLE OFF THE WARRES BETUOX THE GRETIANS AND THE TROJANES, and subsequentlie off y<sup>e</sup> firste eversione of the ancient and famous cite of Troye onder Laamedon the King, and last onder Priame: vrettine by Daretus a Trojane and Dictus a Greciane, present [*a line appears to have been omitted*] by Guido [di Colonna, in his romance entitled *Historia Trojana*], and now in Englis wers by Ihone Lidgate monk off Burye in England, anno 1451.'

The work is otherwise known as Lydgate's TROY-BOKE (see Warton, II. 291 sq. ed. 1840). The longer title is found in a copy printed at London in 1555.

The beginning and end of the MS. in the later hand was supplied by James Murray, 1612 (see fol. 324 *a*).

Other entries: 'Kathrin Morton with my hand;' 'Maria Moorrage with my hand;' 'Capitane James Lyell.'

Several scraps of poetry are added at the end of the volume. On a page at the beginning is part of a poem written in a hand of the xvith century, and beginning:

The MS. is thus dated: α φ ξ θ (i. e. A. D. 1569) ἐν Λουτετία τῶν Παρησίων; below, which an early hand has written, 'Nicolaus Bergilius (sic) scripsit.' The scribe's true name was Ἄγγελος Βεργίκιος of Crete, as it appears in his own hand in his superb MS. of Oppian. See Silv. et Champ. *Paleogr. Gr.* He was brought to Paris by Francis I. and employed by him to catalogue his MSS. His hand served as the model for the types of the Royal press, and his name occasioned the proverb, 'To write like an angel.' (Silv. et Champ. as above.)

## 2. 'Τὰ Λίλιανου τακτικά.'

In this part there are about 33 lines in a page; the initials are green, red, and blue. The figures are chiefly in green and red. The scribe's name appears in the following verses at the conclusion:

f. 44 *b* contains the Greek numeral letters with their names, and their powers in Greek, written in Roman letters. Also the ecclesiastical termini, with the account of the Angel bringing them to St Pachomius.

This page is in the same hand as the following, which is later than the preceding, and contains 36 lines in the page.

2. ff. 45—48. A TRACT ON THE CHURCH KALENDAR.

Begins:

*De concurrentibus.* Concurrentes sunt qui cum Regularibus...

Ends:

The date either of the authorship of this tract, or of the copy from which the present transcript was derived, appears thus: 'Verbi gratia: anni presentis qui est incarnationis Domini dclxxviii annus. Est quippe indictio prima.'

Then follow a few short notes in double column, but in the same hand. Of these the first is *de septem Planetis*, which are named Saturnus, Pheton, Hesper, Sol, Lucifer, Mercurius, Luna.

3. ff. 49—60 *a*. A KALENDAR.

The Saxon names are written in the Saxon character. The position of the Sun in the Zodiac for every month is described in a Latin hexameter.



f. 60*b* contains a table of Roman weights and measures, partly in Latin and partly in Anglo-Saxon.

4. ff. 61—72. *CICLUS MAGNUS PASCALIS*.

There are four leaves cut out at the end. Each page contains the period of one Lunar cycle of nineteen years, and there should be 28 pages for the Solar cycle. The vertical columns give the year in the Lunar cycle, the Concurrents, Septuagesima, Quadragesima, Easter, Pentecost, besides two margins, of which the first records the Popes and the Emperors, &c. for the first great cycle after Christ; and the second those for the second cycle beginning A.D. DLI., and also those for the third great cycle as far as to the year 1100, *Ob Will. Rex, junior*, but the latter entries appear to be in a later hand than the Kalendar. The years of the cycles with which each page concludes are given at the foot, distinguished by the letters A, B, Γ.

The last leaf contains the fragment of a book *de Computo*.

The only traces of ownership are in illegible scribbings, unless the following entries in the Kalendar contain possessors' names. 24th and 27th of May, obiit Ælfgifii filia Æpeldie, obiit Ælflæd, mulier Ælfgari.

