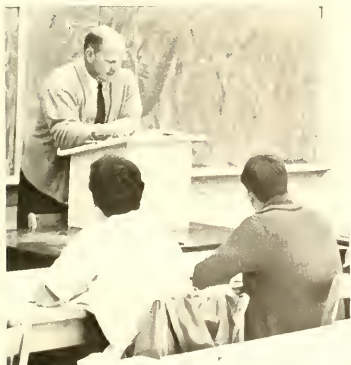


Economics and Business Administration



Many extra hours are spent in class by accounting students laboring over the same problems they thought they had completed the night before. Accounting is not only a difficult subject but also a time consuming one that must be mastered by business majors.

The Division of Economics and Business Administration is set up to train future executives and accountants and to supply the background for future graduate work. Emphasis is placed upon the student's development of an understanding of the fundamental principles governing business management and of the basic patterns of economic thought. Three major courses of study—economics, business administration, and accounting—are offered in this division.

Education

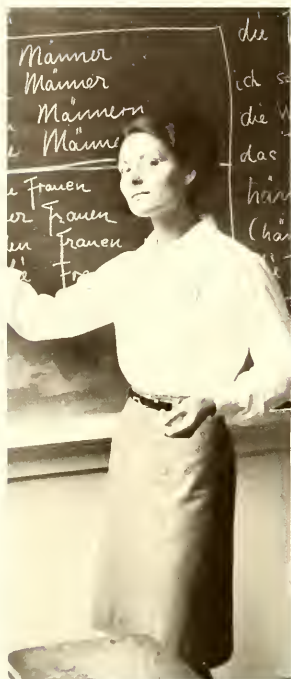

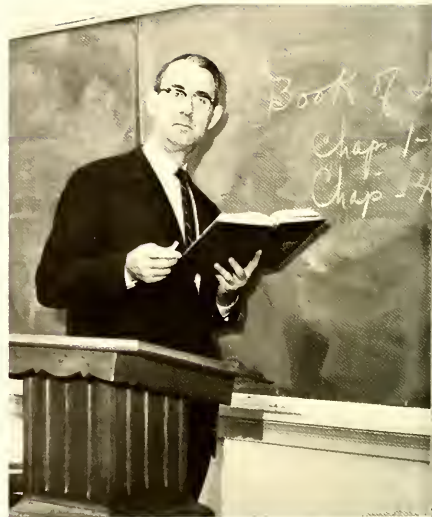

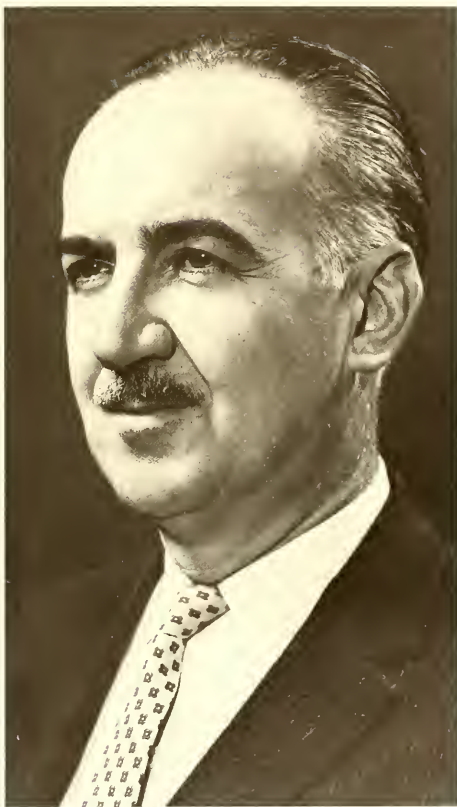

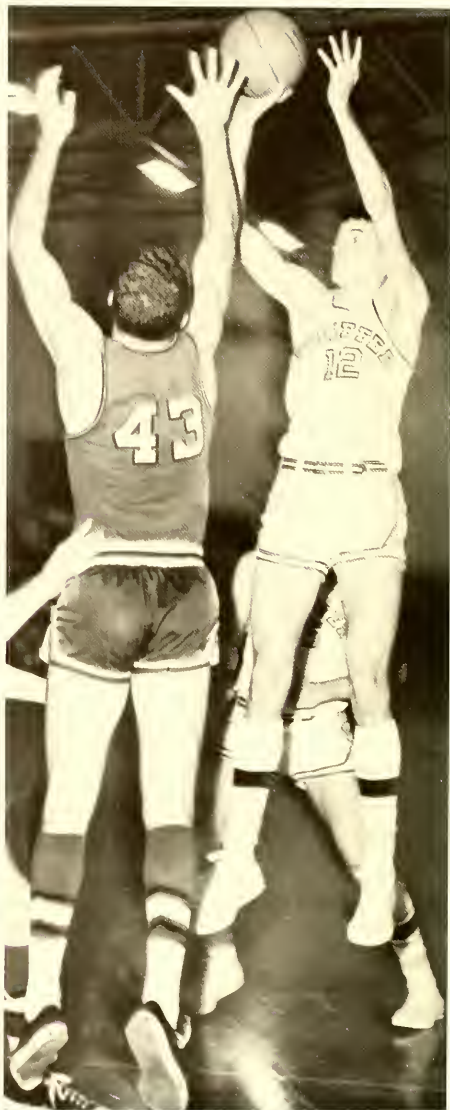

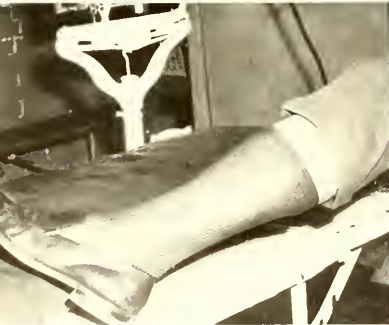

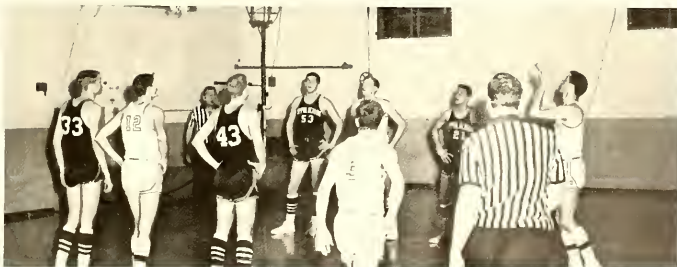

Falcon guard Gareth Beshears fakes out his defenders and drives for the basket. As the defender tries to recover, Gareth takes a jump shot.

