HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE CITY OF NEWBERN.

It is impossible to give either a full or accurate account of the history of Newbern. All official papers and documents have been lost by the changes and chances of war and revolution. All that we can do is to present some of the most important and influential facts which constitute leading landmarks in the progress of the past.

Newbern was settled by Lewis Mitchell and De Graffenreid, two Swiss gentlemen, who in 1710 received a grant of ten thousand acres of land from the Lords Proprietors, who had received the title to their possessions from Charles the Second of England. One of these Proprietors was William Lord Craven, united to the Queen of Bohemia by a morganatic marriage, and after whom the present county of Craven was called. These Swiss gentlemen brought with them fifteen hundred Swiss and six hundred and fifty Germans. These last were called palatines, because they were from the Palatinate. Queen Anne of England was anxious to help the citizens of that country, because of her relation to Elizabeth the daughter of James the First, who had married Frederick the Elector Palatine. The original settlement of Newbern is said to have taken place between the foot of Craven street and the eastern terminus of Broad street, where stood a lofty eminence of land called Council Bluff, because here the Indians built their council fires, and held those serious deliberations which were significant of life or death to the infant white colony. Tradition represents De Graffenreid as a brilliant adventurer, courtly and imposing in his person and manners, ingenious and captivating in his speech, and in almost every sense fitted to be the successful leader of a perilous enterprise. Indeed it is

said that so fascinating was this hero of the Palatines, that even the royal heart of Queen Anne was not insensible to his charms, and that her sagacious ministers thought it the better part of prudence and statecraft to send him to the New World. But whatever may have been his personal beauty, or the splendor of his accomplishments, his dishonest and ungenerous treatment of his associates showed him to be a very bad man. Having an evil eye to the main chance, he took up all the lands of the other settlers in the names of trustees, making himself one of these, and, without assigning any cause therefor, mortgaged the same, including the site of the village of Newbern, to Thomas Pollock for eight thousand pounds sterling. In other words, he conveyed out of the hands of their lawful owners fifteen thousand acres of the richest and best lands in Craven and Jones counties, and then fled from the country which he had dishonored by his cruelty and injustice. If the Indians had lacerated and calcined De Graffenreid instead of poor Lawson, who seems to have been a gentleman and a scholar, they would have rendered a public service to posterity. The descendants of De Graffenreid afterwards endeavored to obtain from the heirs of Thomas Pollock, whose title by the way could be no better than De Graffenreids, the possession of this property. But the law and the lawyers were against them and they had to abandon the contest.

The first exciting experience which befell the little colony was an unexpected Indian war. The Tuscaroras and their savage confederates were set for the destruction of Newbern and its vicinity. This was in September, 1811. Having captured De Graffenreid and Lawson, the latter being the Surveyor General of the province, they went deliberately and cautiously to work to root out the whole settlement. With the habitual cunning of the Indian character, they sent spies into every household, and familiarized themselves with every weakness of the inhabitants. At last the conspiracy was ready and the blow fell. Twelve hundred savages plunged into this sea of blood. The slaughter outside of Newbern was indiscriminate. Old men, women and children alike perished without mercy. The Roanoke settlements were swept like the streets of Paris under the swords of St. Bartholomew. Ancient little Bath, out of whose

moonlighted creeks and coves the monotonous song of the Indian maid still seems to float and live, was drowned in the the blood of its noble Huguenots. And the Swiss and Palatines in the neighborhood of Newbern were struck down without warning and without pity. But this most shameful butchery was a death blow to the Indians in this country. The battle-cry of the settlers rung from river to river, and from headland to promontory. Col. Mitchell took the field with the small force at his command, and detachments from South Carolina and Virginia marched rapidly to the scene of the fiery overthrow. At last, at a point about twenty miles west of Newbern, the same, we presume, now designated Fort Barnwell, the barbarous Tuscaroras and their allies encountered the white forces under Col. Barnwell. The savages, confident in their superiority of numbers, left their stockade and attacked with the tomahawk in the open field. But the avengers of blood were before them. They were utterly defeated, with the loss of three hundred killed and one hundred prisoners. Afterward the whole body surrendered, and that was the end of their power for evil in this country.

