



#### WE BECOME MORE CREATIVE THROUGH LANGUAGE ARTS

The language arts program, in preparing students for a creative and responsible life in a democracy, is of paramount importance. Through language arts, students learn the important art of communication—vivid speech, intelligible writing, appreciative listening, reading with comprehension, and the skillful use of books and libraries.

Miss Bazemore and Miss Tapp teach English III and IV; Miss Bryan, Miss Woodard, and Mrs. Yost teach English I and II. In addition to classes in English, Miss Tapp teaches journalism; Miss Bazemore, dramatics; Miss Bryan, history and civics.

In a democracy speech activities are fundamental. English enables a student to study the use of speech in everyday living, and to cultivate as much skill as possible in correcting speech difficulties. # WE BECOME MORE DISCRIMINATING THROUGH MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE

Mathematics helps to equip the learner, both as a student and later as an adult, to live more proficiently, more happily, and more intelligently in the quantitative society of today. Mr. Underwood teaches Algebra II, Plane and Solid Geometry and Trigonometry; Miss Langford, Algebra I and II; Miss Fergerson, eighth grade Arithmetic and General Math.

Today, more than ever before, if we are to understand our civilization and surroundings, and if we are to make wise decisions, it is necessary for us to have some knowledge of science principles and methods, and to develop scientific attitudes. Mrs. Barnes teaches General Science and Chemistry; Mrs. Spicer teaches Biology.

#### We Become Better Acquainted With Others Through Languages and Social Studies

The study of foreign languages helps in promoting international good-feeling and understanding. From a study of Spanish the student is introduced to Pan-American countries and his Latin-American neighbors. Miss Adkins teaches Spanish I and II. Latin gives the student an opportunity to learn of the classics and culture of ancient Rome. Mrs. Moore and Miss Noble teach Latin I and II. Mrs. Moore also teaches English II, and Miss Noble, Arithmetic.

A major objective of the social studies program is the development of fundamental concepts concerning the economic, social, and cultural life of the people through exploring the community as well as other sources of information. Miss Norman teaches World History and United States History; Miss Blackburn, Commercial Geography and United States History; Mr. Woodard, U. S. History, Civics, Sociology and Economics. Mr. Hyde also teaches Sociology and Economics.

Marriage, divorce, politics, crime, and Mr. Hyde's jokes make Sociology and Economics one of our most interesting and helpful classes.



We Become More Efficient and Better Prepared for Practical Work Through Shop and Commercial Courses

Class work in the commercial courses and practical problems in office procedure prepare the student to take his place in the business world. Bookkeeping classes, taught by Mrs. Felton, teach the student to keep his employer's books correctly and to balance a budget. Typing I and II, taught by Mrs. Felton and Miss Farmer, emphasize speed and accuracy. An important aim of this department is to offer practical training for future use in the business world.

Emphasis is placed on industrial arts as basic training for future vocations as well as a means of developing simple tool skills and mechanical abilities useful in the home, school, and avocational life of the pupil. Mr. Rose is the industrial arts instructor.

Diversified Occupations, taught by Mr. Hyde, gives students practical work and related instruction in the occupations of their choice.



Sadie Hawkins Day, the one big chance a girl has all her own. These two Dog Patchers were the prize winning Daisy Mae and Li'l Abner.





The Choir is scheduled as a regular elass period and earries one-half unit toward graduation. Anyone in high school may join the Choir after passing a voeal test.


During the class period, the Choir studies different types of music. For a month before Christmas they study Christmas music. A specialty of the Choir is the study of folk-musie.


At the beginning of the 1946 football season, too much wasn't known or expected of the Cyclones. The starting lineup was composed of 5 lettermen, Zrakas, Womble, Mattox, Newsome, and Speight; 4 Veterans, Hawkins, Hackney, Shaw, and Beaman, and one boy from the Junior team, Davis. The backfield averaged 140 pounds and the line averaged 170. In the first game the Cyclones, after leading 7-6 until the final five minutes, became exhausted and dropped a nineteen to seven game to Greensboro. The Cyclones then caught fire and won four games in a row. They defeated Goldsboro, Oxford Orphanage, Raleigh and Henderson. Then on an off night, they dropped a 7-6 game to Durham. After defeating Fayetteville and Wilmington, they dropped a poorly played game to Rocky Mount 7-0. After losing a game to Staunton Military Academy, the Cyclones then met Favetteville in a play-off game and defeated them 14-7 to cop the eastern class AA Championship. After Greensboro failed to put in an appearance for the state championship game scheduled for Wilson, the North Carolina Association forfeited the State Championship to Wilson by the score of 1-0. This is the second time within three years that the Cyclones have won the State Championship; thus the Cyclones wound up a successful season, winning eight games and losing only three.


