

"Now, let's consider that average grade of -10 and only the final exam to go," befuddles Coach Martin.







Accuracy is imperative in experiments consisting of elements in minute quantities. Errors could be disastrous.




The botany greenhouse offers an opportunity for students to explore and investigate plant life cycles and growth.













After the holiday recess the Falcons were lacking in depth as four freshmen appeared in the starting line-up: however, the freshmen were determined. They combined their talents with the experience of performers like Mike Smith, Rick Knapp, and Vic Worry. Many games were filled with tension and depended upon the final basket to answer victory or defeat. The 1966-67 season was mainly a rebuilding for Pfeiffer.