Twelve years passed away after this brief but decisive struggle with the Indians, when the act of Incorporation took place. A general assembly of the burgesses, elected by the people, met whenever the Governor chose to call it, and at any place which he might appoint. In November, 1723, the general assembly being then in session in the town of Edenton, an act was passed "for the better settling of the town of Newbern, in the precinct of Craven," by which it was formally incorporated, and lots reserved for a Court House, church and market place. It is not necessary for us to give the words of this act. The area of the city so defined by this official transaction, covered two hundred and fifty acres. And it was a remarkable feature of this legal settlement of Newbern, that, if any owner of property died without heirs, or without disposing of his property by will, said property reverted or escheated to Cullen Pollock and his heirs and assigns. To persons with the enlightened and expansive legal information of this age and generation, this looks like a very irregular arrangement. But it was very likely the best provision that could be made for a people

who had been cheated out of their rights by the bold and unscrupulous cunning of DeGraffenreid. On the 6th of March, 1738, the Colonial Legislature, which had hitherto assembled in the town of Edenton, was convened in Newbern, and some important measures were discussed and inaugurated. Among them was the establishment of Circuit Courts, which was a large improvement in the legal interests of the community. The Legislature continued to meet in Newbern for several years, which of itself is an evidence of the growing importance of the place. In 1740, this body set apart and confirmed four lots to be sold for the purpose of erecting a church. The church of England was the only ecclesiastical body which possessed any jurisdiction in the country, the intimate connection between church and State being of course, just as binding here as in the mother country, and the people, amid the perils and hardships of their new home, seem not to have been forgetful of their religious history and obligations.

In 1743, the town seems to have been in a thrifty and flourishing condition, as there were then within its borders several "taverns" and "ordinaries," which is pretty sure proof of an advancing commercial prosperity. In 1745-'46, the Provincial Legislature met in Newbern, and in the latter year courts of Oyer and Terminer, Assizes and Nisi Prius, and the Courts of Chancery were ordered to be held here. It was also determined that the town should have a representative in the Legislature. In 1747, the Legislature again assembled here, and several important laws were enacted. In 1749, James Davis, a citizen of Virginia, brought a printing press to the place, and afterwards started a weekly paper, called the "North Carolina Gazette." Thus was planted early in the town, and long before the clarion voice of liberty had aroused the hearts and intellects of the land, that spirit of education and refinement, which made Newbern the cradle of social elegance and power, and the birth-place of some of the most richly endowed men on the continent. This was the first printing office established in the State, and the "Gazette" was the first newspaper sent forth in North Carolina, to shape the moral and political sentiment of its citizens, and to start the germs of that hatred of oppression which made North Carolina, in the war of the

Regulators, the first battle field of the Revolution. James Davis, who won the honors of this achievement, was justly selected to do the public printing, and died in 1783, after having witnessed the full fruition of his labors.

About this time considerable attention seems to have been paid to the necessities of life, as a special meeting of the Commissioners was held to see who felt inclined "to undertake and build a fence to enclose the town of Newbern," said fence to be six feet high, close enough "to keep out hogs and wild animals," of good, substantial rails, and with two strong gates communicating with the outer world. This enclosure, when finished, stretched almost parallel with New Street, between New and Queen, from river to river. The builders were allowed fifty pounds for its construction, and, as in the history of walled cities, watchmen were appointed to keep the portals. Domestic animals, such as cattle, horses and sheep, must have been rapidly on the increase, as municipal regulations were passed fixing the number allowed within the corporate limits, and a public pound was built, where all vagrant animals were seized and put up at public auction. The owners of lots were also required, under a penalty of twenty shillings, to cut down the trees and clear up their premises, and also to remove all wooden chimneys so as to guard against the perils of fire.

One of the ordinances passed at that remote period, is especially remarkable for its singularity and quaintness. It reads as follows: "Ordered, that the Town Constable warn the several respective masters and mistresses of families, and others liable by law, to meet at the Court House on Thursday next, at 10 o'clock, and bring with them all their male taxables provided with grubbing hoes or axes, to clear the streets of the town, under penalty by law." No instructions given to the City Marshal at that remote day, to put two or three poorly paid workmen upon the streets, who should receive their slender recompense in city vouchers. The citizens were compelled to do the work themselves, or have it done by the members of their households. Who their male taxables were, we are not definitely informed. But we presume that the servants of a family were specially designated, and, in the event of there being no servants, as is now the

case in the working of the public roads, the free white citizens themselves were required to do the work.

From 1754, the period when Gov Arthur Dobbs arrived from England, and took up his residence here as Colonial Governor, up to the breaking out of the Revolution, the town gradually increased in population, in intelligence and political importance. But it was preserved for the administration of Gov. Tryon, which began in 1765, to arouse the most exciting interest in the public mind, to make Newbern the centre of courtly and aristocratic influence, and to throw around its history the most dazzling memories of its colonial age. Fresh from the ceremonial splendors of the mother country, and inflated with swelling ideas of gubernatorial pomp and power, Gov Tryon sought to establish a viceregal government at the expense of the people. An ordinary house for himself and family was altogether inadequate to his conceptions and wants. Nothing less than a royal palace would do. Backed by the stately blandishments and fascinating manners of the ladies of his household, he caused successive appropriations of nearly one hundred thousand dollars to be made for this purpose by the Legislature. It is doubtful whether the most beautiful and irresistible lobbyist in Washington to-day, would have ranked by the side of Esther Wake, the Governor's sister-in-law, in that struggle for palatial luxury and show. The money was pressed out of the people, and the palace was built. Standing in a prominent position between Eden and Metcalf streets, its rear windows looking out over an imposing terrace upon the sparkling Trent, its front commanded by a broad pavement stretching to the Neuse, massive wings joined on to the main building by semi-circular corridors, a costly aquarium on the roof, with mantles and mantle ornaments from Italy and Spain filing its interior, this expensive structure was at once a monument of Tryon's folly and of the conciliatory spirit of the people. It gave birth to the war of the Regulators, and sowed thickly the seeds of the revolution. Wilmington, on account of its superior commerce, had been the original residence of Gov. Tryon. But when the patriots of that section, lead on by Ashe and Waddell, had resisted the execution of the Stamp Act, had bearded the Governor in his strongholds, and compelled the surrender of the Stamp-

