After the holiday recess the Falcons were lacking in depth as four freshmen appeared in the starting line-up: however, the freshmen were determined. They combined their talents with the experience of performers like Mike Smith, Rick Kinapp, and Vic Worry. Many games were filled with tension and depended upon the final basket to answer victory or defeat. The $1966-67$ season was mainly a rebuilding for Pfeiffer.
