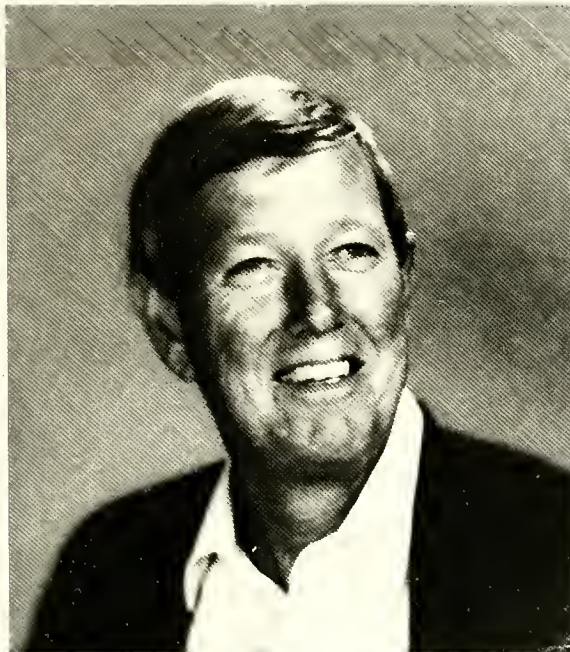

As I recall Delmas and the memories he and I made for years, I am happy as I am reminded to "do a little good in this world" because it "matters" that he lived and I want it to matter that I am alive. May we all try to "do a little good", always remembering Delmas.