master, he determined that Newbern should have the honor of the new palace, and be henceforth the official home of the royal governors. That noble residence has long since become a dream of the past. After the revolution it was completely dismantled, and instead of being jealously guarded by the State as its most valuable possession, it seems to have been abandoned, all but one wing, to ignoble purposes and uses, until at last an old lunatic touched to it the torch which consumed it into ashes.

The oppressive tax levied by the Legislature to meet the extravagant demands of the Governor, had kindled among the western farmers the flames of indignation and resistance. Organized companies of Regulators were springing into existence throughout the State. The Governor became alarmed at the rising tempest. Col. Leach, the commander of the Craven militia, was ordered to bring his regiment into the town. Orders were issued to the military authorities of the adjacent counties to hold themselves ready to march at a moment's warning. The Legislature of 1770, which met in the famous palace at the request of the frightened Executive, directed that all State records and documents should be brought into Newbern. At the same session, five hundred pounds were voted to the Governor to enable him to defend the town against the enemy, and to protect the official residence from the fiery chances of the impending contest. In March following, at a Special Court of Oyer and Terminer, bills of indictment were found against some of the leading Regulators, and Gov. Tryon resolved to execute the writs himself. For this purpose, taking with him the members of his Council, a number of the leading citizens of Newbern, and all the military forces of Craven and adjoining counties, he marched for Hillsboro. Then happened what might have been expected—he defeated the Regulators but ruined himself. The former, though but poorly armed, and little better than an unorganized mob, stood to their colors and died for their principles. Upon the plains of Alamance, memorable forever in our history, the rough ploughman with his reap hook grappled the drilled muskets of the royal soldiery, and in dying breathed the breath of life into the stalwart son of liberty about to be born amid the sobs and groans of Lexing-

ton. For once Newbern was in bad company. In following the Great Wolf, as the Cherokees called Gov. Tryon, she committed herself to bad measures, and submitted to the leadership of a bad man. But she nobly redeemed herself at a later period in her history. The cruelty shown by the victorious Governor to the conquered Regulators is one of the saddest passages in this brief but heroic history. Instead of exhibiting the magnanimity of a great soul, and conciliating the people by his clemency, the dungeon and the cord were the ministers of his vengeance. He hung Capt. Few, one of the most conspicuous of his captives, and afterwards executed six others, himself acting as the master of ceremonies. Gov. Tryon may have been, as he is represented to be, both a politician and a soldier. His women may have been the most brilliant butterflies that ever threw the lustre of their beauty around the princely gatherings of a court. But they drew a curse to themselves in North Carolina, which will cling to their memory forever. It would seem as if the very ghosts of the slain Regulators haunted their grand palace after they had left it, and never quit its doomed corridors and halls until it had perished from the earth.

As the misfortunes of Lous Sixteenth were brought on by the licentious extravagance of his predecessor, so the unpopularity of Gov. Martin, who succeeded Tryon in 1771, was confirmed and intensified by impolitic administration of that inconsiderate ruler. The great contest of the Revolution, which had been made possible by the Stamp Act and other injudicious enactments of the British Government, was made certain and immediate in North Carolina by the oppressive burdens of taxation. Newbern played an important part in the exciting struggle. The first assemblage independent of royal authority ever convened in the State, met here on the 25th August, 1774. This convention approved of a call for a General Congress to be held in Philadelphia in September, and appointed four delegates to represent the colony in that body. Abner Nash and Isaac Edwards were the delegates from Newbern. Col. John Harvey was the President of the first Convention, and issued a call for a second meeting to be held in Newbern on the 4th April, 1775. The Legislature also assembled here at the

