Chowan Baptist Female Institute.

HISTORY.

The Institution was founded more than twenty years ago by the Chowan and Portsmouth Associations, for the purpose of furnishing to the Baptists and their friends, a first class school, possessing all the necessary facilities for imparting a thorough and liberal education. They accordingly erected a large and beautiful building, and furnished it with an elegance and a liberality, which enabled it at once to take rank with the best female schools of the country. This rank it still maintains.

A debt contracted in the original founding of the Institution, unliquidated at the close of the late war, for a time imperiled its safety and impaired its prosperity, but a few brethren, at the instance of the Board of Trustees, generously paid the debt and assumed the temporary control of the Institution, with the pledge, on their part, that they will restore it to the denomination whenever the money advanced by them shall be refunded. In the meantime the school is conducted on the same principles and mainly by the same men as formerly. It is now in a very prosperous condition, and being free from all encumbrance, its continued prosperity may be reasonably anticipated.

LOCATION.

The location is eminently appropriate, embracing a tract of twenty-eight acres adjacent to the town, it secures the important advantages of privacy and affords ample means of exercise and recreation within its own inclosure.

A fine lawn of six acres, immediately in front of the collegiate edifice, laid out in walks and ornamented with shrubbery and flowers, adds greatly to the attractiveness of the place, and affords, at the same time, inducements to out-door exercise and means for botanical pursuits.

HEALTH.

This location was selected over several others in some respects more eligible, on account of its celebrity for health; and the history of the two schools (for the Methodists have here a large and excellent Institution) fully sustains the previous reputation of the place. Both schools have had, for many years, a large and widely extended patronage, and the experience of both concurs in establishing the fact, that pupils from the hill-country, coming here in October and leaving in July, are little, if at all, liable to chills, the only form of disease that can be considered peculiar to this climate, while those from nearer the sea-coast are generally improved in health by a residence here.

The water on the Institute premises is equal in purity and coolness to the best water of the hill-country, being obtained from a well forty-five feet deep,—uniform temperature 55°.

GOVERNMENT.

The government is mild and parental. It is regarded as of primary importance that pupils be induced to act from *principle* rather than from fear of punishment; hence every effort is made to reclaim the erring by kindness and by appeals to the reason and the *conscience*; if these fail the student is privately withdrawn from the Institution. No young lady will be allowed to remain long in the school, whose example tends to encourage idleness or insubordination.

Incentives to diligence are furnished from the moral relations of the individual, and the obligations growing out of them, rather than by appeals to ambition and the hope of reward. The object is to make the student feel her responsibility as a social and rational being, endowed with the power of doing both good and evil, and that it is obligatory upon her to strengthen her faculties, as a means of *usefulness* to others and of *happiness* to herself.

Pupils from abroad are not permitted to make visits or to receive them, except from relations, or friends from their own neighborhoods. Boarding pupils never leave the Institute premises except when attended by an officer of the Institution or a near relative.

No young lady is permitted to open an account with a merchant, without permission from her parent or guardian.

Costly dressing is discouraged, and the wearing of useless jewelry strictly prohibited.

Every pupil on application for admission is examined on her previous acquirements, and is placed in such studies as the Board of Instruction deems best for her, due regard being had to the special wishes of her parent. Ornamental studies are selected by the parent alone.

When a young lady has been placed in a certain routine of study, she is not permitted to change her studies except for good and sufficient reasons.

It is very important that pupils should be entered at the beginning of the session, and no deduction from charges is made for the loss of the first two weeks. Those who enter at any time during the session and join the same classes with which they were previously connected, are charged tuition for the whole session. An absence of a few weeks frequently renders it impossible for a young lady to regain her position in her classes.

New pupils are received at any time, and, after the first two weeks, charged only from the time of entering.

Classes are formed and new studies commenced at the beginning of the Fall Session, hence pupils entering at that time have greatly the advantage of those entering at a later period.

SESSIONS AND VACATION.

The scholastic year is divided into two sessions, thus :—

Fall Session begins 1st Wednesday in October and ends 14th day of February following. Spring Session begins the 15th day of February and ends with the Annual Commencement, 1st Wednesday in July.

The Vacation extends from the 1st Wednesday in July to the 1st Wednesday in October. This arrangement was adopted after due deliberation, and experience has proved it eminently judicious. The length of this vacation renders all others unnecessary, and hence only one day's suspension of business will take place at Christmas.

LECTURES.

Weekly Lectures are delivered on literary and scientific subjects either by members of the Faculty or by distinguished gentlemen invited for that purpose.

APPARATUS.

The Institution is furnished with a very complete and superior set of Philosophical, Chemical, and Astronomical Apparatus for the practical illustration of the principles of those sciences.

LIBRARY, READING-ROOM AND CABINET.

The Institute is furnished with a small, select Library, a Cabinet of Natural and Artificial Curiosities, and a Reading-Room supplied with a suitable periodical literature.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

Considering religion as constituting the foundation of character and happiness, the founders of the Institution incorporated into its system of instruction and discipline, the christian religion in its essential features, as held and taught by evangelical denominations.

Religious services are held morning and evening, at which all the pupils are required to be present. They are also required to attend public worship and Sabbath school on Sunday, in the forenoon, when the weather permits, at the village church, and in the evening at the Institute chapel.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC.

Music, both instrumental and vocal, is taught by the best teachers that can be procured. For the last two years and a half the department has been under the direction of Mrs. S. J. Myrick, a refined and cultivated lady, who has taken unusual pains, under the tuition of the best masters, to qualify herself for teaching; and having taught over a dozen years in the Institution, she is well known to its patrons as the most popular and successful teacher ever connected with the school. Under her direction and tuition, the department has acquired unusual efficiency. Her associates are ladies also of experience and superior qualifications.

DEPARTMENT OF FINE ARTS.

This department is under the direction of a lady of long experience and unrivalled ability. It is justly popular, and presents superior advantages to those who wish to cultivate their taste for the Fine Arts.

STEWARD'S DEPARTMENT.

This department heretofore rented to a steward, who furnished it and received the profits of it, will henceforth be retained by the Trustees. A competent man will be placed in charge of it, and like all the other departments, it will be under the general supervision of the President, whose long experience warrants the assurance that it will be administered in a satisfactory manner.

## Remarks.

While the foregoing scheme of studies may not embrace all that is desirable, a long experience has proved that it embraces as much as can be successfully accomplished in the time allotted to it. The *time* (six years) is as much as most young ladies can, or ought to devote exclusively to scholastic studies.

To render the instruction as efficient as possible, the Institution is furnished with unusual educational facilities

None but experienced teachers are employed, and those who have proved their competency by success in teaching.

The President and several of the Teachers reside in the Institution, and give their whole time to the interests of the school.

The President himself presides in the room occupied for study by the advanced classes; he keeps before him a schedule of the whole school, showing the duty assigned to each pupil, and frequently passes through the building to see that all are at their places.

Almost the whole school consists of boarding pupils, so that no time is lost from inclement weather or other causes which usually affect the punctuality of those residing in private families.

The location is happily adapted to secure exemption from all causes calculated to divert the attention of pupils. Under these circumstances, it is evident that as much successful study is accomplished as is consistent with the capacity and diligence of pupils.

### DIRECTIONS FOR TRAVELING.

Those living near any of our railroads will find it most convenient to come in the cars to Boykin's Depot, on the Seaboard and Roanoke Railroad, about twelve miles from the Institute. From that point to Murfreesboro' there is a daily line of hacks.

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
