## High School Chemistry Day



Fiftyfour stadents from North Stanly, Sonth Stanly and West Stanly High Schools and their advisors attended Chemistry Day Novemher 7 on the Pfeiffer College Campus.
Lisa Hill, Pfeiffer College senior chemistry major and president of the student affiliate chapter of the American Chemical Soclety, introduced the day's activities.
President of the college, Zane Eargle, welcomed the guests with these words, "We commend yon for your Interest ln the sciences. Our chemistry department has an excellent reputation, one that is hacked hy statistics. We hope that many of yon will commit to a career in science. Snch a career will lead you to snccess, not only financially, hut also in the emotional reward that comes from doing something good for your country."
The liberal arts college president went on to tell the high school students that they who succeed in the sciences at Pfeiffer are almost guaranteed a gradnate school edncation - with salary and tuition full-ride. The demand for chemistry majors is so great that this is the sltuation that Pfeiffer College gradnates are enconntering.

Mlcheal Riemann, Academic Dean of the college, in his opening remarks to the students sald, "I remind you of the importance of getting not only a degree, hnt more importantly an education. This allows yon to be versatile, and prepares yon to move and switch careers as yon desire ... I do pat in a plug for chemistry however!"
Donald Jackman, head of the chemistry department at Pfeiffer, told the students that it ls the 143,000 memher American Chemical Soclety that sets the standards for the United States.
Clting statistics that have already been pnhllclzed in recent months, he reminded the students that Pfeiffer College has an excellent record of graduates who attend and complete gradnate stadies following their time at Pfeiffer. $\mathbf{7 2 \%}$ of Pfeiffer graduates have gone on to graduate studies in the past 24 years. Pfeiffer College also gradnates, despite its small student hody enrollment, 4.2 chemistry gradnates per year. This compares favorahly with mnch larger colleges and universities.
Jackman told those gathered that hy the year 2000 that the United States will face a shortage of 500,000 to 750,000 chemists, physlcists, and engineers.
"Sixty-five percent of the graduate students in the sclences are non-resident alleus," he warned. "We are edncating the rest of the world, while our own students are not going to be ahle to compete."
He continned, "In ten years one-half of all the high school science teachers are going to retire." This will leave the United States in a sitaation where there will he no science teachers, or salaries will have to go up significantly to attract persons into the field.
Speaking of salaries, he offered some financial incentive for those who might want to enter a career in chemistry. In private industry, current starting slaries for those who have a hachlor's degree are $\$ 20$ to $\$ 22,000$ annnally; with a master's $\$ 27$ to $\$ 32,000$ annnally; and with a PhD $\$ 44$ to $\$ 58,000$ annually. Salaries are somewhat higher for engineers.

Following the introdnctions, the visiting students attended demonstrations of state-of-the-art electronic equipment, heard research projects explained and attended a chemistry lecture.

Chemistry Day is held annually on the Pfeiffer College Campus.

## Phonathon

The 1990-91 Phonathons were a tremendous success. In addition to the Parent's Phonathon in September, which raised a total of $\$ 14,191$ twentyeight student volunteers also called alumni and friends of the college from October 22 through November 15. The student telemarketers solicited an additional $\$ 68,312$ in pledges. These phonathon pledges will assist the Alumni Board in raising their $\$ 150,000$ goal for $\mathbf{1 9 9 0}-91$. Funds from these pledges will help with the everyday activity of the college: with boosting faculty and staff salaries: with campus renovation: and with student scholarships.

The memories of the 1990-1991 year at Pfeiffer were not all pleasant. A series of set fires, which started out as small trash can fires in the men's dorms, ended with a fire that damaged the top level of the Stokes Student Center. The majority of the damage was not as a result of the fire's flames, but rather from the residual heat, smoke and water.

Prior to the December 2 fire, which broke out at $6: 18 \mathrm{pm}$ on the third floor in the reception area of the Student Government Association Office, there had been 10 trash can fires. The December fire resulted in over $\$ 250,000$ worth of damage. There was smoke damage to the first floor, water damage to the second floor and smoke and heat damage to the third floor. The fire closed the third floor of the Stokes Student Center till the end of the Spring semester. The radio station was not able to go on air and the student publications and several student organizations were forced to find make-shift work areas. The chimes loss its entire fall semester layouts.

As a result of the fire, the administration kept the women's residence doors locked 24 hours a day and security and patrols were increased.

More than $\$ 5,000$ worth of reward money was offered for information leading to the apprehension of anyone involved in the setting of the fires.

As the spring semester began it was stated that the problem had been taking care of and that there hopefully would be no more set fires.

What the Falcon's accomplished was: first-ever appearance in the NAIA "inal Four, most wins in a season (29), highest winning percentage (87.9), scored over 100 points in 12 games a team record), set record for most points scored in a single game (132 against Barton College), and highest oint average (96.5).

Pfeiffer showed that they had one of the best benches round and continued to win despite the loss of key players.