same date, and showed a cordial appreciation of the patriotic sentiments of the people. The gathering storm-cloud began to arouse the loyal feelings of the Governor, and he denounced in unmeasured terms the plans and plotters of rebellion. He mounted cannon before the famous palace, and prepared to use Gov. Tryon's remedy of shot and steel upon the rebels. But the spirit of resistance had become too strong for his authority. The hour for conciliation had passed. The people of Newbern watched with much uneasiness the threatening jaws of the cannon, but they would not be terrified into submission. Dr. Alexander Gaston, Richard Cogdell, James Coor, and others of the leading citizens of the town collected together, captured the six pieces of artillery and carried them off in the very presence of the Executive. That night Governor Martin fled from his royal residence, and returned with a few friends, first to Fort Johnston on the Cape Fear, and afterward to an English ship of war, from which he continued to issue proclamations to the insurgent citizens. But his flight from Newbern on that memorable occasion may be taken as the closing scene of royal administration in North Carolina. This, however, was only the opening of the mighty conflict. A Committee of Safety was appointed, consisting of the most intelligent and influential people of the place, whose duty it was to watch the disaffected and to strengthen the wavering. As Donald McDonald, a distinguished Scotchman, under the power of a commission issued to him by Gov. Martin, had raised the royal standard near Fayetteville, and collected a large body of troops, it became necessary to meet him in the field. There were but two continental regiments raised in North Carolina. One of these was under the command of Col. James Moore, and was posted about twelve miles from McDonald's camp. Moore called for reinforcements, and Col. Richard Caswell went to his assistance with the Newbern battalion of Minute Men. On the march Wilmington added to it some Militia, and a detachment under Col. Lillington. On the 27th of February, 1776, the opposing forces met at Moore's Creek, and a sanguinary battle took place. The Newbern troops, at an important period of the action, poured across South River and charged the enemy in the flank and rear. The boastful Highlander

and his tory allies could not stand the impetuous attack of the fiery patriots, but broke in disorder and fled from the field, thus exhibiting the fact that not only could our people pass inflammatory resolutions in council, but ably and resolutely defend them in the field!

At a session of the Legislature held in Newbern in 1777, a serious and thorough discussion was had of the military condition of the State. The immediate result of the ventilation of this question was the organization of the State militia. Col. William Bryan was appointed General of the Newbern District. Together with the wise and judicious provisions incorporated in the military bill, such as the regulation compelling the inferior soldiery, under the penalty of humiliating confinement, to obey their superior officers, this Legislature passed salutary laws looking to the general protection and prosperity of the country. Among other statutes, it was enacted that, "whereas the evil and pernicious practice of freeing slaves ought, at this alarming state of affairs, to be guarded against by all friends of law and order, it is ordered that if any slave be set free except for meritorious conduct, the said slave shall be arrested and sold." Two facts are prominently set forth by the language of this enactment: first, that there were conscientious scruples in the minds of our countrymen even then concerning the institution of slavery, and second, that their patriotic purpose was too wise, fixed and resolute to permit mere fanatical impulses to embarrass their political efforts. It was reserved for the English Government and the Northern States of this continent, both of whom joined together to fasten the institution like iron fetters upon our people, to scourge with insults, fire and sword, the land which they had so grossly injured. But these enactments of the Legislature were only incidental to the bloody drama, which was still moving forward with all its exciting details. It is probable that the gallant patriots of Newbern, after the battle of Moore's Creek, were scattered under the Continental banners all over the nation, as Caswell, Nash, and others of their leaders have left their fame upon every stricken field. This supposition is confirmed by the fact that, in 1781, almost in the last extremity of the war, a force of four hundred regulars together with about the same number of tories from Wilmington, under

the leadership of Major Craig, attacked Newbern and captured it, sacking the town, and slaying Dr. Gaston as, together with his family, he was making his escape from Union Point. It is said, that this devoted citizen had made himself especially obnoxious to the enemy because of his intelligence, his gallantry and his influence. Richard Cogdell was another citizen against whom they had a burning hatred. Both of them were in Newbern at the time of the attack. Cogdell escaped, but Gaston was slain. It is said that they fired upon the faithful patriot over the shoulder of his wife, thus putting the seal upon that barbarous cruelty which has made the English soldier a public scandal from the battle of Hastings until now.

The history of Newbern, after the close of the Revolution, was more the history of private families and of local commercial development than anything else. That the mercantile prosperity of the place was very great is shown from the fact, that the firm of Turner & Stanly are said to have lost, by the misadventures of the war, thirty sail of vessels in the West Indies. But still there was no public excitement, immediately after the close of hostilities, to give the town a popular importance, and we must look solely to the State and National influence of its most distinguished leaders for whatever history it may have made. The first strongly marked character who came to the front was Richard Dobbs Spaight. An Irishman of respectable and honorable parentage, a graduate of the University of Glasgow, and a staunch adherent of the political rights of the Colonies, he identified himself with the military movements as the Aid of Gen. Caswell in 1780, and was with that distinguished patriot at the battle of Camden. In 1781 he represented the town of Newbern in the House of Commons, and in 1782-'83 and '84 he was elected to represent the State as well in the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, and he appears to have served with ability in both capacities. In 1785 and 1786, he was again a member of the Legislature from Craven. In 1787, he was chosen one of the delegates to frame the National Constitution, and his name is appended to that immortal instrument. In 1788 he was one of the delegates from Craven to the Convention at Hillsboro to deliberate on the same. In 1792 he was elected Governor

of the State, in which year he was member of the House of Commons from Newbern. In 1798, he was again elected to Congress from the Newbern District, and served one term. In 1801 he became a member of the State Senate, and in the next year perished in a personal rencounter with his great political adversary, John Stanly.

