For the past two or three years we have made the improved varieties of Cannas a specialty, and have gathered together for trial everything that has been offered that we have considered promising, and in pursuance of our usual policy of working up large stocks of the best things after thorough trial, have pleasure in offering the following novelties which we can recommend, and which our customers can purchase with entire confidence and can recommend them to their customers, as they are novelties of extraordinary merit and will give unquestioned satisfaction. The improvement in this class of plants is so marked there will be no place for the so-called French Cannas that were grown even two or three years ago, from this time out. Every florist in the United States who sells plants should invest in these Cannas to a greater or lesser extent. They make one of the finest plants for the decoration of the greenhouse that one can have, and the flowers can be used for cut-flowers in decorative work with most telling effect, as there is nothing that approaches them in brilliancy and grandeur. For bedding plants for grouping on the lawn they are brighter than any other plant, and unite with brilliant flowers foliage of tropical luxuriance. We introduced Md. Crozy very largely last season, and every one who purchased it has been more than pleased with it. We have without question the largest stock of Md. Crozy to be found anywhere, and can furnish it in any quantity. We now offer four novelties for this season, which we have propagated extensively, believing these to be the best and most distinct and valuable kinds in their separate colors that have been sent out, up to this time, since the introduction of Md. Crozy, excepting some of the "rare and scarce sorts" offered below, novelties of 1893, of which stock is limited, and which cannot be offered in quantity until next year.

ALPHONSE BOUVIER.—This is the grandest Canna, all things considered, introduced up to this time. It is a very luxurant grower, growing consider-ably taller than Md. Crozy, throwing up flower stems freer than that variety. In good ground and under good cultivation the plant will grow eight feet. The tips of the shoots are surmounted by immense clusters of bright crimson flowers of the very largest size, and nothing can exceed their brilliancy. It has a peculiar habit of drooping the flower cluster a trille as the second flowering shoot begins to push above the first, and the shoots flower two, three, or more times, one after the their their their shorts in blower is many as the interval of the shorts flowers. It was sent out very little last Spring, but there was no supply of it to be had at anything like a reasonable price, and we purchased all we could obtain of it, paying as high as \$1.25 each for it; but there was no no to be had even at this high price. We were fortunate, however, in securing a larger supply of it than any one else, and are pleased to say we can offer it at a low price the coming season. We think for general bedding purposes it will, if anything, surpass Md. Crozy—at least, if not surpass it, it certainly will meet with equal favor. As a pot-plant for greenhouse cultivation, it is not so desirable on account of its taller growth, but for bedding purposes in many ways it will be superior. It is entirely distinct, and as the color is absolutely different, one will not conflict with the other in any way.

CAPTAIN P. DE SUZZONII.-We have tested all the yellow varieties of Cannas that have been introduced so far up to this time, and can say without hesitation, this variety is the best yellow Canna introduced so far. It is almost as large a flower, with about as broad a petal as Md. Crozy, with a very large spikeof bloom, and is slightly mottled with scarlet. The scarlet markings are such, however, that instead of detracting, as is usual with most of the yellow Cannas that have been so marked heretofore, it intensifies, if anything, the brilliancy of the yellow. There is a great demand for yellow Cannas on account of the desirability of the color, and this is bound to have a heavy run in consequence. It has a distinct habit of growth, the foliage very nearly approaching the banana.

**PAUL MARQUANT.**—This variety is not much known, but it is one of the most distinct of all the varieties, and one of the most beauti-ful. Many who have seen it in our houses have considered it preferable to any other variety, not excepting Md. Crozy. The individual flowers are larger than any other, and the flower spike very large, each flower standing out separately by itself. The flower is as line as the finest orchid. The color is very hard to describe, to give any adequate idea of how beautiful a shade it is. It might be described as a bright salmon, with a carmine tint, The flower has a silvery lustre, which glistens and lightens it up with a silvery sheen, making the salmon of the flower very brilliant. Some have described it as apricot—a shade that is so fashionable at the present time. For greenhouse culture it is one of the finest of all, as the growth is not as tall as the two preceding sorts.