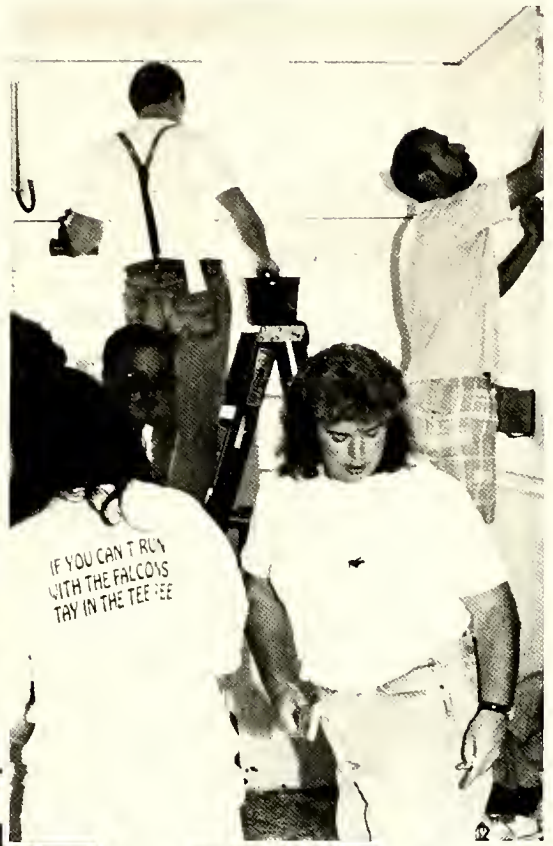

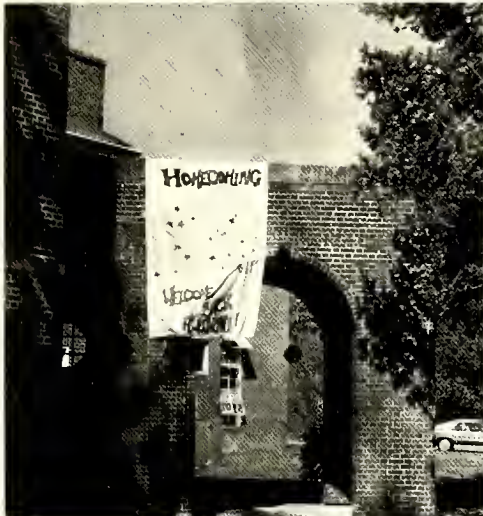

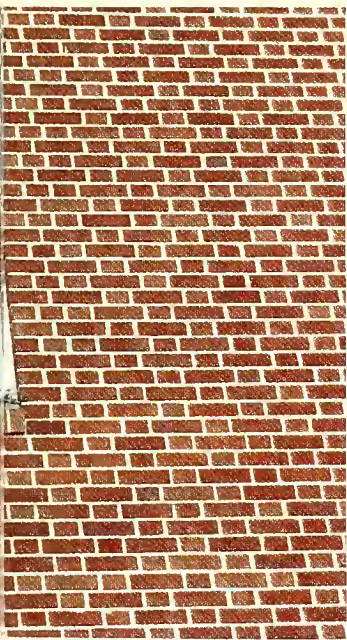


Williamsburg Christmas



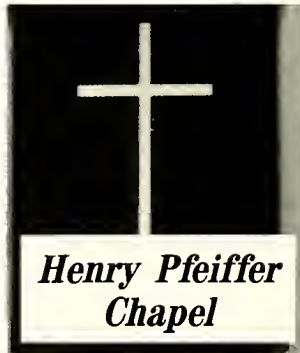

In addition to the donors, many students volunteered their time to work at the Bloodmobiles each time.

Carol LaCroix, M.D., the Blood Services Chairman states, "Thanks to Pfeiffer College the Carolinas Region of the American Red Cross has been able to fulfill blood needs of patients in 90 regional hospitals in 56 counties. You have also helped the Carolinas Region meet their requirement of 200 units per week which is being shipped to our Armed Forces serving in Operation Desert Storm."



High School Chemistry Day



Fifty-four students from North Stanly, South Stanly and West Stanly High Schools and their advisors attended Chemistry Day November 7 on the Pfeiffer College Campus.

Lisa Hill, Pfeiffer College senior chemistry major and president of the student affiliate chapter of the American Chemical Society, introduced the day's activities.

President of the college, Zane Eargle, welcomed the guests with these words, "We commend you for your interest in the sciences. Our chemistry department has an excellent reputation, one that is backed by statistics. We hope that many of you will commit to a career in science. Such a career will lead you to success, not only financially, but also in the emotional reward that comes from doing something good for your country."

The liberal arts college president went on to tell the high school students that they who succeed in the sciences at Pfeiffer are almost guaranteed a graduate school education — with salary and tuition full-ride. The demand for chemistry majors is so great that this is the situation that Pfeiffer College graduates are encountering.

Michael Riemann, Academic Dean of the college, in his opening remarks to the students said, "I remind you of the importance of getting not only a degree, but more importantly an education. This allows you to be versatile, and prepares you to move and switch careers as you desire . . . I do put in a plug for chemistry however!"

Donald Jackman, head of the chemistry department at Pfeiffer, told the students that it is the 143,000 member American Chemical Society that sets the standards for the United States.

Citing statistics that have already been publicized in recent months, he reminded the students that Pfeiffer College has an excellent record of graduates who attend and complete graduate studies following their time at Pfeiffer. 72% of Pfeiffer graduates have gone on to graduate studies in the past 24 years. Pfeiffer College also graduates, despite its small student body enrollment, 4.2 chemistry graduates per year. This compares favorably with much larger colleges and universities.

Jackman told those gathered that by the year 2000 that the United States will face a shortage of 500,000 to 750,000 chemists, physicists, and engineers.

"Sixty-five percent of the graduate students in the sciences are non-resident aliens," he warned. "We are educating the rest of the world, while our own students are not going to be able to compete."

He continued, "In ten years one-half of all the high school science teachers are going to retire." This will leave the United States in a situation where there will be no science teachers, or salaries will have to go up significantly to attract persons into the field.

Speaking of salaries, he offered some financial incentive for those who might want to enter a career in chemistry. In private industry, current starting salaries for those who have a bachelor's degree are \$20 to \$22,000 annually; with a master's \$27 to \$32,000 annually; and with a PhD \$44 to \$58,000 annually. Salaries are somewhat higher for engineers.

