Introduction


On October 11, 1848, Chowan Baptist Female Institute opened its doors. As the name "Chowan" indicates, the institution is located in the northeast section of North Carolina, a portion of which was once occupied by the Chowan Indians. The name of this tribe was given to a county, a river, an association of Baptist, and through this association, to an institution.

The first recorded discussion concerning the establishment of Chowan Female Institute took place in April of 1848; yet less than six months later the institute opened its doors with a complete faculty, with adequate buildings and equipment, and with a creditable enrollment which grew through the school year to nearly fifty students.

The dream of a college for girls located in the bounds of the Chowan Association was envisioned from time to time, but it began to take definite form during an informal conversation after supper in the home of a Baptist deacon, Dr. Godwin Cotton Moore, On Friday morning, May 19, the Association took up an important item: The establishment by the Chowan Association of an institution of higher learning for girls. A full Board of Trustees was elected and instructed to obtain a charter from the next State Legislature. The Board of Trustees was authorized to purchase provisions and adopt all the arrangements necessary to carry out the plans for the Institute. The name which the Chowan Association decided upon for the School was the "Chowan Female Institute". The dream of Godwin Cotton Moore was realized. As a result, a new day dawned for hundreds of girls in northeastern North Carolina and southeastern Virginia, who had previously been forgotten in the matter of higher education.

The College was located in the old Hertford Academy building on Broad Street. Within three years McDowell Columns was constructed, and in 1851, the college moved there. The building serves today as the administration headquarters.

For sixty-two (62) years the institution was known as the Chowan Baptist Female Institute; in 1910 its name was changed to Chowan College. Until 1937 it was a senior college, but it was changed that year to a junior college.



Chowan College remained open during the Civil War, although a number of Southern Colleges closed. By the latter part of the 19th century Chowan was recognized throughout the south for its high standards in scholarship and culture. The Twentieth century brought continued progress to the college by way of additional buildings and equipment and the maintaining of traditional high standards. However, due to the shortage of students during World War II, the College closed its doors in 1913. Since its reopening in 1919, the college has experienced an unusual growth both in enrollment and physical facilities. It is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The first commencement was held on the present site in 1851. The campus then consists of 50 acres.

Chowan is old in tradition. Since 1880, the bell with its "bell tower" has been an integral part of life. If it could talk as well as ring, it might peel forth the legend of the Brown lady who haunts the campus on Halloween night; the story of the young confederate officer hidden in the watch tower and of the young ladies spreading their hoop skirts on the steps to prevent the Yankees from finding the hidden confederate; the story of the rumored insurrection, a phase of the Nat Turner rebellion, the the shooting and burial of one of the rebellionists on the campus while the girls were gathered in one room for prayer; of all-day steamboat rides and picnics on the Meherrin River; of all-day commencements, with visitors arriving by boat and being guest of the Spencer House of the Boyette Hotel; of its famous presidents and educators as William Hooper, Archibald McDowell; of its first famous literary society organized in 1857; of the entrance, graduation, and return of its illustrious allumni; of its famous "Crow's Nest", for seniors only; and of all the numerous heartaches and joys that have been purred forth amoung its shaded walks and drives.




The purposes of Chowan College are expressed in the following quotation as established by its Founders. It is taken from the Catalogue of 1853-54:

"It is established for holy purposes: to discipline - mind; instrumentally, to sanctify mind; then to direct its strengthened energies. The latter are regarded as of paramount importance, as transcendent talent, without moral culture, produces only evil. That system of education is, therefore, radically defective, which neglects the heart. The true system contemplated a symmetrical development of all the faculties — physical, intellectual, and moral — and has regard to the whole sume of our existence."

Chowan now is 128 years old, proud of its history, tradition; both past and present, not content only to look back, but eager to look forward!