Stephen de Turneham lived in the reign of HEN. III. *Escheat Records*.

The poem is by a Christian (*Christum* occurs v. 43), probably by an Englishman (*Anglos* occurs v. 23); certainly by a poet who had very little skill in his quantities, as Jorbert seems to have perceived (fol. 10 b). Some unusual words are found in it, e. g. *babbiger*, *baburus*, *barritor* (the last not occurring even in the recent edition of Du Cange), and many words taken from the Greek, as *diapente*, *epitritus*, *syntheca*, &c. The eighth century, according to Mr Wright, produced most of the Anglo-Saxon Latin poets, and it seems likely enough that this is a production of that age.

The Kalendar occupies from ff. 3—8, and the Psalter begins f. 9, the initial B containing David and Goliath in the upper loop, and David as king in the lower, and ends f. 166 (the Psalms have all their numbers affixed by a later hand); the Canticles begin f. 166 *b*, and are followed by the Litany, which ends f. 183.

On the fly-leaves at the end a former possessor has inserted a few prayers; one for his two children, William and Martha.

On f. 1, the same hand that numbered the Psalms has written, in ink that once was red, 'Exemplar vetus—corrupta multa, imperfecta plurima, vide Spalmum (sic) 97.' This refers to Ps. xcvi. 9, which is incorrectly read in this Psalter.

See Duchesne, Vol. iv. p. 878 c. A very few of the initials are coloured red and green. There is no division into books.

The names of Ambrosius, Xenocrates, Demosthenes, Plato, Aristoteles, Diogenes, Hermogenes, Theophrastus, Seneca, &c. occur at fol. 24 and fol. 32. The last two pages are mostly taken from Pseudo-Seneca *de Proverbiis*: the concluding words of the MS. (fol. 33) are:

1. 'HISTORIA BRUTI,' so reads the colophon (fol. 170 a): or the HISTORY of GEOFFREY of MONMOUTH.

The present scribe completed his task at Worcester in 1327 (*Ibid.*). Several pages appear to have been left blank after fol. 7. They are now filled with historical notes, and a piece of poetry commencing 'O myghty Mars that marrith many a wight:' handwriting of the xvth century. The history is then resumed at fol. 11, but a gap occurs immediately after, the next leaf being numbered 24.

2. *A prophetic poem*, without title, handwriting somewhat later, about 50 lines in each page.

Stephen and S. John Evangelist; and f. 146 the hymns '*O lux beate Trinitas*,' and '*Ecce jam noctis tenuatur umbra.*' The next 6 leaves contain the Calendar, and the Psalter begins f. 153, followed by the '*Te Deum*,' &c. and Litany. In f. 279 is the note:

Dominus Ricardus Thirlewall scripsit hunc librum a.d. m.cccc<sup>mo</sup>xl<sup>o</sup>  
ad laudem dei qui est benedictus in secula sempiterna. Amen.

The '*Commune Sanctorum*' begins f. 280, and the '*Proprium Sanctorum*' in f. 326, ending, f. 431 *b*, with S. Gereon. The MS. ends, f. 435, with a commemoration of S. Thomas of Canterbury, and the translation of S. Osmund.

This work may perhaps deserve some attention in consequence of the number of quotations which are found in it. Thus fol. 4 (s. v. *amoliior*)



contains a quotation from Sisenna, lib. iv., which occurs however exactly in the same words in Nonius Marcellus. (See Krause, *Fragm. Vet. Historic. Roman.* p. 308.) From this work then, (among others,) the present dictionary seems to be compiled.

Begins (after the prayer, God unto whom all hartes...and the Prologue, In þe name of þe father...and the list of chapters):

Gostely freynde in god I praye þe and I besече þe...

Ends:

...alle god is lovers in erþe. Amen.

This is the treatise ascribed to William Exmeuse and Walter Hilton. See Tanner, *Biblioth.* p. 272, and Ff. vi. 41, § 2. Also Ii. vi. 39, § 4.