Following the introductions, the visiting students attended demonstrations of state-of-the-art electronic equipment, heard research projects explained and attended a chemistry lecture.

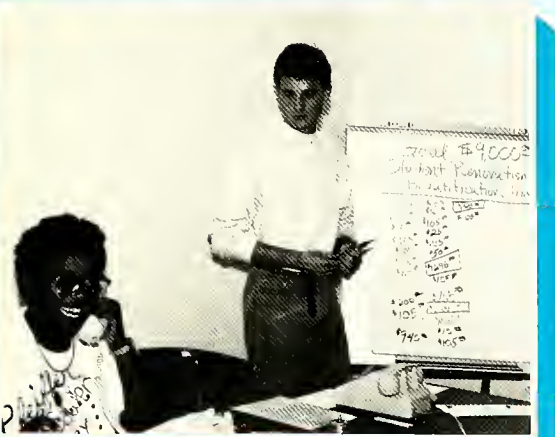

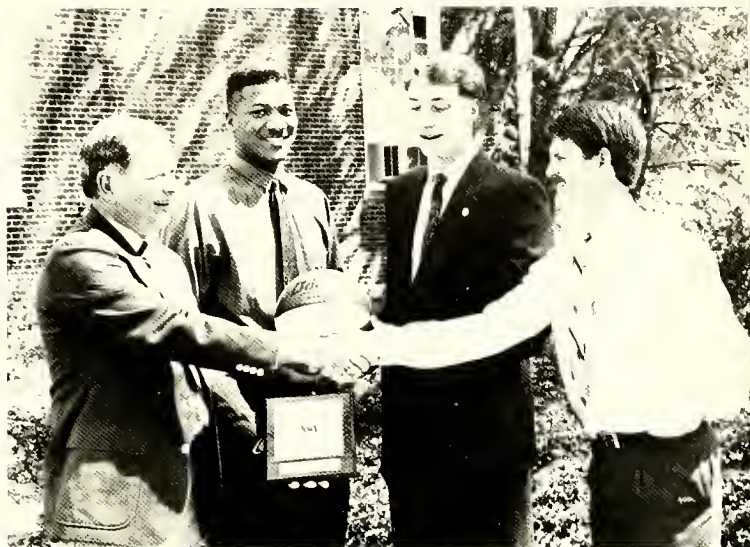

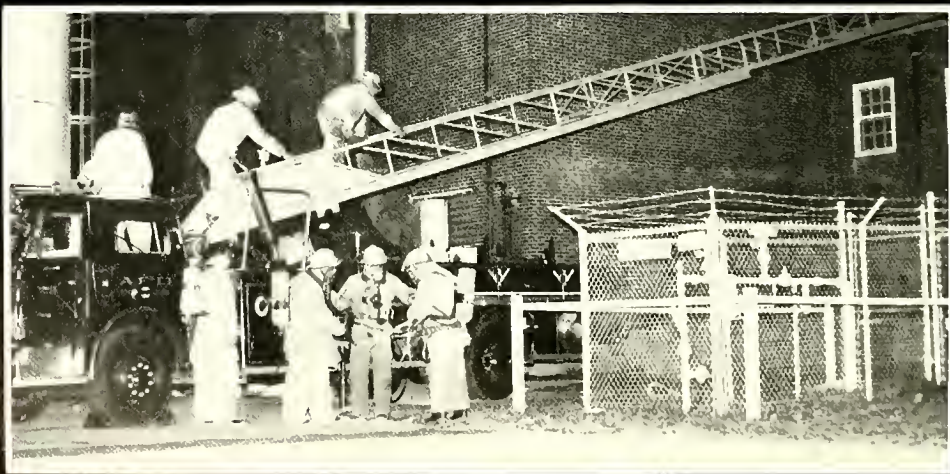
The memories of the 1990-1991 year at Pfeiffer were not all pleasant. A series of set fires, which started out as small trash can fires in the men's dorms, ended with a fire that damaged the top level of the Stokes Student Center. The majority of the damage was not as a result of the fire's flames, but rather from the residual heat, smoke and water.