Perhaps the secret of Chowan's longevity is service to thousands of young men and women throughout its one hundred and twenty-eight years has been the exceptional strong leadership from its Presidents. Exemplifying this unique characteristic were the administrations of Dr. William Hooper, President, 185+1862, who was the gradnson of William Hooper, one of North Carolina's signers of the Declaration of Independence; Dr. Archibald McDowell, President 1848-1849 and 1862-1881; John C. Scarborough, President 1897-1909; Dr. F. O. Mixon, President 1951-1956; and continued today by Dr. Bruce E. Whitaker, who is in his 19th year as President of an institution which is serving its community, region, nation, and students in the proudest tradition.



In the fall of 1931, Chowan College decided to broaden the field of service by opening its doors to young men. This measure was introduced also to ease a financial burden of the college.

As the times changed, the rules and regulations had to change too. In 1853, students were not allowed to visit the stores nor the post office, but obtain goods through their friends, and all purchases were to be approved by the lady with whom they boarded. In 1909, boarding students were not permitted to receive visits from young gentlemen, except upon the written requests of parents or guardians. Jewelry was also discouraged. In 1969, dancing on campus was not permitted by the college. Also in that year those students who neglected their studies, wasted time... were asked to withdraw. All of these rules have been done away with today. Our most recent change in rules concerns the women. Before March of 1976, girls had to be in the dorms at 11 o'clock, except upon written permission from their parents. For those students, the curfew was 1 o'clock. As of March 22, 1976, women have unlimited curfew. This rule was not changed because the college wanted to but because of the Equal Rights Amendment. Also this rule was not changed for abuse but so women could become more responsible for their decisions in terms of residence hall living. Women will be making more decisions independently, but hopefully based on wise and mature academic and social considerations.

The traditition of Chowan College that is most talked of is the Brown Lady. This is the story of a girl who died while in school. One tradition says that the spirit of loyalty to Chowan so pervaded her life that she returned again from the dead to test the loyalty of the students and to see if they had fallen away from the lofty ideals of Chowan. Also she returns to instill the spirit of loyalty in each freshman by an impressive ceremony.

Another tradition concerning the Brown Lady is contained in a poem by Mrs. R. Harry Underwood, a Chowan alumna who, along with other alumni, has kept the "Brown Lady" alive. The poem says that the Brown Lady is in love with a Southerner but he wants to fight for the North (in the Civil War). On the day he left, he said that he would return to her after the war was over. After the war, she got a letter saying that he had died in battle. The last stanza of the poem tells why the Brown Lady is still around:

"So if you hear rustlings of the stairs, thry the hall Or see her go tripping thry the pines in the fall Or, if by chance, you should see her one night Stroll 'neath the pines in the melting moonlight She'll be keeping her "tryst" with her lover, they say, For she knows he'll come back as he promised that day,"

The dress of Chowan students has changed right along with the times. Here are a few examples of the changes:

There was a great feeling of unity and harmony among the college community this summer. Students relied on each other for entertainment and enjoyment. It was a time when the faculty, staff, and students merged and mutually learned from each others' experiences. There were many night time activities like watermelon feasts, the great homemade ice cream provided by Dean Lewis and the Pruettes, the tug of wars, and of course the talent show that was enjoyed by faculty, staff and students alike. Mostly, the nights offered a quiet peaceful time to sit and listen to sounds of living that were going on all around us.

Then, all of a sudden, the summer was over and students began returning to Chowan. One can remember that day especially welf, seeing many people returning that swore they would never again gaze upon the white pillars of the Columns Building. One could even hear a few unexpected, "It's good to be back!" The long awaited return brought cheers and tears from the reuniting friends and lovers and there was a general feeling of excitement. Again it was time to get down to the business of trying to obtain an education.







The officials of Chowan College were concerned about athletics from the very beginning. The early catalogues show that the faculty desired that the students take regular daily exercise. Classes in "physical culture" were offered within a few years, and regulations around the beginning of the twentieth century required that "in addition to the regular work of the Physical Culture Department, daily exercise is compulsory, and games are encouraged and supervised."

The campus was equipped with a basketball field and two tennis courts after 1900 and keen interest in basketball was maintained through intramural sports, there is also mention of games of basketball with other schools as early as 1918.

