




Hi Band

History

As the seniors of 1957 prepare the great Exit of Graduation and the grand Entrance of Life, they sadly but proudly turn back the pages of twelve years that truly may show somewhat a personification of Emerson's words: "Hitch your wagon to a star."

It was 1952 that we proudly held the "green" freshman title, enduring the agony of grease and perfume, a necessary evil of each freshman's first day. We remember Mr. Braswell, our math teacher, for his bashfulness around the girls in the math classes. We had a most enjoyable time with Miss Taylor in the Dramatics Club's production of the Negro Minstrel of '54. Mr. Hicks proved to be the sternest piece of structure we had ever met, but we soon learned to like him as teacher and coach. At the end of that first year in high school we were almost demolished by a terrible disaster which befell us called final examinations.

Through these we came and ranked the new name of sophomore the following September. As sophomores we gained Miss Faison and Mrs. Anderson and lost Mr. Braswell and Miss Taylor. Also we had Mrs. Brooks as our home-room teacher. This year for the first time we began to look at high school with the attitude of putting something in as well as taking something out. We began to think of means of making money for our senior trip, and with the help of Mrs. Brooks we launched our first campaign to make money with an order of Christmas cards. We had a very successful struggle and the high light of our whole year came at commencement with the carrying of the rose arbor.

By the time we were juniors, our number had decreased but we had really just begun to work. To begin our projects for that year we chose another order of Christmas cards and then topped it with 1,000 boxes of candy, adding a neat profit to our treasury. Immediately following midterm exams we began the choosing of our junior play. After much contemplation we chose "Pride and Prejudice" and in its presentation we tasted the sweetness of success as never before. Miss Sumrell was directing and how we all remember the first dress rehearsal and all the facial paint that accompanied the costuming. Before we had completely recovered from "Pride and Prejudice," we had to start our preparations for the Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom. The memorable times we had at the Smithfield Country Club in decorating to carry out our theme, "Hitch Your Wagon to a Star" would rank high indeed if our memories were listed in order of value. The prom was really something out of the ordinary since we had a five piece orchestra to play for the dancing. Thus the year passed, ending with our beginning the first section of our '57 Annual.

The summer passed quickly and it seemed no time before we were resuming work on the annual. Finally that long-looked-forward-to day arrived when we were officially seniors. Mrs. Charles Williams, the former LACY GARRIS, is very happy in her role of housewife. Her family, Charles, and lovely twin boys, are very fortunate.


There across the way I see the famous BOBBY HARRELSON who is known throughout the world as a second Peter Marshall. His ability as a great speaker has been quite helpful.
