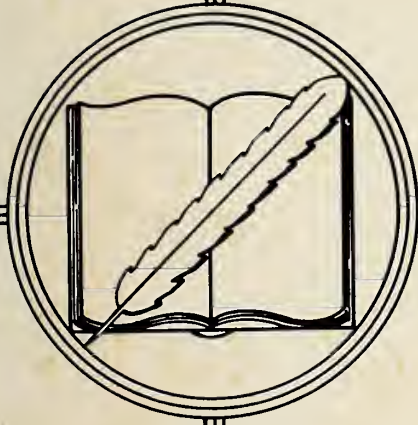

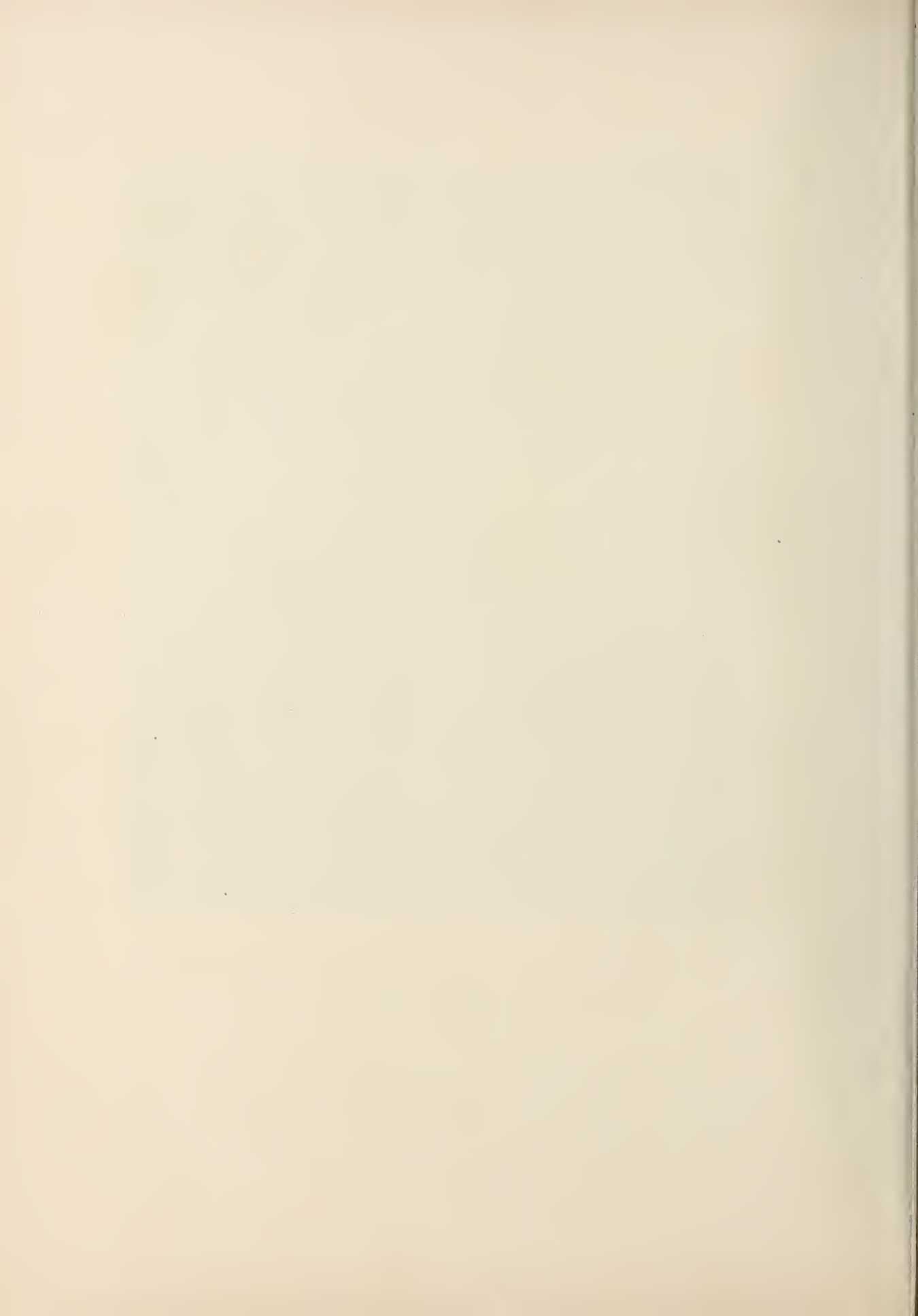

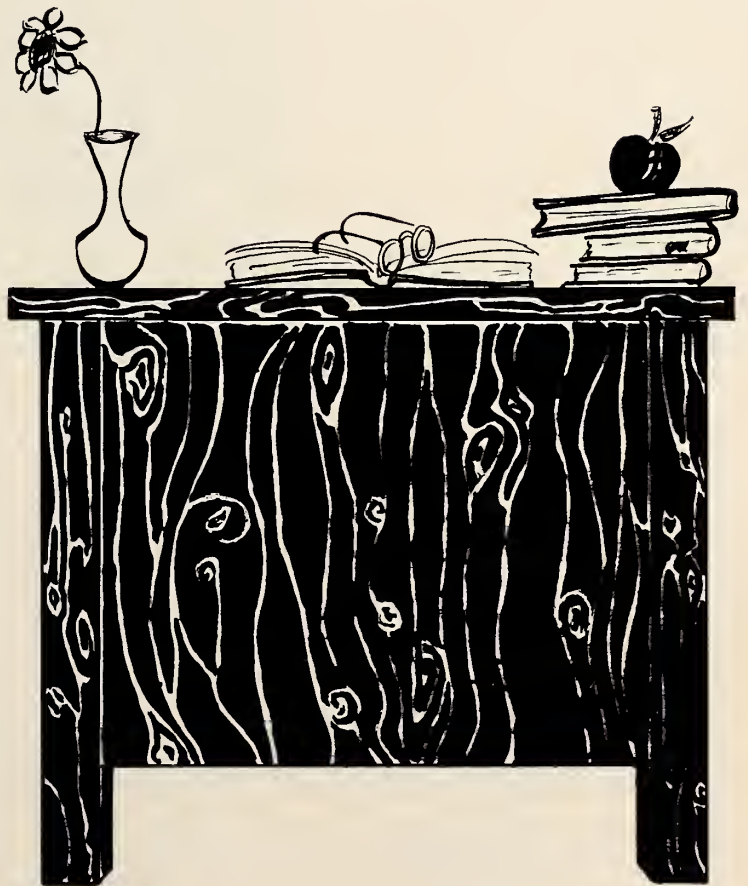


Dedication

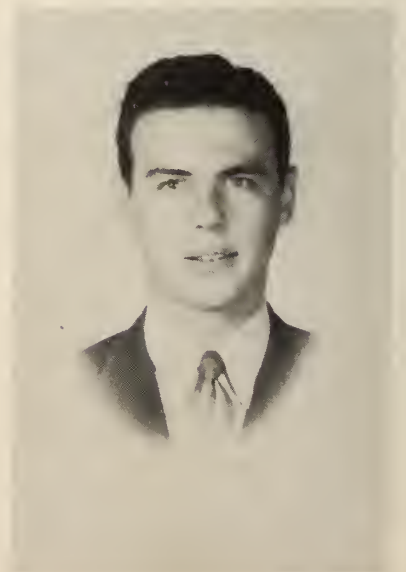

Miss Aileen Reel, our much admired Senior teacher, has helped us a great deal more than we know. She was a great source of advice while we were working on our annual for 1951. She was also the director of our Senior Play "Deacon Dubbs", which we presented with a great deal of enthusiasm, even though it took a lot of practice.

We cannot forget our other teachers of this last year, Miss Majette, Mr. Hicks, Mr. Stephenson, and our principal, Mr. Welch, who were strong staffs for us to lean upon, when we needed advice or aid.

This last year has been filled with a great many different activities, but we have come smiling through. We are looking forward to our long awaited trip to Washington, D. C. We know it will be a trip we Seniors will enjoy very much, even if it will be the last one we Seniors will take together.
