


Orders for less than ten of a variety or grade will be invoiced at an ADVANCE of 50% OVER THE TEN RATE, REGARDLESS OF THE SIZE OF THE ORDER, except Conifers and Broadleaved Evergreens where 5 plants at the 10 rate and 25 plants at the 100 rate are available.

Prices do not include packing charges.

#### GRADES

We grade liberally. All shrubs of specified sizes are well furnished and well rooted. Culls are as rigidly excluded from the lightest grades listed as from the heaviest stock. Our rule is, "WHEN IN DOUBT, PUT IT IN THE LOWER GRADE." Detailed information as to method of grading Hedge Plants and Roses is given under such heads.

#### CLAIMS

All claims must be made immediately after receipt of stock.

#### LIABILITY and NON-WARRANTY

All quotations are for immediate acceptance and subject to stock being sold.
