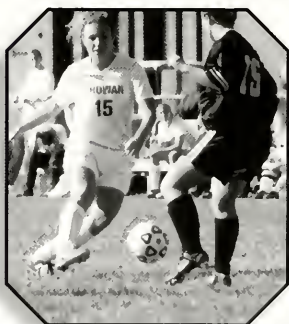

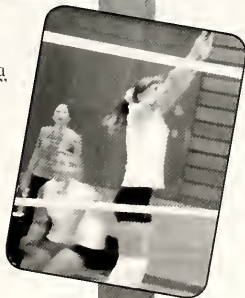

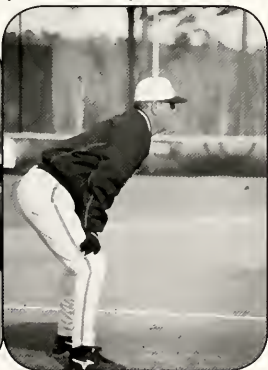

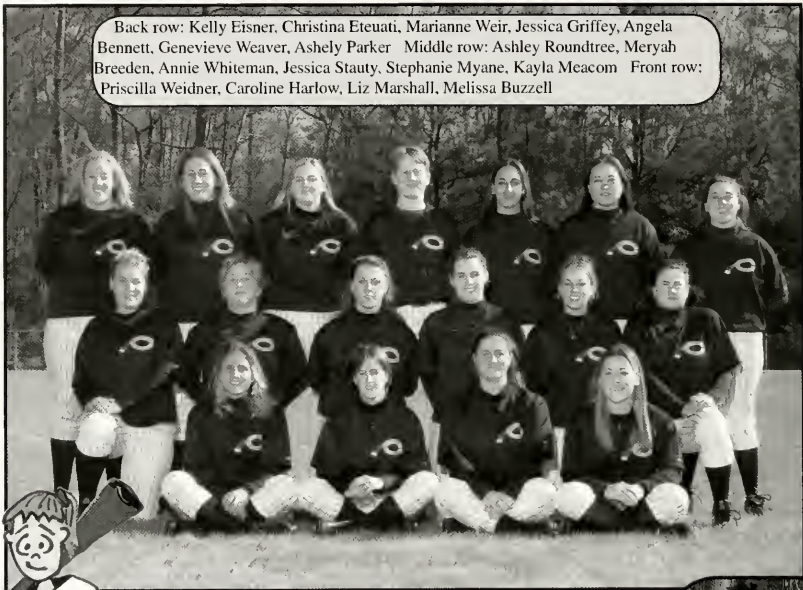

Four softball players earn All-Conference honors

Junior outfielder Angie Bennett earned Second Team honors after hitting .331 for the Braves, stealing 12 bases, and boasting a .941 fielding percentage. The Eure, NC native was fourth on the team in batting average this season.

Senior first baseman Meryah Breeden earned Second Team honors after a stellar 2004 season. Breeden hit a .380 clip, knocking in 35 runs, and leading the league in doubles at 18. Breeden hit 5 homeruns this season and surpassed the Chowan College career homerun record this season, getting 16 in her four-year career. The Virginia Beach, VA native was third on the team in batting average this season.

Sophomore pitcher/infielder Kayla Meacom earned Second Team honors as a utility player. She started in 19 games as a pitcher, earning a 14-5 overall record and a 1.32 ERA. She also had a .929 fielding percentage from the mound and at second base. The Norfolk, VA native hit at a .304 clip this season.

Sophomore shortstop Ashley Rountree earned Second Team honors after hitting .385 this season, collecting 47 totals hits to lead the team in that category. She knocked in 21 RBI and collected 6 doubles this season. The Belvidere, NC native was second on the team in batting average this season.

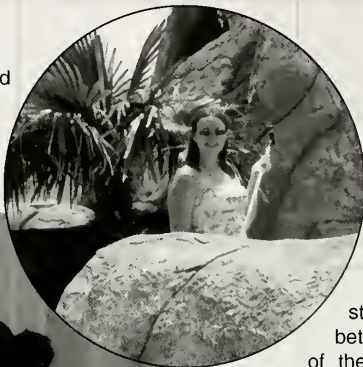

For the fourth year, Chowan hosted the Hertford-Gates Relay for Life event in Squirrel Park on April 16-17. This year, organizers set a goal of \$177,500 and raised \$186,000 for cancer research. They had hoped to exceed the half-million dollar mark and clearly achieved that goal with the four-year total now standing at over \$650,000.

During the opening ceremony, names of survivors were read aloud, with Girl Scouts presenting each with daffodils and a Relay pin. The survivors' walk followed, with survivors taking one lap around a portion of the park. After that, caregivers and over 30 teams walked the lap. Later in the evening, over 1,000

luminaries that lined the park were lit in honor of those fighting cancer and in memory of those who have lost the battle, with names being recognized during the special service. Throughout the night into Saturday afternoon, team members walked in the fight against cancer.

While walking, teams were entertained by a variety of performers. These included the Riverview Review Step and Voice, the Chowan College Gospel Choir, Nancy Joyner and the Eastern Brass, the County Line Cloggers, and Beth Burleson and Highway to Heaven. 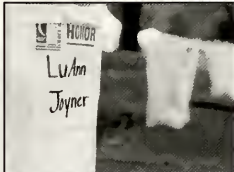
