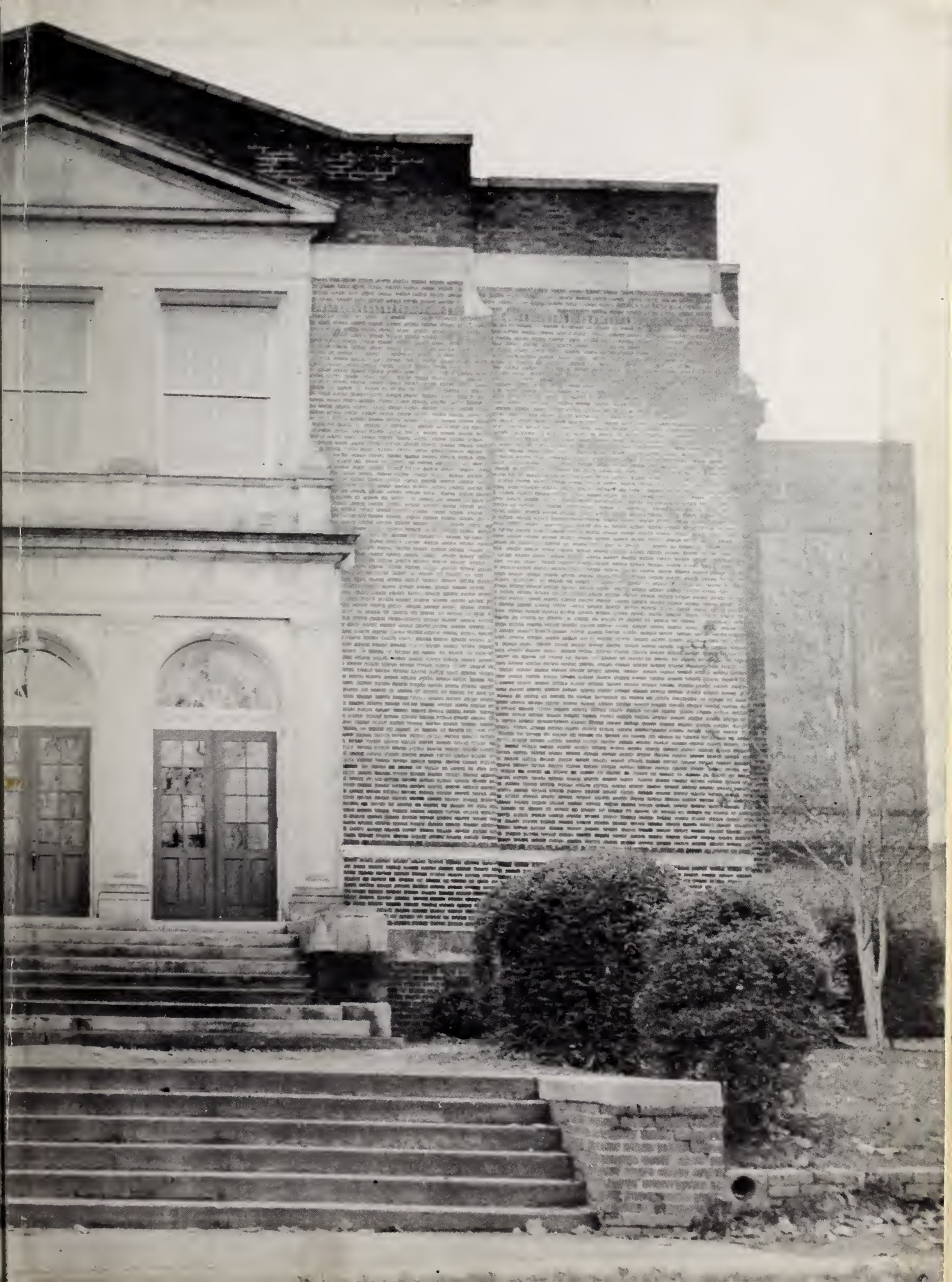

As it shines for you today.

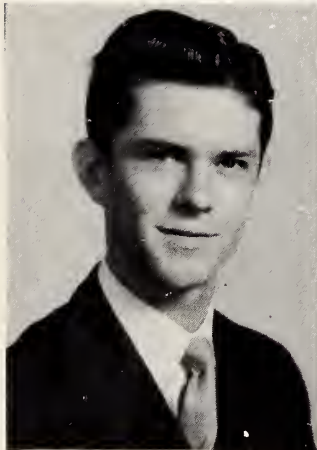