In the 1920's soccer was introduced to the girls at Chowan College. The new game met with enthusiastic reception among the student body and on September 25, 1923, the girls met on the athletic field to learn the first essentials of "girls' football."

With the admission of boys in the 1930's, a modification took place in the atheletic program of Chowan College. The girls continued their Athletic Association and emphasized inter-class rivalry, while the boys organized teams in the major sports and competed with teams from other colleges. The general program for girls included tennis, swimming, soccer, volleyball, and softball during the fall; tap dancing and basketball during the winter; and a choice of tennis, swimming, minor sports, folk and character dancing, golf, archery, deck tennis, and badminton in the spring.

The boys at Chowan College quickly organized football, basketball and baseball teams and played nearby high schools and other colleges. Football began in the fall of 1933. In the spring of 1934 Chowan College fielded its first male baseball team.

Since 1949 Chowan has engaged in a full round of athletic events. The girls organized a Woman's Athletic Association to "encourage the spirit of play for its own sake and to work for the promotion of physical activities among the student body." Girls do not emphasize intercollegiate sports, but are offered softball, soccer, badminton, tennis, volleyball, basketball, and other sports in their physical education program. They have had basketball teams which played local high schools and other college teams.

The men at first emphasized football, basketball, and baseball. However, other sports such as track, tennis, and golf have their fans; and teams have been organized in these and other sports.

One of the high points in the football career of Chowan College came in the school year 1961-62. The Chowan "Braves" won every football game except one and were considered for an invitation to the Junior College Rose Bowl game in Pasadena, California.









In the early days Dr. Godwin Cotton Moore was given the responsibility of securing adequate teachers. As trustee of Wake Forest he was well acquainted with the work of that college, located about one hundred miles from Murfreesboro, and after an inquiry about possible graduates, the ability of one man caused his name to be given to Dr. Moore. This man was Archibald McDowell, and he was engaged by the the Board of Trustees as principal.

McDowell married one of the teachers of an all girls academy, Miss Mary Owens, and therefore the selection of McDowell as principal of the Chowan Female Institute brought not only a principal but also an experienced teacher. In addition, Mrs. McDowell's sister, Miss Sallie Owen, came as a teacher of music. Therefore, an experienced faculty who had worked together in the field of the education of girls came to operate the new school in Murfreesboro. Amos J. Battle completed the original staff of the Institute. He was engaged to serve as steward; that is, he was to care for the room and board of the girls of the Institute.

As the years went by, there was a need to add more faculty, staff, and administration members. Also some retired and there was a need for replacement. Members of the faculty are encouraged to continue their formal education, and each summer a large number engage in additional graduate study. In the summer of 1962, eighteen faculty members were engaged in further study, and two teachers were granted a leave of absence in 1962-63 for purposes of doing graduate work. Leaves of absence for the 1963-64 academic year were granted for further graduate study to three others, with some financial assistance to each by the College.

Today we have a faculty that is willing to help the students heyond just the academic studies and they will probably have an influence on Chowan's students for years to come.

CHOWAN COLLEGE:

Yesterday and Today

Although it may have been unknown to many of us, all current members of the Chowan College community have had the opportunity to "visualize" - to compare and contrast - what the campus was like in 1818-49 and what it is like today. Such a visualizing of past and present requires a trip to the corner of Broad and Sycamore streets, a little imagination, and some acquaintance with the present campus scene.

Stand on the corner of Broad and Sycamore streets and imagine 47 girls housed and attending classes in what is now the Melrose Woman's Club Building. Visualize the campus as consisting of what is now the lawn of that building. Then, take a look at the Chowan College campus as it is today — 11 major buildings neatly arranged around Jones Drive and spacious "Squirrel Park"; expansion to the south, including athletic and maintenance facilities, Carrie Savage Camp Hall, Parker Hall; and the scenic beauty of those wooded acres which constitute a major segment of the southeastern corner of our 235-acre campus. Such is illustrative of what time and history have made of the Chowan College campus over the past 128 years.