This disastrous result grew out of the divergent political principles of the day, and the intense personal bitterness engendered thereby. Contemporaneous with the framing of the Constitution the old Federal ideas of national consolidation, which in this year, 1880, are again threatening the stability of the government, and the opposite theory of State sovereignty, represented by Republicanism, began to agitate the people. By the close of the century, two great, powerfully organized bodies, lead on by Adams and Hamilton on the one part, and Madison and Jefferson on the other, had divided the political sentiment of the country. John Stanly, son of John Wright Stanly, one of the wealthiest and most influential merchants of Newbern at the close of the Revolution, had then just grown to manhood, and was one of the most brilliant intellects ever produced by the South. A federalist by principle and profession, with a quick and inexhaustible genius armed at all points with satire, ridicule and invective, bold even to recklessness in grappling with an adversary, and with more of the rude gallantry of Randolph than the polished courtesy of Clay, it was inevitable if there was any manhood on the other side, that he should sooner or later come into personal collision with his opponents. Gov. Spaight happened to be the most conspicuous of the Republican leaders, and it fell to his lot to become a victim to the towering ambition and relentless temper of his adversary. It is unnecessary to repeat the often told story here. Doubtless, both were to blame for the quarrel. But it is a sad commentary on the civilization and christian spirit of the times, that two such eminent men as John Stanly and Richard Dobbs Spaight could fight a fatal duel in the very suburbs of Newbern, in broad daylight of the Holy Sabbath, in the presence of numerous spectators, and yet public sentiment tolerate the crime. It is a matter of public history, that even the Governor of the State extended

his executive clemency to the survivor, by granting him a pardon. This duel took place on the 5th of September, 1802.

We do not admire the character of John Stanly any more than we do that of John Randolph, whom he seems greatly to have resembled in the erratic splendor of his genius, and in the impervious, overbearing forcefulness of his temper. But, nevertheless, after the opening of this century, his professional ingenuity and success, and his public political career wrought out a large part of our local history for many years. His first entrance into public life was as a borough member in the House of Commons in 1798, which position he again filled the next year. He represented the Newbern District in Congress in 1801, and again in 1809. At the expiration of this term of service, he was again elected a borough member of the House of Commons in 1812, and became the leader of his party in opposition to the war, and to President Madison's administration. He continued without much intermission in the House of Commons, of which he was often Speaker, until 1826, when he was smitten with a paralytic stroke, which terminated his political career. His life ended in a short time thereafter, on the 3rd of August, 1834. Contemporaneous with Mr. Stanly, whose inferior he was probably in what men agree to call genius, but vastly his superior in the roundness of his character, and in the greatness and completeness of his intellectual furniture, was William Gaston. Time and again representing the people in the State Legislature and in Congress, but on account of his religious opinions being disabled from holding any judicial position before 1833, he conferred honor and distinction upon every office which he held. He was Speaker of the House of Commons in 1803. In 1816, as a member of the Federal Congress, he was considered to take rank with Randolph, Lowndes, Clay, Forsyth, Pinckney and others, who were the political giants of those days. After the Convention for amending the State Constitution had removed the religious disqualifications from his path, he was made one of the judges of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, and was filling that exalted position when he died in 1844. Judge Gaston was entitled to rank at his death as the first citizen of the State, if not the very first which she ever possessed. Senator Badger doubtless possessed a greater

volume of brain, Frank Hawks was the greatest orator the State ever produced, and John Stanly may have been his superior as a great popular speaker and leader. But take mental gifts, culture and character all in one, neither one of these was the equal of William Gaston. A noble memory of him, like the echo of a beautiful song, still lingers around the hearts and homes of the ancient city for which his father perished, and to illustrate whose annals he devoted the noblest energies of his life. And what other city in America has ever been the nursing mother of four such men as Gaston, Stanly, Badger and Hawks.

Newbern's participation in the war of 1812 was not likely to have been active or conspicuous. Though the voting strength of the two parties in Craven county is said to have been about equally divided, the personal and political influence of Gaston and Stanly, the two most potential citizens of the town, being exerted against Madison's government, and consequently against the policy of the war, it is hardly probable that the people of Newbern went very earnestly against the sentiment of these two men. But a very marked incident of the times, notwithstanding, was the important part played by the privateer, Snap-Dragon, owned by a stock company in Newbern, and commanded by Capt. Ottway Burns. This vessel is said to have done great damage to the English shipping, and to have brought many prizes into port. During the progress of the war, Admiral Cockburn, with an English fleet, came over Ocracoke Bar, and created great excitement through the country. He captured the Custom House officer at Portsmouth, but treated the people kindly, even generously, paying them the highest prices for the commissary stores which he took from them. Probably the inadequacy of the navigation through the Swash and the river Neuse for his ponderous ships of war, prevented a repetition of Major Craig's famous attack upon Newbern.