- The win over Barton College was a big win in many ways. It was a record setting victory (most points in a ame, 132), it gave the Falcons the Conference Title for the second year in a row and it provided Pfeiffer with ome court advantage for the district tournament.
After winning the district tournament, the Falcons set their sights on the NAIA Nationals. Last year, the eam went into the tournament unranked but confident. This year the team was ranked and had alot of xpectations, as they had throughout the season. So with high hopes, the team was off the Kansas City, iansas.
The team made it to the "Final Four" but were unable to bring home the title. The team did an awesome ob representing Pfeiffer in Kansas. Tony Smith won Most Valuable Player and was chosen for the first team Ull American. Bo Bryant was named Academic All American. Rodney Wilson and Jeff Pinder were named All american.

## International



In the early morning hours of August 2, 1990 following negotiations and promises by Iraqs dictator, Saddam Hussein, not to use force, a powerful Iraqi army invaded Kuwait. Within three days 120,000 Iraqi troops with 850 tanks had poured into Kuwait. The United States wasted no time answering the aggression. Hours after the invasion Arabs took to the streets in Anti-Iraq demonstrations. (Pictured above is one of those demonstrations in London). The United States reacted immediately to the invasion, building up a U.S. force of well over 100,000 troops in neighboring Saudi Arabia. Other nations also sent troops and financial support. The United Nations voted for an economic embargo against Iraq. Pictured above are U.S. tanks and troops in the Persian Gulf area.


It was a time of change in Eastern Europe. Communism no longer ruled. Demonstrators demanding an end to communist domination lit candles and placed flowers on bloodstained sidewalks where police attacked protestors in the largest rally in 20 years. Thousands of students marched to commemorate student Jan Opletal, killed by Nazis. When demonstrators tried to reach Wenceslas Square, police attacked with tear gas, dogs and clubs.


After months of debate and years of struggle, E: Germany and West Germany became the Federal le public of Germany on October 3, 1990. The new count will have a total population of nearly 78 million peots and will occupy 137,743 square miles, or about half 16 size of Texas. Five East German states joined W; Germany and Berlin became the capital.

Food had become a scarce commodity in the Soviet Union. Even bread - cheap and always plentiful joined the list of hard-to-get items that included tobacco, paper and gasoline. Anatoly Znamensky, a retired taxi driver said: "Vegetables, cheese, butter, meat they appear and disappear. But with bread there was never a problem, until now." Russia is finding it difficult to feed itself.


David Souter became the latest member of the supreme court in October. He is known in his adopted home state of New Hampshire as a brilliant legal scholar, a diligent judge and a private man who never married. Souter is seen here with President Bush after his nomination was announced.


President George Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev of the Soviet Union met several times during 1990 on economic matters, nuclear matters and on the matters of a possible war in the Persian Gulf. (Both leaders joined together in condemning Iraqs invasion of Kuwait.) The Cold War between the two super powers has ended and an era of cooperation has begun. ,

President Mikhail Gorbachev is struggling to unite and reform the Soviet Union. The country is in a critical economic condition. The communist party and the government agree that reform is needed, but they disagree on how to achieve it. Gorbachev is seen here during a summit meeting with President Bush.



The 'Savings and Loan' business hit a brick wall in 1990. It is estimated that the losses will be in the billions of dollars. One of the good guys in all this is William Seidman, the chairman of the FDIC. Short and stout and in his late 60 's, Seidman has his work cut out for him. The S \& L's are in so much trouble that the FDIC has been refunding money to people who lost their savings in failed S \& L's.


The rain came in the spring of 1990 and one of the hardest hit areas of the country was Texas and parts of the southeast. In this picture a group of people are seen standing on a half-submerged bridge near Dallas. Thousands of families in the hardest-hit north and north central Texas counties of Liberty, Bowie, Brown and Dallas watched the rain-swollen Bravos Trinity and Red River wash away their homes and large pieces of their lives.

In August, 1990, a 34 year old football player, Joe Montana, made history. He negotiated one of the richest contracts in NFL history with the San Francisco 49ers. He would be paid $\$ 13$ million over 4 years to play football. Montana led the 49 ers to their 4th Super Bowl victory in the previous season. Montana has become the standard by which all other quarterbacks are measured.

Richard Marx was a back-up singer and song writer before he landed a solo recording contract in 1986. His first album, "Richard Marx", spawned four hit singles and earned him a Grammy nomination. Even though it took Marx until 1989 to release his second album, "Repeat Offender", his music continues to be popular.

M.C. Hammer is a 27-year old rapper from Oakland, California, who is really hot. His second album, "Please Hammer Don't Hurt 'Em", sold close to 5 million copies and is one of a few rap albums in history to land at the top of the charts. When Hammer puts on a show, it's an extravaganza, complete with 32 performers, cutting edge costumes, and some of the flashlest footwork being done on stage today. He's an entertainer, no doubt about it.

The shelter on the average houses 22 individuals per night and in the winter, the number is sometimes more.

The shelter is open to anyone who wishes to spend the night. If an individual is not a resident of Rowan County, they are allowed to stay there for 3 days while looking for other housing. This community service is one of two service projects the Religious Life Council attempts to provide for the community.