Prior to the December 2 fire, which broke out at 6:18 pm on the third floor in the reception area of the Student Government Association Office, there had been 10 trash can fires. The December fire resulted in over \$250,000 worth of damage. There was smoke damage to the first floor, water damage to the second floor and smoke and heat damage to the third floor. The fire closed the third floor of the Stokes Student Center till the end of the Spring semester. The radio station was not able to go on air and the student publications and several student organizations were forced to find make-shift work areas. The chimes lost its entire fall semester layouts.

As a result of the fire, the administration kept the women's residence doors locked 24 hours a day and security and patrols were increased.

More than \$5,000 worth of reward money was offered for information leading to the apprehension of anyone involved in the setting of the fires.

As the spring semester began it was stated that the problem had been taking care of and that there hopefully would be no more set fires.



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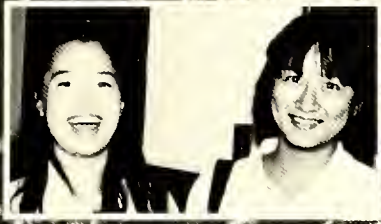

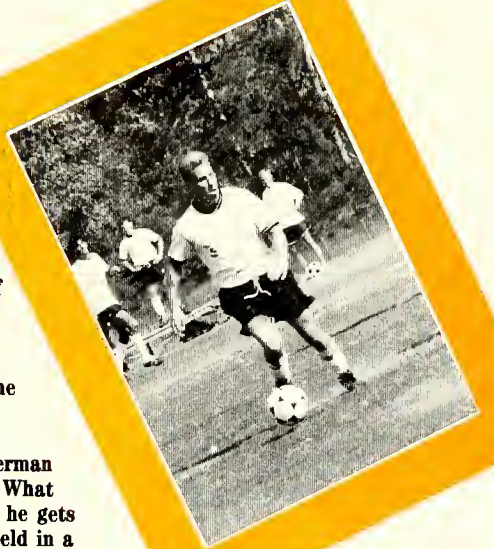

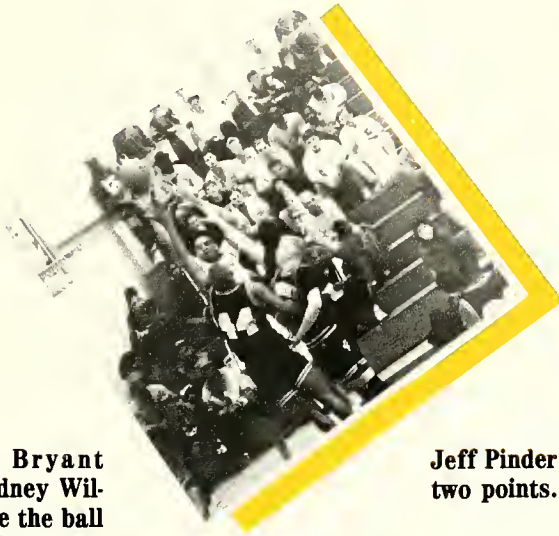

This year's season was a great expectation for Pfeiffer. The Falcons were ranked in the preseason NAIA top 10, they were the preseason pick to win the district title. What the Falcon's accomplished was: first-ever appearance in the NAIA Final Four, most wins in a season (29), highest winning percentage (87.9), scored over 100 points in 12 games (a team record), set record for most points scored in a single game (132 against Barton College), and highest point average (96.5).