We have said, that one of the most important elements of the history of Newbern, after the Revolutionary struggle, was its commercial prosperity and growth. This was especially the case after the opening of this century. Its foreign trade grew with dazzling rapidity, and the importance of these foreign relations left its impress upon every

department of business. Ship-yards sprang into existence as if under the touch of an enchanter's wand—new vessels of every grade and model were constantly going upon the stocks. Smith's creek and Bay river also became the scenes of mechanical ingenuity and skill, and, with the exception of the canvass, the vessels when completed were fully rigged and equipped in our own waters. To adopt the expressive language of another writer: "The rope-walks in the vicinity of the town manufactured all the cordage, the iron work was all done at the ship yards, and when the vessels were launched and the accounts all settled up by the contractors, almost every dollar was left at home, to lay the keels of new vessels, and to purchase cargoes for the distant voyages." These cargoes consisted of oak and red oak staves, cypress shingles, tar and pitch, long ranging pitch pine lumber, mess pork and tobacco, in a word, all the products of the surrounding country, which were exchanged in the West Indies for sugar and molasses, salt and rum, besides a large balance of Spanish milled dollars and doubloons. Fortunes were easily made by enterprising merchants in those days, for the commodities brought back from foreign ports in exchange for our exports were in great demand in the interior, and were carried off in waggons and flats, the only means of transportation known to people of that generation.

This commercial growth, slightly repressed by the war of 1812, sprang into fresh activity and life after its termination. It is said that the single article of salt went up in this market to five dollars per bushel. The foreign demand for our home products, from this period on to 1835, was more pressing than ever. Then were laid the foundations of those prosperous fortunes, which gave to Newbern whatever material energy she possessed in the commercial experience of those days. Her merchants, equally with her lawyers, politicians and divines, became the architects of her power, reputation and influence. The McHinnleys, Harveys, Sneads, Justices, Taylors, Hollisters, Smallwoods, Simpsons, McLins, Cuthberts and others, accumulated the comforts and luxuries of social life, and gave a financial character to the place, which it never before possessed. Some conception may be formed of the immense merchant-ma-

rine, which then crowded our waters, when, it is said, that there were over forty square-rigged vessels belonging to the port, besides numerous smaller coast-wise schooners. These vessels were nearly all owned by the citizens of Newbern. The costly cargoes with which they were freighted, on their outward and return voyages, were under the control of home capital, and the wealth which they accumulated was employed for home expansion and home happiness.

The year 1835 is generally considered by the best students of our local history to have been the turning point in the prosperity of Newbern. After that period her commercial decline was gradual but inevitable. Disease had swept from the forests the oak timber, which had been such a valuable article of trade. The Great West was teeming with enterprising settlers, and we could no longer compete with her in the raising of pork. In the production of cotton, we could not begin to sustain a struggle with the prolific soil and precocious climate of the more Southern States. The facilities of steam were rapidly driving sail-vessels from the ocean, and concentrating the commercial forces of the world upon the metropolitan centres of traffic and trade. To make matters worse, real estate began to fall, the banks with a plethora of money could not find customers, and immigration set in, draining the town and country of many of our most valuable and cultivated citizens. For a time, utter bankruptcy was stayed by the sudden and unexpected demand for rosin and spirits of turpentine. The spirits was an indispensable article in the manufacture of rubber goods, and was besides necessary for lights, as no kerosene or gas had at that day enlightened the darkness of the world. The old town was soon dotted with turpentine distilleries, extending far up the Neuse. About 1845, two steamboats were required upon that river as tugs, to draw the enormous flats, loaded down with six hundred barrels of naval stores a piece, brought out of the counties of Wayne, Johnston, Lenoir and Greene. But still, from 1835 up to the commencement of our civil war, the commercial decline of Newbern was steadily on the increase. It was thought, that the construction of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad, which was formerly opened by splendid addresses from North Carolina's two greatest orators, Henry W. Miller and

Dr. Hawks, in 1858, would restore the glowing prestige of the past. But if more than the mere convenience of travel has been harvested from the operation of that road, we are yet to see it.

