#### Announcement from Board of Trustees

The Trustees of Chowan College will operate it as a Junior College offering the first two years of college work, beginning September, 1937. Their purpose is to have Chowan College from the first, meet the requirements set by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. This will assure the students full college credit for their work in all other educational institutions and state departments of education.

With some additions to the scientific laboratory facilities already provided for, the College will have the required physical equipment. It has its buildings and grounds, which were much improved last year, wholly free from debt. The Library contains about 9,000 volumes, three times as many as are prescribed by the Southern Association for Junior Colleges.

The minimum annual operating income, fixed by the Southern Association, is \$20,000, of which not less than \$10,000 should be derived from stable sources other than student fees.

Beginning September 1, 1937, the College is assured of the full amount to meet this requirement. It is expected that the student fees will provide more than the remaining \$10,000. In addition it is hoped and expected that the friends of the College will provide it with ample endowment, so that in all respects it may meet the financial standards of the Southern Association.

# PRESIDENT AND FACULTY

For President of the College the Trustees have elected the Rev. J. L. Carrick, D. D., until recently pastor of Blackwell Memorial Baptist Church, Elizabeth City, and a member of the Board of Trustees. His zeal for the interest of the College is well known to all its friends, and the Trustees feel that he will gain active cooperation in promoting its welfare in its new role as a Junior College.

The members of the faculty have not yet been selected, but it is the purpose of the Trustees to secure men and women who will not only meet the academic standards set by the Southern Association, but the inspirational teachers and leaders of the students, and influential in the general social and religious life of the section.

#### THE WORK OF THE COLLEGE

As a Junior College the institution will no longer grant degrees. It will give instruction to no high school students. All its work will

be of college grade. A limited number of irregular and special students, however, may be admitted to classes for which they are prepared.

In planning the work regard is had for two classes of students: first, those who after completing the work at Chowan College intend to enter a four-year standard college and do the remaining two years of work for a bachelor's degree; and second, those who on completing two years at the College will enter on the active work of life. A more detailed statement of these two lines of work will be found elsewhere.

## REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

The requirements for admission are the same as they have been at Chowan College and are at any other standard college. Any graduale of an accredited high school who comes with a properly attested certificate of work showing the completion of not less than fifteen units, and who is recommended by an authorized officer of the high school, may be admitted to Chowan College. A blank for application may be found at the back of this bulletin.

#### THE COURSE IN ARTS AND SCIENCES

This course is for those who intend to continue their work in a four-year college. For admission to it the requirements are; English, 4 high school units; Foreign Languages, 2 units; Algebra, 1.5 units; Geometry, 1 unit; History, 2 units; Electives, 2.5 units.

The work for the two years will be practically the same as that heretofore offered in Chowan College for the same years. On its completion the student will be entitled to a diploma, "Associate in Arts and Sciences."

With variations to meet the needs of individual students the work of the first two years will be as follows:

A limited amount of the electives mentioned above to be chosen from courses in Home Economics and Commerce and Business. For those who plan to take Medicine the electives will be in the Sciences.

#### COMPLETE COURSES

For those whose purpose it is to enter upon active work on the completion of their two years of Junior College work, courses will be offered that definitely fit them for it. The entrance requirements are the same as those for admission to the college. The two departments in which provision will be made for this class of students are those of Home Economics and Business and Accounting. Students who elect these courses will do about half the work in each year in them. They will take the same courses in English and Mathematics as students in the course in Arts and Sciences, and also the same course in Physical Education. The course in Business and Accounting will include practical training in typing, stenggraphy, and bookkeeping. On the completion of these courses students will be entitled to Certificates of Proficiency in them.

#### Music

For the present the College is making no provision for the teaching of music in its regular curriculum. Students who desire instruction in Piano and Voice may obtain it by private arrangement with highly competent instructors in the College.

## OTHER MATTERS

In other matters the regulations and practices of Chowan College of previous years will still be followed. There will be the same regulations regarding work and recitations, the same general regulations and residence regulations. It is assured that the fine religious life and activity in students' organizations will continue, and that the students will enjoy the same pleasant social life. The spirit of the old Chowan will continue in the new.

#### STUDENT OUTFIT

Each woman student should bring for her own use as an occupant of the college dormitory the following articles: Two pairs of sheets, one pair of blankets, two counterpanes, two pillow cases, six towels, dresser and table scarfs, a glass, a spoon, and a 60-watt light bulb.

#### EXPENSES

For students living in the College dormitories the fees are \$260.00 for the school year, and are payable quarterly in advance, unless special arrangements are made with the President. These fees are distributed as follows: tuition, \$95.00; board, \$125.00; average room cost, \$40.00 (best rooms \$50.00, and other rooms \$35.00 for each occupant for year). In addition there will be special laboratory and infirmary fees and others, which will be the same as those named in the last edition of the catalogue of Chowan College.

Arrangements are being made to provide suitable rooms for the young men students at reasonable prices. They will also be provided with good table board, either in the College dining room at the prices indicated above, or in private homes or clubs. All will

be under the care and supervision of the faculty.
