

ATHLETIC PERSONNEL

Mr. H. L. Madden, Director of Athletics, came to Wilson from the Charlotte Technical High School in 1945. In 1946, his football team won the state championship, and three years later, his team was runner-up in the east. The basketball teams showed smooth form while taking the championship and while winning the runner-up position for the state title. After five years of success he is now faced with rebuilding his hope for future champions.

Coach Dickens, a star baseball performer at Wake Forest, has been a member of the staff since 1940, with the exception of three years in the U. S. Army. This year he has successfully coached our junior teams in both football and basketball. Last year he replaced Coach Benton as coach of the varsity baseball team and led them to an eastern championship and to the runner-up spot for the state title.


MONOGRAM CLUB



In their opening games they lost to a powerful Central High team of Charlotte 19-0 and Goldsboro 13-0. After these two defcats the Cyclones got their smashing running attack going and with Paul Gay leading the way, ground out a 26-6 victory over Raleigh. Next came two tough games with Mount Airy and Durham with the Cyclones on the short end of each score. Although the injury list was long, they mustered steam enough to trounce Statesville 19-6. Then came three crushing defeats for the Blue and Gold by Fayetteville, 18-0, Wilmington, 48-13, and Rocky Mount, 33-0. Rocky Mount's victory gave it possession of the Shelton Looms Trophy for the first time since its origin in 1948.






RESUME