Any sketch of Newbern would be incomplete, which should make no reference to the development of its educational interests. In 1764, the Legislature passed an act to erect a school house in the town. On the 3rd of November, 1766, another act was passed which was couched in the following language: "Whereas, a number of well disposed persons, taking into consideration the great necessity of having a proper school or public seminary of learning established, have at a great expense, erected and built in the town of Newbern a convenient house for the purposes aforesaid," &c. In 1773, another act was passed alluding to a "large and commodious building" already erected for school purposes, and prohibiting any other improvement of the lots upon which it was located. In 1784, another act was passed, first giving to the school the name of the Newbern Academy, and appointing Richard Caswell, Abner Nash, John Wright Stanly, William Blount, John Sitgraves, William McClure, and others a Board of Trustees. Now the question is, when was the present school building erected? We see it stated in some of the modern accounts of the occurrences of that remote day, that the school house of the Revolution was a log building, and that the present commodious structure was built at a much later day. But would the Acts of 1766 and '73 describe a log house as an expensive building, and speak of it as large and commodious? Would such men as Caswell, Nash, Stanly and Blount take the trusteeship of a log school house, calling it by the pompous name of the Newbern Academy? We think that all the proofs from the early legislative enactments, as well as from the size, style, location and material of the present structure, show that the present Newbern Academy is the one constructed between 1764 and '66, and probably by the very architect who built Tryon's palace. But however this may be, this school has for over a hundred years been the unfailing source of moral and mental training for the citizens of Newbern. A long line of accomplished schoolmasters have honored its halls. Some of the mightiest spirits of the nation have been taught

beneath its venerable roof. And it is even to-day under the faithful direction of one of the ablest and most deserving of the Professors of our own University, when that noble institution was in its prime, and is dispensing its imperishable blessings to the rising generation.

Besides the distinguished public men whose names have already been mentioned, Newbern was the birth-place of many other gifted spirits. Richard Dobbs Spaight, son of the previous Governor of that name, represented this District in Congress in 1823-'24, and was elected Governor of the State in 1834, being the last under the old constitution. Edward Stanly, son of John Stanly, represented this District in Congress from 1837 to 1843, and again from 1849 to 1853. He was elected Attorney General during the session of 1846, but soon resigned the position. After his last term in Congress, he removed to California, and soon launched into a lucrative practice of the law. During the great civil war, he was appointed by President Lincoln, Governor of North Carolina. But when he came here, found all his old friends in the Confederate army, and saw the utter impossibility of quieting the storm, he resigned and returned to his distant home, where he soon after passed peacefully to his reward. Besides these, there were John R. Donnell, a Judge of the Superior Court, Charles B. Shepherd, a prominent lawyer and politician, John H. and James W. Bryan, both men of talent, fame and influence; Richard S. Donnell, a fine parliamentarian, a successful lawyer and the soul of wit; M. E. Manly, a Judge of the Supreme Court and a member-elect of the United States Senate; Thomas Blackledge, Vine Allen, Edward Graham, Wright Stanly, Isaac Lee Guion, George L. Attmore, and others. In the nobler sphere of religious effort, Dr. Francis L. Hawks, Bishop Cicero Hawks, and John Todd Brame, were honored representatives of the genius and culture of the old town. The latter died in his early manhood, but not before he had proven himself to be one of the most brilliant preachers and writers in the State. The two former won a national reputation as powerful, eloquent and useful ministers of the Church.

Religious principle was the very corner stone of the settlement of Newbern, and to this was due, more than to any

thing else, her splendid career in war, finance, social refinement and intellectual influence, De Graffenreid, in 1711, the year of the uprising of the Indians, in a letter to the Bishop of London, tendered the colony to the Church of England. At the session of the Legislature held in Elen-ton in 1723, in the very act of incorporation there was inserted a clause providing a lot for the erection of a house of worship. The Episcopal Church of to-day still stands upon the lot, which was the burial ground of provincial days. Here may be seen old tomb-stones with quaint inscriptions, commemorating the virtues of a long past generation. The silver communion service still used in the Episcopal Church was, together with the Bible and Prayer-Book, presented by George the Third, and all bear the royal coat-of-arms with the initials "G. R." The Bible was printed in 1717, and the Prayer-Book in 1750. There is also in the Presbyterian Church a tablet erected to the memory of a daughter of Jonathan Edwards, the great Calvinistic theologian, who married Thomas Pollock, the great grandson of the Pollock who bought De Graffenreid's claim, and died in Newbern. Religion, through all the vicissitudes of its one hundred and seventy years, despite the threatenings of war and the menacing influences of peace, has firmly kept its place in Newbern. Besides the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterians, the Methodists, the Baptists, and the Roman Catholics all have capacious and comfortable houses of worship, and are in a prosperous condition. The colored population also have their devout places for religious service, and are showing a commendable attention to their religious duties. If a sincere consecration to God is the highest excellence of a State, then may we hope that this ancient and meritorious city will not be rejected by the Infinite Mercy. For notwithstanding its fiery trials of poverty and pestilence, and notwithstanding the vices and moral declensions of the age, the spirit and temper of Newbern are fully in accord with the religious hope and faith which first planted the civilization of the Old World among the wild forests of the Neuse.