Imagine, further, that 1/2 of that original student body of 47 students is engaged in studies in the "domestic arts" (music, embroidery, etc.) and that only one of those students who enrolled in 1948-49 had sufficient academic preparation to complete the collegiate program of studies. Contrast that situation with the current one: 1025 students engaged in pursuing some 41 different curricular programs leading towards diplomas and/or advanced degrees. Such is illustrative of what time and history have made of the academic program of Chowan College over the past 128 years.

The historical contrast can be seen in very sharp and elear focus when we look only at the beginning and at the present. But, running throughout that long course of 128 years has been a "common thread," a "tradition" - academic, religious, and social. It is that "tradition," with its constant appeal for academic excellence, religious awareness and commitment, and social development and concern which has motivated, and - in some sense - made possible the progress of Chowan College throughout these years. It is that multi-faceted tradition which has made us who and what we are today.

Chowan College is the great institution she is, today, because of students and others from the past who "cared" about the quality of her life. Chowan College will be an even greater institution of Christian higher education in the days ahead as those who share in her current life join the ranks of past sudent generations, and others, who "keep on caring" about their Alma Mater.


Faculty



On October 11, 1848, eleven students registered at Chowan Female Institute. The eleven, however, were merely a foretaste of what was to come. One by one young ladies came to Murfreesboro by boat and by wagon until forty-seven had registered. By 1940, the enrollment of Chowan was about 200. Now in 1976, Chowan College has approximately 1,000 students. This includes students from the four corners of the world.

Many of the Chowan graduates have made contributions to the college as individuals and as a group through the Alumni Association. The graduates testify to the accomplishments of the school. They do this by coming back and giving talks to the Association.

One often underestimated contribution of a college is the preparation of its graduates for service in the home and community. To this day paintings are found in many homes in northeastern North Carolina and southeastern Virginia which came from the work at Chowan Institute. As a result of the training at Chowan, therefore, many of the graduates have become outstanding homemakers.

Many graduates of Chowan College have been connected with well known people. Annie J. Ward, the first graduate of the Institute became the wife of John W. Moore, the famous historian of North Carolina. Anne Battle was the wife of the Rev. B. J. Harrell, a well-known poet and Baptist minister who wrote, "Ho, for Carolina." Elizabeth Marable, became the wife of I. B. Lake, the president of Roanoke College in Danville, Virginia. Amaret Reese, married Dr. P. R. Henson. Dr. Henson was a professor at Chowan for a number of years and served as a pastor in Philadelphis, Chicago, and Boston. There is a number of other graduates who have married prominent people but it would take another page to name them all.

In years to come there will be more people to graduate from Chowan who will be well known for one reason or another and we will be just as proud of them as we are of the past graduates.

Closing

The officials of Chowan College are not content to rest upon the accomplishments of the past and present. They are planning and working for a greater future. Further increases in salary and quality of faculty members; advancement in quality educational offering; and increasing service in everyway to the people of northeastern North Carolina and southeastern Virginia are the general objectives for the future.

The newest buildings that Chowan has built are Parker Dorm for Men which was erected in 1970, and Carrie Savage Camp Hall which was constructed in 1973. The next improvement to the campus will be a new gymnasium.

Since the beginning of Chowan, the rules and regulations have changed just as the times have changed. In 1853, students were not allowed to open accounts with merchants, without permission from their parents or guardians, and all purchases must be approved by the lady with whom they board. They do not visit the stores nor the post office, but obtain goods through the agency of friends. All letters received pass through the hands of the principal; and where there is suspicion of a clandestine correspondence, the letters are enclosed to the parents or guardians, without examination. Also in that year they had a required uniform and were not allowed to wear jewelry.

In 1909 the government regulations read: "... Boarding students are not permitted to receive visits from young gentlemen, except upon the written requests of parents or guardians; nor are they permitted to spend the night out of the college... Boxes of eatables, except fruit, are seldom desirable and may be returned..."

In 1969, "... Dancing on the campus of Chowan College was neither sanctioned nor permitted by the college.

Those students who neglect their studies, waste time...may be asked to withdraw..."

All of the above rules and regulations have been done away with now. Read over them again and try to realize how really lucky we are not to have to abide by those rules.






