## 1996 SUMMER OLYMPIC GAMES

The Opening Ceremonies were held at The Olympic Stadium in Atlanta on July 19, 1996 at 8:30 P.M. The Closing Ceremony finished off the events on August 4, 1996 at 9:00 P.M. The cost of tickets to view these two events ranged from $\$ 212.00$ to $\$ 636.00$. The United States won approximately 37 Gold medals, 24 Silver medals, and 20 Bronze medals, for a grand total of 81 medals.
The Olympic sporting events held are as follows: Archery, Badminton, Baseball, Basketball, Canoe and Kayaking, Cycling, Mountain Biking, Diving, Equestrian Events, Fencing, Gymnastics (Artistic, Competition, and Rhythmic), Handball, Field Hockey, Judo, Modern Pentathlon, Rowing, Shooting (Riflery), Soccer, Softball, Swimming, Synchronized Swimming, Table Tennis, Tennis, Track and Field Events, Beach Volleyball, Volleyball, Water Polo, Weightlifting, Wrestling, and Yachting. August of 1996
The Federal Flight Administration continues its debates on the issue of a set age limit to fly a plane accompanied or in solo flight. This issue has had ongoing controversy after Jessica Dubroff's plane crashed this month in Cheyenne, Wyoming during her solo attempt to be the youngest to fly across America. The doors opened wide this August at The Citadel for a new school year. For the first time in the school's history, women were permitted to attend the traditionally all male military institute. In June, the Supreme Court found the all male policy discriminatory and unconstitutional. Four women were admitted this year: . Jeanie Mentavalos of Charlotte, NC, Nancy Mace of Goose Creek, SC, Perta Lovetinska of Washington D.C., and Kim Messer of Clover, SC.

## SEPTEMBER 1996

Dr. Shannon Lucid, the American astronaut, returns home to Earth on September 26, 1996. Lucid had left for the Russian Mir Space Station on March 22, 1996. Mir is Russian for the English word Peace. Lucid set a U.S. record for having the most hours in space by a woman. One hundred and eighty-eight days to be exact. She traveled a total of 75.2 million miles in space during her trip.

On September 19, 1996 six year old Jonathan Prevette of Lexington, NC was suspended from school for kissing a female classmate. His reason for suspension was on the grounds of sexual harassment. It has been questioned whether his punishment was justified due to the innocence of childhood.

In the month of September, rapper Tupac Shakur of Los Angeles was murdered by gang members. The reason for his death was a mix up in a drug deal between the two gangs, the Crips and the Bloods. It is believed that Tupac was not involved with either gang. He just happened to be at the wrong place at the wrong time. His death has stirred up controversy by the nation on finding an end to gangs and gang violence.

Well, who could ever forget good ol' Hurricane Fran that swept through North Carolina on a late Thursday night in September? Most Chowan students can recall the Hurricane parties and the slumber parties in the hallways of their dormitories.

The storm hit first land at Cape Fear, NC around 8:00 P.M. on Thursday, September 5, 1996. The eye of the storm hit Wilmington, NC an hour and a half later with wind gusts up to 129 miles per hour. The eye of Fran furthered her course in a Northwest direction striking the Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill area at full Hurricane speeds. The course took a turn North into Virginia in the wee-hours of the morning on Friday, September 6, 1996 having reduced its wind strength to a tropical storm. Many shelters were opened for North Carolina residents to feel safe from the storm. Power was lost in most of central and eastern parts of the states. Millions of dollars in property damage were lost, and insurance agents were kept busy for weeks following. President Clinton declared then a state of National Emergency. The Red Cross, other volunteer agencies, and individuals arrived in North Carolina to help in the clean up and to house families who became homeless due to the damage.

## OCTOBER / NOVEMBER 1996

## October 1996

A biography on Hillary Clinton is to be released in the month of October 1996. The title, The Seduction of Hillary Rodham Clinton, was written by David Brook.

During the week of October 7, 1996, Disney World celebrated its 25th birthday. For the next 15 months the birthday will become the amusement park's theme. If you plan on attending in the near future, put on your party hats!

The 1996 World Series was held the week of October 20 between the Atlanta Braves and the New York Yankees. In game one, the Braves won, 12-1. Game two, the Braves won 4-0. In game six, held on October 26, the Yankees won their fourth game, 3-2, and the World Championship.

Consequently, a rough draft of the ransom note was found inside the parents' home. The amount of the money request is suspicious. It is not a rounded figure like $\$ 120,000$ and the amount also happens to equal a bonus check Ramsey's father received from work. On the morning of December 27, 1996 JonBenet's murdered body was found in the basement of her parents' home. The parents of the young beauty queen are prime suspects in the case.

## JANUARY 1997

On January 20, 1997, despite the frigid weather, the reinstatement of President Clinton and Martin Luther King Day was celebrated across the nation. Many programs recognizing the M.L. King Day were held before or after the 20th due to the popularity of the president's festivities. The two events consequently matched up this year. Steve Fossett from the U.S., the solo balloonist, was forced to land in India on January 20 due to fuel shortage. Granted he did not have enough fuel to finish his trip over the Pacific Ocean, he was able to hover over India in enough time to beat the longest time in the air by any one balloonist by one hour. The old record was made by two balloonists also from the U.S. Their time was six days and sixteen minutes.

On January 12, 1997 professional football gathered its best teams for the AFC and NFC Championships. In the AFC Championship game between the New England Patriots and the Jacksonville Jaguars, the Patriots won with a score of 20 to 6. In the NFC Championship game the Green Bay Packers beat the Carolina Panthers, 30 to 13. The Packers and the Patriots met in the "Big Game." Super Bowl Sunday was January 26, 1997. Green Bay beat the Packers with a final score of 35 to 21 .