In f. 55 b in the margin is a calculation of the number of hours, minutes, and atoms in a year.

8. ff. 102—121. '*A tretyse of pryvey counseylle.*'

Begins:

Gostly frende in god as touchyng þin inwarde occupacion...

Ends:

...þat it schall not mych erre.

See Ii. vi. 31, which contains a few more lines than the present copy.

9. ff. 122—127. '*A translacion of Dynyse hidde dyvynite.*'

Begins (after the Preface, This wrytyng þ' next folowep...and Seynt Dionyse preyer):

Thow frend Thimothe what tyme þ' þou proposest...

Ends:

...aboven alle affermyng and denyng.

This is a translation of the '*Mystica Theologia*' of S. Dionysius Areopagita.

A small quarto, on paper, of 40 leaves, excluding blanks, each page containing from 30 to 40 lines, distinctly written in a not very careful hand of the latter part of the xviii<sup>th</sup> century.

Begins (fol. 3):

αἰὲ μὲν, ᾧ παῖ Λαρτίου, δέδορκά σε...

Ends (fol. ult.):

Divided in this MS. into 1436 lines, and seemingly written out for the press. Prefixed (fol. 1) is the argument, (beginning τὸ δράμα τῆς Τρωικῆς ἐστὶν πραγματείας,) and the *Dramatis personæ*. On the back of fol. ult., perhaps in the same hand, is a fragment of an account-book,

headed '1683 M<sup>r</sup>. Thom. Snat Deb<sup>r</sup>.' He had received £10 'of my brother D<sup>r</sup>.'.....Then follows the name, but unfortunately written in cypher. The handwriting is a good deal like Stanley's, especially the Greek: but if it be his, the *memorandum* cannot be by him, as he died about five years before its date.

The title of Eustathius' commentary is given in a shorter form in Bernhardt's edition: he erroneously states that this MS. therein has Καματοροῦ.

The vertical columns for every month are headed ‘Number of dayes,’ ‘dawnynge,’ ‘Sun risynge,’ ‘Greis of signes,’ ‘Houris of Planet,’ ‘Sun sett,’ ‘Darknyght,’ and on the opposite page appears the year in the three consecutive lunar cycles, and the hour and minute when there is New and Full Moon on any day of the month. The leaves containing August and October are torn out. There follow various tables of Eclipses solar and lunar, &c., also the remains of a volvelle. This part contains at present 14 leaves.

2. A BOOK OF MEDICAL RECEIPTS, with rubricks.

This contains 113 leaves.

This MS. (also called Codex Eliensis from having been in Bp Moore's possession) was consulted by Toup and Hudson, but deserves, according to Weiske (p. xxiv.), a better examination. The later notes in the margin he considers to be taken from the edition of Paulus Manutius. 'Ab hac certe pauca eorum discrepant.'

It ends on the 4th January, 1640-41, and, omitting many things recorded in the printed Journal of the House of Commons for that period, contains entries not to be found therein, with short notes of some of the debates.

The writer records himself as 'being returned Burgess for Stamford in Lincolnshire.' The Members for Stamford in that Parliament were Geoffrey Palmer and Sir Thomas Hatcher, Kt. The former was probably the author of this Journal. He reported cases in the King's Bench from 17 JAMES I. to 4 CHARLES I., printed in 1678. He was made Attorney-General and created a Baronet by CHARLES II. in 1660, and died in 1670. His epitaph is given by Le Neve.

At the end of the volume, written with the book reversed, are 17 leaves, containing :

Notes on the law of treason.—The case of the Earl of Strafford, in Westminster Hall, 17 April, 1641.—'The King's Speech, 1 Maii, 1641,' in Strafford's case.—'A protestation made by the Howse of Commons, 3<sup>o</sup>. Maii, 1641,' for the maintenance of the reformed religion, &c.—'In the case of Mr Percy and others,' upon their 'conspiring to bring up the army to awe the Parliament.'