The Falcons opened the season with a win over the NCAA Division II team, the University of South Carolina at Spartanburg. The Falcons took a trip to the Bahamas and did a splendid job on the court by beating the Bahama National Team and Medger Evans of New York before losing to an excellent Belmont team out of Tennessee. That loss gave the Falcons their first loss of the season. After that loss, the Falcons went on to a nine game winning streak. During the nine game sweep, the Falcons battled for a chance to move into first place in the conference. They did so with their win against Pembroke State at home on January 16. This was the first of four meetings between the two rivals during the season.

The winning streak ended, and unfortunately at the hands of none other than Pembroke State. They won four in a row after the Pembroke loss, but in the course of those four games the team lost three starters; Marcus Elam, Bo Bryant and Jeff Pinder to injuries. Pfeiffer showed that they had one of the best benches around and continued to win despite the loss of key players.

The win over Barton College was a big win in many ways. It was a record setting victory (most points in a game, 132), it gave the Falcons the Conference Title for the second year in a row and it provided Pfeiffer with some court advantage for the district tournament.

After winning the district tournament, the Falcons set their sights on the NAIA Nationals. Last year, the team went into the tournament unranked but confident. This year the team was ranked and had a lot of expectations, as they had throughout the season. So with high hopes, the team was off the Kansas City, Kansas.

The team made it to the "Final Four" but were unable to bring home the title. The team did an awesome job representing Pfeiffer in Kansas. Tony Smith won Most Valuable Player and was chosen for the first team All American. Bo Bryant was named Academic All American. Rodney Wilson and Jeff Pinder were named All American.

The Student Government Association



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THE ASSOCIATION OF MEN STUDENTS is a branch of the Student Government Association. The AMS represents and furthers the special interests of the men students. This association serves as a medium for presenting the men's opinions to student government, faculty, and administration. The AMS promotes responsible action of the men students in all phases of campus life.

The AMS is governed by an Executive Council which carries out the business and projects of the organization. The council keeps communications open on campus. Each residence hall elects a House Council whose major responsibility is to carry out the business, regulations, and projects of the hall.

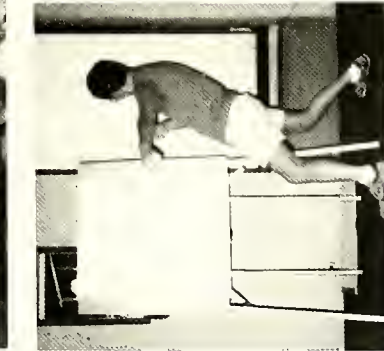

The CUB also gathers ideas for future entertainment. The CUB office receives catalogs and entertainment brochures on a regular basis and contacts outside agencies and other colleges to find good entertainment. Since the main objective of the CUB is to provide entertainment which Pfeiffer students will enjoy, students are asked for their ideas. Often, they are one of the best sources of suggestions.

THE RELIGIOUS LIFE program is coordinated by the Religious Life Council, a faculty-student group with representatives from all of the campus religious organizations. The RLC Executive Committee is elected by the student body and encourages Religious worship, fellowship, study, and service on the campus. It seeks to preserve unity of spirit in matters relating to member organizations and to develop an ecumenical spirit on the campus. It coordinates the activities of the following member organizations and integrates them into the total religious life of the College. Membership in all organizations is open to all students regardless of religious affiliation.



THE AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY

is an organization through which students in chemistry and related disciplines become better acquainted; experience the intellectual stimulation of professional association; obtain experience in preparing and presenting technical material before audiences; and develop a professional spirit, a pride in chemistry, and an awareness of the responsibilities and challenges of the modern chemist.



THE MATH CLUB

is a club which is open for membership to all students and faculty who are interested in mathematics or who are studying mathematics as a career option. The club meets monthly during the academic year to hear invited speakers and to plan activities of marked interest to the members. An important club activity each year is the high school mathematics contest that requires faculty and students to work very closely together during the testing and evaluation.

THE OUTINGS CLUB is a club which promotes and sponsors backpacking trips and other outdoor activities.