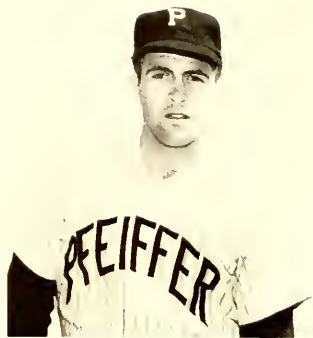

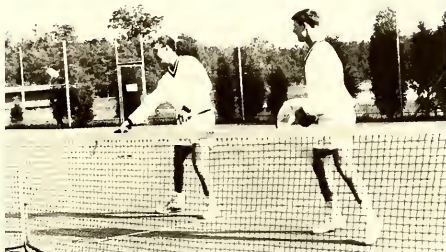

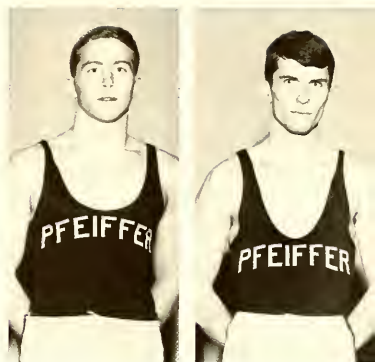

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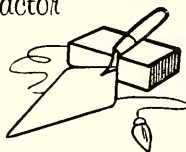
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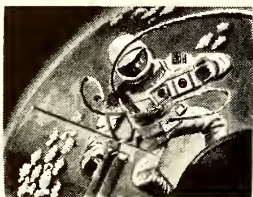
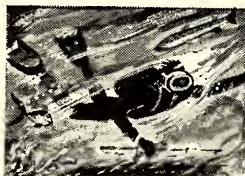
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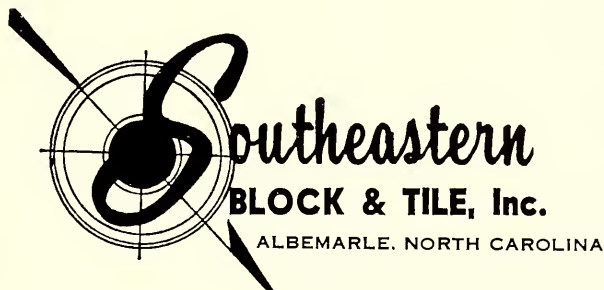
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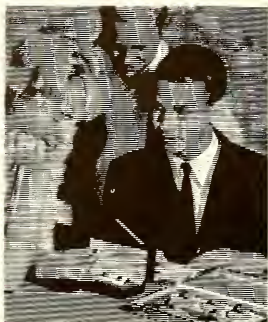
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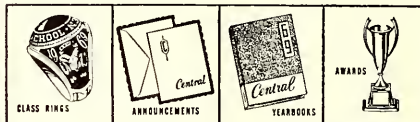
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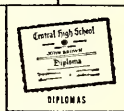
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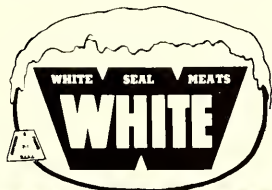
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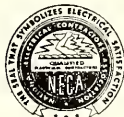
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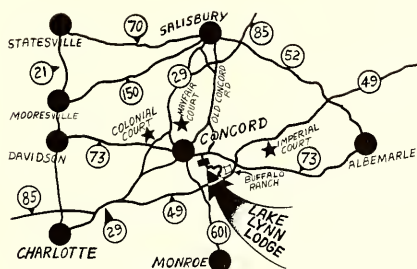
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Editor's Comments