MISS SARAH HILL.-This variety somewhat approaches Alphonse Bouvier in color, but is entirely different in every way. The flower spike is held erect and upright; the crimson has considerable carmine in it, and so it may be called a carmine-crimson. It is entirely different from Alphonse Bouvier in the style of the flower spike, and in the habit of growth; the flower spike is held erect, and while the head is not so large as Bouvier, it is of more dwarf growth, and holds its head of bloom a trifle longer than Bouvier. Its main merit hes in the fact of its being more dwarf so that it can be used where it would not be practicable to use Alphonse Bouvier.



Hydrangea Paniculata Grandiflora.





# ASPARAGUS ROOTS.

The ground for an Asparagus bed should be thoroughly prepared beforehand by trenching TWO FEET deep, mixing the soil thoroughly with plenty of manure, as no more can the soil thoroughly with plenty of manure, as no more can be applied after the beds are planted except by surface dressing; the soil can scarcely be made too rich. A plot of ground 20 feet by 50 feet will be large enough to supply a moderate-sized family, requiring 300 plants. Plant in rows 3 feet apart, plants I foot apart in the rows. To plant the bed, open trenches 6 inches deep and the width of a spade, spread the roots out carefully in all directions, keeping the crown 6 inches from the surface. Plant always in spring, as carly as the ground can be worked. In autumn cut old stalks of, re-move all weeds and cover with a ton dressing of manure. move all weeds, and cover with a top dressing of manure, which should be forked in, in the spring, with a dressing of fine salt, about 2 or 3 pounds per square yard, or 200 pounds for a bed of the above size. A new bed should be left uncut two years, cutting the third year.

The colors are very brilliant. In order that all may succeed with these lovely flowers, we give the following hints:

#### HOW TO GROW ASTERS.

For early flowering, sow rather thinly in March or April, in good, rich compost, under a frame; prick out when seedlings have two leaves, shade and water; plant out in the middle or end of May. For later flowering, sow the seed thinly, out of doors, on a soil nicely prepared sow the seen thinly, out of doors, on a soll needy prepared in drills six inches apart, the first week in May. As soon at they are about an inch high, prick them out on a well-prepared bed, three or four inches apart: shade them from the sun until well rooted, which will be in three or four days; never let them become spindling, for if arounded many around they may a down well. Keep if crowded when small they never do as well. Keep them stocky and vigorous. Before the plants begin to

run up in the stem, plant them out where they are to stand for blooming, in well-manured soil, being care-ful to remove them with as much mold attached to the roots as possible; let the rows be one foot apart, and the plants teninches or a foot apart in the rows. If the weather is dry they must be watered until they take root; afterward keep clean from weeds, stir between the plants, and about the first week in August top-dress with rotten manure from an old hot bed, or water frequently with liquid manure. Give them plenty of water and tie them to neat stakes as they advance in growth.

For an Autumn display it has no equal among annuel flowers; as it is essentially a fall flower, like the Dahlia, and does best late, it can just as well be planted out of doors in May, unless *early* flowers are desired, as it does best, and the flowers are largest and most perfect when cool, dewy autumn nights come. #### HOW TO MAKE A LAWN.

"The first point is to get the ground shaped to the desired grade, taking care in grading that when hills are removed sufficient sub-soil is also removed, to be replaced with top-soil, so that at least six inches of good soil will overlay the whole in all places. When the grading is finished drains should be laid wherever necessary ; then the whole should be thoroughly plowed. A heavy harrow should then be applied until the surface is thoroughly fined down. The lawn is now ready to be sown. When the seed is sown a high tharrow should again be applied, and after that a thoroughl rolling given, so that the surface is made as smooth as possible. In the latitude of New York the seed may be sown at any time during the months of April and May, and will form a good lawn by August, if the preparation has been good, and when necessary can be sown as late as Sept. 1st, if weather is favorable. For small plats, of course, digging, trenching and raking must be done, instead of plowing and harrowing."

Mowing machines are excellent after a comparatively close turf is established, but for the first six months after sowing, a sharp sythe should be used in preference to the machine. Frequent mowing and rolling are indispensable to maintain the turf in good order. By following these directions, a close sward will be obtained in a short time. 