BLACK ALLIANCE is an organization that provides a voice for black students and promotes awareness of black culture among all students.

PFEIFFER REVIEW

The Pfeiffer art and literary magazine is published bi-annually. It recognizes and shares the creative literary and artistic talents of the men and women of the College.



CHIMES

The Pfeiffer College yearbook serves as a permanent record of all facets of campus life. The annual is published by students for the students.

WSPC RADIO

The Pfeiffer radio station provides a medium of information and entertainment for students and offers training and experience in broadcasting techniques to interested students.

PFEIFFER NEWS

The campus newspaper is written and edited by students. It reports campus news; offers opinions of students and others on a variety of topics; and provides a forum for reflections on student life, college affairs, and events beyond the campus.

International



In the early morning hours of August 2, 1990 following negotiations and promises by Iraq's dictator, Saddam Hussein, not to use force, a powerful Iraqi army invaded Kuwait. Within three days 120,000 Iraqi troops with 850 tanks had poured into Kuwait. The United States wasted no time answering the aggression. Hours after the invasion Arabs took to the streets in Anti-Iraq demonstrations. (Pictured above is one of those demonstrations in London). The United States reacted immediately to the invasion, building up a U.S. force of well over 100,000 troops in neighboring Saudi Arabia. Other nations also sent troops and financial support. The United Nations voted for an economic embargo against Iraq. Pictured above are U.S. tanks and troops in the Persian Gulf area.



It was a time of change in Eastern Europe. Communism no longer ruled. Demonstrators demanding an end to communist domination lit candles and placed flowers on bloodstained sidewalks where police attacked protesters in the largest rally in 20 years. Thousands of students marched to commemorate student Jan Opletal, killed by Nazis. When demonstrators tried to reach Wenceslas Square, police attacked with tear gas, dogs and clubs.



After months of debate and years of struggle, East Germany and West Germany became the Federal Republic of Germany on October 3, 1990. The new country will have a total population of nearly 78 million people and will occupy 137,743 square miles, or about half the size of Texas. Five East German states joined West Germany and Berlin became the capital.

Food had become a scarce commodity in the Soviet Union. Even bread — cheap and always plentiful — joined the list of hard-to-get items that included tobacco, paper and gasoline. Anatoly Znamensky, a retired taxi driver said: "Vegetables, cheese, butter, meat — they appear and disappear. But with bread there was never a problem, until now." Russia is finding it difficult to feed itself.



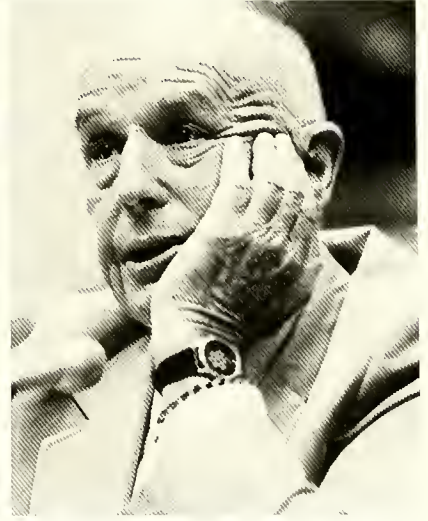
David Souter became the latest member of the supreme court in October. He is known in his adopted home state of New Hampshire as a brilliant legal scholar, a diligent judge and a private man who never married. Souter is seen here with President Bush after his nomination was announced.



President George Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev of the Soviet Union met several times during 1990 on economic matters, nuclear matters and on the matters of a possible war in the Persian Gulf. (Both leaders joined together in condemning Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.) The Cold War between the two super powers has ended and an era of cooperation has begun.



President Mikhail Gorbachev is struggling to unite and reform the Soviet Union. The country is in a critical economic condition. The communist party and the government agree that reform is needed, but they disagree on how to achieve it. Gorbachev is seen here during a summit meeting with President Bush.



