



#### Happenings of 1950-'51

Nineteen Fifty—Fifty-One was an era of of important world developments, and at the same time a period of constant activity for American high schools throughout the nation. At Hamlet High School this particular date in history had individual significance for each student; for the freshmen it was the beginning of a new era in their period of education, to the sophomores new doors of school activities were opened, the juniors found the thrill of their first Junior-Senior Banquet, and, of course, the seniors prepared to leave behind them all that had constituted their carefree school days in Hamlet.

What happened in '50-'51? No student will ever forget the exciting grid season in which the H. H. S. football army was led by such outstanding warriors as Bobby Allen, Pete Hornaday, Bobby Strock, Gene Gunter, Carl Uzzell, and Tracy Caulk . . . Ending the football season was the initial Harvest Festival which honored the local homecoming game with a banquet at which Governor Scott was the guest speaker. In honor of the occasion Rebecca Hatcher was crowned Harvest Queen . .. Another step toward progress in this particular year was the remarkable manner in which the newlyformed school band stood out in various athletic contests and in the town's annual Christmas parade . . . It was also a big year for the Hamlet High Glee Club under the capable direction of Miss Jocelyn Rhyne . . . Leading the way with Speech Club activities were the debating teams composed of Lewis Levine, Bob Niemyer, Rebecca Hatcher, and Bill Allen . . . Basketball was also in the limelight for Hamlet during 1950-'51 with the local lads and lassies turning in a number of commendable hoopster battles under the leadership of such court personalities as Margaret Snyder, Sue Brown, Eva Gray Davis, Wennie Mitchum; and Stanford Honeycutt, Bobby Brigman, Herbert Kirkley, and Bobby Allen . . . In the field of dramatics the "Dramedians" presented several local productions as well as an entry in the North Carolina Playmaker's Theater at Chapel Hill . . . Another Chapel Hill event was the state-wide journalism conference which was attended by four local representatives: Meda Grigg, Rebecca Hatcher, Tat Howell, and Bob Niemyer . . . Members of the Senior Class received their beautiful class rings in January . . . Members of Miss Liles' French Club found mements of enjoyment corresponding with French "pen pals" . . .