It is unnecessary to dwell upon the heroic record made by the citizens of Newbern during the progress of the great civil war. Their martial and patriotic deportment through all that trying period, was only a repetition of the war-like

achievements of every section of the Confederacy. The fall of Hatteras on the 30th of August, 1861, threw wide open the gates of our navigation to the military and naval forces of the enemy. Still, if such injudicious attempts had not been made to strengthen the town, if such wretched positions had not been taken by our troops, and better engineering and better handling of our forces had been encountered by the Federal advance, the capture of Newbern might at least have been delayed for many months. But under circumstances of inexperience and mismanagement, its capture became a foregone conclusion. On the 14th of March, 1862, Burnside successfully hurled his legions and his ships of war upon our entrenchments and fortifications, our lines were flanked and broken, and the city fell into the hands of the army of conquest. Twice, during its occupation, the most complete preparations were made for wrenching it from the possession of the enemy. But the first effort miscarried on account of the indifference and incapacity of Gens. Pickett and Barton, and in the second Gen. Hoke, who would certainly have succeeded, was called with his division to Virginia, just as he was about to open the assault. After this the Confederacy was compelled to fight for its life upon the very threshold of its existence, and the old town was abandoned to its fate. It has a long and illustrious roll of honor to show to the generations yet to come. Upon almost every battle field of the war she shed her blood lavishly for the defence of the country. She gave the noblest and bravest of her young men for the "lost cause" and the "furled banner." And now, after their death, she has built them a noble sepulchre, where, surrounded by the sacred dust of Gaston, Stanly, Donnell, Shepherd and others of her famous sons, she has gratefully entombed their remains, and annually sheds the tear of pity and scatters the beautiful flowers of remembrance over their martyr graves. She is determined, that if the fruits have perished, the recollection of her dead heroes shall live forever.

Since the termination of the war, Newbern has been busily employed in repairing the waste places, in settling and applying new theories of development, and in getting ready for a higher and more reliable commercial progress. Her business men are looking to manufactures as one of the

most certain elements of her future prosperity. Already a large cotton factory is at work near the point where the homeless palatines pitched their tent in the dim misty long ago. A capacious and prosperous plate factory is driving its machinery almost within a stone's throw of the beautiful terrace which stretched its radiant greensward under the rear windows of Gov. Tryon's palace. A bucket factory, a rice mill, an enterprising agricultural house, where plows and other implements of husbandry are made, iron foundries, together with many other manufacturing projects are in full and successful operation. Agriculture also is springing into fresh life, and is taking much encouragement from the marked attention which is given to truck farming in this vicinity. Hundreds of acres are being planted in peas and potatoes, which after harvesting will again be covered with valuable crops of cotton and corn. Through the indefatigable industry of one of our most intelligent citizens, a colony of Hollanders has been settled on a rich body of land below the city, and it is believed that this will prove a healthy stimulus to immigration in the future. The Neuse and the Trent, the great highways of interior commerce for the city, are being rapidly opened and improved by the application of appropriations granted by the general Government, and in a short time very remote and obscure sections of the country, through the facilities of steam, will have their products pouring into Newbern. To complete the more cheerful prospect which now opens up before us, the merchants of the city have organized themselves into a Board of Trade, and are pulling together with harmony, intelligence and zeal in the reconstruction of our mercantile condition and character. They may not have the capital, experience and personal force of the powerful race of merchants who built up Newbern at the beginning of this century, but they are as fully intelligent, earnest and persevering. Thus it will be seen, that while the old elements of commercial prosperity and power have vanished into the past, never to be restored, there is at least an encouraging probability of such a measure of local opulence and success as we have not known for many years.

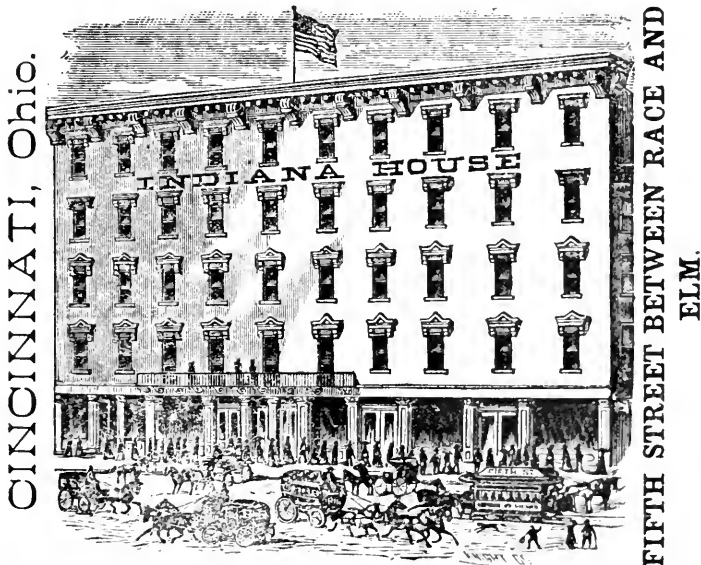