The 'Savings and Loan' business hit a brick wall in 1990. It is estimated that the losses will be in the billions of dollars. One of the good guys in all this is William Seidman, the chairman of the FDIC. Short and stout and in his late 60's, Seidman has his work cut out for him. The S & L's are in so much trouble that the FDIC has been refunding money to people who lost their savings in failed S & L's.



The rain came in the spring of 1990 and one of the hardest hit areas of the country was Texas and parts of the southeast. In this picture a group of people are seen standing on a half-submerged bridge near Dallas. Thousands of families in the hardest-hit north and north central Texas counties of Liberty, Bowie, Brown and Dallas watched the rain-swollen Bravos Trinity and Red River wash away their homes and large pieces of their lives.



Ivana and Donald Trump may look the picture of marital bliss, but don't believe it. Trump's millions were slowly eroded in 1990 to the edge of financial disaster. He and Ivana, his wife of 13 years, separated after Trump was romantically linked with actress/model Marla Maples. "The Donald" moved out of their 50 room triplex in New York's Trump Tower and talk of divorce has rumored.



Nelson Mandela was given a life sentence in 1962 for plotting to overthrow the South African Government. He became one of the world's most influential prisoners. In February, 1990, at the age of 71, Nelson Mandela was released after lengthy negotiations with President F.W. de Klerk.



In August, 1990, a 34 year old football player, Joe Montana, made history. He negotiated one of the richest contracts in NFL history with the San Francisco 49ers. He would be paid \$13 million over 4 years to play football. Montana led the 49ers to their 4th Super Bowl victory in the previous season. Montana has become the standard by which all other quarterbacks are measured.



Nolan Ryan can still put plenty of heat on his fastball. At the age of 43 that says something about his lasting abilities. He holds more than 40 major league records including most no-hitters, most one-hitters and most strike outs. He got his name in the record books while playing for the New York Mets, The California Angels, the Houston Astros and the Texas Rangers.



There she is, Miss America. Marjorie Judith Vincent, Miss Illinois, is a pianist of Haitian descent who wants to practice international law. Miss American 1991 is 25 and a third year law student at Duke University. She graduated from DePaul University in 1988 with a degree in music.



Richard Marx was a back-up singer and song writer before he landed a solo recording contract in 1986. His first album, "Richard Marx", spawned four hit singles and earned him a Grammy nomination. Even though it took Marx until 1989 to release his second album, "Repeat Offender", his music continues to be popular.



When you're hot, you're hot, and the golden girl Madonna has been hot for a long time. The actress, singer and 'Material Girl' has had hit after hit on the charts. In the fall of 1990, Madonna's latest album, "I'm Breathless", was high on the list, and on the top 100 singles list "Hanky Panky" continued to appear.

When he was 12 he wrote his first song and three years later he signed with Epic Records. Now he is a Grammy winner. Bolton poses here with the award he won for the best male pop vocal. M.C. Hammer is a 27-year-old rapper from Oakland, California, who is really hot. His second album, "Please Hammer Don't Hurt 'Em", sold close to 5 million copies and is one of a few rap albums in history to land at the top of the charts. When Hammer puts on a show, it's an extravaganza, complete with 32 performers, cutting edge costumes, and some of the flashiest footwork being done on stage today. He's an entertainer, no doubt about it.

The shelter on the average houses 22 individuals per night and in the winter, the number is sometimes more.

The shelter is open to anyone who wishes to spend the night. If an individual is not a resident of Rowan County, they are allowed to stay there for 3 days while looking for other housing. This community service is one of two service projects the Religious Life Council attempts to provide for the community.

I have to say that there is a lot to be said about my year as Editor In Chief of the 1991 Chimes. I would like to start by expressing my gratitude to some very important people whom without this book would have never been published. Although a simple thank you may sound trite, it is given with my deepest sincerity. The first thank you goes to Christi Joyner who selflessly took over the job of assistant editor and spent the first part of her summer and the following fall helping me pull this book together (Chick I owe you several rounds of B-52's). I couldn't have been blessed with a better editor or friend. I feel confident leaving my position to her as the 1992 Editor In Chief. Next there is Preston Smith who offered a "focused" view of the 1991 Chimes when he took over as the photography editor. He not only artistically provided a great deal of the photographs, but also many of the descriptive captions. Ann Blackmore-Keyes also contributed a "focused" outlook for the Chimes. When campus apathy seemed to be the capital response to our plea for rescue after the fire, Ann came through with tons of pictures and copy. Thanks to Anns assistance we were able to obtain the events we lacked and enhance the material we had.

While Mark Sell's was not exactly a staff member, he had one of the hardest jobs. He had to put up with me when I was alone with 168 unfinished pages in a strange city. He also provided the support and encouragement I needed to go from one layout to the next, not to mention the table which I selfishly occupied from June to January. (Thanks for the kitchen table babe!)

My final thank you is reserved for Dr. Peg Sides (Harmon). Dr Sides gave me the freedom to handle this book the way I chose, but was always there when needed to offer endless guidance, understanding and friendship. Thanks Dr. Sides for you confidence in me and the grammar lessons!

Now on to the Chimes. In retrospect it is ironic that when we started the book we chose an unwritten theme of "Not what you expect". We chose this theme because we wanted the 1991 edition to be something completely different from the past years. We desired a book which encompassed the ideas and motifs of each individual, not a book of conformity of individuals into one single expression. We wanted all perceptions represented no matter how abstract and not a book of uniform pages and concepts as it had been in the previous years. We anticipated a book that even if you did not like it as a whole you would like at least one concept and you would appreciate its diversity and creativity.

To say the least, the year was full of "unexpected" events and spoiled "expectations". The start of the Chimes was "Unexpectedly" postponed due to the absence of an editor or staff organization. Once we overcame this obstacle, we quickly made up for lost time by scrambling to compose several excellent layouts by November. The same week layouts for the fall were to be mailed, we were "unexpectedly" struck by a fire. This fire not only destroyed every fall layout and 90% of our photographs, but it also took away our supplies, our layout room, our office, and our dark room. We were completely incapacitated and "unexpectedly" left with no confirmation of our first semesters efforts, not to mention the austere outlook for the upcoming spring semester.

"Unexpectedly" the spring semester staff started out with high expectations and motivation to turn around the disastrous events of the fall and move on with the spring. Unfortunately our attempts to restore the first semester were obstructed by campus apathy. No matter how we pleaded we were unable to get material to represent what we had lost. After almost four months of searching the only support we had received was from the athletic department, to whom I extend my sincerest gratitude, and a couple of students. When the spring semester ended we had submitted 15 pages, had 25 unedited proofs and a box of unsorted pictures and copy. This started my summer with 168 pages to produce and no staff.

Debbie Carnes and I spent the first week gathering information for layout and thanks to Ann Blackmore-Keyes that information was available. Debbie was called away, and against my "expectations" Christi Joyner and Preston Smith came forward to help. Over the next 8 months, between Florida and Misenheimer, we put this book together and finally sent it to press in January 1992.

Due to the string of "unexpected" events this book was delayed, even though the real production time was only 8 months (right on schedule), these 8 months started 8 months late. During this delay many people expressed concern for the plight of their yearbook and frustration about the book's lateness. To this I only have to say that if that same concern and frustration had been expressed when it was needed instead of campus-wide impassivity and unresponsiveness, faculty included, then the yearbook would have arrived much sooner, maybe even on schedule. Therefore I will not apologize. Each person had the opportunity to make a difference and as usual only a handful overcame the apathetic attitude.

Again I extend my gratitude to all of those people who had a part in putting together this book. Even though it was trying at times I am really glad that I had the opportunity to be editor and I know that I will always remember this experience and this edition of the Chimes as one that was "Not What I Expected".
